

#### STATE POLICE REPORT **ON ACCIDENTS**

Seventy-five water accidents have already caused 51 deaths and injured 29 persons in Michigan this year, the State Police report, and the toll has emphasized the need for increased safety precautions as the water sports season heads toward its point of high activity.

Of the accidents, 43 were fatals, 16 personal injury and 16 property damage only. The information is based on reports received from all police agencies through June 14.







# **Good Fishermen Learn to** Hunt, U-M Expert Says

Fishing is where you find it. And, says Karl F. Lagler (PhD), chairman of The University of Michigan Department of Fisheries, the good fisherman moves around — like a rabbit hunter.

"You will never see a rabbit hunter sitting on a stump in the middle of a field, waiting for the game to come to him. It would be a long wait between rabbits," Lagler reminds.

"And yet, how many fishermen do this very thing - just sitting in one spot, waiting for fish to come to them. The good rabbit hunter tries all kinds of cover until he locates his game. Then he concentrates on that type of cover."

Lagler, a veteran angler, offers this recipe for fishing success:

"Start casting the shoreline. with a floating-diving lure. If the water is clear, start the bait moving the second it strikes the water. If the water is murky, let it remain motionless for five or ten seconds, then start retrieving. This gives the fish time to find it when visibility is poor. Occasionally try a surface lure for variation. "If no fish are taken around shore, try casting from shore into deeper water, using a sinking bait which will dig right down to the bottom. Next try heavier cover such as moss beds, weed patches or lily pad fields. Cast a slow sinking lure next to the cover and make a steady retrieve. Occasionally try a jerky retrieve. Fish far back in the pads or weeds call for a weedless lure. Toss one deep into the cover and retrieve slowly. Set the hook quickly. "Sunken logs, fallen trees, brush piles, small patches of cover, drop-offs and rocky shorelines are excellent places. Approach them quietly. "As a last resort, try thistie a floating lure to the end of your line and about 18 inches ahead of it attach a keel sinker just large enough to sink the lure. Troll this slowly through the middle of the lake. It will ride nicely."

When the fisherman makes a catch, Lagler reminds, he should mark the spot well by picking landmarks in four directions. Then he can visit the spot often. It will be exclusively his and will pay off regularly.

Lagler explains this subject on his radio program, "Conservation Report," produced by the University Broadcasting Service (WUOM) and carried around the state.

SISTER M. VERONICA



# **Good Fishermen Learn to** Hunt, U-M Expert Says

Fishing is where you find it. And, says Karl F. Lagler (PhD), chairman of The University of Michigan Department of Fisheries, the good fisherman moves around — like a rabbit hunter.

"You will never see a rabbit hunter sitting on a stump in the middle of a field, waiting for the game to come to him. It would be a long wait between rabbits," Lagler reminds.

"And yet, how many fishermen do this very thing — just sitting in one spot, waiting for fish to come to them. The good rabbit hunter tries all kinds of cover until he locates his game. Then he concentrates on that type of cover."

Lagler, a veteran angler, offers this recipe for fishing success:

"Start casting the shoreline. with a floating-diving lure. If the water is clear, start the bait moving the second it strikes the water If the water is murky, let it remain motionless for five or ten seconds, then start retrieving. This gives the fish time to find it when visibility is poor. Occasionally try a surface lure for variation.

"If no fish are taken around shore, try casting from shore into deeper water, using a sinking bait which will dig right down to the bottom. Next try heavier cover such as moss beds, weed patches or lily pad fields. Cast a slow sinking lure next to the cover and make a steady retrieve. Occasionally try a jerky retrieve. Fish far back in the pads or weeds call for a weedless lure. Toss one deep into the cover and retrieve slowly. Set the hook quickly. "Sunken logs, fallen trees, brush piles, small patches of cover, drop-offs and rocky shorelines are excellent places. Approach them quietly. "As a last resort, try thistie a floating lure to the end of your line and about 18 inches ahead of it attach a keel sinker just large enough to sink the lure. Troll this slowly through the middle of the lake. It will ride nicely."

When the fisherman makes a catch, Lagler reminds, he should mark the spot well by picking landmarks in four directions. Then he can visit the spot often. It will be exclusively his and will pay off regularly.

Lagler explains this subject on his radio program, "Conservation Report," produced by the University Broadcasting Service (WUOM) and carried around the state.
