## Last Quarter of '61 Recorded In Final Chronology Installment

The last three months of 1961 are still withing easy remembering though the year itself has given way to young 1962. These notes cover the final events recalled in our chronology:

### OCTOBER 4th:

Linda Bechler and Lewis Crabtree were married Saturday in Brighton. The high school classes named their class queens this week: they are Kay Wylie, senior; Scharme Baxter, junior; Karen Rowell, sophomore and Ann Marie Young, freshman. One of the four will be crowned Homecoming Queen at the homecoming festivities October 20. Pirates win another football game. They now share the lead in Washtenaw conference with Dexter. Mrs. Margaret Gibney, 89, dies in Gregory. School enrollment is 1275; 71 students over last year's total. Ernest Greer dies at Patterson Lake. Village streets around square are resurfaced.

### OCTOBER 11th:

James Barker is named "most valuable player" of summer Babe Ruth league; awarded a trophy. A pitcher - outfielder, he pitched 2 shut-outs during season. Mr. and Mrs. James Conrad observe their 60th wedding anniversary on Oct. 15. Hollis Swarthout's Mobil station entered and robbed in the nighttime. Donald Parlettes are named to head Parents Club as co-chairmen for 1961-62. Rev. William Hainsworth undergoes lung surgery; operation successful at University Medical Center. Kiwanis Club sponsors "Big Brother" night. Pirates beat Trojans, 53-6; high school football team undefeated.

### OCTOBER 18th:

Pirates blast Chelsea football team, 59-0. Kiwanis Club announces plans for 2nd annual All-Star game. Work starts this week on a second oil well in area; this one on Three Brothers Farm on Dexter-Pinckney road.

### OCTOBER 25th:

St. Mary's church confirms 110 boys and girls; Most Reverend Bishop Henry Donnelly here for ceremony. Kay Wylie is crowned Homecoming Queen at half-time of homecoming game. Pirates edge Dexter 7-6 for great rejoicing among students and football fans. Marilyn Atkins and Donald Kaiser are married. Hurley H. Baker, father of Mrs. Glenda Hoyt, dies. Roy Harris is victim of farm accident; undergoes emergency surgery for removal of kidney, recovers. Karl Burg undergoes heart surgery at U. Medical Center.

### NOVEMBER 1st:

Jack Lee and Crystal Campbell are married. Engagement of Sharon Lee Griffiths and Floyd J. Campbell told. Vandal damages two school buses; suspect 'Halloween' prank. Pinckney Typesetting Co. schedules open house at new plant. Daughter, Margaret Shari, born to William C. Hills on October 30. Con-con delegates Thomas Sharpe makes first report in this issue of Lansing activities. Pirates win over Saline, 24-14 at Saline's

Homecoming; Pirates undefeated, one more game to go.

### NOVEMBER 8th:

Harvey Garrs observe silver wedding anniversary. Pirates win football game from U High 14-6 and the Washtenaw Conference crown. Plans told for building of motel in Hell, Mich.; to be ready next June. Phillip Wayne Johnson, 19, former P.H.S. student, killed in auto crash in Ann Arbor. O.E.S. installs new officers; Mrs. Grant Ward and James Moran, Worthy Matron and Worthy Patron, respectively.

### NOVEMBER 15th:

Board of Education announces decision to seek \$1,175,000 bond issue for new high school, additions to existing facilities, etc. Rachel Nash was named winner of Kiwanis Award for first card-marking period. Local Community Chest organized; 5-man board is named. Kiwanis Club holds "Career Night" for seniors. Nine P.H.S. student notified they are winners in Michigan Week writing contest. P.H.S. Pirates name tri-captains for 1962 — Gary Szalwinski, Bill Light and John Biery.

### NOVEMBER 22nd:

Louis A. Rogers elected 1962 president of Kiwanis Club. Junior League basketball attracts five teams, all sponsored by area churches and business men. S. M. Speake, father of Jerry Speake, dies in Royal Oak. John I. Garfield dies suddenly at home on W. M-36. Mrs. Bertha Hinkley passes after long illness. Mr. and Mrs. Al Fredenburg leave for Florida vacation; won as a prize in Howell Melon raising contest.

### NOVEMBER 29th:

Community Chest goal for Hamburg - Putnam set at \$5000. Terry Rowell, P.H.S. football star, is named to Detroit News All-Suburban selections for 1961. Named to four of the eleven positions on the Washtenaw All-League team were Rowell, Szalwinski, Ed Guy and Jim DeWolf. Rainbow Girls sponsor winter "Snow Frolic" dance. Women's Fellowship of Cong'l church holds annual Silver Tea and Silent Bazaar.

### DECEMBER 6th:

Sixty members of the Parents Club attended the special meeting last Thursday to hear school board members discuss plans for \$1,175,000 bond issue. Bill Barber, Captain with North Central Airlines, goes to Paris to represent U. S. Aeronautics Association at meetings of Aeronautics International. ## TB Tests Slated To Start Jan. 29

Again this year as in December 1960, all Livingston County residents age 30 and over will be given the opportunity of having a free chest X-ray. A mobile unit will be in the county from February 6 to March 2.

Dr. Morris Clesky, medical adviser of the program, says, "TB strikes anyone, anywhere, and older men frequently are unwittingly carriers of the TB bacillus."

So that Livingston County families may guard against such an occurrence, the Livingston County Health Department is joined by the Livingston County Medical Society, the Home Extension Clubs, the Michigan Department of Health, and the Michigan Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease Association in urging adult residents age 30 and over to take advantage of this opportunity for an X-ray.

Because the survey is limited to those age 30 and over, there will be a tuberculin testing clinic for the benefit of all persons between the ages of 18-29 inclusive at the following locations:

Fowlerville - Library: Jan. 29, 2 - 5 p.m.; Jan. 30, 7 - 9 p.m.  
Brighton - Fire Hall: Feb. 5, 2 - 5 p.m.; Feb. 6, 7 - 9 p.m.  
Howell - Court House Annex: Feb. 12, 2 - 5 p.m.; Feb. 13, 7 - 9 p.m.

Any positive reactors will be x-rayed at the mobile unit. All people receiving the test must return on the following Thursday to have the test read.

## Dr. Hollis Sigler Loses Life in Home Fire

Dr. Hollis Sigler, 63, a prominent Livingston County physician lost his life in a fire that destroyed the interior of his home at 809 N. Michigan Ave., Howell, during the early morning hours last Saturday. He lived alone.

The body of the doctor was found by firemen in the upper hallway of the house; he had apparently suffocated.

The blaze was first discovered by a neighbor who was awakened at 4 a.m. by the barking of her dog. She saw the flames at the Sigler home and called the Howell fire department who found the body about a half hour later.

Damage to the home was estimated to be \$25,000. Firemen believe a burning cigaret may have started the fire.

Dr. Sigler was born November 15, 1898, in Pinckney, the son of Dr. Claude L. and Mildred Sykes Sigler. He was a Howell resident for the past 38 years.

He was graduated from Pinckney High school in 1916 and the University of Michigan Medical school in 1924. His father, grandfather and great grandfather all were physicians and practiced in Pinckney. Many children now attending school here were brought into the world by "Dr. Hollis" as were hundreds of children in Livingston county.

## County Road Commission Reports

Snow and ice storms in the first two and one-half weeks of January have proved to be expensive for the Livingston County Road Commission.

In tabulating costs of snow and ice removal for the past two weeks, Livingston County Road Commission has found that salting, sanding and plowing operations consumed nearly 3% of the Commission's total yearly income.

Over 266 manhours of work were expended by Road Commission crews to keep the county's 1100 miles of highways in a passable and safe condition.

Records show that over 350 tons of salt, 1004 yards of sand and 120,000 pounds of chloride were spread upon the county highway system in the last few weeks.

Added to this, but not readily available in terms of dollars and cents, is the wear and tear on the county equipment.

It was announced by the Board of Trustees of the McPherson Health Center that the physical therapy service at the hospital has been expanded to a full time program.

Russell Addison, the registered physical therapist who had been covering the program on a part-time basis and who helped organize the program in physical therapy, is now devoting his full time to his own office and the Ingham County Hospital at Okemos.

Warren Crouch, a registered physical therapist, has assumed the full time duties as a physical therapist. Prior to coming to the Health Center he was a Physical therapist trainee for the University of Michigan. He previously spent a period of time in research work at Ohio State University and had been chief therapist at Ashtabula

General Hospital in Ashtabula, O. The program will continue to be under the direction of Dr. Lester Wolcott who is on the consulting staff of the hospital.

Crouch and Mrs. Addie Mitchell, R.N. will visit the Ingham County Rehabilitation Hospital on Thursday afternoons to work with Mr. Addison. In turn, Addison and his staff will provide relief for this hospital for vocations and illness when the occasion arises.

James Sullivan, hospital administrator, paid special tribute to Addison for his help in developing the physical therapy program.

# McPherson Bank Directors Meet January 16; Name Evelyn Montgomery Assistant Cashier

Mrs. Evelyn I. Montgomery was elected an Assistant Cashier of the McPherson State Bank at a meeting of the Board of Directors which was held Tuesday, January 16, immediately following the annual stockholders meeting.

The stockholders of the bank re-elected the eight directors presently serving. They are: Robert H. McPherson, Robert T. McPherson, Alexander M. McPherson, William McPherson III, William McPherson IV, and Edward G. McPherson, all of Howell, Thomas B. Mann of Chicago and W. McPherson Smith, Jr. of Detroit.

Mrs. Montgomery graduated from High School in River Rouge, Michigan and had several years of experience in banking there and in California before joining the McPherson State Bank in 1953. She has since been an integral part of the bank's staff with the exception of a period from 1958 to 1960 when she resided in Canton, Ohio. Mrs. Montgomery resides with her husband Lawrence K. Montgomery, Jr., at 9109 Malby Road, Brighton, Michigan. The Montgomerys have one child. Mrs. Montgomery has had experience in every department of the bank and is presently supervisor of teller personnel.

William McPherson III, President, reported to the stockholders that 1961 had been a successful year for the bank in all areas of operation and that new customers were continually being attracted by the bank's modern quarters both in Howell and at the Pinckney Office where extensive remodeling was done in 1961. 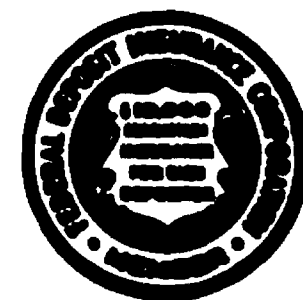
