Michigan can lose by default one of the states most valuable assets, its top grade university faculty members. This means the level of education by the states universities will suffer substantially and for a long period for it takes a long time to build an outstanding faculty. Due to payless pay-days many faculty members are leaving. Also due to the states financial condition no raises are imminent. So the state cannot meet the salaries offered by other universities. Pres. John Hannah of Michigan State University says resignations this year are 50 percent ahead of last year at this time. One hundred forty-seven staff members are leaving compared to 101 last year. He fears this is just the start and there may be a mass exodus. If this happens the education offered in Michigan will be less than top grade. Many professors believe their situation receives proper public attention the solution will be forthcoming. That the people can put enough pressure on the legislature to get needed tax bills passed.

Highway officials are buying the right of way for Mich. new \$1250,000 highway. Options were secured on 400 pieces of land in April for \$1,883,000. This does not include land acquired in Wayne county which totalled 13.1 million. By the end of May options will be obtained on 2,673 parcels of land for the 900 miles of limited access highways.

On March 1, 1955 he became director of the Bureau of School Services. In 1957, he was appointed professor in the School of Education.

He has had experience in teaching and administration in Michigan and Ohio, served three years in the U. S. Army, and prior to his university appointment, was director of research and guidance for the school system of Lakewood, Ohio.

Leach holds the Bachelor of Arts and Master of Arts degrees from Oberlin College, and a Doctor of Philosophy degree from Western Reserve University, Cleveland, Ohio.



Current Comment

Commencement week. Incidentally it is the 50th anniversary of the graduation of ye editor at Dexter high school. The event of that big day in my life is as clear as if they happened yesterday. Over the past 50 years there has been a big change in commencements. Caps and gowns were unheard of for high school graduations then. In fact the first graduating high school class to use them was not until 1913 and it was not until many years later their use became general. Colleges however used them for years. There were 7 boys and 7 girls in my class. The boys were told to get blue serge suits for graduation and the girls white dresses. Blue serge was once very popular but it had a tendency to get shiny. Then the question of the baccalaureate came up. Now this meant the girls had to have another dress as it was not considered according to Hoyle to wear a graduation dress to this event. So led by the girls they decided not to have any. It was probably the only class that went into the world without a clerical blessing. Commencement was always around June 22 in these days and invariably very hot. Schools had no auditoriums and commencement was held in the opera house. The class had to decorate their own stage. One of the girls fathers was connected with the Mack & Co. store in Ann Arbor and thru her the store sent up a window dresser. The background of the stage was a huge sunburst in blue and white, the class colors. The furnishings of the opera house were not good enough so 14 new chairs were borrowed from a furniture store and carried to the opera house by the seniors. There was repercussion to this as the graduates sweat so much they took all the varnish off them and the furniture man wanted us to pay for revarnishing them. The stage was further adorned with potted palms, plants, flowers and whatever else the seniors could borrow. Commencement night was very hot and the grads sat and suffered for hours. The hall was filled and every grad's relatives and friends were there. The editor was near the top of the podium. This oration was entitled "The Future". When I got up I could not remember her first line. After that I remembered it came to me and I started off and went thru without a stop.

There was no J-Hop in those days and no after graduation party although some entertained at their homes afterward.


The state conservation commission which banned motor boats from Silver Lake south of here is being bombarded by boat owners. The edict is that no motor boat can be launched there from a public fishing beach. This means that only people owning property there who have motor boats could use them. This was caused because as many as 60 boats were in operation there some days last year, running training and making swimming dangerous. Persons who rent rowboats are exempt as outboard motors can be used on them.




