About Michigan News

Ghosts of the political campaign of 1948 are coming back to haunt the political parties. This year the Democrats are fighting apathy caused by 10 years of success. Republicans are fighting for their political life.

Democrats have billboards, TV and money. The Republicans are using amateurs who have little money as the big industrialists refused to kick in this year and to top it all a lack of unity.

Gov. Williams is campaigning in places seldom visited before by another candidate higher than justice of the peace or drain commissioner.

Paul Bagwell, his opponent, a comparative unknown is plugging hard but his task is tremendous.

Williams in 1948 was also an amateur. He and his wife stumped the state alone with a handful of enthusiastic admirers and won. He was the only Democrat to do so. He now has a solid top to bottom party organization operated by Chairman Neil Stabler and has swept his whole party into office with him.

So says the Michigan Mirror. This is not the whole story. Williams was elected in 1948 by stand pat Taft Republican votes who hated Republican Kim Sigler. Sigler conducted a grand jury investigation of the legislature, tried and convicted a number of legislators of accepting bribes, including some conservative Republicans. The legislature did not like this and hamstrung him by taking his funds away and finally fired him and hired another prosecutor who allowed the pending cases to go by default.

The people figured Sigler got a bum deal and nominated him governor over Vern Brown, the conservative choice in 1946. In 1948 the Taft Republicans bolted the ballot and elected Williams. Their motto was "Anybody but Sigler". They have not been able to get rid of him since.

Bagwell hopes he can repeat the Williams miracle of 1948 but has no Kim Sigler issue to help him.

Actually, the issues are cloudy in most cases. Republicans say taxes are driving industry out of the state but the Republican legislature enacted these taxes.

They say they set up the financing of the Mackinac Bridge and new highway system, but the Governor fought for it and the projects were put through while he was governor.

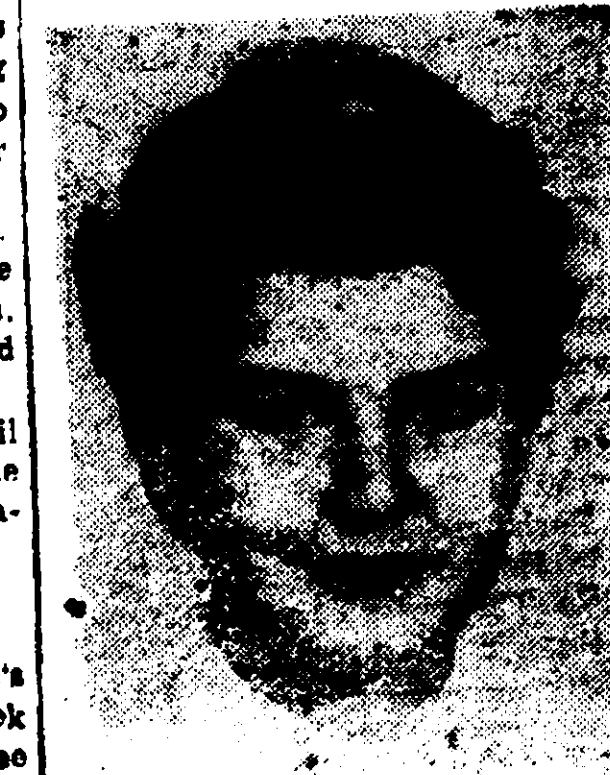

CELEBRATE FIRST BIRTHDAY

The First Federal Savings and Loan Ass'n located in the new shopping center at the east city limits of Howell will celebrate their first birthday on November 1, 1958.

To show their gratitude they are holding open house and inviting the public in. Each one will receive a gift.

During the year the association has opened 810 new savings accounts with gross receipts amounting to \$1,080,000. About \$250,000 has been withdrawn leaving a balance of \$830,000 in savings accounts. There were 511 Christmas Clubs opened amounting to \$3,300. 144 mortgage loans were made and land contracts purchased amounting to \$1,120,000 to help the people build, buy or remodel homes. Also 30 home improvement loans totalling \$33,778. Total assets are \$1,025,000.

Current Comment

The shouting and the tumult of the election will all be over by next Tuesday and there was not such an awful lot of it compared to some previous elections. The Democrats have the best organization. They have every precinct in the state organized and make it a point that all Democrat voters get to the polls. The Republican organization is mostly amateurs. The old line Republicans did not like Bagwell and have set on their hands and refused to aid him financially or otherwise. All those who intend to vote by absent voter's ballot should remember that Saturday, Nov. 1 is the last day to make application for such a ballot. As it is an off year election only about a 50% vote is expected. That was the vote in 1954, the last off year.

The small game hunting season opened last Tuesday and in this section the pheasants appear to be greater in numbers than in many past years. Quite a few around here got their limit the first day. The only drawback to the hunting activities was that there were 3 fatalities and 53 were wounded. 2 were accidentally shot by themselves and the other died of a heart attack. Why do football players fumble at critical moments? There seems to be no excuse for it. The best of players do it. Hop-along Cassidy, the former all-American now with the Detroit Lions made 4 fumbles in his last game. Ken Williams had an interesting article in the Detroit News last Thursday. It concerns Harry Warren, Hartland Star. In a recent game with Manchester in which Hartland played them even up only losing out 19 to 6 in the last quarter, Warren fumbled 6 times at critical moments. This probably lost Hartland the game. He went to his coach, Jack Stovall. He told him to carry the football around with him all the time. He did so, even carrying it to school and to his classes along with his books. In the next game with Pinckney he scored four touchdowns with nary a fumble. Back in the old days when Murray Kennedy starred for Pinckney, he was seldom seen without a football in his hand. He carried it with him up town, to school and it was even said he slept with it. Murray never made any fumbles.

Herman Kierdorf, Detroit Teamster member, accused of many things, including arson, etc., but convicted of Jew was found guilty of having a homemade silencer on his pistol in Pontiac last week. The penalty for this is small. This is akin to the Al Campone case. He was probably the nation's biggest wholesale murderer but the only thing he was ever convicted of was in not paying his tax for which he served a short term.

Acting on emergency appeal where the Republicans are hard passed President Eisenhower made a flying trip to Iowa, Colorado, California and Chicago. The only speeches were at California and Chicago. In California he was supposed to heal the breach between Gov. Knight and Senator Knowland who are feuding. Knight has announced he will not support Knowland on account of Knowland's advocating a right to work law. The president sent for them to come to his hotel room. Knight showed up. Knowland did not. A second call brought him, he said he was leaving for the hall to make his speech. He merely said hello to him. Efforts to get the president to come to Michigan have been in vain. He has a new speech writer who was supposed to put pep in his speeches. W. K. Kelsey says he is the most non-political president since U. S. Grant. The only other West Pointer to hold the office. He finds inconsistencies in his speeches. The president appealed for a Republican congress. Then he lauded the great accomplishments of his administration. Now this great success has all been achieved with a Democrat controlled congress for the last 4 years. If things are so non-political, why change it? Kelsey says that in 1910 President Bill Taft campaigned extensively for a Republican congress, but alas every time he spoke went Democratic. Kelsey asks "Why Henry?"

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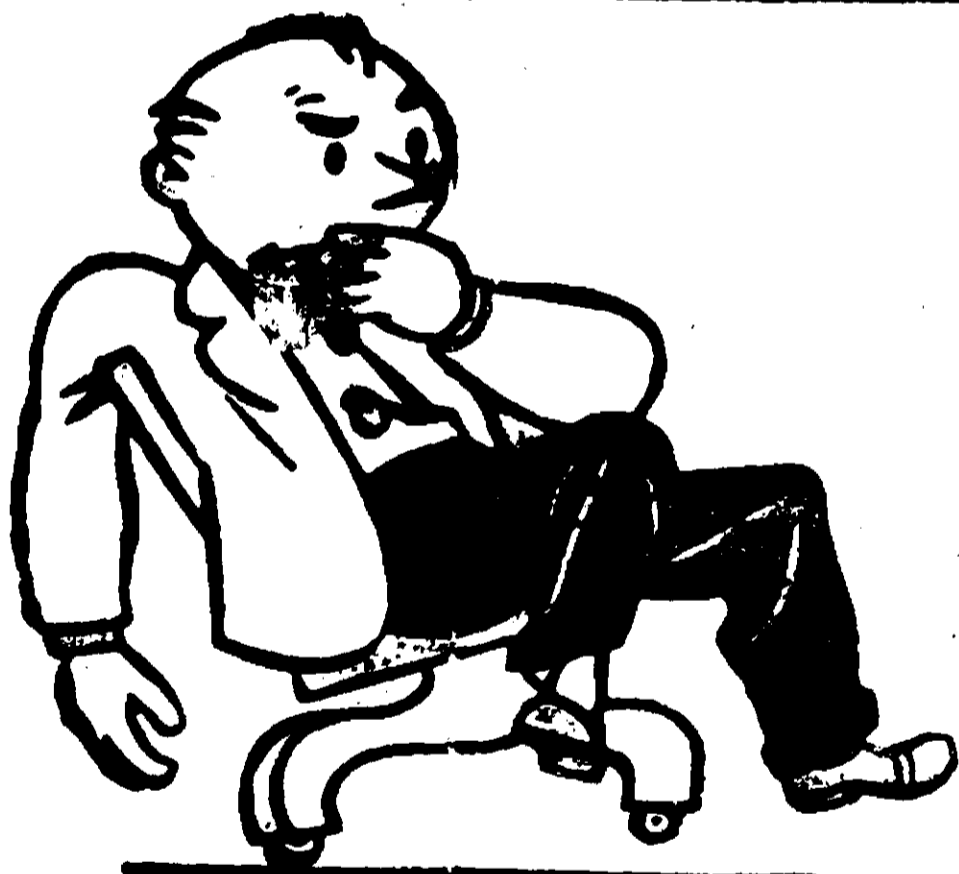
