Deadline Nearing for License Tabs

With the March 1 deadline for the purchase of license tabs and plates approaching, Livingston county sales are approximately one-third behind last year.

According to a report from the Department of State, 10 times as many plates per day must be sold during the remainder of the month as were sold during the past three months if every vehicle is to be tabbed by the deadline.

Throughout the state, less than 12,000 cars have been licensed daily since tabs went on sale in November. This means that 140,000 applications per day must be processed in order to license Michigan's three million cars by March 1.

The program will be made available to pre-schoolers, second, fifth and eighth graders and to special cases referred by the family dentist.

The topical application of sodium fluoride to newly erupted teeth will reduce new tooth decay by 40 per cent of children. In addition to these benefits the program offers a valuable education experience with no discomfort involved and dental health education is given to the child by the clinic personnel.

Children who participate in the fluoride program are being taught the proper method of toothbrushing, are given information about the kind of diet that is best for good dental health and information about the value of sodium fluoride on teeth.

Make regular dental visits to avoid loss of teeth from dental diseases. Begin early with pre-schoolers before you think they have any decay.

The location of the topical fluoride clinic will be announced at a later date.

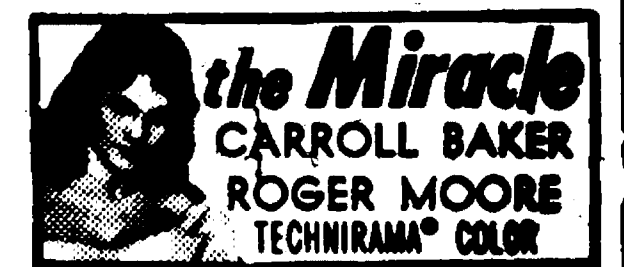

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MICHIGAN MIRROR . . .

A PRESSING PROBLEM facing Michigan lawmakers this year is the search for means of stemming the tide of juvenile delinquency.

Juvenile delinquency affects less than 3 per cent of school-age youngsters, yet it constitutes a major factor in the eventual total cost of crime.

The Legislature recognized this problem two years ago and set up a study committee, headed by Rep. Harry DeMaso (R-Battle Creek), to study it.

Drastic measures, at least for those involved, were proposed in bill form by DeMaso's committee.

A statewide curfew would set 10 p. m. as deadline for children under 12 and midnight for those under 16.

One proposal called "revolutionary" by DeMaso would provide up to \$200 fine for parents

violating probate court orders on child supervision.

Conservation camps for youthful offenders and a juvenile delinquency study center also were proposed.

A "shock attack" approach to the juvenile delinquency problem is gaining support.

Perhaps the most startling approach has been the sentencing practices of Calhoun Circuit Judge Alfonso A. Magnotta, who has put youthful offenders in solitary confinement on meager diets of bread, milk, water and vitamin pills.

A church group asked the state Supreme Court to investigate Magnotta's practice. The court refused.

Justice George Edwards let it be known several weeks later he didn't think much of Magnotta's approach. He said he considered such practices to be in violation of state law, public policy and judicial ethics.

"The restricted diet provision is neither original nor novel," said Edwards. "In varying forms it has been used in the history of punishment for centuries. In most civilized countries it has been abandoned simply because experience showed that it did not work."

Edwards is of the school that says social revenge and harsh punishment rarely help.

Somewhere, either to one extreme or to the middle, there may be an answer to juvenile problems. Michigan is a leader in the search.

AN EXODUS of aides from Governor Williams' camp early this year just about cleared out

the original crowd around the Governor when he first took office.

In a brief period it was announced that Paul Weber, Williams' press secretary, was going to work for the Civil Service Service Commission; legal aide Alfred B. Fitt was going to work for a U. S. Senate subcommittee; and administrative aide William Monat was going to the faculty of Pennsylvania State College.

Weber was the only male old-timer left. Pretty Julie Lawler, Williams' personal secretary, and other secretaries on the original staff remained.

A clue that Williams would not seek reelection was seen by many in the staff exists, but few were willing to bet on it.

Weber insists the Governor's decision was not known at the time his aides made their decisions.

Weber said Monta wanted to return to the campus life, Fitt wanted to broaden his experience as a lawyer, "and I want to make a buck."

A FORMER GOVERNOR'S son is making a bigger than usual splash in his maiden plunge into politics.

Although a newcomer, Sen. John Fitzgerald (R-Grand Ledge) is considered to be in the "inner" circle of that exclusive club, the State Senate.

He is sponsor of the resolution that will, if given a two-thirds vote in the Legislature, put a sales tax hike proposal on the November 8 ballot.

Capitol veterans say John has the same mannerisms of his father, the late Gov. Frank D. Fitz-

gerald.

His grandfather, after whom he was named, was a member of the House of Representatives just before the turn of the century.

Before he was elected to the Senate in 1958, Fitzgerald was legal adviser to the Senate Judiciary Committee.

Like most GOP senators, Fitzgerald is often critical of the "liberal" leadership of the Republican State Central Committee. When the committee adopted a resolution favoring

calling of a constitutional convention, Fitzgerald said he feared it was trying to "ram" something down the throat of the voter.

However, he has been more prone to compromise than many senate Republicans.

After a few years of seasoning, it could be that John Fitzgerald may try to follow in his father's footsteps.

CONSERVATION DEPT.

Deer hunters being polled by the conservation commission are two to one in favor of any deer season. Post cards were mailed to hunters who had taken out 1959 licenses. Sixty-four percent were for the any deer season. In 1952 in a similar poll 59 percent of the hunters were opposed to such a season.

The long standing gentlemen's agreement that the hunter who draws first blood is entitled to the game bird or animal has been sustained by the supreme court. This case came up in Wisconsin where a wolf was wounded by hunters and later killed by another hunter who declared it belonged to him.

"Water Key to Your Survival" is billed as this years National Wildlife theme by the National Wildlife Federation. Suitable programs are being prepared by schools and civic groups. There will also be visits to farms, watersheds and water developments. The Michigan Conservation Dept. will present a 16 page supplement.

A pool of the legislature shows no one willing to introduce a bill raising the cost of fishing licenses. Sales of these licenses declined 13 percent last year.

Federal Surplus property at Ta-was Bay will become public property if conservation plans materialize. This 140 acres was formerly owned by the U.S. Coast Guard.

The Conservation dept. will consider adding more acreage at their February meeting. This includes 40 acres at Fife Lake, 40 in Crawford county, 594 on Maple River, 40 from Consumers Power Company in Kalkaska county, 63 in Chippewa county, 32 at Ft. Drummond and there are numerous tracts of tax reverted lands.

The department has added two T-34b Beechcraft planes to their aerial wing.

Thirty-two of Michigan's state parks had more visitors last year than ever before.

Michigan deer herds are in good shape due to a light winter.

Vice President Nixon, the only Republican candidate for the presidency visited Detroit last week. 1500 ate dinner with him at the Masonic temple. He was received royally but his speech was without substance as he carefully skirted the issues of the coming campaign. Civil rights were not mentioned. He said old fashioned virtue and economy can keep us ahead of Russia despite Russian boasting whatever that means. We noticed several peculiarities on his reception. There were no negroes on his reception committee or at his dinner. The only union man there was Leon Woodcock, UAW vice president and Democrat governor of Wayne University. Nixon is a conservative of the old guard type and was named vice president to hold the Taft wing of the party in line. The old guard dumped Taft in 1952 because they decided he could not be elected. Today they are confident they can elect Nixon, on a peace and prosperity slogan.

The civil rights issue has cropped up in the south in new demonstrations against the segregated lunch counters in dime, shopping centers, drug and variety stores in the Carolinas, Virginia and Florida. The negro students in colleges there have been insisting on their right to eat at these places. 41 were arrested at Raleigh last week and charged with trespass. Negro attorneys say their arrest is illegal and will carry it into court.

Mayor William Brashear of Livonia wants a law exempting persons who are more than 65 years old from the payment of school taxes. He says their children are grown, most of these people are living on pensions and social security and it is absurd to expect them to adjust their lives to deprivation after years of honorable service to the community. The mayor is a little ahead of his time. Such a law may be passed but not now. Much money is needed for school expansion and much more will be needed. All are yelling about the growing burden of taxation, and if the taxpayers over 65 were exempted from school taxes where would the money come from to replace their tax.

With Washington and Lincoln birthdays coming close together it keeps the editorial writers busy writing eulogies about them. We first heard about Washington when in the first grade and especially the cherry tree incident. No Washington day program was complete without a cherry tree being chopped down and Washington was rated the only person in the world who never told a lie. Then we were told he threw a silver dollar across the Rappahannock River. Both stories have since been classed as false. Washington's officers formed a conspiracy to deprive him of command of the army and might have succeeded if General Gates had not lost the battle at Camden and General Lee at Monmouth. All were former British army officers as was Washington himself. Lincoln was called the only president ever born in a log cabin. He may have been, but lots of people in his days were born in log cabins. General Wm. Harrison's friends claimed he was but this was proved false. Lincoln was said to have learned to read by the light from the fireplace. We are inclined to doubt this as his eyesight was always good. Lincoln was said to be a champion rail splitter. The average boy today never saw a rail. When the pioneers settled this country they were short on money but there were trees galore so they cut them down and split them into rails. The rails were about 10 feet long and four to six inches thick. They were placed in a zig-zag manner to fence farm fields. Hence the saying crooked as a rail fence. There were plenty of rail fences still here in the nineties. Lincoln is said to have become an abolitionist when he saw a slave auction in New Orleans when a boy. Still Illinois was never a slave state. Anyway his election put an abolitionist in the president's chair and the south seceded.

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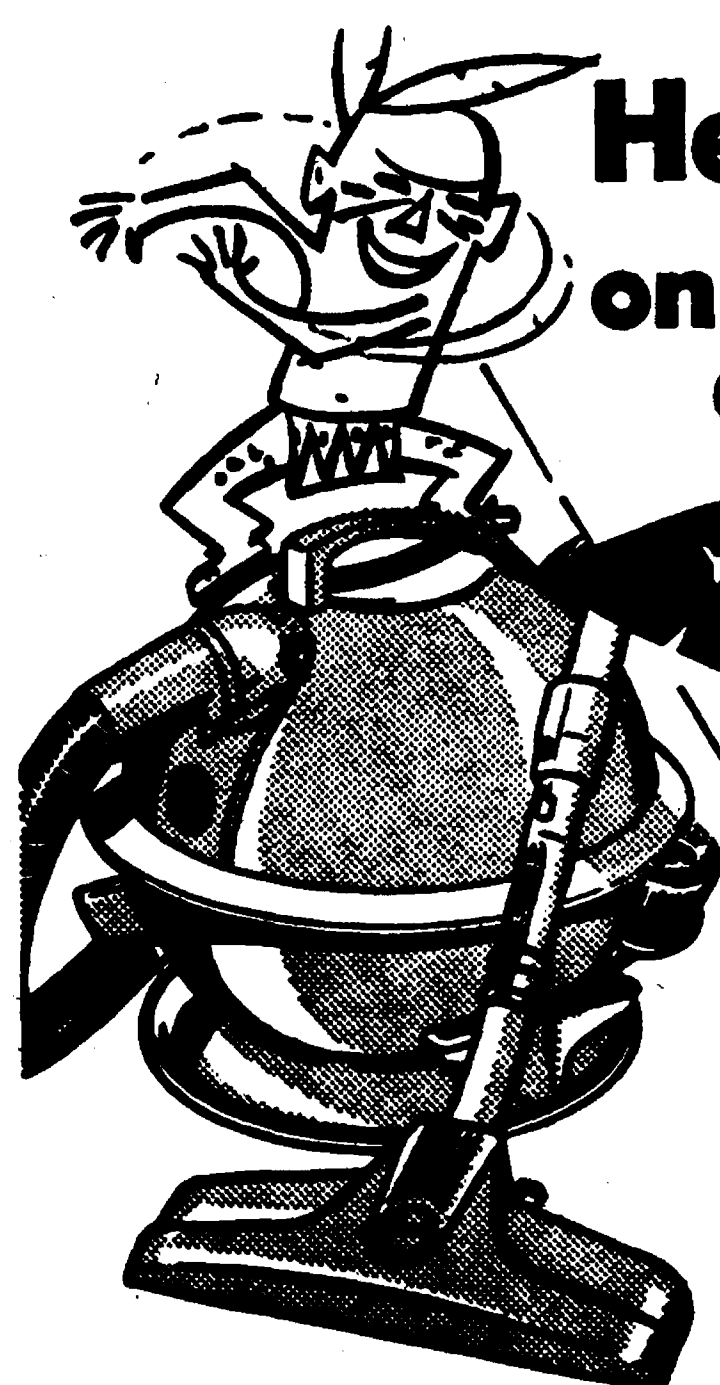

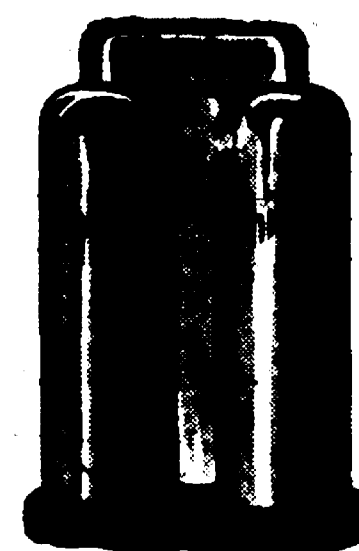
