Ketcham says the gifted opportunities to learn.

"Research shows these children have an insatiable hunger for knowledge, and an almost mysterious way of learning. They frequently learn before they are taught."

The "gifted" make up the brightest two per cent of children, Ketehant explains. The achievement of these

children is not adversely affected unless their entire environment - home, school and community — is seriously limited in opportunities in the home, but in an equal number of cases the home successfully compenstates for what the school does not provide."

Parents and teachers sometimes are disturbed because some gifted children exhibit mark e d inconsistencies in their learning pattern. They shouldn't be, says Ketcham. "At one time the gifted child

is completely absorbed in the mastery of a single skill or a narrow field of knowledge to the exclusion of all others. The parents and teachers of this child wonder when he will do his 'required work' or whether he will 'miss something.'

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
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
