About Michigan News

Knowledge is power so goes an old saying and few argue the point. One of the finest sources of knowledge is the state library at Lansing which has been homeless since their building was destroyed by fire in 1949. Since then it has been scattered around Lansing in different places. It is always the last to be considered by the legislature for new housing although now it serves more people than ever. 221,000 books were borrowed last year. Libraries around the state borrowed 45,000 books. Reference services furnished totaled 113,000 requests compared to 48,000 last year. This enables a citizen to get detailed research by dialing a telephone or writing a letter. The law library on the 2nd floor of the capitol is a source of information for all courts and lawyers in Michigan. Loans of books in the upper peninsula branch doubled last year.

The legislative investigating committee has made both friends and enemies. Chairman Lodge claims it has saved the state \$116,000, by cutting the state police budget. Gov. William also dropped one driver. In mental health they also saved by abolishing bakeries and lard rendering rooms. There are to be other savings. They do not report until 1959. The legislature is now tied as there are 55 Democrats and 55 Republicans. This happened once before when 3 Republicans and 2 Democrats were killed in the Hotel Wentworth fire at Lansing. As the Democrats cast the biggest vote they're expected to name the speaker.

As all state agencies and departments are out of money, a special session is rumored to pass emergency legislation.

Mail Speedup Service

Sweeping service improvement to provide next day first class letter service for over four million people throughout the 7,000 square mile Detroit Metropolitan area were announced Oct. 1, 1958 by Postmaster General Summerfield.

This new service started October 20, last and after a short shake-down period postal patrons will be guaranteed that barring occasional human errors letter mails deposited before 5 p. m. on a weekday will be in the hands of the first delivery trip the following weekday.

The Detroit Metropolitan Area includes the city of Detroit, and the following nine (9) counties: Lapeer, Livingston, Macomb, Monroe, Oakland, St. Clair, Washtenaw and Wayne. Because of the program substantial service improvement will be noted in the Thumb, Saginaw, Bay City and Midland areas. Lansing with its state mail is also tied into the proved mail service.

Within the nine counties are 136 postoffices handling an average per day between offices of approximately 1.4 million.

The postmaster general said many of the postal buildings were built years ago and are not adequate to handle the growing mail load. Improvements are being accomplished despite this.

The improved service required changes in practically every highway mail transportation route in the area to give each office a mail dispatch after 5 p. m. and a receipt in time for in practically every highway mail route changes were made Oct. 20.

When asked the effect of the Program locally Postmaster Lawrence Baughn stated the program is working well and giving next day delivery to all first class mail mailed before 5 p. m. in any office in the Detroit metropolitan area. He says early mailing by patrons will be helpful as the 5 p. m. mailing time is closely integrated with the final dispatch time and there is not time to handle a large volume of letter mail.

The Pinckney postoffice is now better equipped than ever in its history. On Oct. 9, 1958 new equipment was installed that compares to that used in all the new postoffices being built around the state.

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Current Comment

The election was the big news last and still the prognosticators are not agreed on what happened. All agreed that it was a Democrat landslide with that party sweeping the nation except New York state and Arizona. In New York, Nelson Rockefeller spent \$2,000,000. He has been handing out money for years to any and all charities and organizations irrespective which included Jewish, Catholic, Negro, garment workers and many organizations got handouts. He even gave \$40,000 to the Truman Library at Independence Mo. He was also aided by a split in the Democrat party. Averil Harriman wanted Sec. Finletter of the air force as a candidate for senator. Tammany turned him down, nominated Frank Logan an old warhorse. In California here was a Republican split. Knowland for governor and Knight for senator were not speaking. Knight did not support Knowland. The president flew there to get them to smoke the peace pipe but failed. By the way all the states in which he spoke went Democratic. The Detroit News says the Republicans will remain the minority party unless they stand for the things the people want. It also says the president did not exert the required leadership. Brink tottering and a part time president are also mentioned.

Right to Work laws were on the ballot in 6 states and lost in 5. They are credited with the Republican defeats in Ohio and California partially. 12 states now have Right to Work but they are mostly in the south and midwest where there is little industry. Indiana is the only industrial state to have one. In California a proposal to tax private and parochial schools was defeated. Also a state income tax law. In Colorado and New York a proposal to legalize bingo carried. However it is charity bingo and the proceeds must go to charity. There is also a local option connected with it as in New York, Troy, Niagara Falls and Southport turned it down.

Republicans say that as Gov. Williams did not get his big majority of 2 years so he is finished as a presidential candidate in 1960. Time only will tell. Harriman's defeat in New York eliminated one contender. Gov. Williams got majority of 140, 799, 500 of State James Hare led the ticket with 250,841 majority. There are rumors for this there is usually little cutting on this office. Hares opponent was Raymond Plank an unknown owner of a small radio station in the northern part of the state. He did practically no campaigning. Moore ever there was able to build up an effective machine by judicious appointment of his dispute dealers all over the state.

One thing the victory of Nelson Rockefeller in New York did was to put a crimp in the presidential aspirations of Vice President Nixon. The big block of electoral votes of New York state is always very attractive and bound to get serious consideration at the national convention 2 years hence. Nixon's chances have been badly damaged by Democrat sweep in California and the powers that be are certain to give Rockefeller serious consideration. New York state has provided a large number of presidential electors.

In Michigan the result ran true to forecasts. The Republicans were unable to dent the ranks of organized labor and until they do will have hard sledding. Senator Potter campaigned almost exclusively against Walter Reuter, ignoring Phil Hart who beat him handsly. Bagwell played the same record over and over again until it got worn out. Gov. Williams was driving industry out of Michigan by high taxes (passed by Republican legislatures). He had to revise his figures several times. He started with 137, cut to 96 and even these ways questioned as he listed the Brown-McClaren Company at Ham-burg which is still operating. Sec. Sloan of the Detroit industrial survey says Detroit has gained 23 industries this year, one of which employs 1200.

In North Dakota Cong. Usher Haddock, Republican, did not run for reelection. His congressional seat was won by son, Quentin, who however was elected on the Democrat ticket.
