Political leaders in the off year of 1959 are jockeying for position in the 1960 race. Both Gov. Williams and the legislature are vying for the position of martyr and trying to tug their opponent with the tar of viliany. Gov. Williams first suggested using the veterans fund. The Republicans defeated it then revived it but refused to pass it unless the governor would approve their one cent sales tax hike. This put Williams in the martyr's role. The payless pay days resulting from legislative inaction followed. Sentiment is gathering steam for a constitutional convention. Democrats have long contended that the Republican senate represents area not people. Republicans say area should be represented as well as people. Citizens in 500 communities will pay tribute to industry, business, farms and other activities in Michigan Week May 17-23. As Michigan has been publicized as a poor house the affect will be harder this year. The idea is to picture it as a good place to live and do business in both on a national and local scale. Lawyers gathered at their new \$300,000 building at Lansing May 14 to celebrate Law Day and inspect their new headquarters. Chief Justice DeWitt said "Ours is a civilization of laws, not of men." Gov. Williams said "The vitality of our legal system, so essential to maintaining freedom, depends on broad understanding & support." 7th DISTRICT MASONIC MEETING

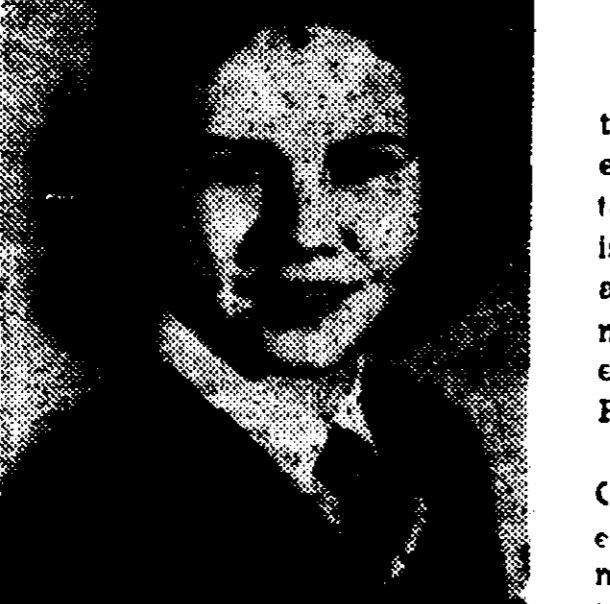
The 7th District Masonic meeting for the lodges of Washtenaw and Livingston counties was held at the Pinckney Masonic temple Monday night to discuss Masonic legislation to come up at Detroit at Grand Lodge, May 26-27. Olin Robinson board of general purpose member for this district presided. The legislation was discussed and questions answered by Frank Lane, Pontiac, Barney Wilson, Glen Alt of Ann Arbor and Charles Fagin of Ypsilanti. The items discussed were forming a 5 county group of lodges in Wayne, Macomb, Oakland, Washtenaw and Monroe counties, state wide concurrent jurisdiction, changing the place of election of board of general purpose members and DDIs, Masonic funeral service for funeral homes, exempting all lodges of less than 500 members from Masonic home assessment, putting all correspondence with foreign jurisdictions in the hands of the grand secretary, granting no life memberships until the applicant has been a member exactly 40 years. Two other proposals were assessing life members a per capita of \$1.50 a year. Cutting the state Demolay board from 9 to 3 members. The following were present and were introduced: James Lunsford, Detroit and Ivan Addis of Dearborn, candidates for grand marshal and Ralph Esham, Olive Branch, Dearborn, candidate for grand lecturer.

Dr. Godfrey, top radio and TV newsmen has just underwent an operation for cancer of the lung. Some years ago he had a TV program sponsored by a cigarette company. Then he pulled a cigarette from a package and smoked it. He quit cigarette smoking 4 years ago. We wonder?

Paul Bagwell, late Republican candidate for governor has trouble in keeping his appointments. Last week he was to have been the main speaker at Republican victory dinner but did not show up. Last fall he was scheduled to speak here between halves at a football game and although the county committee was here did not put in his appearance. Last spring Hamburg Republicans who claim to have organized the first Bagwell Booster Club advertised a big dinner with Bagwell as speaker. He did not appear, but went to Detroit and took part in a TV broadcast in aid. We wonder why all the mixup in dates.

Michigan had its first payless pay day last week for state employees. In Lansing the situation was eased somewhat when credit unions advanced employees money without interest, taking a lien on their pay due. The governor and senate are still deadlocked the senate insisting on a one cent sales tax increase and the governor feels the veterans fund. The governor was bolstered by an opinion of the attorney general that the sales tax could not be increased without a vote of the people and an increase by the legislature would be unconstitutional. Senator Morris, Republican of Midland said the sales tax was dead end there was no sense in riding a dead horse and that he was disposed to favor Rep. Salaries personal income tax. The house killed the sales tax when 2 Republicans voted with the Democrats against it. Another Republican who is against any sales tax did not vote. His is Rep. Conlin, chair man of the tax committee. The Republicans and Democrats were holding conferences and a solution may be worked out.

As usual during Michigan Week, May 17 to 22 the Michigan State Police will observe visiting days from 10 a. m. to 5 p. m. Visitors will be escorted thru the post and equipment and procedure explained. Thousands visited the Brighton State Police Post last year. The one nearest here.

From now until the law is declared to be unconstitutional, voters on the basis that it's a religious law you may continue to buy cars on Sunday by certifying that you plan to observe Monday as the Sabbath or Saturday, it makes no difference. I wish the senators had amended the bill to have it blessed before leaving forth to do bloody combat on the highways and prohibited the parking of vehicles anywhere except before established houses of worship on Sunday. But this might have interrupted with the courting process, causing a great economic loss to justness of the peace, ministers and printers of wedding announcements.
