## McPherson Health Center Embarks on Building Project

Mrs. Lynn Zimmerman, the Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the McPherson Community Health Center, has announced that the hospital has received approval from the U. S. Department of Public Health to proceed with the hospital building project.

The architect, Clark Ackley, has been instructed to notify the successful bidders who are the Wallace Construction Co. of Farmington for general construction in the amount of \$162,726., Dard, Inc. for the mechanical contract in the amount of \$106,310. and Lansing Electric Motors for the electrical contract in the amount of \$35,579. The total building project cost, including contingency, architect fees, equipment and miscellaneous costs will amount to \$378,115.

There will be a meeting of the contractors, the architect and hospital representatives on Tuesday, August 14th. Ground breaking is expected to occur shortly after that.

At the completion of this building project the total number of beds will be 12. The addition will provide a ten bed intensive care unit, and 26 beds will be allocated for long term rehabilitation patients. This unit will be known as the continuing care unit. There will be four addi-

tional beds added to the surgical wing. In addition to patient rooms, the now unfinished west wing of the ground floor will be finished to provide for a physical therapy department and a hospital auxiliary work room. The extension of the north wing of the hospital will provide an enlarged Laundry and Maintenance Shop.

Under consideration at the present time is an additional 20 bed selective care building. It is proposed that this selective care building be connected to the present structure at the ground floor of the west wing. The Board of Trustees are continuing to study this and to provide criteria for the utilization of this type patient service.

Upon the conclusion of the construction, the hospital will then have facilities enabling it to render all five phases of progressive patient care which will be intensive, intermediate, continuing care, selective care and home care.

Part of the Kellogg Foundation grant which was recently given to the hospital will be used to study the progressive patient care program by the Bureau of Hospital Administration of the University of Michigan.

The anticipated completion of the project will be May or June of 1963.

## Putnam Township Voting Light; GOP Candidates Favored by Residents

Voting was light in Putnam township and throughout Livingston County in the General Primary Election last Tuesday.

Only 320, or about one-fourth of Putnam's registered voters went to the polls. Republican candidates were the favorites here, as in the entire county, with Clarence Blackburn, incumbent candidate for the Register of Deeds post, polling 249 votes to his two opponents combined 71 votes.

Favored here, also, were Romney, Younger, Sharpe, Gehring, Heeg, Greer, Munsell and Miller.

County-wide the heaviest votes were pulled by George Romney for governor; Reid for Lt. Governor; Bentley for Rep. in Congress at large; Chamberlain for Rep. in Congress, Sixth District; Younger for State Senator; Sharpe for Rep. in State Legislature; Charles B. Gatesman for

re-election to the office of Prosecuting Attorney, unopposed, received 3221; Gehring pulled 3060 votes for sheriff while the favorite Democrat candidate in the county office (sheriff) Norman Davis polled 569.

Joseph Ellis received the highest number of votes for County Clerk, 2024, to Herman Heeg's 1920; Dorothea Greer for County Treasurer, 3182 votes; Blackburn, for Reg. of Deeds, 2799; Munsell for Drain Commissioner 1328; Miller 2322 for Surveyor.

Five Democratic candidates in the county received enough write-in votes to put them on the November ballot. They are Nina Hauser seeking the county treasurer post; McMillan for county clerk; Munzel for drain commissioner; Wildes for Register of Deeds and Newcombe for Surveyor.

November 6 is Election Day.

## Monkeys Give Clues at WSU To Schizophrenia's Cause



DETROIT — Healthy monkeys can be made to behave in a psychotic manner by injecting into them an element from the blood of schizophrenic human beings.

This amazing fact causes a Wayne State University medical research team to believe that they are on the brink of a breakthrough into the study of many mental illnesses.

In one phase of successful tests that were directed by Dr. Charles E. Frohman, a protein factor from the blood of various humans suffering from all the classical types of schizophrenia was injected into normal squirrel monkeys such as that shown above on the right.

Within minutes those same monkeys developed peculiar behavioral symptoms which resembled the disease (above left).

The importance of this research can be seen in statistics which show that on any given day, one out of four hospital beds in the United States is occupied by a mental patient, and one out of two of these is a schizophrenic.

Dr. Frohman reports his team is now working eagerly towards more concrete evidence to show that schizophrenia may be caused by some protein factor present in the blood.

Technical improvements in methods of keeping records and cutting costs saved the state \$2.5 million in the fiscal year which ended June 30, according to State Controller Ira Polley.

Polley reported on request from Gov. John B. Swainson that eliminated efforts by staff members, and some elimination of personnel were accomplished during the year through a variety of uses of modern methods and employee ideas.

The major savings, he said, came through improved methods of purchasing gasoline and coal; records management; printing of

forms; filing system changes; and reproduction systems.

The Controller emphasized the savings did not result in any return of appropriated operating funds. Rather, they cut down costs to meet available funds.


