The Michigan Mirror

Motorists pay for their own highways in Michigan. They do this by paying slightly under half a cent a mile in gasoline tax to the state and slightly under a quarter of a cent in federal taxes.

This amounts to 6 cents a gallon to the state and 3 cents to the federal government. The total tax in this state is \$188,000,000 a year. The average car travels 14 miles a gallon and the average year consumption is 731 gallons. The state tax can be deducted from your income tax. The average car travels 10,000 miles a year and pays \$69.29 in gasoline taxes.

Michigan State University and Station WILX commercial are using the same TV channel, the university afternoons and evenings.

The people will vote April 6 on giving the legislature power to act during an emergency.

A bill to reduce state employees 20 percent has been introduced. Only 50 percent of the vacancies would be filled the first year and 25 percent the next.

Curret Comment

There have been so many Berlin crises that the general public is not overly alarmed about the present one. The Russian has set May 27 as the date for the evacuation of Berlin and shifting it over to the Germans. They control the east half of Berlin and the highways leading to it. The western Allies will not withdraw on that date. Both sides say there will be a breakdown. Russia put on a blockade some years ago and the Allies had to fly in all supplies. Due to ill health of Secretary Dulles and this country's refusal to attend a summit conference this country has lost the initiative in Europe which has been assumed by Premier McMillan of Britain who visited Premier Stalin in Moscow. He is reportedly hearing that the Russians are planning to take over Saxony. He is expected to a conference in Geneva on grounds and problems. He was caught out by meetings in London. He says Russia is not going ahead with his plan and is going ahead with his plan. He says the other nations are being friendly to us.

The president says the depression is over but the list of unemployed is still mounting. The UAW who are planning a march on Washington to the White House comm. says there are 750,000 unemployed in hand. In California and Baltimore factories are only working 24 hours a week. It is as doubtful if there will ever be full employment again as we once had unless there is another war. Two many labor saving machines which do the work of many men have been produced and it is now possible to get out 6 days work in 4 and the time is not yet.

There is a large class of people who believe that only persons who are poor should have to pay taxes on their upkeep. Namely those who send children to school. The citizens of Midland has introduced in the legislature to that effect. He would charge starting in the kindergarten \$20 registration fee for children attending a public school and increase the fee to \$40 for children to be paid by the parent. College students would pay \$200 a year half each semester. He says this would raise \$60,220,210 a year and raise the tax burden of people who do not benefit by the schools. He overlooks one thing. These people who are poor are though school children are in school. It would be the parents with large families who would have to send them to school on account of the fees.

The legislature is still kicking the cigarette question around. Senator William H. Clegg says nothing will be done until after the April election. He did not say why. An anti mortgage veterans fund lost 200,000 last week. In Republican support out a number of Republican and Democrats were absent. A motion to instruct the sergeant at arms to arrest them and bring them in faced. It will come up again. The Republicans regard the financial condition of the state as a campaign asset and they have been painting the state black in an effort to pin the blame on Gov. Williams while it is their own stalling and refusal to consider anything except a one cent tax the poor sales tax which is to blame.

The Fowlerville Review in an editorial by Joe Cox last week says the cigarette law is antiquated and was passed many years ago when blue laws were popular. It reads persons under 20 cannot smoke cigarettes but says nothing about smoking cigars, pipes, chewing tobacco or using snuff. It adds if this law is to be enforced why not enforce the other blue laws such as closing the stores on Sunday and banning the playing of base ball on Sunday. It adds those who are eligible for military service and get married and raise families. Why bar them from cigarettes.

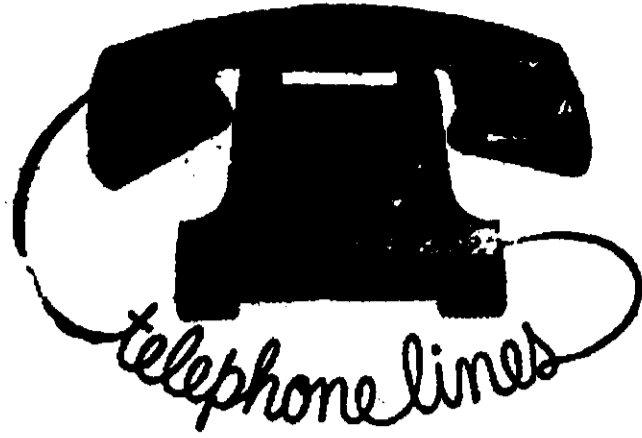

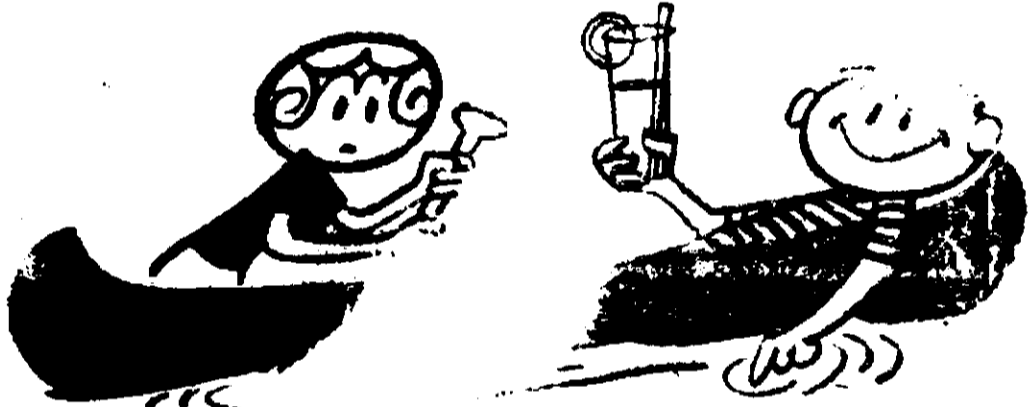
