Officials who have been boosting their cities will get a special chance in programs to dovetail in with Michigan week in May. Chambers of Commerce will hold a special meeting in Lansing in April.

The Bear Creek Mining Co. wants to explore state lands in the upper peninsula for minerals. They wanted to mine iron in the Porcupine state park last year but were turned down. Paul Bagwell, Republican candidate for governor endorsed their proposal.

Stanley Yankus, the chicken farmer who sold his farm and equipment for \$25,000 and is going to Australia because he was fined for exceeding wheat planting restrictions is fading from the front page. The legislature refused to pass a law commending him.

All farmers do not favor the restrictions but they contend that breaking the law is illegal.

The legislature may adjourn in mid-May but will probably leave many problems unsolved including the cash crisis and a long range tax basis. They agree that something must be done to meet the needs of the growing population but disagree what it should be. Some Republicans say they are not convinced a crisis exists and will have to be shown. They say the state government is going through the same recession as a year ago and the drop in tax collections reflects the decline in business.

Senator Phil Hart has started something in Washington, instead of pulling all his relatives on the payroll he is making his office automatic. He even has a stamp licking machine.

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Current Comment

Although they won but 3 offices and lost 11 last week the Republicans staged a victory celebration. This reminds us of the Jack Dempsey-Georges Carpentier championship fight in New York some years ago. Carpentier was knocked out. George Bernard Shaw said Carpentier won a moral victory. However Dempsey got the winners share of the purse. The celebration was because this in the first time since 1955 the Republicans have won a state office. They had a chance to regain control of the legislature by winning in the silk stocking Groesbeek district which has been Republican in the past but lost. The big campaign was waged against the 2 Democratic supreme court justices, George Edward and John Voelker. Edwards was classed as a socialist and puppet of Walter Reuther. Voelker as a nudist and a picture of him taken in a Turkish bath was used. The Detroit Free Press says the Republicans had a chance to do a lot better than they did as the spring election is usually a Republican field day, due to many local issues. In Detroit 139,000 voters voted on the school issues but not on state or county candidates. As the Democrats are well organized in Wayne county these are reckoned as Republican or independent voters. Only about a two thirds vote was cast. Here 516 voted compared to 642 last fall.

Michigan's unemployed lists declined 37,000 in March but this is not hailed with any great enthusiasm as it is due to seasonal jobs such as construction, resort area work and the opening of Great Lakes shipping. The auto factories and other big industries called few workers back. They are not expected to as new and improved machinery enable them to get out more production with less men. There are still 1,363,000 unemployed.

At the election 7 bonding proposals were approved and 8 defeated. The major ones for schools, sewers, etc. were defeated. Most of the defeated ones were for swimming pools, recreational parks etc. It seems that if the people can be convinced of the need of a proposal they will vote for it. If they consider it a luxury they vote No.

Foundry expects to have a \$25 million cement industry in operation by next October. Their output will be 20 million bags of cement a year and they will employ 200 people. They claim to have 100 years supply of limestone and clay, the two principal ingredients of cement on their site are on US-23 between Detroit and Toledo. The states big cement plant is at Alpena where there are deposits are apparently unlimited. Years ago a big cement plant operated at Four Mile Lake, between here and Chelsea. Quite a number of local people worked there. The limestone was taken from and around the lake. Finally it ran out and had to be shipped in making operation costly. In 1920 Alex Groesbeck, then governor started a huge paving program. He had trouble getting cement to bought the 4 mile Lake plant and operated it with convict labor. By this he was able to force the price of cement down. This earned him the enmity of the cement companies. They backed Fred Green for governor and beat Groesbeck. Green closed down the cement plant. Many still doubt the wisdom of this move. According to the Dispatch files of years ago there was a cement promotional project at Lakeland 50 years ago where limestone deposits were found. Options were taken on a great many acres of and plans were drawn for a cement plant but like many another project of that period it never materialized.




