About Michigan News

Money can buy Michigan's most compelling needs. The problem is how to get it.

Leaders of both parties say the state must have more money but they are not agreed on how to get it. Many legislators believe a personal income tax could be passed. This is at hot subject and few will commit themselves. Others favor a boost of \$1.25 a barrel on the beer tax.

With current revenues falling off \$10,000,000 this year welfare rolls in creasing and new services demanded new taxes are a certainty.

274 building projects to cost some \$226,000,000 are still on the planning board. Probate judges want action to house and care for 1500 mentally ill children. Public health and correction officials want more money. The new prison addition at Ionia is only half completed.

The schools in the state are all heavily in debt and have been forced to borrow money from banks. The state guaranteed them \$190 per pupil and does not have the money. For the past two years the legislature has declared a moratorium on new buildings. This is election year and the candidates are blaming each other and promising to rectify everything if elected. These promises are usually forgotten after election.

Gov. Williams and Paul Bagwell are still debating as to whether the Gov. Williams taking the 1958 Industrial Review figures says the state has gained over 1200 new industries. Bagwell says the Review is not up to date and says the state has lost over 200 industries. One he listed as lost through is the Brown-McClaren plant at Hamburg which is still operating.

LOSE 4th STRAIGHT GAME

Pinckney is still without a victory after 4 games. At Boysville Friday they go off to a flying start and scored 19 points in the first 13 minutes only to go to pieces the 2nd half and lose 27 to 19.

Pinckney was aided by 3 Boysville fumbles. Gordy Hoyt scored a touch down on a pass from Bob Williams and Don Clark and Tom Kennedy scored on line plays. Kennedy passed to Hoyt for the extra point. Then came the 2nd half collapse. No team can win without a good line and Pinckney has not got one yet. Neither do they have a forward pass defense. Boysville gained 155 yds, rushing to Pinckneys 112, in passing they gained 175 yds to Pinckneys 15. They made 13 first downs and Pinckney 9. Pinckney's team is green. Most of the juniors, sophomore and freshmen never played before or very little. They have yet to master tackling and blocking. There is a lot of good material but it needs a lot of developing. They play Hartland there Friday. This is rated the weakest team in the league if Pinckney does not win. They will probably be victorious this year.

The other communities report small attendance. It was not thus in the old days. I have a dim recollection of the Bryan McKinley campaign in 1896 at Dexter. The speakers, candidates etc were met at the 6:30 p. m. train by a band, torchlight parade and led by a man on a white horse. They paraded from the depot to the business section about half a mile away. The candidates had dinner at the hotel. The program took place on a dry or platform outdoors. There was a clown who wisecracked, a negro quartette from Ypsilanti and Jim Harkins, an Ann Arbor entertainer sang. After the speeches and introductions they visited the bars and set up free drinks. Box after box of cigars was passed around. At one of the affairs there was a Goddess of Liberty float drawn by 20 horses. Some times there was a 5 gallon jug of whiskey with a tin cup attached. They knew how to get out the crowds in the old days. I wonder if these things would work now? Then there was no competition from autos, radio, TV or picture shows.

CONSERVATION NOTES

Michigan's biggest water fowl hunt grounds, Pointe Mouillee, Monroe, is wanted by the state for the St. Lawrence waterway widening.

110,000 applications have been received for the any deer season.

To date 132,491 camping permits have been issued in Michigan an increase of 16.2% over 1957.

The sharp increase in the number of wildlife in Lakes Huron and Michigan has alarmed fishermen. They came in from the ocean. They resemble herring but have no commercial value. 1863 lbs have been taken this year. The shad gizzard also comes in from the ocean but in small numbers.

The 11,000 acre Porter Ranch on Missaukee and Roscommon counties will be purchased by the state for \$175,000.

Hunters are warned to stay away from foxes, coyotes and other animals which appear tame. Many are afflicted with rabies.

Current Comment

One error seems to have creased Chief Justice Warren's Michigan from the list of those eligible for appointment to the United States Supreme Court. When Justice Reed was appointed he was ranked 2nd on the list of eligibles. Last week in a quick surprise appointment President Eisenhower appointed Potter Stuart, 45, an Ohio judge who was born in Jackson, Mich. At the recent chief justices convention in California, Bethmers was chairman of a committee which presented a resolution censuring the recent supreme court decisions. The one on Communism were stressed but the resolution was aimed at the segregation decision.

In the segregation battles in the south all the court decisions continue to go steadily against the segregationists. A ruling has been handed down that public money and public teachers paid by tax money cannot be used to operate private schools, nor can they use public buildings. The governors of Arkansas and Virginia now say they will rent private buildings and pay the teachers with money raised by donations and tuition. This will be a tremendous undertaking. It will also violate a court edict that any substitute to nullify the court decision is unconstitutional. The TV schools have been discontinued. Many families had no TVs. The governors are making no provision to educate negroes. They say it is up to the negroes themselves. This would also seem unconstitutional. In Ohio the supreme court has ordered Cincinnati to reinstate 7 negro teachers who were released when an all negro school was closed.

We do not like the attitude of some of the churches in the south on segregation. Some of the hottest segregationists are churchmen. At the recent Episcopal convention in Florida last week a battle took place between segregationists and anti-segregationists. A segregationist declared segregation is not contrary to the teachings of Christianity. An anti-segregationist said it is an abomination and failure of Christian love. In Arkansas Rev. Cowley, a Baptist minister, barred 4 negroes from his church. This led the Detroit Free Press to remark that if the late Malcolm X were alive, he would probably tell his favorite story. It related a southern colonel was driven to church every Sunday by his negro coachman. Uncle Samuel who was not allowed in the church. One Sunday the colonel said "I too had Samuel you can come in the church." Samuel said "Never mind that boss. I just sit out here and commune with the Lord. The boss say he said to me, 'Don't feel bad about not getting in that church. Samuel Lee never been able to get in it himself!'"

In the Far East and Formosa things are not improving. The rebel premier of Lebanon resigned after a month in office. Fighting continues there and assassination attempts were made. Our troops scheduled to be withdrawn this month may stay there. In Formosa things were quiet this week due to a 7 day cease fire. Chang Kai Chek was against it and said it was a trick to allow Red China to replace her worn-out guns with bigger ones. But public opinion is strong for peace and we have withdrawn our convoys. Chang has also withdrawn 11,000 from Quemoy, mostly teachers and civilians. He has denounced the Moscow peace talks but as he is dependent on us for food and ammunition if we withdraw them he will be forced to withdraw from the offshore islands.

The heavy traffic here on the days of the Michigan-Michigan State football games is no more due to the new highways built. It was not heavier than any other day this year. The churches who served chicken dinner to several hundred here on that day have discontinued them.

The Ann Arbor News last week mentioned a meeting of blacksmiths organization held there in 1902. The principal bone of contention was that they could no longer hire boys for 20c an hour to switch flies off horses while they were shoeing them. Some of the old timers here earned their spending money that way. Their spokesman was the tall of a black horse affixed to a stick.

3. At the Supt. meeting at Howell it was requested that the schools assist financially the Child Guidance and Testing Clinic at Lansing.

Motion by Russe, 2nd by Basydio, that the board contribute \$75. Carried.

The basic needs for the future expansion program was given to the board. The following additional rooms are needed: Biology Home Ec., to handle 28 students (2 eight grades), (2) high school classes, additional lavatories, improved locker rooms. Present high school enrollment is 295 students, an increase of 85 over 1957. Anticipated high school enrollment for 1960 is 415 students.
