Belleville Man Killed in Crash

A 35-year-old Belleville man was killed about 5 p. m. last Tuesday evening when his car crashed on W. M-36 just east of Gregory.

Glenn P. Daymon of 18455 Elwell road, Sumpter township, one of the owners of the Dearborn Sod Nurseries farm near Gregory evidently lost control of the station wagon he was driving, skidded off the highway and into a marsh.

A sheriff's deputy at Howell said death was due to a broken neck.

Approximately 60 Local Citizens Attend Club Meet

Approximately 60 local citizens attended the special meeting of the Parents Club last Thursday evening at the elementary school to hear four of the five board members favoring the proposed bond issue answer questions and discuss the proposal. Jack Swanson, trustee, was unable to attend because of illness. Board President John Walton, Lee Coucher, Jack Young and George Roth took turns reading and answering a list of sixteen questions prepared by the Parents Club who wished to hear why the board favored the bond issue for which a special school election will be held in the near future. School

board treasurer Lyle Kinsey and Thomas Line, trustee, who have gone on record as opposing the \$1,175,000 proposal, were not invited to express their views and reasons for their stand.

In addition to the questions, sheets showing 1961 Financial Data of the Pinckney Community Schools and facts pertinent to growth and needs study were presented to those attending.

The proposed new debt, according to the figures, would mean an actual increase of 2 mills over the present millage.

Applying the State Equalized Valuation factor of 2.85 for the Pinckney Community School District, 2 mills will mean a \$5.70 increase in taxes for each \$1,000 assessed valuation on your property. (Former Hamburg District will add 4 mills or \$11.20 increase in taxes for each \$1,000 assessed valuation.)

Chest Drive Starts Monday

Final details for the Hamburg-Putnam Community Chest Drive were completed at a meeting of the seven-man board of directors held at the ACO, Inc., plant last night and volunteer workers will start Monday morning, December 11, on their week long fund drive.

The board of directors earlier announced a total goal of \$5,000 for the two townships. Volunteer workers under area captains will solicit every home in the village of Pinckney and Hamburg as well as the rural homes.

Serving on the board are Lloyd Hendee, chairman; Oscar Beck, treasurer; Hugh Radloff and Manly Bennett, both of Hamburg; Don Swarthout, James Blommel and Don Gibson.

The "Give Once For All" pattern of giving will be appreciated in this initial drive and the cooperation of every resident is urged to make the goal and its requirements possible.

Bill Barber at Pilot's Meet in Paris, France, Dec. 11

William A. Barber of 8881 McGregor Road, Pinckney, will leave for Europe this week to represent the United States in meetings of pilots from the free world and Iron Curtain countries beginning December 11 in Paris, France.

Barber, an exhibition aerobatic pilot, will be the delegate from the U. S. Aeronautic Association at the meetings sponsored by the Federation Aeronautique Internationale. The group will establish the requirements for the first world championship aerobatics flying events to be held sometime next year.

Countries participating will include the United States, Great Britain, Switzerland, West Germany, Czechoslovakia, Hungary, Poland and Russia.

Barber, who is now based at Willow Run Airport as a captain for North Central Airlines, started flying when still in high school. He has been a crop duster, charter pilot, army flight instructor and has done exhibition flying throughout the country.

In addition to serving as a representative in Europe this month, Capt. Barber, assisted in the filming of a special CBS T.V. show on aerobatic flying which will be televised coast to coast on February 18.

Family Project . . . "Hunt America Time"

My whole family—husband, youngsters and assorted inlaws — has just joined a marvelous do-it-yourself program to restore landowners' confidence in hunters. It's called "Hunt America Time," and its slogan is "Respect Private Property — Save Public Hunting."

The program has two parts. The first is aimed at hunters through publicity, speeches and demonstrations. They are asked to sign a pledge card promising to respect property rights and be careful with firearms.

The second phase has us calling on landowners and asking them to permit hunting. Those who agree are given free signs reading "Hunting By Permission Only" and "Safety

Zone — No Hunting Near Buildings." We even tack up the signs for them, if they wish!

And it works — many a "Posted" sign has been replaced by our new signs, once we convinced the landowners that hunters who carry the card will respect their property. | 1 cup chopped onion | 1 teaspoon oregano |
| 3/4 cup diced green pepper | 1 1/2 cups diced cooked turkey |
| 1/2 cup butter or margarine | 1 1/2 cups diced cooked ham |
| 1-4 ounce can whole pimientos, diced | 2 1/2 cups cooked noodles |
| 3/4 cup sliced ripe olives | 2 cups canned apple sauce |
| 1/2 teaspoon salt | 2 tablespoons melted butter |
| | Few grains paprika |

Saute onion and green pepper in butter or margarine until lightly browned. Add pimientos, olives, salt and oregano. Using 1 1/2 cups of noodles, place in layers the turkey, vegetables, ham and the noodles in buttered 2 quart casserole, ending with vegetable layer. Spoon apple sauce over top. Toss remaining noodles with 2 tablespoons melted butter; place in ring around edge of casserole and sprinkle with paprika. Bake in hot oven, 375 degrees, 25 to 30 minutes. Makes 6-8 servings.

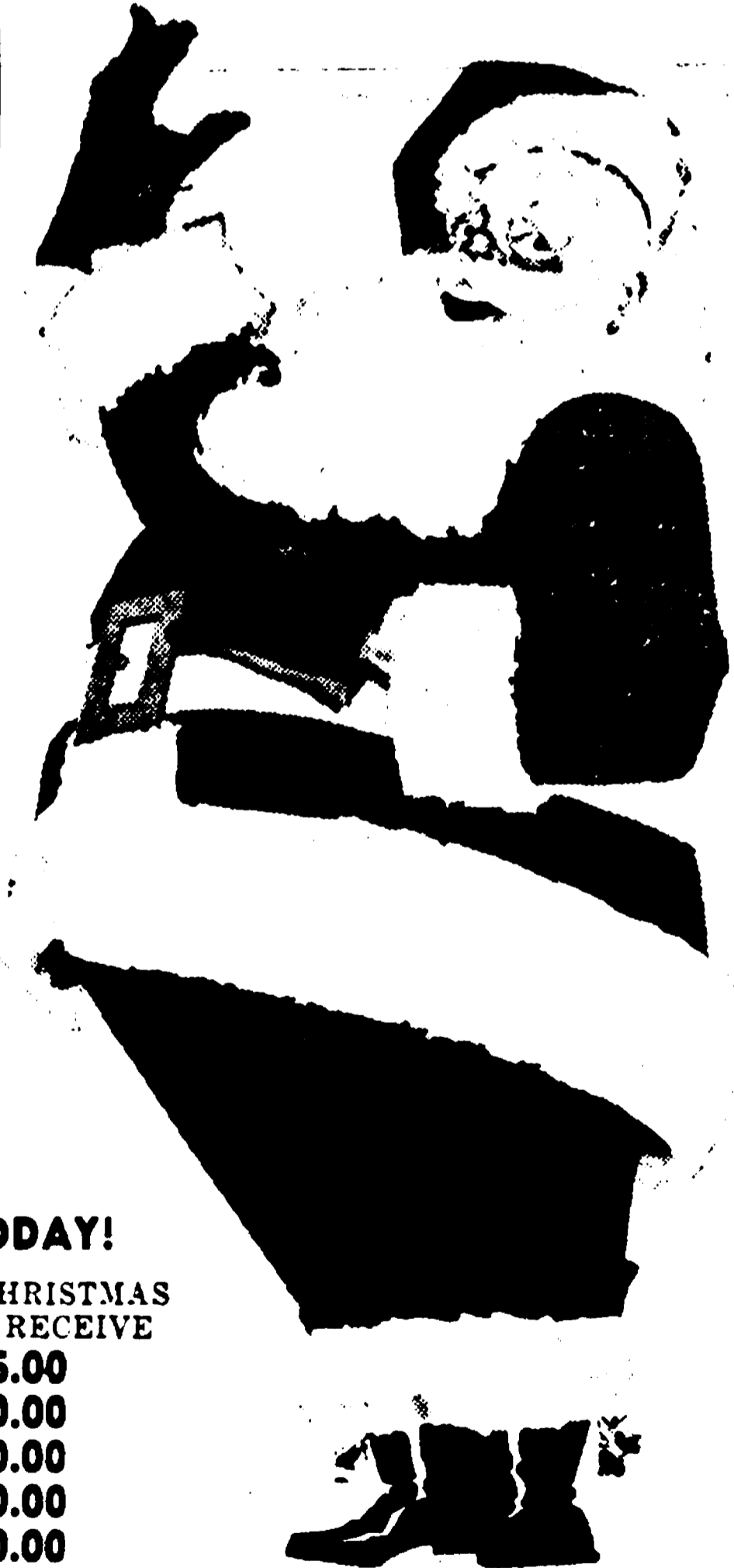
