About Michigan News

Investigators from every corner of the state are taking a look at the results taxpayers are getting from \$82,000,000 spent on mental health.

Rep. Phillips of Port Huron wants an answer to the following questions:

1. How many children have lost contact with their families and moved to hospitals where space was available?
2. How many patients occupy the space in hospitals and what is the treatment of each?
3. What are the different kinds of treatment, the cost, size of the staff and training required to treat each type?
4. What facilities are devoted to each type of disease?

Funds to bring in experts to make the survey are requested.

The committee believes the state has 12 too many beds at the Coldwater institution, too many for some types, not enough for others. There is too much space for retarded children, not enough for mentally ill. There are 205 such cases according to Probate Judge Moore of Oakland county.

Another committee is studying committee procedure where civil rights are revoked. They want them suspended not revoked during a 3 year convalescent period. The mental health commission will ask the legislature planning money for a new mental health hospital, a 15000 bed addition, 1000 for children, 500 for adults. In the meantime they are trying to make room in existing hospitals.

The Corrections Committee wants a \$25,000,000 center for drug addicts, alcoholics and mentally ill in prisons and a unit near Detroit for criminal insane.

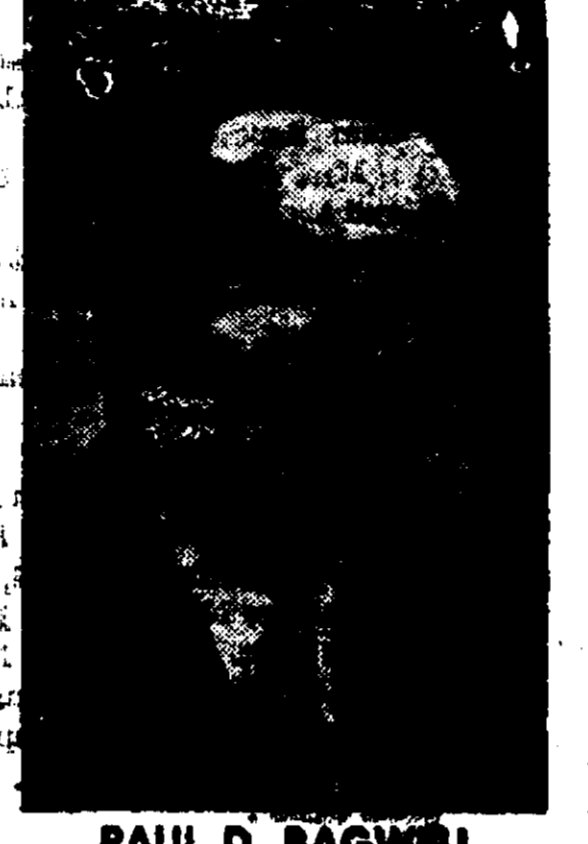

State Convention

THE REPUBLICAN CONVENTION

The Republicans held a unique convention at Grand Rapids last Saturday and nominated a ticket of unknowns. It was hailed as an unboasted convention with anyone free to enter the contest for offices. This is the first time. Conventions are not run that way. The directors of the convention were Paul Bagwell Senator Potter, John Martin, national committeeman and former state chairman John Felkena. Two of their choices went through easily Allen Weatherwax, a Jackson druggist for state treasurer and Jason Honigan, Detroit lawyer for attorney general. Ralph Osborn, a Detroit negro lawyer was also nominated but got only a few votes. Honi-

gan was born Russia and is the first Jew ever nominated by the Republicans for state office. He is president of the Mich. Mortgage Corp. and a director of the Wrigley Stores.

The office of secretary of state turned over a number of candidates. The two leading ones up to noon were Senator Faulkner of Colorado, a staff conservative noted for his labor views and supporter of right to work. The other was Arthur Hannah, Grand Rapids poultry man and brother of John Hannah, president of Mich. State University. Neither was favored by the Bagwell advisors but it was not until noon they came up with a candidate in the person of Raymond Plank, 48, proprietor of a small radio station at Luddington. It was his first convention and he was not even a delegate but an alternate. The word was passed around he was Bagwell's choice and he won getting 810 votes to 257 for Faulkner and 237 for Hannah.

John Clements, 45, of L'Anse, an insurance man also attending his first convention was nominated for auditor general. He was not a candidate when he came to the convention. He got 837 votes to 657 for Vincent Murray UAW man and chairman of the Republican Labor committee.

Austin Curtis, Detroit negro and Republican candidate for congress tried to get a civil rights plank in the platform but failed. He announced he would join the party and run as an independent.

A plank favoring a constitutional convention was placed in platform. Senator Hutchinson of the platform committee and to kill but could only muster 4 of the 12 committee votes. Rural members do not favor this.

Soft Ball News

The action of the chief justice in convention in California in drawing up resolutions blasting the supreme court decisions was ill advised. Chief Justice Deethmers of Michigan signed the resolution for which he was censured by 5 of the 8 Michigan supreme court justices who said he did not represent their viewpoint. Only 36 justices were present and southern justices predominated. They ignored segregation, stressed decisions they said favored Communists. We do not follow them. Anyone should know the McCarthy inquisition methods would not hold up. The whole was that their resolution was aimed at the supreme court desecration decision. If there had been so such decision there would have been no such resolution.

Like Ajax defying the lightning Gov. Fabus of Arkansas continues to back in publicity received by efforts to defy supreme court integration decision. He called a special session of the legislature who gave him power to close any school which integrated. Then he appealed the appellate court decision which revealed the stay in integration. As the decision will not be handed down until Sept. 11 the schools will be closed until then. It is hard to say how the supreme court can do anything but uphold integration. If they reverse themselves they will look silly. President Eisenhower continues to blow hot and cold on the issue. Following the appellate court decision he said he was prepared to enforce the decision with all the means in his power which was taken to mean the use of troops. At a press meeting last week he hedged slightly and although his wording was not clear left the impression he thought integration should be slowed up. This coming on the eve of court decision added to the confusion. When the decision is handed down Sept. 11 there will be interesting developments.

In the far east there has been a important change in affairs. The government and rebel forces are still fighting in Lebanon with the Americans as spectators. No more troops have been withdrawn by either the Americans or British. Jordan does not want the British to withdraw as she fears the Communists will take over. There is no probability that things will be settled there. Israel is the fly in the ointment. Any plan which does not include elimination of Israel will not be accepted by the Arabs. The western powers on account of the huge oil supplies in Arabia which are vital to their needs cannot allow a state of anarchy to prevail so if they withdraw their troops they will probably stand by on the bases they have near there.

To add to the general unrest prevailing the Chinese Reds started an incessant shelling of Quemoy and the Nationalist held islands adjacent to China and called on the troops there to surrender as they were about to invade them. This caused our 7th fleet at Formosa to be alerted and Gen. Dulles delivered an ultimatum that if they invaded Quemoy they did so at their peril. Just who is bluffing is not clear. There is wide doubt the Reds intend any serious attack or if they do the Nationalists will defend the islands on the other hand it is extremely doubtful if we would go to war over them. It might precipitate another Korea in which we lost 20,000 men and still have troops there.

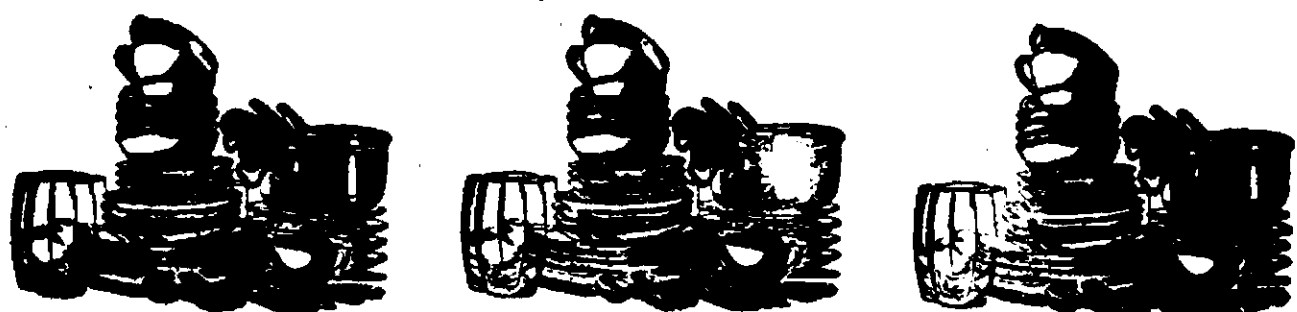

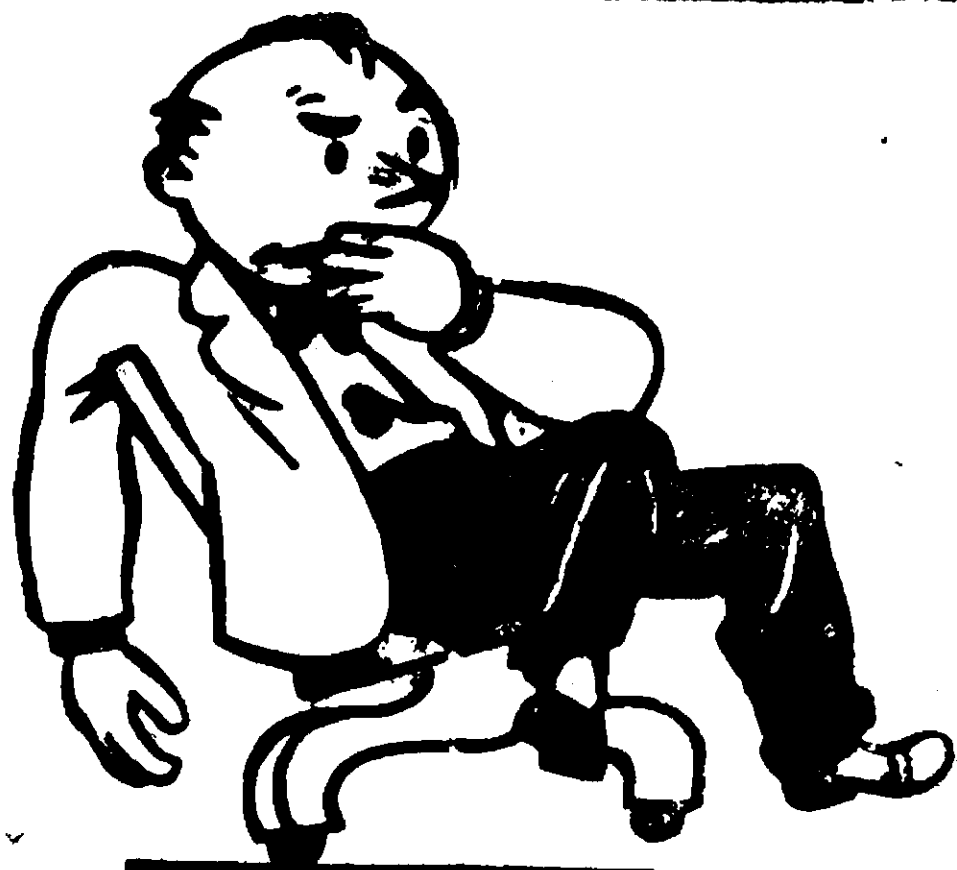

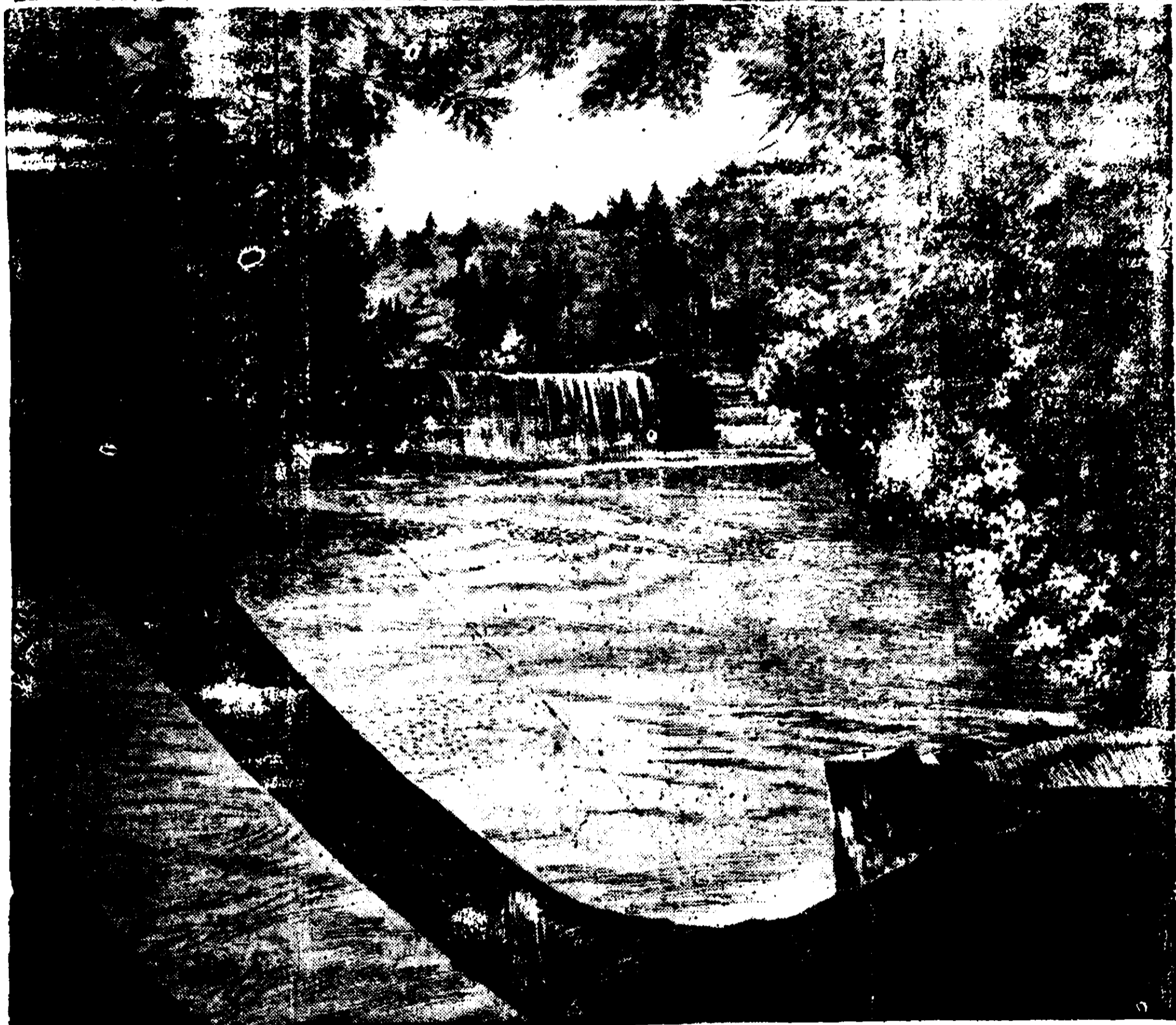
