About Michigan News

Michigan is in the throes of an almost accidental move to make the city the basic form of government. Through annexation, whole townships are disappearing inside of city limits. For better or for worse metropolitan areas are growing rapidly. The city is the court to annul a township and parts of two townships. But the Creek has elaborate annexation plans and so does Holt. The City of Research Council urges that Okemos, Pointe Farms, Gross Pointe Woods and Gross Pointe be merged to provide a single service at less cost.

There are the main issues. Usually the annexed area feels more taxes as new services are added. Local government is centralized. The council says it is silly to have 2 fire departments when one will do.

One problem is indebtedness of the municipalities. Neither wants to assume the debt of the other. A centralized government with a responsible head has been the goal of reformers for years.

Both parties are trying to give away Jimmie Hoff of the Teamsters Union. He left the Democrat party in 1952. He supported Homer Ferguson for U. S. senator and Mayor Cobo for governor. A committee released a list showing that many other candidates have been aided by the teamsters. Probably no one will know whom Hoff is supporting until election day.

Current Comment

President Eisenhower delivered an address last week in which he threw down the gauntlet to Red China and Russia in which he said if they try to take the off shore islands of Quemoy and Matsu from Chiang Kai Chek we will aid him with everything in our power. The going has been rocky there for Chang of late. Our aid has been ineffectual so far. Our 7th fleet escorts Chang's supply ships to Quemoy but stays out of the range of the Red China guns and the supply ships have to go the last 3 miles alone under Red China fire. As a result one supply ship was sunk and most of them have been unable to land supplies. It looks like Chang has got us out on limb, Congress voted to defend Formosa but left it up to the president to decide whether Quemoy and Matsu were vital to that defence. Chang made them so by placing one third of his troops on the island and says if they fall so does Formosa. The Reds think we are bluffing as we have done before. We have 2 courses open to us. 1. Invade China. 2. Make Chang withdraw his forces from the islands. He has had over 1000 killed so far and military men say the islands cannot be held. This may be the last brink.

The Democrats sprang a surprise last week when they took 4 of 5 offices for election in Republican Maine, including a senatorship governorship and two congressional seats. Gov. Muskie who won the senatorship was rated a strong candidate but the others were given little chance. Sen. Payne the defeated candidate was one of Bernard Goldstein's proteges and received money and a vicuna coat from him. The primaries held last week showed a strong Democrat trend the Democrats in most places outvoting the Republicans. The Maine result has renewed the demand for the resignation of Sherman Adams main beneficiary of the Goldstein gifts. The quip is heard "As goes Maine so goes Sherman Adams."

The football sages are picking the champions and Michigan Ann Arbor rank too high. Mill Marsh Ann Arbor News foot ball expert says Michigan will lose three games this year. He picks Mich. State and Ohio State as the leading teams. Michigan Tot Jim Pace their All American and Herminstein is out with a broken nose. A queer situation exists at Pinckney, when the high school only had about 100 they had many championship teams, every able bodied boy in the school came out for the team. The supreme court turned down the petition of the Little Rock, Ark. school board for 2 1/2 year stay in integration. Gov. Faubus is still defiant and ordered all the schools closed under a new law he had legislature pass last week. The federal government sent 40 U. S. marshalls and it is reported Faubus will be arrested for contempt of court.

Many schools who expanded find their income insufficient for operating expenses. The Dexter school lacked \$11,160.00 of meeting their August payroll. So they sold all their buses over 3 years old to the McCadden Co. of Wayne for that amount. Now they will rent buses from the McCadden Co. for \$180 a month per bus. It will be handled through the Devine Chevrolet and Gross Ford who will operate and service the buses. It cost the school \$5000 for bus repairs last year. A new bus costs \$8,500.

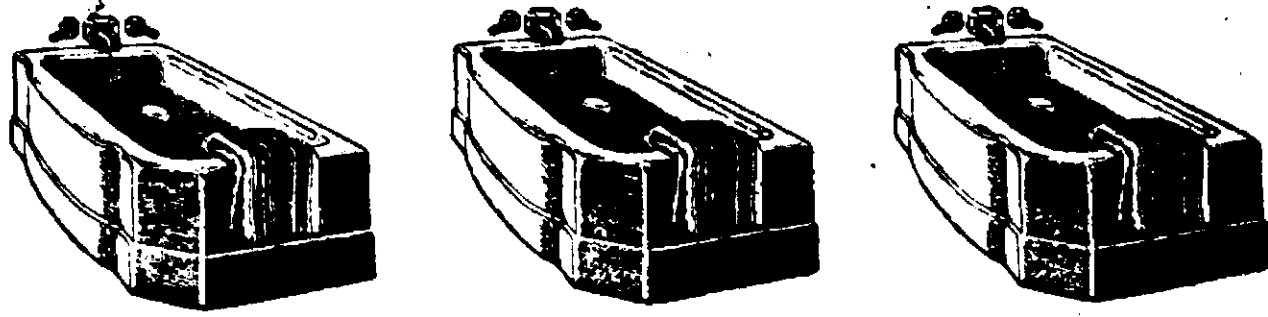

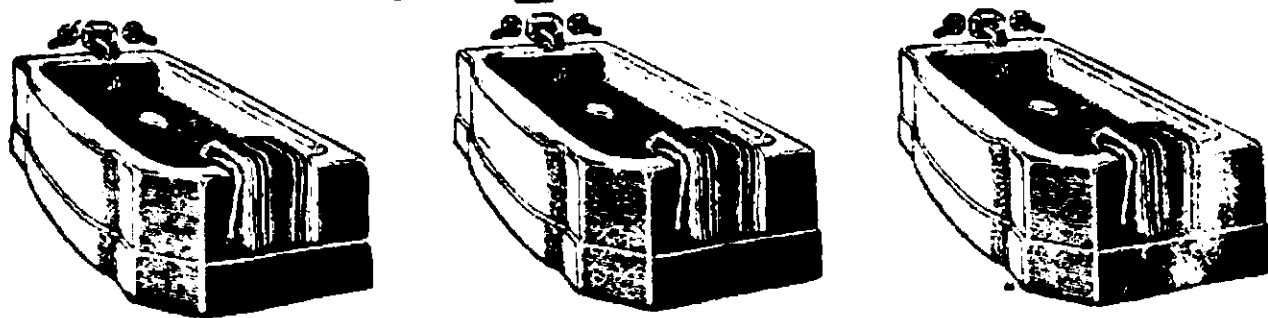

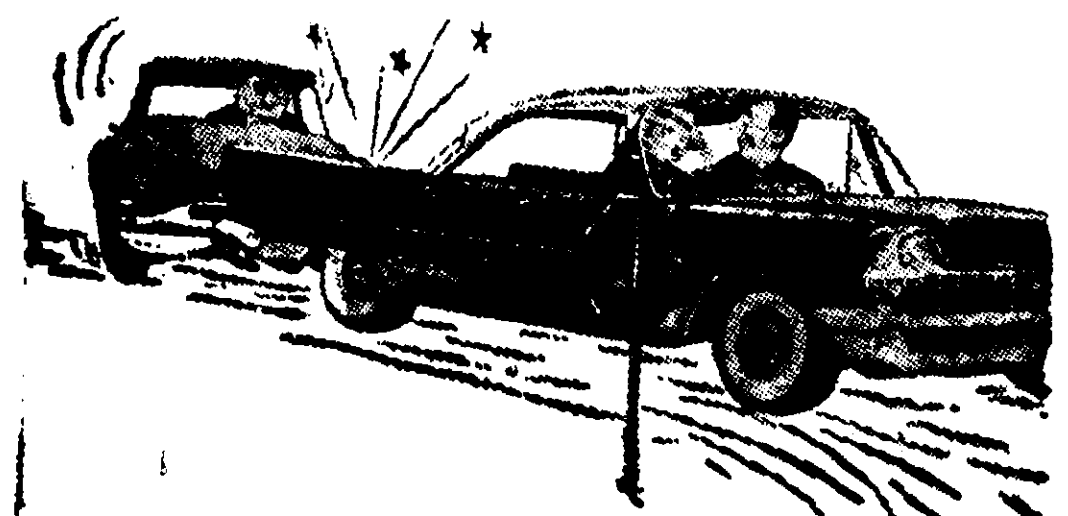

Soil Care Pays Off For New Corn Prince

DAVID LUX, 18, of Shelbyville, Indiana, the new Corn Prince, maintained an old family tradition when he won top honors at the recent International Grain and Hay Show in Chicago.

David is a third-generation champion in the family. His grandfather, Peter J. Lux, started it all back in the 1920's when he won the Corn King title our times. David's father Maurice, was Corn Prince twice and



David Lux, the new Corn Prince his Uncle Frank, also a former Corn Prince, was named reserve grand champion corn grower at the 1936 international show.

The Lux family attribute their corn growing success to careful seed selection, good management and soil fertility. This year, David's prize winning corn was grown on a 3-acre field he had entered in the 1936 Indiana 5-acre corn growing contest. The seed was an Indiana Certified Hybrid No. 8-44-D. Altogether, the Luxes had 118 acres in hybrid seed corn last season on the family's 400-acre farm in Shelby County, Ind. On most fields, the yields averaged better than 120 bushels per acre.

Over the years the soil fertility level has been built up and maintained by adding manure, crop residues and plenty of mixed fertilizer. Last season, the fertility program included 400 pounds per acre of 4-16-16 plowed down before corn planting, plus 200 pounds added in the row at planting. In addition, 45 pounds per acre of 80 per cent nitrogen fertilizer was applied for the corn crop.

Top-Dressed Alfalfa Gives Extra Tons Of Hay Per Acre

TOP-DRESSING alfalfa fields with fertilizer every year can pay off in extra tons of hay per acre per year, says the Middle West Soil Improvement Committee, in citing tests by Wisconsin soils specialists.



Hay yields are higher with good soil care.

A. R. Albert and A. M. Strommen, of the University of Wisconsin staff, report that hay yields have averaged more than four tons per year for the past six years on fields top-dressed annually with 300 pounds of fertilizer. Unfertilized fields yielded less than three tons of hay.

The tests were made at the Spooner Branch agricultural experiment station. The extra hay from fertilized fields the first year was sufficient to pay for the plant food the second year. These results have continued for each of the succeeding years. Agronomists say enough nutrients remain in the soil for extra two or three tons of hay with no added investment.

Balanced Fertility Boosts Corn Yields 55 Bu. per Acre

BALANCED fertilization in a rotation on low fertility soil boosted corn yields as much as 55 bushels per acre, wheat by 24 bushels and hay more than a ton per acre, reports E. C. Doll, University of Kentucky agronomist.

In tests at Campbellsville, Kentucky, plots that got lime, nitrogen, phosphate and potash fertilizer yielded 68 bushels of corn per acre, compared to only 11 bushels on plots that received lime alone, says Doll in a statement summarized here by the Midwest division of the National Plant Food Institute.

Wheat yields averaged 25 bushels per acre on the balanced fertilization plots, compared to seven-tenths of a bushel on plots that received lime alone; hay yields were 1.7 tons per acre, as against four-tenths of a ton per acre.
