How Special Education Funds Will Be Applied

(A statement from the County Board of Education)

Pinckney is one of the 14 school districts in Livingston County which are capped children in the constituent school district of Livingston County was passed at the annual school elections on June 11, 1962. These monies were voted to provide funds to establish special education centers in the various school districts in the county as well as to provide professional services to the local school districts from the county board of education offices.

Interested groups have asked questions relative to the status of this program at the present time, and why are fully operational programs not now in effect. The following might shed some light on these matters.

Special education is of a type designed especially for the deaf, hard of hearing, blind, partially sighted, speech defect, homebound, mentally handicapped, crippled or otherwise physically handicapped, or children having behavior problems.

Possibly the most common of the above areas operating in the State today is in the field of the mentally handicapped. One such program is now in effect in the Fowlerville Elementary School where a class of approximately fifteen pupils meet daily with a teacher especially trained to administer to their needs.

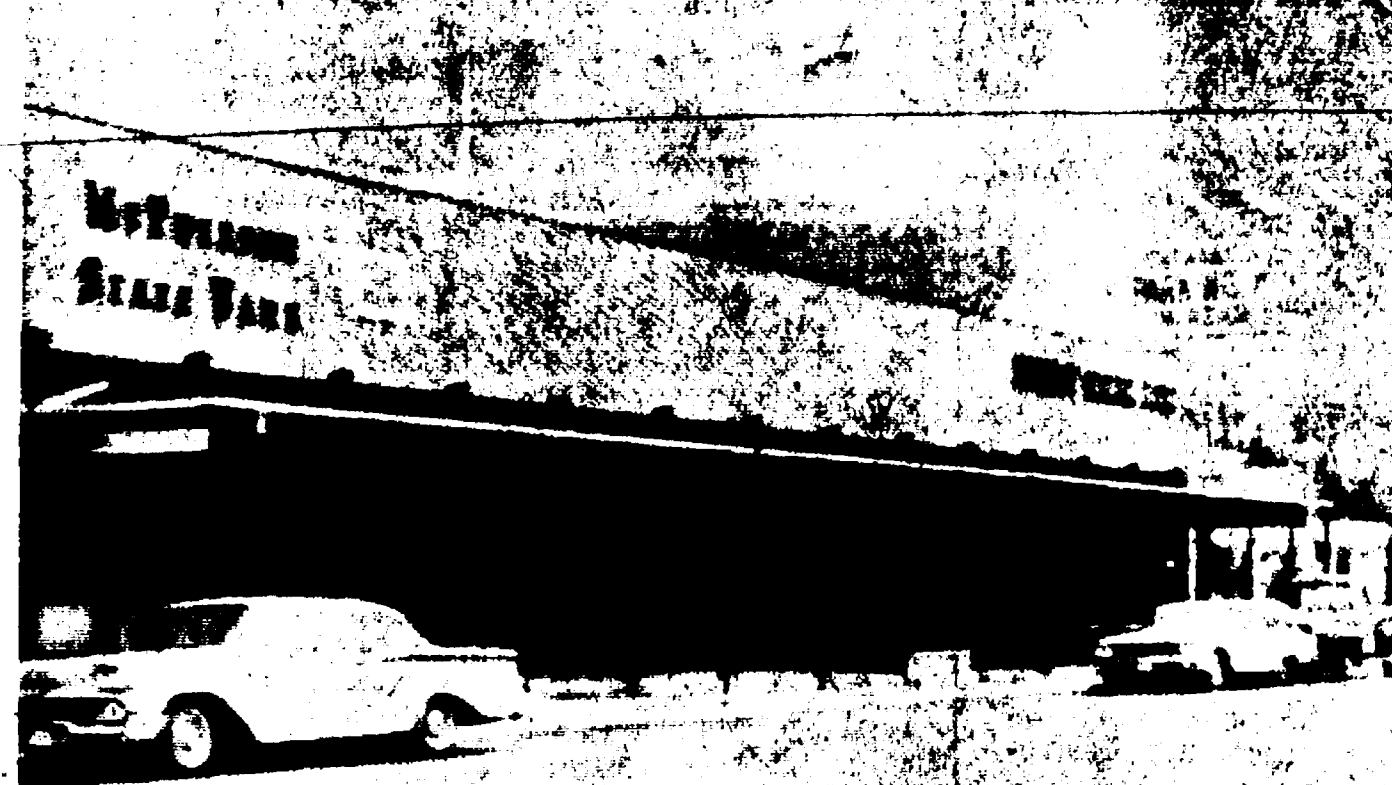
The County Office supplies a Type C Consultant to the Mentally Handicapped who is working with several children in each of the other schools in the county. A Psychological Diagnostician is also employed by the County School Office to test pupils referred to her to determine their eligibility in an educational program for the mentally handicapped.

The only other area of special education in the county at this time is in the Brighton School District where a speech therapist is working with over one hundred children with varying

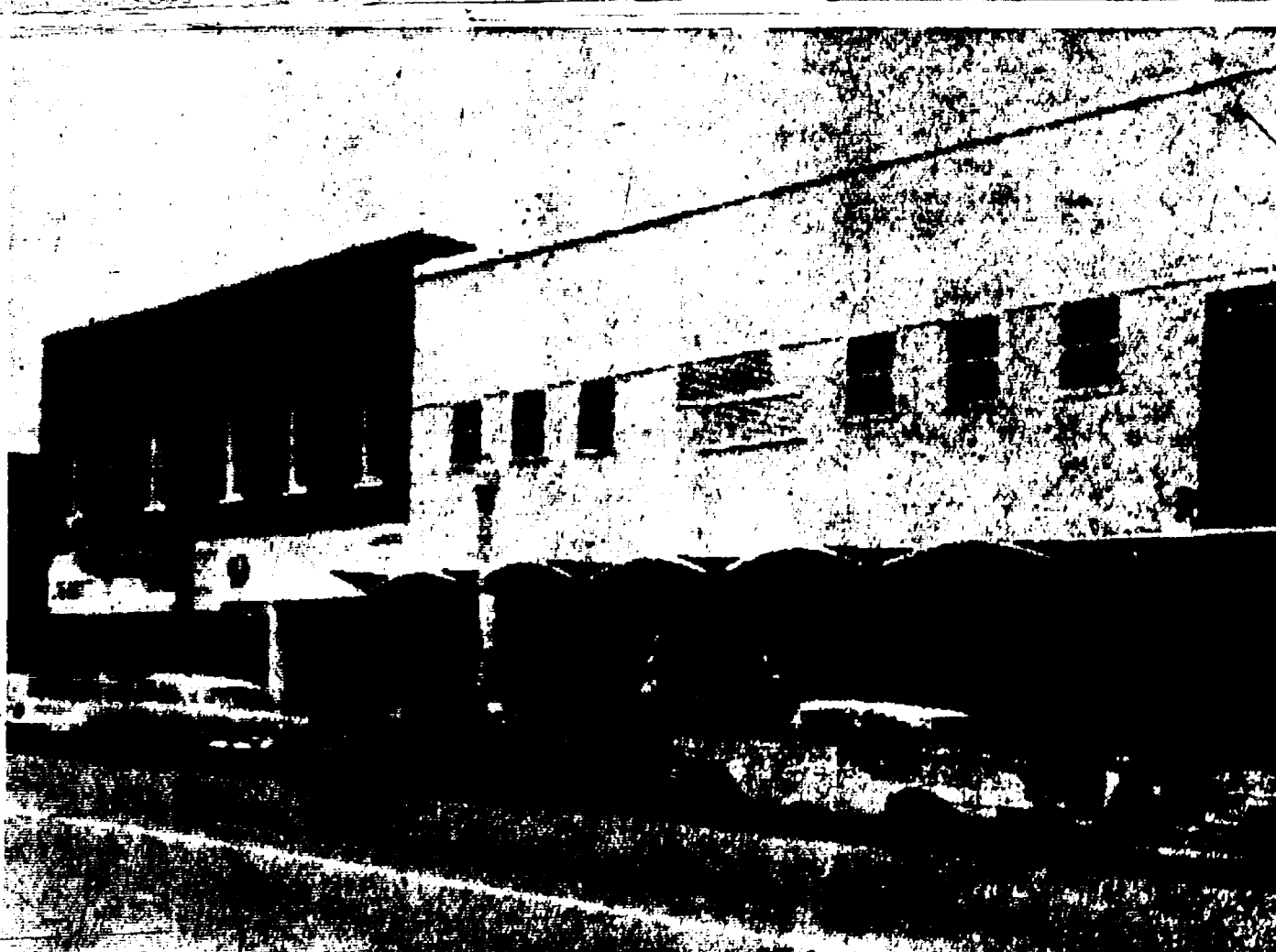
School Board Votes to Replace Wornout Truck

Supervisors Will Get Report Friday

A slash of 1/4 of a million dollars in Brighton Township equalization was revealed yesterday by the Michigan State Tax Commission in a report to the County.

Brighton Township Supervisor Joseph Ellis announced that his township's valuation had been cut.

The report will be considered Friday morning when the Board of Supervisors meets at 10:30 in the Court House at Howell.

Brighton Township appealed its equalized valuation of \$15,287,624. This has been reduced by the state to \$14,617,119. Ellis' original assessment had placed the valuation of the township at \$4,879,760.

This cut is spread over the

other townships and the cities of Brighton and Howell. Some townships were reduced in valuation, some raised, and both Brighton and Howell received an increased equalized valuation.

County Deputy Clerk Mrs. Louise Shady said the tax commission report on equalization was received Tuesday.

A hearing had been held one week ago Monday. No decision has yet been made by the state tax allocation problem.

Freeway Stretch Opens Northwest Of Brighton

BRIGHTON — Four miles of the I-96 freeway are now open between Woodland Lake and Lake Chemung.

The State Highway Department has announced that traffic will now be able to enter or leave the freeway at Lake Chemung, between Brighton and Howell, instead of at the freeway's interchange at old US-16 just northwest of Brighton.

The four-mile section is part of a \$2.2 million contract held by the L. A. Davidson Construction Co. of Lansing. The project includes an overpass at Dorr Rd.

Highway Funds Go To Pinckney, Brighton, Howell, and County

The State Highway Department has started distributing third quarter Motor Vehicle Highway Fund collections to Michigan counties and incorporated cities and villages.

Livingston County will receive \$130,250; Brighton — \$4,536; Howell — \$9,146; and Pinckney — \$1,869.

State Highway Commissioner John C. Mackle said not receipts of the Highway Fund during July, August and September — 1962, amounted to \$44,400,383, an increase of \$2,961,003 over the same period of 1961.

Gross collections during the third quarter amounted to \$46,267,158, from which collection costs of \$1,356,958 and the Waterways Commission's share amounting to \$219,853 were deducted.

All state gasoline and diesel fuel taxes, license plate fees, and a small amount of miscellaneous fees are deposited in the Motor Vehicle Highway Fund.

After deductions, the money is distributed under provisions of state law which provides that 47 per cent goes to the State Highway Department for use on state highways, 25 per cent to the state's 83 counties for use on county roads, and 15 per cent to all incorporated cities and villages for their roads and streets.

Under this formula, the Highway Department will have \$20,910,465 as its share of the first quarter collections while the counties will have \$15,571,823 and the incorporated cities and villages will have \$8,085,863.

State Publishes Election Laws

A new and revised edition of "Laws Relating To Elections" is now available for \$1.00. It was announced today by Secretary of State James M. Hare.

The last compilation was issued in 1958. The 1962 edition contains acts passed in 1962 which will not become effective until 1963, due to the fact that this year's Legislature has not yet adjourned.

"In these few instances the unamended sections of certain laws are still in effect," Hare said. "Where this happens, a notation is included in the text." "At General Election time in November many challengers and other interested citizens like to have at hand the latest compilation of our State laws relating to elections," Hare pointed out. The conference theme "The Extra Dimension in Curriculum Development" was carried out throughout the entire conference.

Your local high school Home Economics teacher, Mrs. Patricia Copeland, attended the conference Friday and Saturday.

Friday evening, Dr. David Gottlieb, Associate Professor, College of Education, Michigan State University, gave a most interesting talk entitled "Students - The Solid Out Generation."

I certainly wish all parents and those working with young people could have heard him. "The Solid Out Generation" referred to teenagers. During his talk stated that "the apple doesn't fall far from the tree," meaning the attitudes of family and school.

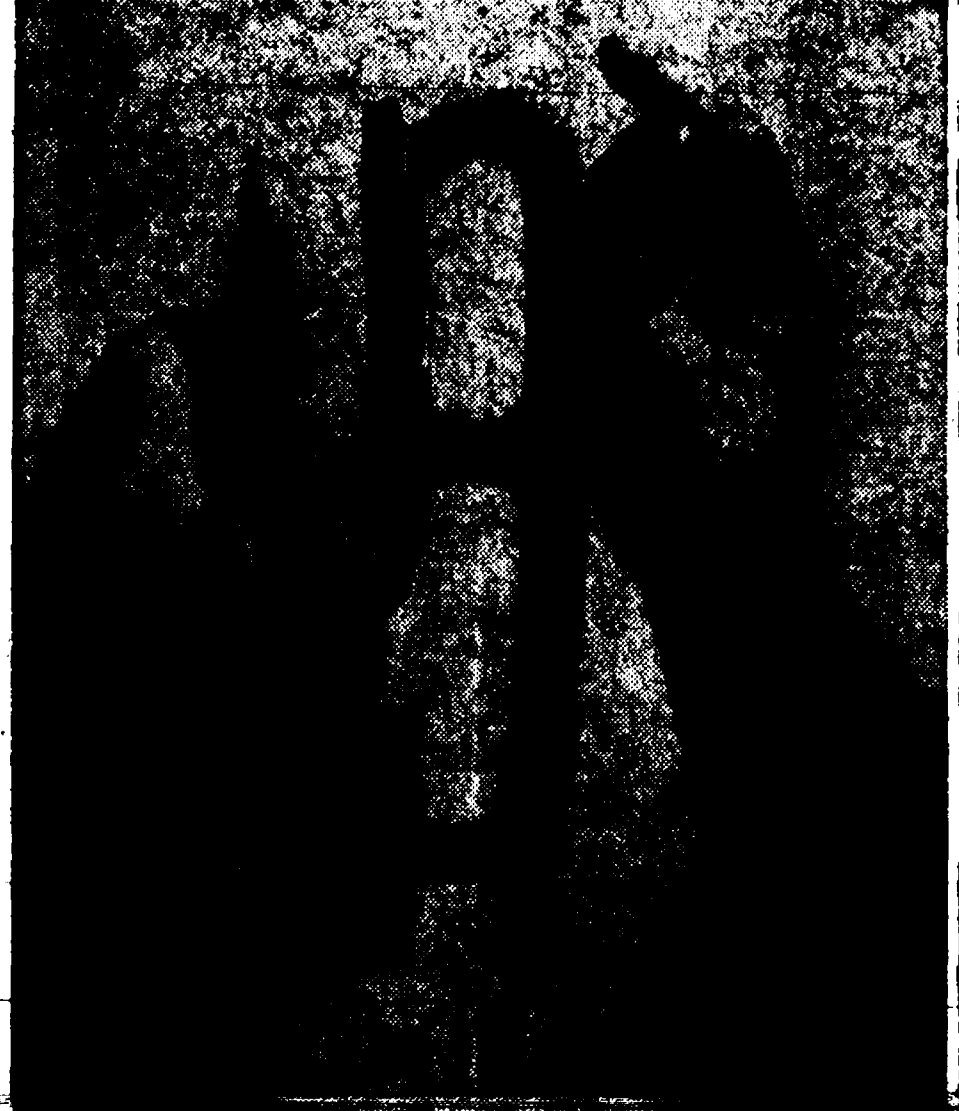

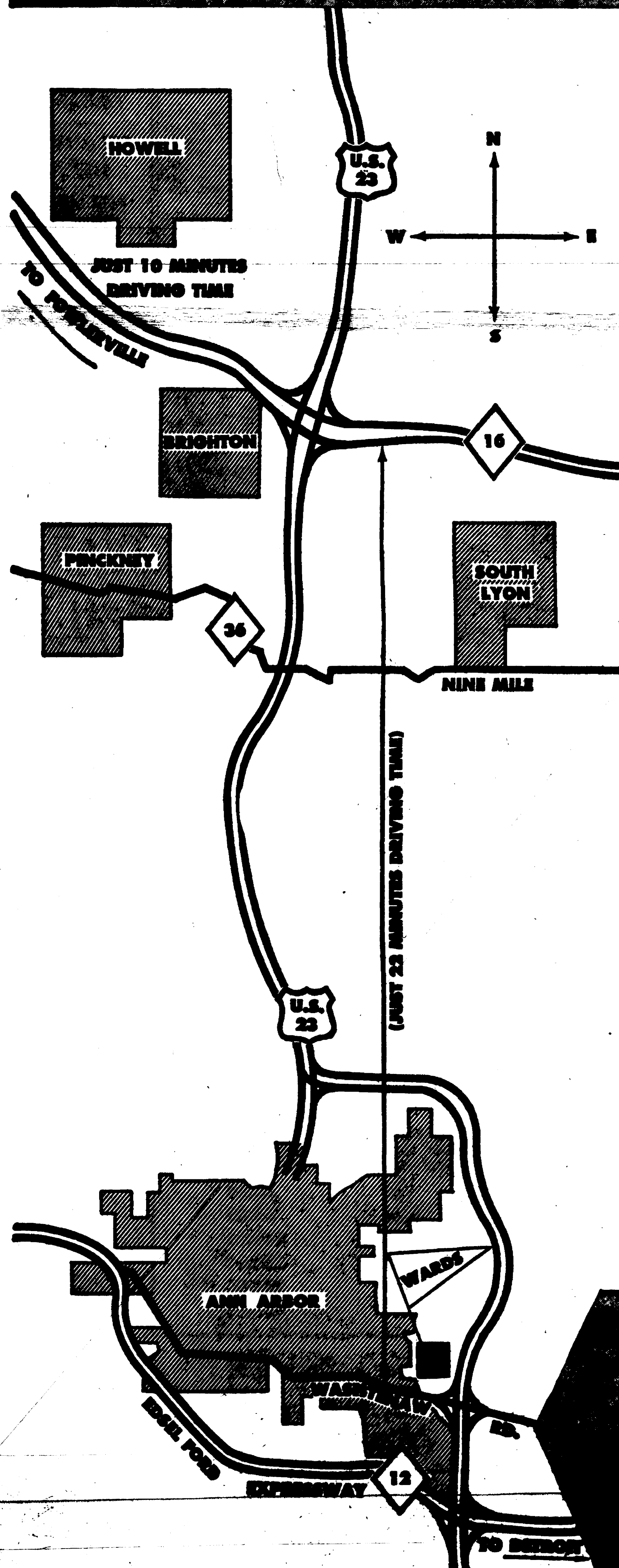

Gifted Child Learns In 'Mysterious' Way

The gifted child finds opportunities to learn even when his environment seems totally against him, says Warren A. Ketcham, Professor of education at The University of Michigan.
Ketcham says the gifted child's superior achievement is due primarily to his ability to make the maximum use of his opportunities to learn.
"Research shows these children have an insatiable hunger for knowledge, and an almost mysterious way of learning. They frequently learn before they are taught."
The "gifted" make up the brightest two per cent of children, Ketcham explains. "The achievement of these children is not adversely affected unless their entire environment — home, school and community — is seriously limited in opportunities in the home, but in an equal number of cases the home successfully compensates for what the school does not provide."
Parents and teachers sometimes are disturbed because some gifted children exhibit marked inconsistencies in their learning pattern. They shouldn't be, says Ketcham.
"At one time the gifted child is completely absorbed in the mastery of a single skill or a narrow field of knowledge to the exclusion of all others. The parents and teachers of this child wonder when he will do his 'required work' or whether he will 'miss something.'"

The 1963 Michigan State Fair will be held in Detroit Friday, August 23 through Labor Day, Monday, September 2.
This is announced by General Manager Walter A. Goodman who said earlier dates would continue now that a report has been issued on the 1963 State Fair.
"Last summer there may have been some fears about ending the State Fair on Labor Day week-end instead of opening it then but no longer are there any doubts as far as the Authority and staff are concerned," he said.
"Setting the dates so that Fair time didn't conflict with school time helped give us by far the most successful State Fair in history. There was universal public acceptance of the early dates."
The 1962 report, issued by C. J. Wassung, assistant manager and controller, shows an all-time record profit of \$121,176.02 and a record attendance of 1,902,481 persons.
The best previous figures were a profit of \$78,180.70 in 1955 and an attendance of 825,989 in 1960.
Practically every activity of the 1962 event set new records including the number of farm and livestock entries.

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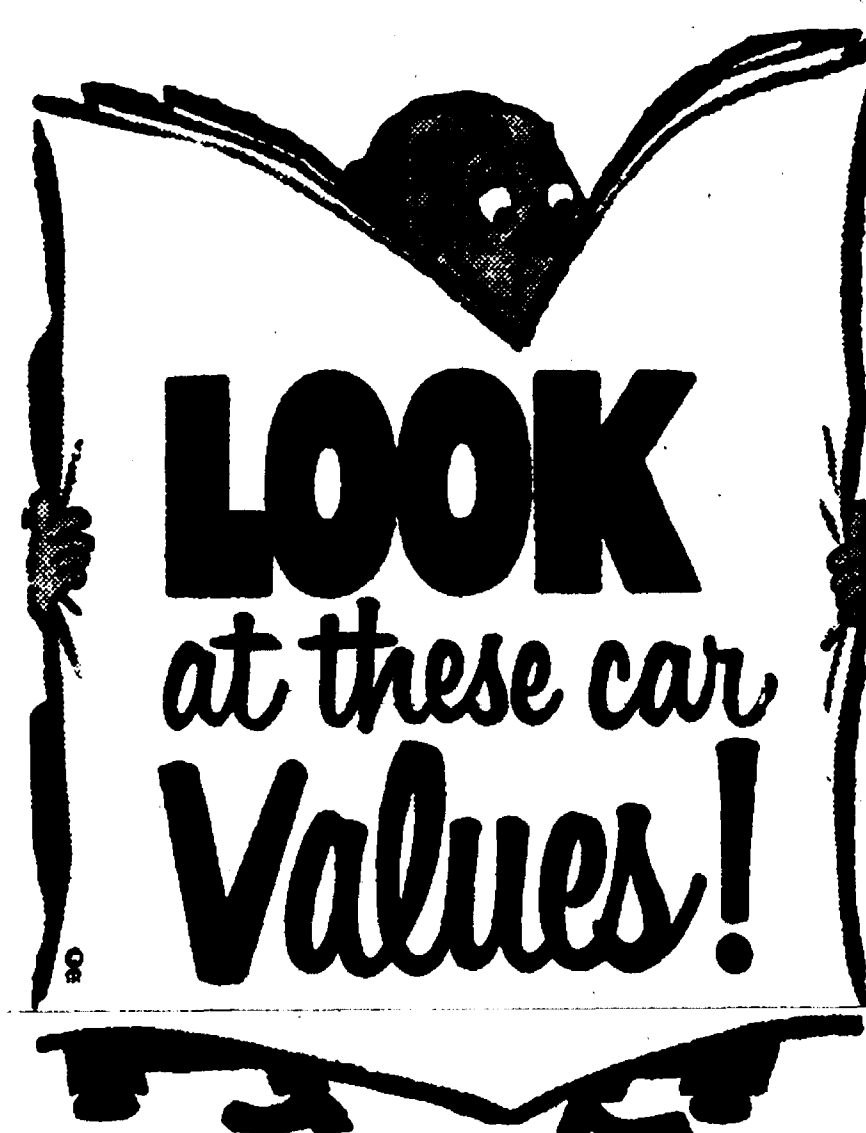
