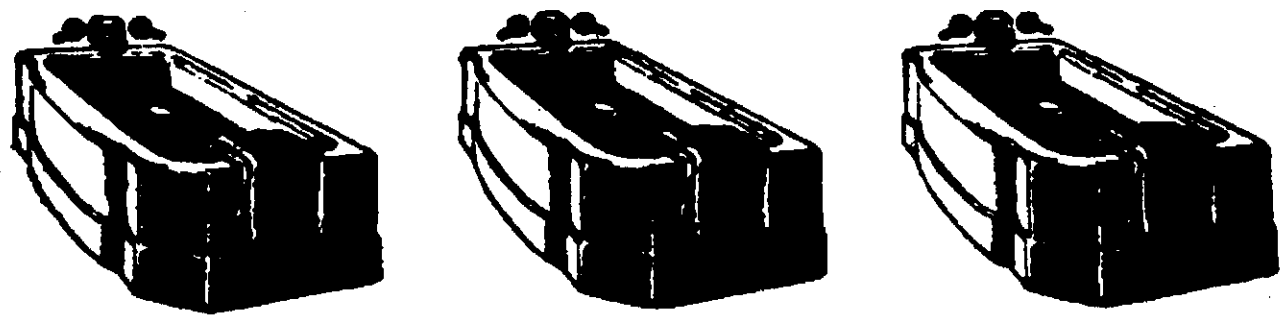

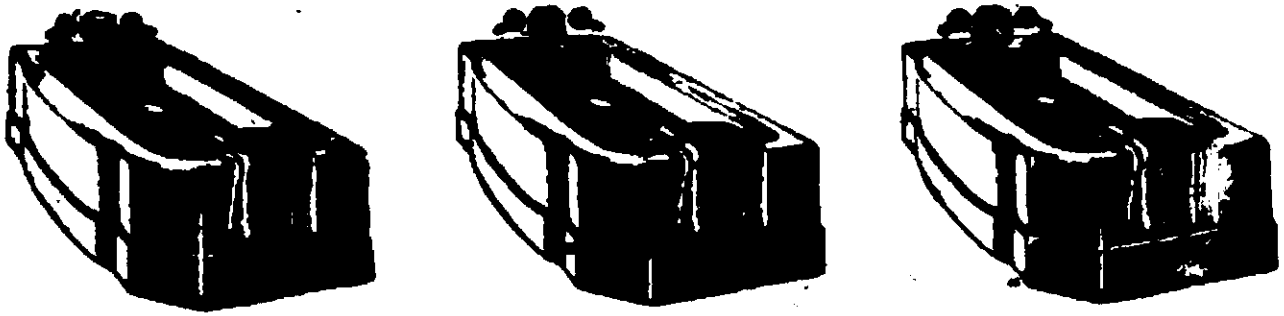

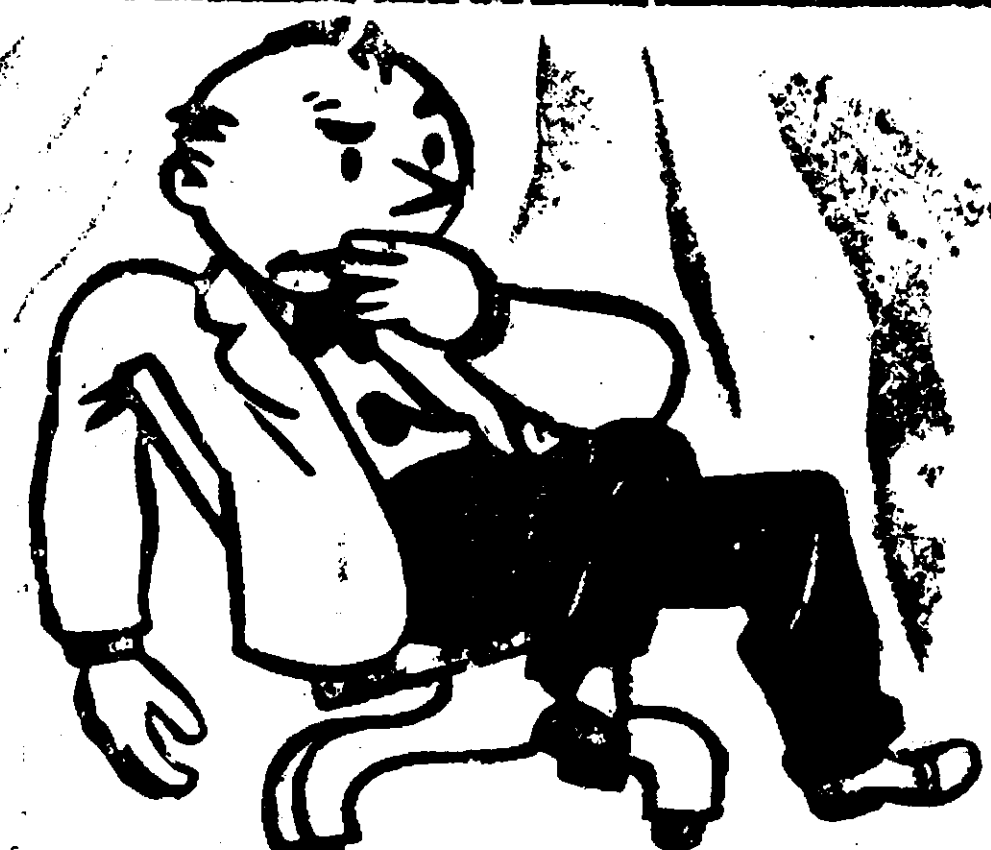

The Thirtieth day preceding said Election
From 8 o'clock a. m. until 8 o'clock p. m. on said day for the purpose of REVIEWING the REGISTRATION and REGISTER-
ING each of the qualified electors in said CITY as SHALL PRO-
BABLY apply therefor.

The name of no person but an ACTUAL RESIDENT of the precinct at the time of registration, and entitled under the Con-
stitution, if remaining such resident, to vote at the next election,
shall be entered in the registration book.

Elector Unable To Make Personal Application, Procedure

SEC. 504. Any elector who is unable to make personal appli-
cation for registration because of physical disability or absence
from the Township, City or Village in which his legal residence
is located, may be registered prior to the close of registration
before any election or primary election by securing from the
Clerk of the Township, City or Village in which is located his
legal residence, duplicate registration cards and executing in
duplicate the registration affidavit before a notary public or
other officer legally authorized to administer oaths and returning
such registration cards to the Clerk of the Township, City or
Village before the close of office hours on the last day of regis-
tration prior to any election or primary election. The notary public
or other officer administering the oath shall sign his name on
the line for the signature of the registration officer and design-
ate by title.

Unregistered Persons Not Entitled To Vote

SEC. 491. The inspectors of election at any elec- on or pri-
mary election in this State, or in any District, County, Township,
City or Village thereof, shall not receive the vote of any person
whose name is not registered in the registration book of the
Township, Ward or Precinct in which he offers to vote. (As pro-
vided under Act 116, P. A. 1954)

Transfer of Registration; Application, Time

SEC. 505. Any registered elector may upon change of resi-
dence within the City cause his registration to be transferred to
his new address by sending to the Clerk a signed request, stating
his present address, the date he moved thereto, and the address
from which he was last registered, or by applying in person for
a transfer. Such transfers shall not be made within the (30) days
next preceding any election or primary election.

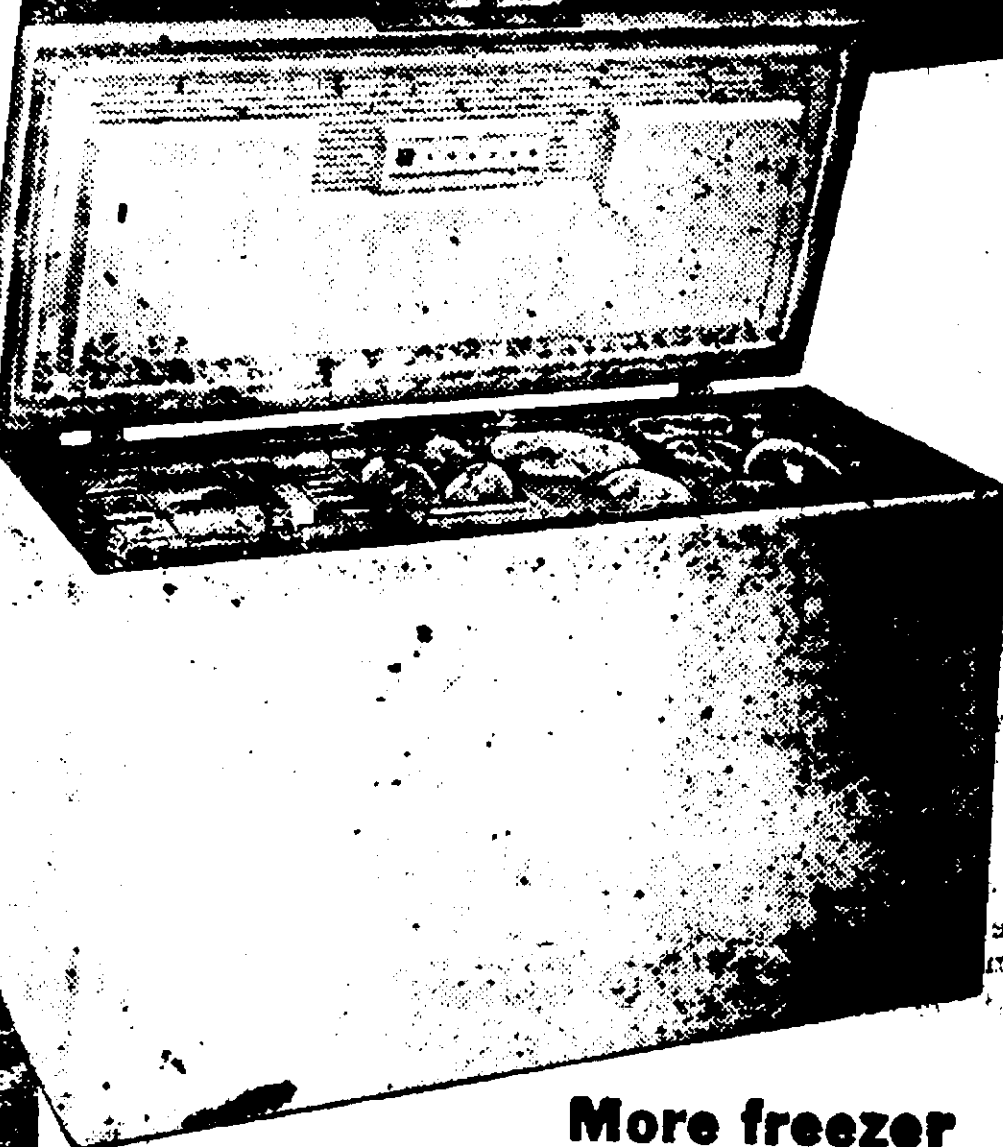
