Republicans have come alive in Mich. after a decade of defeat and despair. There are traces of liberalism in the party and a togetherness which has been absent for years. They figure that in 1960 when Gov. Williams will not head the Democrat ticket may be a breaking point. Right now they have lost all state offices only head the senate 22 to 12. The house is split 55 to 55.

Chairman Lindemere wants to re-visit the party and for the first time in years Paul Bagwell, the losing candidate for governor was not criticized. He hinted he might be a candidate again in 1960. Wayne county is booming. George Romney, head of American Motors and Mayor Marjorie of Detroit sent up a trial balloon last week.

Michigan is developing a safety plan for schools, following the fire in Chicago in which 89 children lost their lives. There will be regular inspections and some of the combustible schools will be closed. In Detroit there are said to be 30 such schools.

Linked with the tax proposals certain to develop controversy is a war on waste. The principal target so far is use of state owned autos.

Controversies over the routes of Michigan's new expressways only delay the program says Com. Mackinac is the U. S. Bureau of Roads requires hearings on all routes before federal matching funds are available. The most damaging controversy is in the Detroit area where the commissioner has withdrawn his proposal to have a major highway under construction by 1961.

CONSERVATION DEPT.

The dept. is trying to get the Port Custer Recreation Area made a part of the state park system. It has been leasing it since 1926. About \$351,750 needs to be spent for roads, parking space and buildings.

This is the upper peninsula's coldest winter in 8 years. The premature winter may have increased the deer starvation due to increased hinds after the light winters. Aspen cuttings may help as the deer feed on the boughs and branches left but much may remain uncut due to the low price of timber.

Michigan's shooting preserves only recorded only moderate activity the first month of operation. Hunters bagged 478 mallards in public preserves 121 in private. But only about 13 percent of the pheasants were shot in public preserves and 15.6 in private. The preserves close Feb. 27 in the upper peninsula and March 15 in the lower. Only 5 deer were shot in special season in the Cuisino game reserve.

HOLIDAY TREATS

Every hostess likes to have plenty of sweets around the house during holidays. Dorothy Downer, Detroit Edson Home Service Adviser offers easy to make recipes for Brownies, Date Chews, Almond Crescents and Rum Kisses. They are included in this month's recipe available free on cards at all Detroit Edison offices.

Rum Kisses: Temp 50 degrees. Time 10 minutes. 2 egg whites, 1 cup pecans, 2 cups sifted powdered sugar, 1 cup walnuts, grated, Beat eggs until stiff. Add powdered sugar gradually. Beat well. Fold in grated nuts, refrigerate etc. about an hour. Shape into rolls 1 inch in diameter. Refrigerate over night. Cut into 1/4 inch slices. Place on greased rookle sheet. Bake, Frost while warm with: Frothing: 1/2 cups sifted powdered sugar. Add sufficient cream to bring to spreading consistency. Makes 4 1/2 dozen.

There are also instructions on roasting and carving a turkey. New recipes available every month.

Current Comment

Although the observance of Christmas is universal in the western hemisphere it was not always thus. The first observance was not until 200 years after the death of Christ. In some states, notably New England, laws were passed vs. it. They called it a pagan custom, the Puritans and Pilgrims dating back to the Druids who used the holly and mistletoe in their rites and worshipped trees. The gifts giving is ascribed to Wise men bringing gifts to the Saviour but it really originated in Germany some hundreds of years later where a bishop named Nickolas started the practice. Santa Claus was imported from Holland where a mythical character was credited with gift giving. The trees and candles were German importations.

In New York State the Christmas observance got into the court over nativity scenes in schools. 28 members of Protestant and Jewish organizations filed suit claiming it violated the law on separation of church and state. Judge Gallaguer of the state supreme court ruled they could be displayed on school lawns but not in schools. They are not satisfied with his ruling and will appeal it.

Detroit is having a hassle over Sunday selling by merchants. They succeeded in putting over an ordinance banning Sunday furniture sales but so far they have been unable to stop Sunday real estate and auto sales. The Council of Churches are sponsoring it and their target is the supermarkets and food stores. They claim they have to remain open to meet the competition of the suburban stores outside the city limits. We think the day of the blue law is passed and there would be little enforcement if one was enacted. We once went to New York thru Canada. Before we got to St. Thomas the porter went through the train and asked the passengers if they were tough with their papers. He got quite a few. At St. Thomas a bunch swarmed on the train begging Sunday papers. The porter sold those he had gathered up. St. Thomas did not allow the sale of papers on Sunday.

The gasoline tax may be increased from 3 cents to 5 cents gallon to raise money for highway needs. The state and the federal tax now total 9 cents a gallon, about 41 percent of the retail price of gasoline. This is way out of line with any tax on any comparable product. The tax raised \$3.6 billion last year but only \$2.1 billion went in the highway fund, \$1.5 billion went in the general fund. If all this money had gone in the highway fund there would have been no need for new taxes.

There is talk of a 2nd raise in charges although one went into effect only last July. The parcel post rates which have always shown a deficit were not changed. The Industrial Review says when law was enacted it was the understanding it would pay its own way which it never has. There is no way to compute costs as the cost system was not started until 1926. Even they do not tell the story as space in government buildings, custodial charges, alterations repairs, retirement benefits, compensation for workers etc are not listed. These are estimated at \$200 million a year.

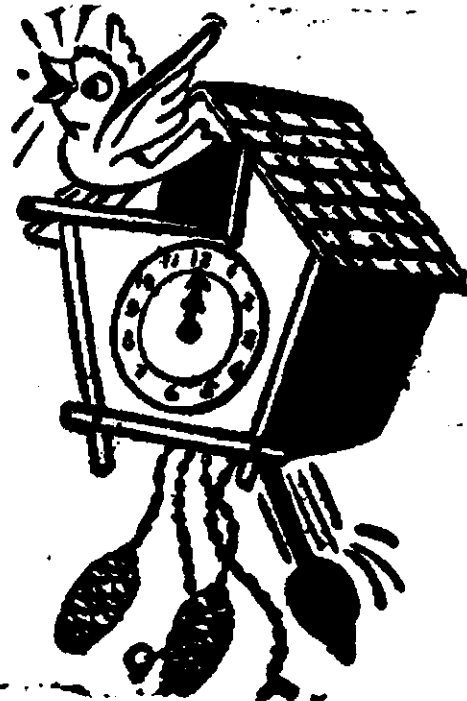

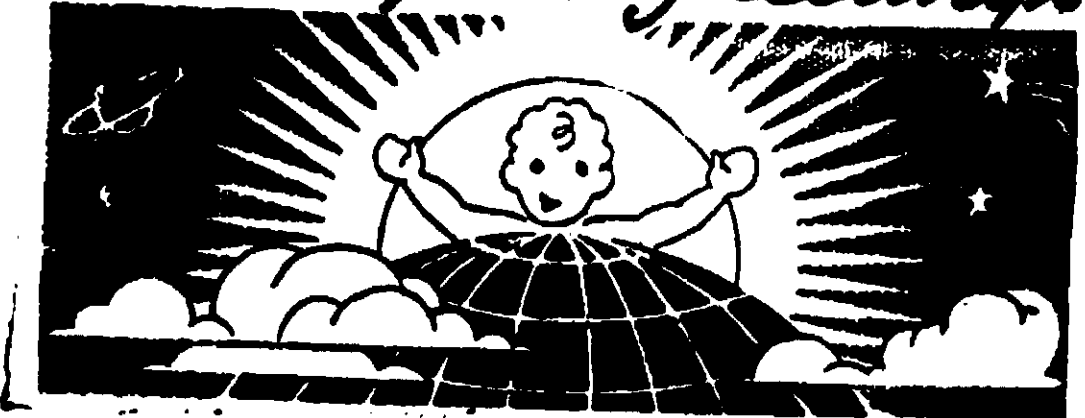
