About Michigan News

Michigan is bordered on all sides by water but there is still a water shortage in places. It also has myriads of streams and lakes across the land.

It seems to be a problem of distribution as the water is not always in the right place. Enormous new uses of water are needed for irrigation, industry and sewage disposal for the many growing cities and recreation.

The legislature is concerned. The problem has grown acute in the past 5 years and is becoming critical as cities and industries expand, also recreation spots.

Rural areas are shrinking. Once farming was the main industry. Now only 10% of the population are engaged in it and to make farms more profitable farmers are turning to irrigation to increase their yields and building ponds to collect water.

Industry needs more water. It takes 1,000,000 gallons of water to mine a ton of ore. Water is a necessity in sewage systems.

The argument now is whether to ration water or let a first come use all the water.

The result of all this is the water line has been lowered in many places and a value of water frontage land lowered.

On Nov. 4 the people will vote whether or not to call a constitutional convention. Republicans endorsed it at their convention. Democrats did not. They claim the method of selecting delegates is unfair. It is by senatorial district which represents area and not people.

The Dexter team took home the league trophy.

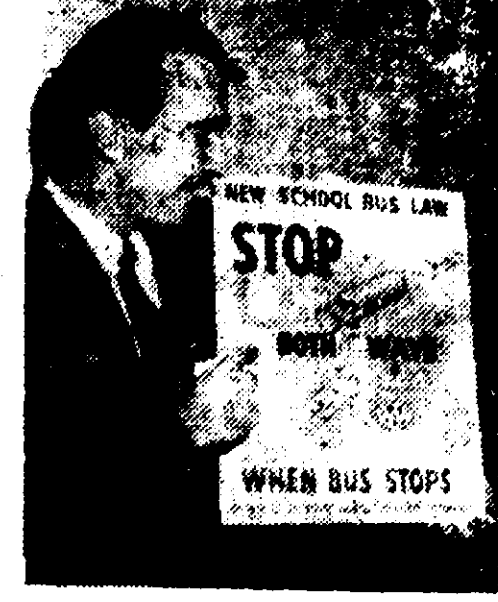

NEW SCHOOL BUS LAW

Michigan's new school bus law requiring a motorist to stop when meeting as well as overtaking a school bus goes into effect Saturday, Sept. 13 we are informed by Sergt. Pennala of the Mich. Police.

This new law conforms with all states but Utah. It does not apply to incorporated villages or cities but they can pass ordinances and erect signs to that effect. Stops must be made at least 10 feet in front or behind a stopped bus and the motorist can



not proceed until the bus is in motion or the driver signals him to proceed.

There are 2 exceptions. Stops are not required at intersections controlled by a stop-and-go signal or a police officer. But the motorist cannot proceed at a speed greater than 10 miles an hour. He need not stop on the opposite side of a divided highway while meeting a school bus.

When a school bus stops the driver is required to give signals by flashing lights front and rear but the motorist is still required to stop if the lights are not operating.

Current Comment

During prohibition days a Lansing woman became famous for receiving a life sentence for selling a pint of liquor. This was far fetched as she got the sentence because it was a 4th offense. So much publicity was stirred up over it the sentence was commuted and she never served it. It was known as the life for a pint case. Alabama has a case to rival it. Jimmy Wilson, 55 year old negro handy man received the death sentence for robbing a 95 year old woman of \$1.95. He had previously served 2 terms for larceny. He was scheduled to die last Friday but court granted a rehearing. The supreme court of Alabama had on June 12 upheld the execution. This situation has existed for years. The person who steals a few dollar gets the works, the one who steals a million after years of litigation goes free.

Detroit has a new police commissioner in the person of Norbert Hart, 46, millionair and C. F. Smith chain store executive with no previous police experience. He replaces the popular Edward Piggins, rated an outstanding commissioner. Somehow every Detroit mayor seems to think he ought to appoint his own police commissioner irrespective. There have some outstanding commissioners and some not so good. The outstanding ones were Frank Crowell, James Couzens, Dr. Inches, Frank Egan and Piggins. Just why Piggins was replaced is not known. It is said he and the mayor were not seeing eye to eye.

In London of all places a race riot took place last week in which 59 persons were hurt and the arrests numbered into the hundreds. It seems colored people, mostly from the West Indies and British possessions have been coming into London and now dominate whole sections of it which the white people resent. Hence the riots.

Great Britain and Iceland came to blows last week but the battle was between fishermen of both countries and unofficially Iceland is a rocky barren country with no industry and no farming and depends on fishing for income. British fishermen have been going into Iceland waters for 50 years they claim but due to scarcity of fish Iceland fishermen are trying to drive them out of the fishing grounds.

It now seems definite that if Red China invades the Nationalist held islands of Quemoy and Matsu the country will go to the aid of Chiang Kai Chek and Nationalist China. They are our burdens. It has cost this nation \$80,000,000 to maintain Chiang Kai Chek and his regime on Formosa since 1949. Congress has voted to aid him to defend Formosa but left it up to the president whether we should defend the off shore islands. They are but 3 miles from China, Formosa 100. Chang has fortified them and has 100,000 troops there. He wants them as a jumping off place to invade China. He had 500 men killed on them last week by the Red China bombardment. Dean Acheson, former secretary of state says they are not worth the life of a single American soldier.

Just how silly can one get? David Lawrence columnist for a number of daily papers says the 14th amendment proposed by Abraham Lincoln and adopted by congress nearly 100 years ago was illegally adopted as the southern states were not allowed to vote on it. Therefore negroes are still slaves and have no rights. He wants a supreme court ruling on it. And they pay him money for writing that stuff.

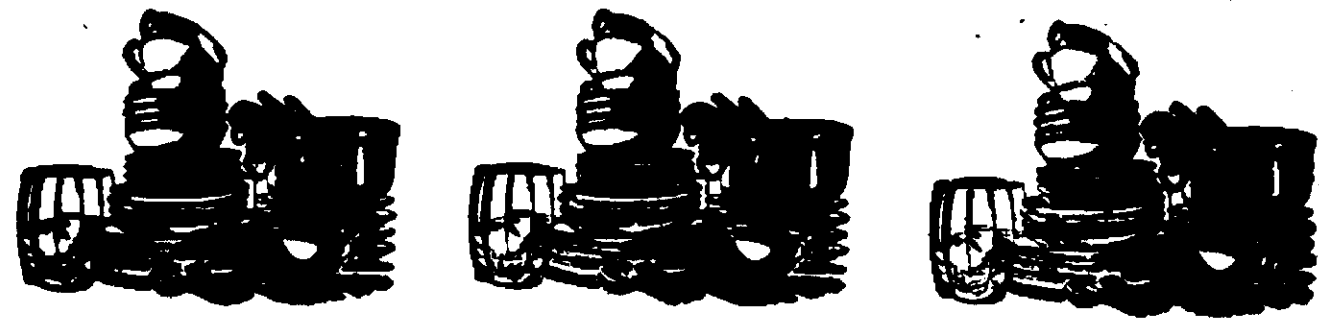

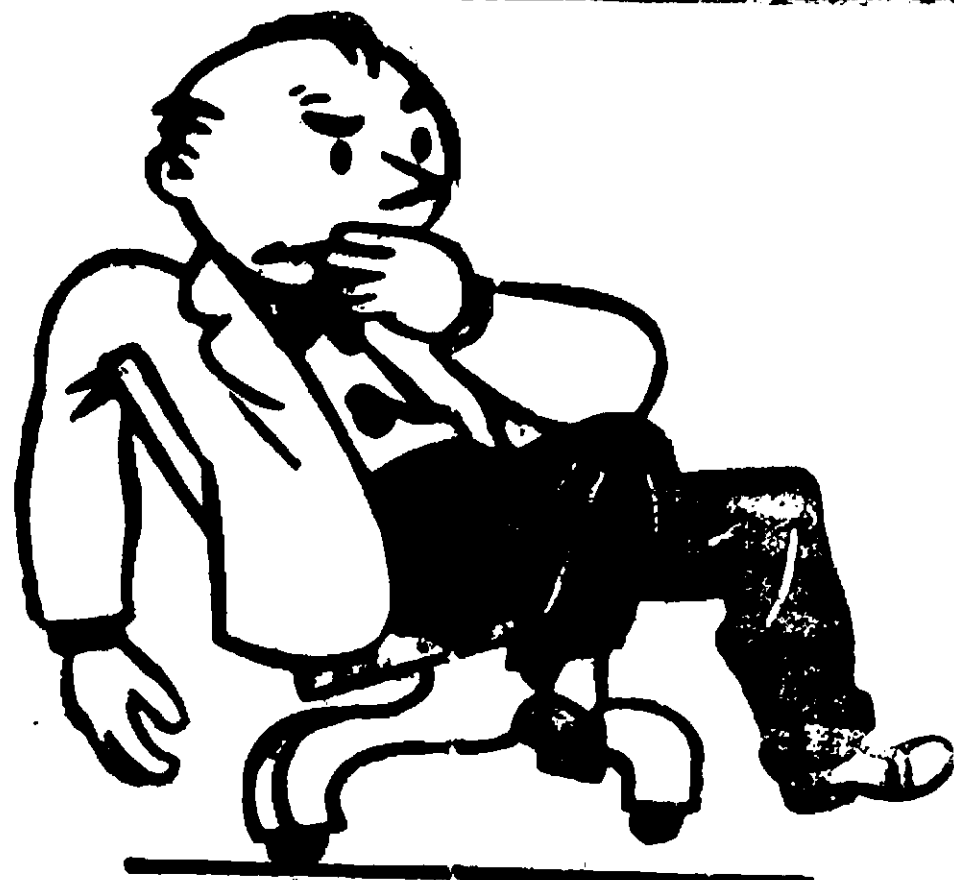
