At a speech before the Pontiac Rotary Club Mr Hill said Michigan was the most maligned state in the union. McPherson State Bank will open her new bank building at 207 North Michigan Ave., Howell for business on Tuesday, April 7. The new building is the latest in design for convenience of customers, efficiency in service, convenient service and ample customer parking space.

April marks the 94th anniversary of the bank established in April, 1865 as Alex McPherson Co. The new bank is on the site of the former McPherson Memorial Hospital. It has central heating and air conditioning, 13 teller windows, in addition to 2 drive-in windows. The bookkeeping dept is on the lower floor with work delivered there by a dumb waiter. Supplies by a freight elevator. There will be 24 hour depositary service.

The bank will hold open house on Sunday, April 12 from 12 to 8 p.m. The staff will answer questions and demonstrate equipment, refreshments served. Public is invited.

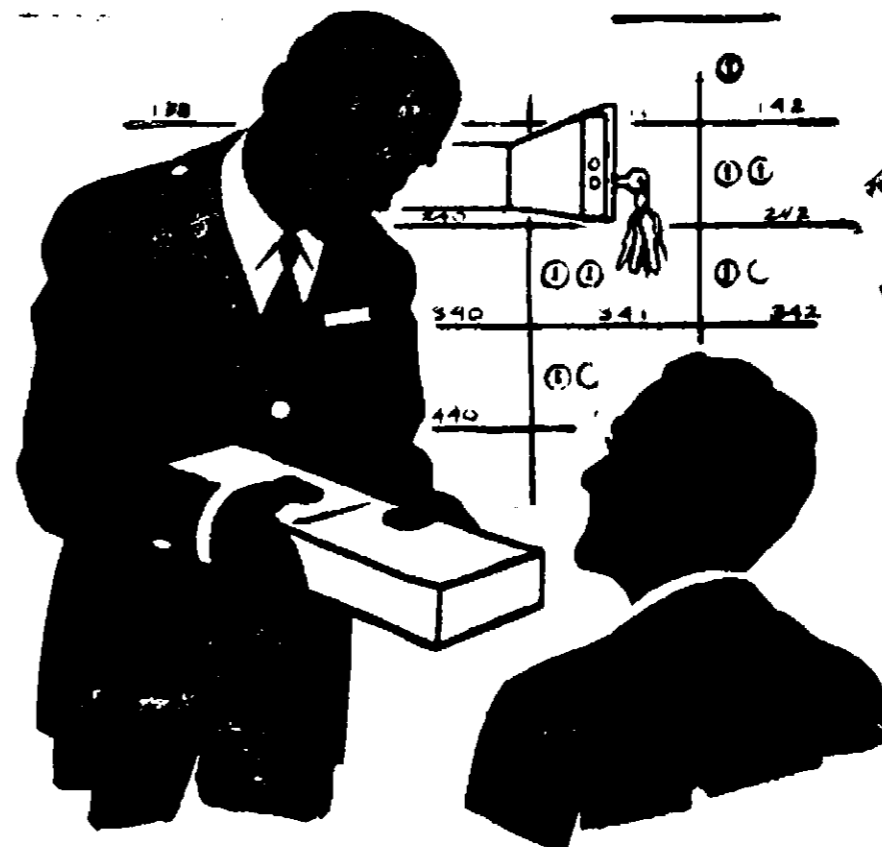
