## Pirate 11 Blasts Chelsea 59-0; Meet Dexter Here Friday

Pinckney Pirates played at Chelsea Homecoming last Friday night, defeating Chelsea 59 to 0. Chelsea was contained in its own territory thru-out the entire game. Chelsea received Bob Williams kick-off which was fumbled by Chelsea on its own 6 yard line. Pinckney scored from the 6 with John Biery, end converted to halfback carrying the ball the first time as a Varsity back, going in taking a handoff from Jack Young.

Chelsea received the kickoff and gained no ground, punted to Pinckney on their own 47. Pinckney failed to move to a first down and Bob Williams punted to Chelsea who fumbled. The ball recovered by Paul Burg. A series of line plays and a 30 yard pass. Youngs to Manns, then a 12 yard gain by John Biery set the stage for Terry Rowell to score on a 2 yard plunge. Dennis Singer's kick was blocked. Score at the end of the 1st quarter, Pinckney 12, Chelsea 0.

In the 2nd quarter Don Barker intercepted a Chelsea pass and aided by terrific blocking by John Biery and Terry Rowell, ran 40 yards to score. Jack Young passed to Mike Manns for extra point. Pinckney then started a drive on their own 23, using 11 plays and four different backs brought the ball to the Chelsea 20 yard line, where Terry Rowell passed to Chuck DeWolf on the five and DeWolf went in to score. Singer's kick was low. Score at the half, Pinckney 25, Chelsea 0.

Pinckney took the 2nd half kickoff on its own 20 yard line and with 10 plays moved in to score by Larry Mills slanting off tackle 7 yards. Williams' kick was good. Terry Rowell then intercepted a Chelsea pass and ran 45 yards to score. Williams' kick was good. After Chelsea received the kickoff they could not gain, they punted to Pinckney's 30 where a drive was started. Using 7 plays, the big gain by Szalwinski, reserve halfback who went 30 yards to set up the TD situation, John Holben ran 16 yards, then handed off to Gary Szalwinski who went 2 yards on an end sweep to tally.

Dennis Singer's kick was good. Score at the 3rd quarter, Pinckney 46, Chelsea 0.

In the fourth quarter Williams kickoff was low, fumbled by Chelsea, then recovered by Williams on Chelsea's 40 yard line. In five plays, including a 15 yard penalty, the Pirates moved in on a pass play by John Holben throwing 45 yards to Ed Guy who went the remaining 5 yards to score. Dennis Singer's kick was wide. The last touchdown was made by Gerry Darrow intercepting a Chelsea pass on Chelsea's 12 and running in to score his first touchdown. Jack Young passed to Ed Guy for extra point. Final score, Pinckney 59, Chelsea 0. Pinckney score 11 touchdowns: 6 on running plays of which two were by Chuck DeWolf, one of 47 yards and one of 27 yards were called back by penalties, 3

touchdowns on pass interceptions, and 2 touchdowns on passes. Pinckney scored five extra points, 3 by place kicks, 2 by passes. Pinckney was up for the Chelsea Homecoming game with several new backs showing promise. The reserve squad played last half of 3rd quarter and the last quarter. John Holben again did a good job at Quarterback as did Jack Young, the varsity signal-caller who mixed his plays well. It was an alert Pinckney squad that played at Chelsea. Now the big test comes Friday when Dexter, who is tied with Pinckney for Conference lead will play at Pinckney Homecoming. With Dexter's speed and power it should be a good ball game. Game time at 7:30 Friday night.

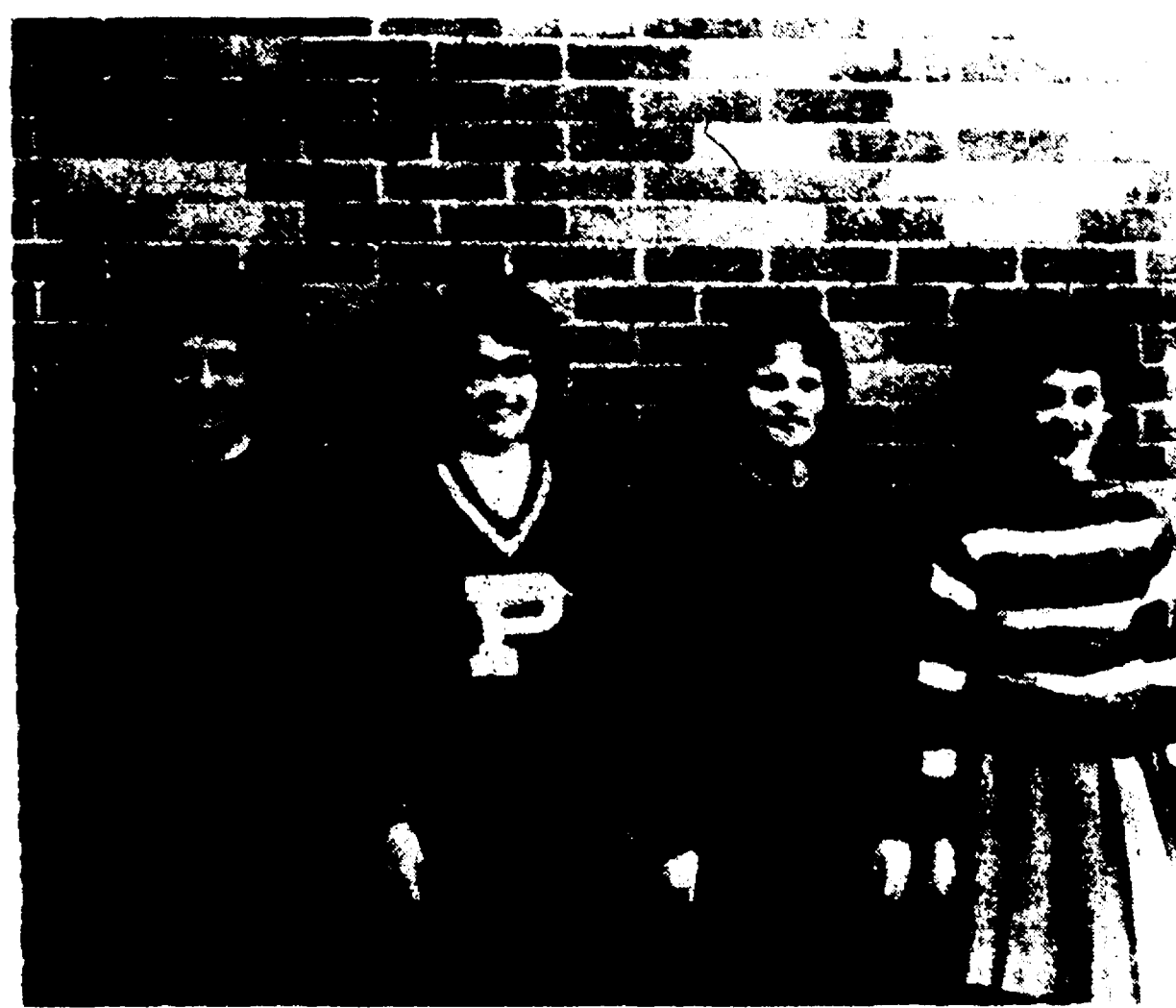
### LOCAL BOY COMPLETES TRAINING

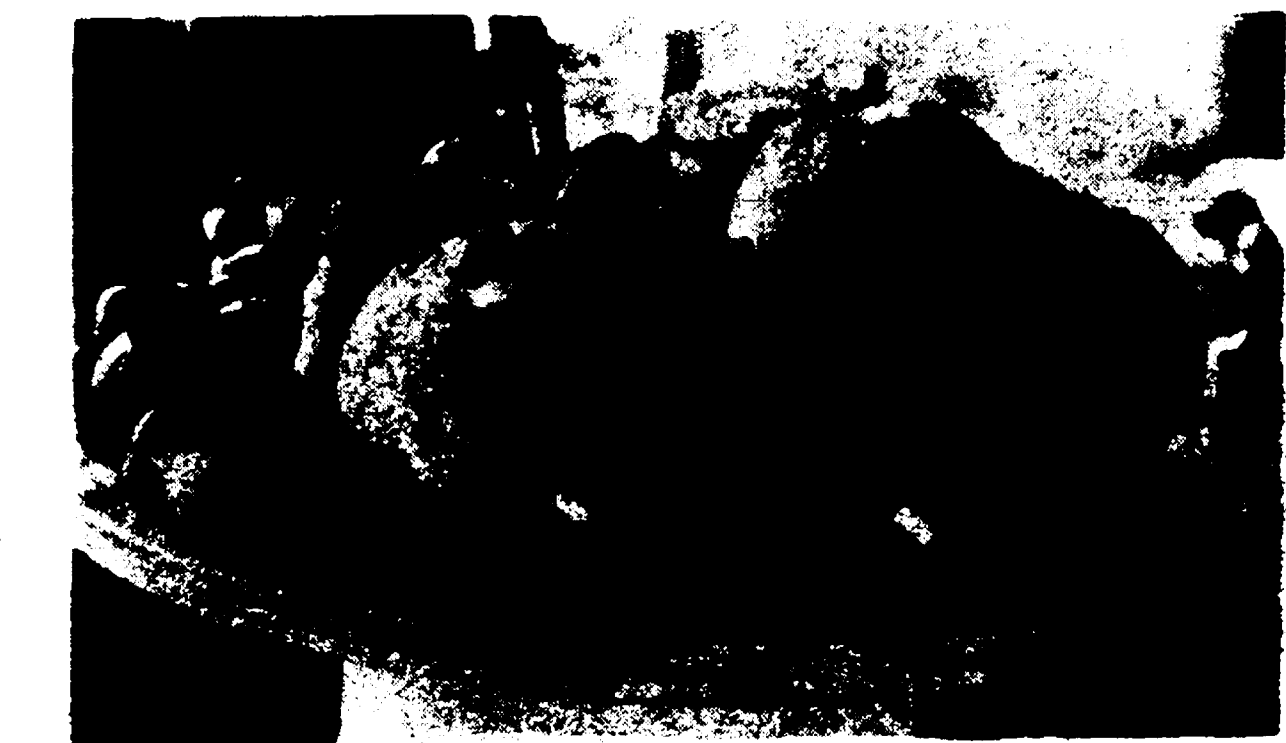
The starting teams will be chosen just before kick-off, making the suspense greater than at other football games.

## MICHIGAN MIRROR

Michigan's public and private school teachers, roughly 90,000 in number, recently got a warning from Superintendent of Public Instruction Lynn M. Bartlett. Its message was: "Keep abreast of the times in which you live."

There are three duties for teachers in order that they may fulfill their role as instructors for children and leaders of the community, Bartlett said.

Teachers must keep themselves informed in areas of rapid change, he said. This applies to current political and economic events, technological and scientific advances and social change.

Another goal for the teacher is to keep his teaching methods and subject matter abreast of the changes that are taking place. Not only must students be told of the changes, but they must also be made aware of the implications for them, Bartlett said.

The third responsibility of teachers is to help bring information about the developments, problems and needs in education

to members of the community whose only contact with schools may be casual ones through their children.

Bartlett even hinted that he believes education and educators have fallen down slightly, at least in some areas.

He cited particularly instruction in foreign languages, which are still handled with the same emphasis as years ago; and history, where teaching has in some cases failed to stay abreast of developments of various national and international feelings, and the emergence of entirely new countries.

The Public Instruction chief emphasized that teachers have a special role in Michigan society, and it is up to them to maintain it.

The agricultural picture in Michigan has a dark spot on it this year.

Grape production is expected to fall to about one-half the size the last year's crop. The problem involves a freeze that came along late in May, while grapes were in the critical formative stages. The vineyards never recovered.

While last year was a bumper crop compared to the 10-year

average, the drop in production this year still means a blow to grape growers.

All the other eastern grape states in the country are expected to have grape yields as large or slightly larger than last year, except for Arkansas.

Michigan's commercial grape production is centered in Van Buren, Berrien and Kalamazoo counties with Allegan and Cass counties also contributing to the market yield.

The late and relatively light grape harvest will mean a handicap for jam and jellie makers, and wine producers; and probably a price increase for the consumer.

Medical men in Michigan face a new call to the service of their country.

The call for more doctors, dentists and veterinarians to handle the needs of the armed forces went out nationwide.

The Michigan headquarters of the Selective Service system says local draft boards will be asked to recheck the classifications and deferments of those with badly needed skills in the healing arts.

None of those called to fill the needs will be less than 28 years old, the Selective Service said.

A hitch in the service can put a hitch in the plans of someone who intends to become a doctor, dentist or veterinarian, and the resultant delay in training can be especially bothersome for physicians.

Interns are permitted to finish their training before they are called up, but specialists who are taking resident training have trouble getting deferments unless they are in public health residency programs.

The Selective Service system expects many persons who were eligible for deferments before

## HUNTERS OFTEN DAMAGE TELEPHONE LINES

There is no more welcome time of the year than this for the bird hunter, but for his prey and for telephone companies, it's an uneasy period.

The pheasant season places an extra threat of damage to overhead cables and wire as they come in line of fire, or are sometimes aimed at intentionally.

In repeating its plea for hunted care this season, the Michigan Bell Telephone Company points out that a single pellet from a shot can cut off scores of conversations — many of which could be exchanging vital information.

Cutting off calls in rural areas could be serious to the farmer who might have to make an emergency call, or to the hunter himself who may need the telephone to call for help in case of an accident afield.

In addition to these aspects, says Michigan Bell, an average case of cable trouble costs the company from \$75 to \$100, often more, to repair. Hunters are reminded they can be held financially responsible for such damages. Wilful destruction is punishable by heavy fines and imprisonment.

So, hunters are asked again this year, as the season is about to open October 20, to take care when they take aim.

# McPherson Health Center Makes New Physical Medicine Service Available to Patients

With the establishment of a program in physical medicine, the McPherson Community Health Center has made a new service available to the community.

Dr. Lester Wolcott, the program advisor, is available to staff physicians for consultation every Wednesday morning. Dr. Wolcott was graduated from the University of Buffalo, School of Medicine. He served his internship at Sparrow Hospital in Lansing and his residency in physical medicine at the University of Michigan. Dr. Wolcott is the Medical Director of the Ingham County Rehabilitation Center. He has a consuming interest in the rehabilitation of incapacitated individuals in order that they

might attain the ability to help themselves.

Each week-day morning, Monday through Friday, Russell Addison, a registered physical therapist, directs the physical therapy program for both in and out patients. Addison was graduated as a registered physical therapist from the Mayo Clinic. He formerly served on the staff at the University of Michigan.

The type of patients receiving treatment will be those in need of rehabilitation because of fractures, stroke victims, arthritics or any condition where it is indicated that physical therapy would be beneficial.

Working with Addison will be Miss Sharon DeYoung, also a registered physical therapist and

# State Police Warn Drivers

The last three months of the year are the harvest season for traffic fatalities in Michigan, nearly one-third of them occurring during this period, is the warning of Sgt. Robert Vesey, commanding officer of the Brighton State Police post.

"The wise driver and pedestrian will need no further reminder of the hazards encountered in fall and winter driving or walking and will proceed with care and alertness," he said.

State Police records for the last 25 years show that October, November and December account for an average of 30 per cent of the annual toll of traffic deaths. Last year the loss in lives for the three months was 487, a frightful price to pay for a graduate of the University of Michigan.

Be careful at railroad crossings, especially where banks of snow may obscure vision. Faithfully obey the traffic laws and signs and watch out for the motorist or pedestrian who may not be watching you.

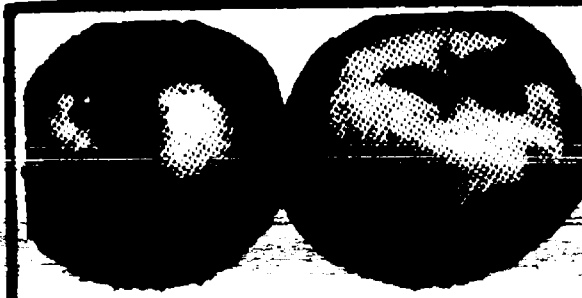

## '62 Plates Are Green on White

Secretary of State James M. Hare today announced that 1962 green on white auto license plates will go on sale at branch offices in all 83 counties on November 1, 1961.

Hare said that the color combination was picked after consultations early this year with Prison Industry technicians at a time when nobody in Lansing was sure if the 1962 plates would be reflectorized or not.

"If the reflectorization law passed by the Legislature had not been repealed and if we had been forced to use luminous paints the white background would have made possible the use of either kind of paint," Hare pointed out.

Safety experts who have made visibility tests on hundreds of color combinations give a preferential rating to green letters on a white background. Even under dusty road conditions the green-white offers a desirable contrast, technicians say.

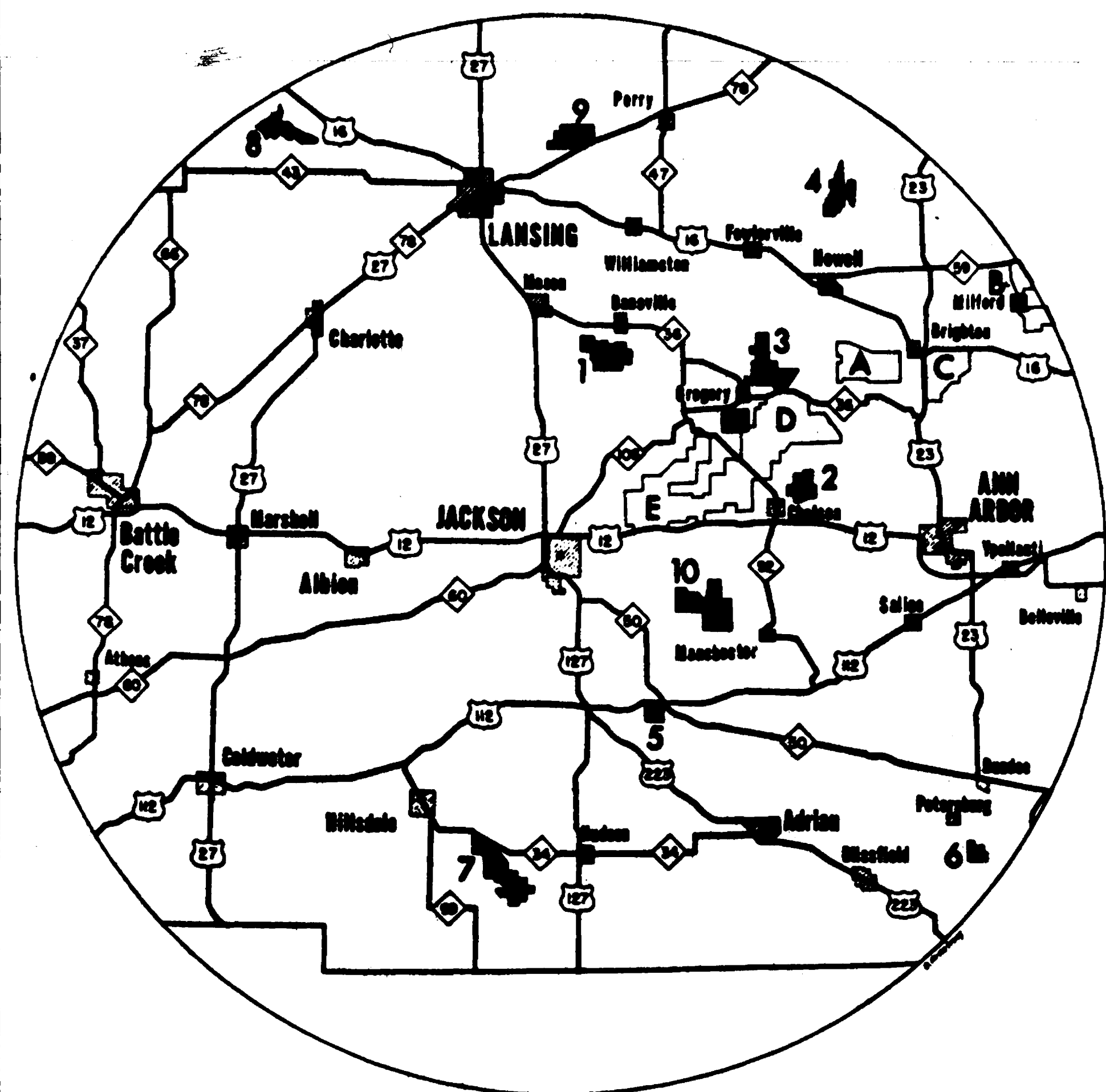
