## The Michigan Mirror

Labor may be forcing industry to provide a guaranteed annual wage. It won a compromise some years ago but fell short of complete victory but now it is possible to see signs of success. Labor has always considered the unemployment program inadequate. Last week they got help from an unexpected source.

Three university professors on a research committee reported that jobless benefits in all states are generally inadequate. They said all the workers should be covered, Michigan only covers those with 4 or more employees. They said benefits should last 30 weeks. They last 20 now. Also that a worker should get 40% of his take home pay.

Republicans are proposing a law whereby workers should contribute to the unemployment fund. At present employers contribute 100%.

April 6 voters will decide whether to give the legislature extraordinary powers in case of a surprise attack.

Michigan State University wants to change the name of her school. During debate a legislator said Michigan State wants a medical school there. They would use the old Boys' Vocation school for the purpose.

They also want voluntary committees for the mentally ill. They would commit them by declaration without court procedure.

## SCHOOL BOND VOTES

There were a number of votes on school bond issues in this area Monday. They lost at Dexter and South Lyon and carried at Brighton.

At Dexter 1450 voted on proposition to increase the mill tax 4 mills lost 730 to 703 after a hot campaign. This is the third time it has been beaten.

At South Lyon the \$450,000 bond issue lost 434 to 385 and the proposition to raise the mill tax 4 mills for operating expenses lost 457 to 414.

At Brighton the \$325,000 bonding proposal carried 403 to 218. It did not involve a millage increase.

## Curret Comment

Financial affairs have occupied the state the last two months and the legislature adjourned over the week end without arriving at any solution. Due to tax payments the state will probably be able to meet its payments until June. The Republicans and Democrats have been unable to agree on a tax measure. The Republicans want one cent sales tax increase which the Democrats want accept as they say it would fall on the working man and low income group. The Democrats want a graduated income tax which the Republicans want accept as they say it would fall on industry and big business, there being a \$3000 exemption with it. Neither would they accept the Democrat proposal to increase the borrowing limit from the present one of \$250,000. No new taxes will mean payless pay days and as we can't see the legislators going without their pay they will probably tap the \$50,000,000 fund by putting it up as collateral for a loan.

The Detroit News takes the Republican state central committee to task for putting Michigan as the worst disaster state in the nation due to crushing taxes passed Republican legislatures under prodding of Gov. Williams. It says this is baloney as Michigan in no worse shape than New York, Pennsylvania or Ohio, all of whom are broke and seeking now taxes and Indiana despite glowing statements has not escaped the ravages of the economic depression. Another item in the press also refutes this. The Ford Motor Company has announced a huge expansion program and the Michigan Consolidated Gas Company a \$31,000,000 building program of which \$80,000 is in the Ann Arbor district. So these two companies do not take much stock in the wallowing being broadcast concerning Michigan.

A special election was held in Miss our last week to elect a congress man to replace a Democrat congress man elected last fall who died. The Republicans carried this district by 1000 in 1952 but it went Democrat in 1954 last fall. This was hailed as a first vote and the Republicans predicted a protest vote against the Democrats it failed to materialize as the Democrat candidate won getting 60% of the vote. The Republicans campaigned extensively and established headquarters in Republican precincts they used the telephone extensively telling the voters "The vote will be tight. If you all turn out we can win." Apparently their plea fell on deaf ears.

The University of Colorado offers \$3000 in Horace scholarships each year. The condition is that the applicant does not drink or smoke. The college says it is getting impossible to find such qualified applicants.

Another Berlin crisis is on. There have been many before and will be more in the future as Russia is in a strategic position as she controls all the roads to Berlin and can bar the other nations from access to that city when the mood strikes her. We doubt if she has any intention of starting another world war. She is settling pretty and can tie up the other nations whenever she desires. She started the Lebanon affair the Que. may affair it is now reviving the Berlin crisis. This forces the other nations to maintain bases & armies all over the world in case she should start something and is the main reason for the heavy tax burden.

In the Texas legislature a law has been introduced to force the presence of attorney to attend the execution of all persons he sends to the death cell. Now we believe the chaplain, doctor, press representative and the executioner are the only ones there. The bill is a subterfuge to make an execution unpopular. It might better be one to abolish the death penalty.
