About Michigan News

Most voters going to the polls for the first time since they were in the 4th grade have Governor William G. Milliken as their symbol of political supremacy. They must learn from their elders of the last Republican governor of 10 years ago Kim Sigler. Their slogan is "It's Time for a Change." Unfortunately they do not want this to apply to Senator Charles Potter, Republican who is running for a 2nd term.

Many are wondering about the future in Michigan if Williams gets by Paul Bagwell he is expected to go after the presidential nomination in 1960 which will leave Democrats in Michigan leaderless.

What are Williams chances for the presidency in 1960? The other possibilities are Adlai Stevenson, Senators Kefauver and Kennedy and Governors Harriman and Meyer. None is a front runner now.

Democrats are rich in talent now whereas in 1948 they had trouble filling out their ticket. Mrs. Margaret Price of Ann Arbor was nominated for auditor general. It will be years before either party nominates a woman for state office again when they think they have a chance of winning.

Since then the Democrats have been building. Governor Williams has filled dozens of long-term judgeships and appointive offices. They now have a 5 to 3 majority in the supreme court. Younger leaders are being groomed. One is Senator Charles Swanson, candidate for the governor.

Republicans are fighting against the disengagement of 10 years of debt. The Michigan State party have failed to come across. They are left with a few names. Bagwell, the former U.S. senator, is the only one at the state convention and refused to put up as their number one state ticket. They have no money for television and radio advertising.

Current Comment

The straw votes as well as the Maine vote have shown such a strong Democratic trend that President Eisenhower has been called out to campaign and will make speeches in California, Chicago and other places in the mid west, once Republican strongholds which are showing signs of slipping away from them. Senator Knowland is said to be in serious trouble in California. The president is not slated to come to Michigan but Vice President Richard Nixon, No. 2 man will address a \$100. a plate banquet at the IMA auditorium, Flint Oct. 27. As a vote getter it will be a dud as those there will be mostly industrialists and millionaires. 3000 tickets will be sold. The money is needed to fill their treasury. There is no better system to fill an empty treasury than to charge \$100 for \$3 worth of food.

A stalemate exists in the Little Rock school affair. Attorney General Rogers has ruled that private schools which Gov. Faubus announced he would convert the public schools in to must be desegregated as well as the public ones. The Catholic schools in Arkansas have been desegregated for some time. The matter is again headed for the court and so far all court decisions have been against segregation. Gov. Faubus has branded the ministerial association in Little Rock Communist because they wanted to ask Evangelist Billy Graham to come and settle the dispute. Gov. Faubus like Chang Kai Chek is out on a limb as there is little danger of the federal government backing down.

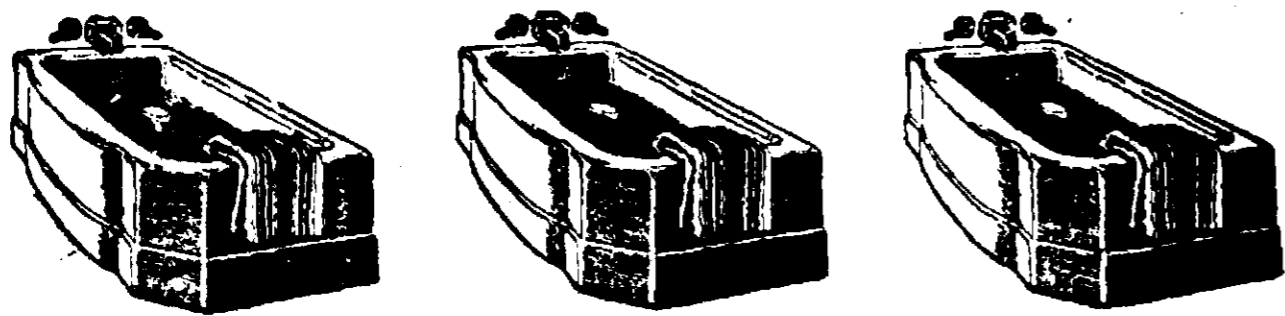
The matter of Formosa and the out lying islands is unchanged. Chang is still hanging onto Quemoy and Matsu but taking a terrific beating. For about a week he was unable to land any supplies there but last week managed to unload several ships and drop some from planes. He has never been able to land over 100 ton a day and it takes 7 times that amount for the island. So is ammunition and medical supplies. There is no refrigeration so there is no blood transfusion and the death rate is high among the wounded. A supply ship sank there last week on which were 20 war correspondents, some American. Military men say Chang will not be able to hold out there indefinitely. He wants to bomb Chinese mainland and this country will not let him. He does not have enough planes to put the Red guns out of commission without our help as they are all underground. So Mr. Dulles keeps hopping from brink to brink.

The United States beat back another attempt by Red China to get in the United Nations last week but the margin of victory grows smaller each time. This time it was 44 against 27 for and 9 not voting. The resolution was to postpone admitting them for one year. The press seems to think they might make it next year if not the year after. Their admission is a certainty some time in the future as they are in China to stay. Chang is like the Stuarts who lost the throne of England and for the next 50 made repeated attempts to recover all of which failed.

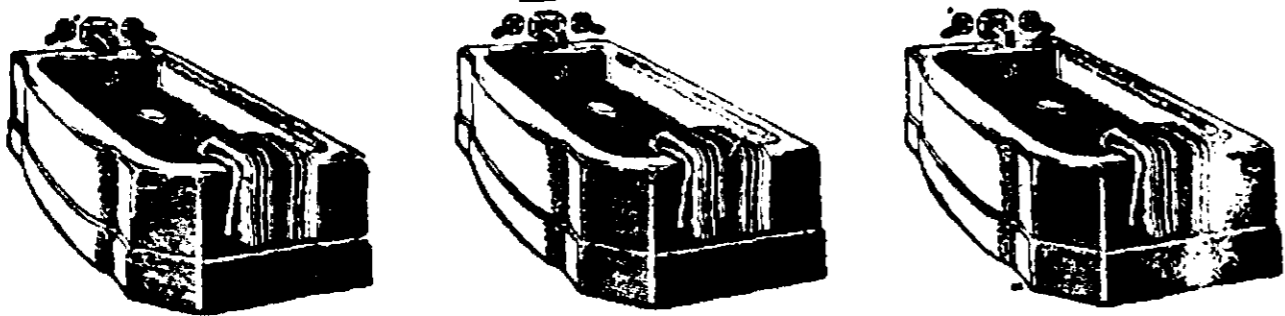

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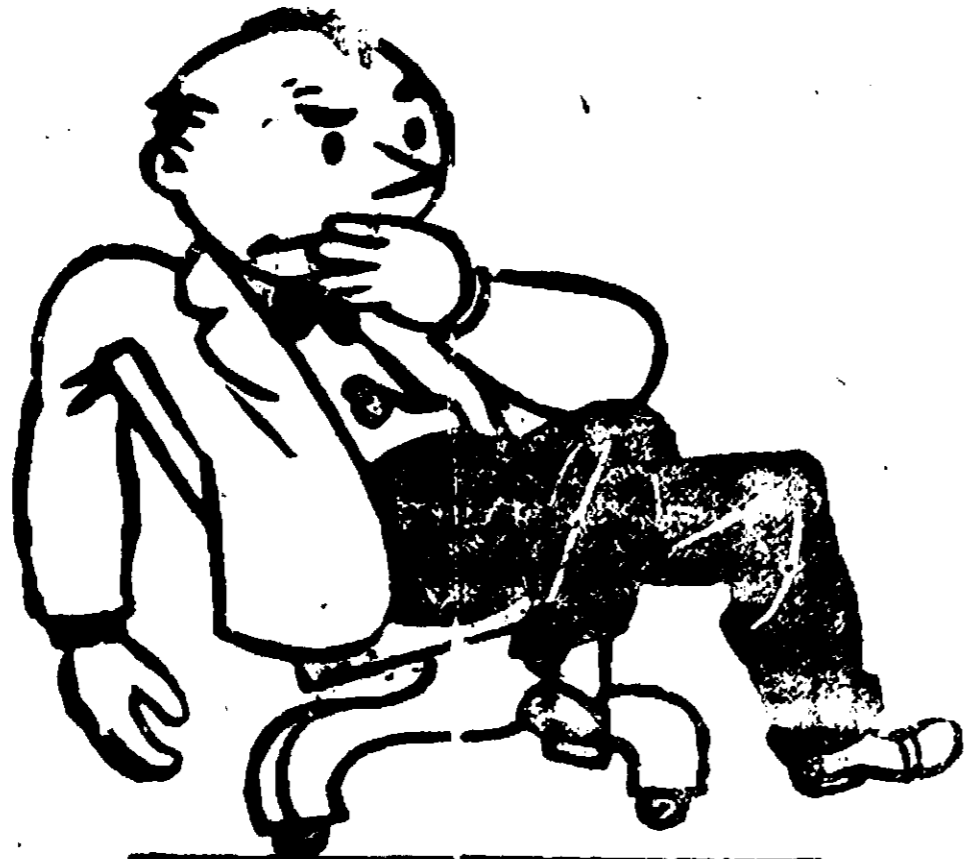
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Notes of 48 Years Ago

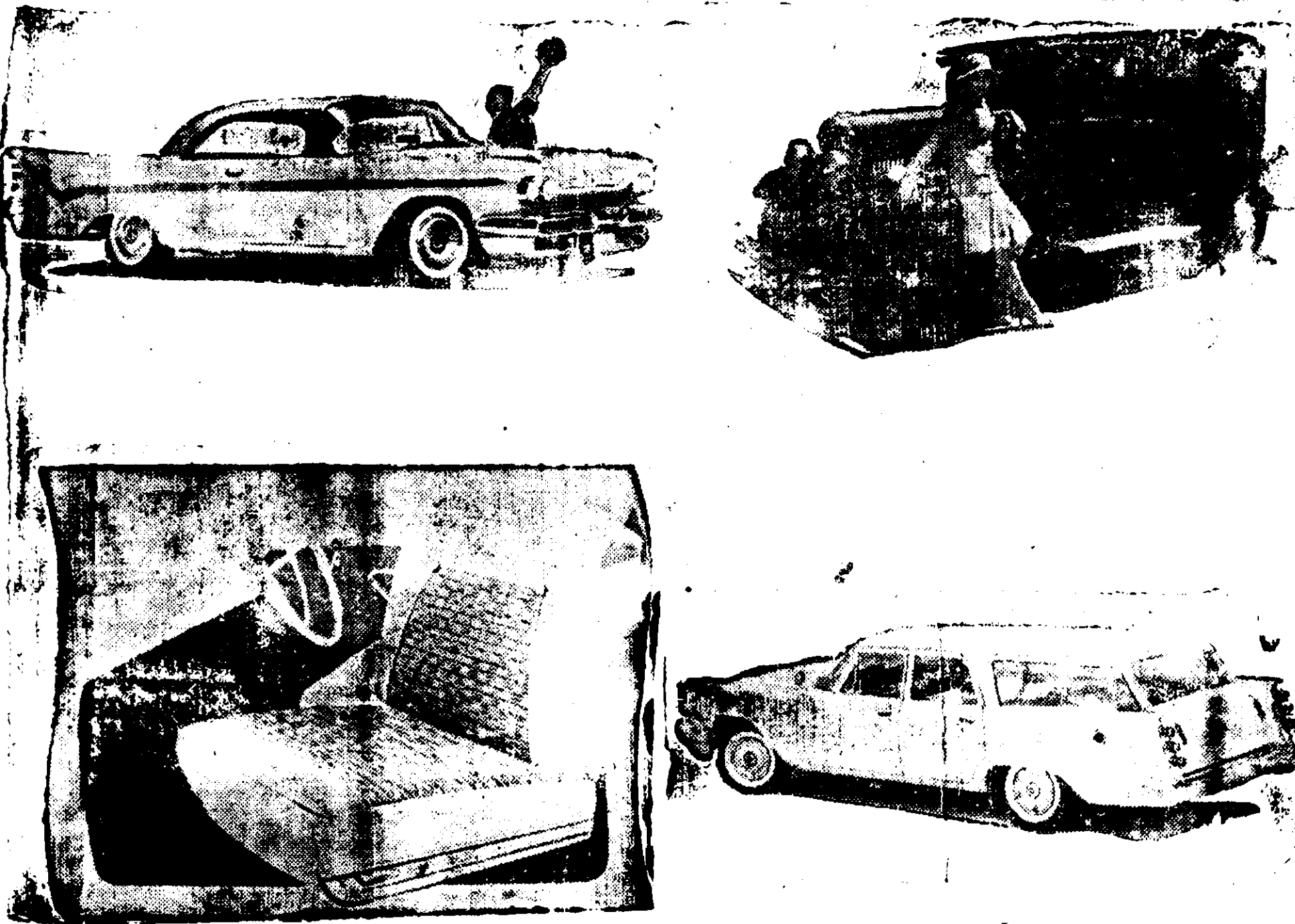
