Some were killed when they jumped from upstairs windows. Then why are not these aid fire treps replaced?, There are number of reasons. No. 1 reason & the cost It would be hard to raise enough money. No. 2 is that they are all urgently needed due to the souring birth rate which followed World War H.They are building new schools, not tearing down any. The old school here is not fire proof and has an op en stairway. During the late war the loard was ordered to put in fire doors to shut off the new part from the old. They were ordered but due to the war they could not get delivery and they have never been installed. An outside fire escape was put up two years ago. The state police who enforce the fire laws inspect the build ings regularly. Now days most new schools are built one story high with plenty of playground and parking space. This eliminates a lot of fire haz zard




