
A complete dinner was served at the Masonic Hall, with birthday cake, ice cream, gifts, and all else it takes to make a party successful.

### A & P Promotes Frank Bucher

BRIGHTON — Frank W. Bucher, county resident, who has been president since 1958 of the Central Western Division of The Great Atlantic & Pacific Tea Company, with headquarters in Detroit, today was elevated to executive vice president of the parent company in New York.

The election of Bucher to one of three newly-created executive posts was announced simultaneously by the board of directors with the resignation of Ralph W. Burger as president and the election of John D. Ehrigott, former vice president, and treasurer, to succeed him. Burger will remain as chairman of the board and chief executive officer.

A successor to Bucher as president of the Central Western Division will be announced shortly.

Chosen for the other two executive vice president positions were Stephen W. Shea of New York, vice president in charge of merchandising, and Melvin

W. Abredege of Pittsburgh, president of the Central Division. Both were directors and vice presidents of the parent company, as was Bucher.

He started with the company in 1929 and, in keeping with A & P's practice, at the bottom of the ladder. His first assignment was unloading cases in the Detroit warehouse.

His educational background, pre-A & P business experience, acceptance of responsibility and qualities of leadership were soon recognized.

His promotion came quickly and within 14 months he was elevated to operating superintendent. He held this position in warehouses in Cincinnati, Indianapolis and Detroit.

Bucher became director of operations for the Central Western Division, embracing a six-state area, in 1941 and vice president of the Detroit Unit in charge of Eastern Michigan stores in 1952.

He is expected to move to New York in the very near future to assume his position, possibly before the selection of his successor as president of the Central Western Division.

### Brown-McLaren Is Solvent But Out of Business

HAMBURG — "Brown-McLaren Manufacturing Co. is a solvent firm," says its president, Morris Bond. "We discontinued our operations because the business wasn't making money."

Bond made this statement to assure the public that the Argus headline, which said "Hamburg Business Folds Up," didn't mean it had folded up financially.

The firm will discontinue its operation in Hamburg Friday, ending the employment of some 55 persons.

Machinery has been sold but the plant is still for sale.

Explaining the action, the Board of Directors in a proxy statement sent to shareholders said that Brown-McLaren lost substantial amounts of money during each of the past three years, and for several years prior to that, and during the first 11 months of the calendar year 1962.

Recent losses were listed as \$42,828 for 1959, \$11,571 for 1960, \$34,285 for 1961 and \$39,770 for 1962.

# Board Minutes

Regular meeting of the Putnam Township Board, Wednesday, January 16, 1963. All Board members present: Hendee, Stackable, Reynolds, Wylie, and Kennedy.

Meeting called to order by Supervisor Hendee. Minutes of the meeting of December 19, 1962, were read and approved.

Motion by Wylie, supported by Stackable to pay the following bills, as read. Motion carried.

Cecil Murphy, December care of dump, \$15.00; Ezra Plummer, December care of dump, \$15.00; Cecil Murphy, Labor at dump, Christmas and New Years, \$20.00; Ezra Plummer, labor at dump, Christmas and New Years, \$20.00; Alber Oil Co., fuel oil for town hall, \$46.25; Brighton Argus, December printing, \$11.88; Michigan Bell Telephone Co. five unit fire phones, phones in fire hall, town hall, \$46.60; The Detroit Edison Co., lights for town hall, \$47.04; Jack's Printing Service, election ballots, \$53.00; Double Day Bros. & Co., on account, \$13.36; Florence Preuss, January Librarian, \$50.00; Pinckney fire department, balance on fire runs for 1962, \$138.00.

The following resolutions were read and passed unanimously by the board:

Resolution by Putnam Township Board, Jan. 16, 1963.

Resolution providing for increase in planned total expenditure for capital improvement projects.

Whereas, under the terms of Public Law 87-658, approved September 14, 1962, the United States of America has authorized the making of grants to aid in financing construction of specific public works projects, provided the proposed or planned total expenditure of the public body for its capital improvement projects is increased by an amount approximately equal to the non-Federal funds required to complete such public works projects:

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved by the Township Board of Putnam Township:

1. That as of the date of filing of an application by Putnam Township, Livingston County, Michigan, (hereafter called Applicant) with the Housing and Home Finance Agency, United States Government, for a grant to aid in financing the construction of Township Hall the Applicant had a capital improvements plan or capital improvement budget for the fiscal year or years during which construction of the proposed project is expected to occur; and that the total expenditure for capital improvements in said plan or budget was \$-0- for the fiscal year ending 3/31/63 and \$-0- for the fiscal year ending 3/31/64.

2. That, in the event that said Federal grant is approved by the United States of America, said capital improvements plan or capital budget will be increased by \$53,000.00 for the fiscal year ending 3-31-64 for a total increase of \$53,000.00 in the proposed or planned total expenditure for capital improvement projects (exclusive of Federal funds).

3. That said increase in the proposed or planned total expenditure for capital improvement projects is approximately equal to the non-Federal funds required to complete the public works project for which the application is to be submitted.

This resolution is adopted pursuant to the authority provided by Public Act 381 of State of Michigan, as amended.

Resolution authorizing filing of application with the Housing and Home Finance Agency, United States of America, for a grant under the terms of Public Law 345, 84th Congress, as amended by the Public Works Acceleration Act.

Whereas, under the terms of said Public Law 345, as amended, the United States of America has authorized the making of grants to Public bodies to aid in financing the construction of specific public projects:

Now Therefore, Be It Resolved by the Putnam Township Board:

1. That Lloyd Hendee, Township Supervisor be and he is hereby authorized to execute and file an application on behalf of Putnam Township, Livingston County, Michigan, with

the Housing and Home Finance Agency, United States Government, for a grant to aid in financing the construction of a new Township Hall.

2. That James Lee Lavey, Project Coordinator be and he is hereby authorized and directed to furnish such information as the Housing and Home Finance Agency may reasonably request in connection with the application which is herein authorized to be filed.

Whereas Putnam Township intends to have a new building erected to serve as a Town Hall and to house the offices of Putnam Township and the Village of Pinckney, the Public Library, the Township Fire Department and public meeting rooms, storage space and attendant facilities:

Now Therefore Be It Resolved By the Putnam Township Board to proceed as necessary and as required by law:

To apply to the Housing and Home Finance Agency, United States Government for a grant to pay approximately one half the total cost of the proposed Town Hall and the issue general obligation bonds if approved by the electors, to pay the balance of the cost.

To name James Lee Lavey as an employee of the Township of Putnam at a salary of one dollar (\$1.00) per year to act as Project Coordinator for the Township Board for said Town Hall.

To enter into an Agreement with Ralph Hammett Associates in Architecture, Inc., as Architect for the proposed Town Hall.

To retain the firm of Miller, Canfield, Paddock and Stone, Attorneys as legal counsel for the bonding proposed and as further may be required to administer all the requirements of this resolution.

The next regular meeting of Putnam Township Board will be held Wednesday, February 6, 1963 at 8:00 p.m.

Motion by Kennedy, supported by Wylie to adjourn. Motion carried.

# Progressive Patient Care To Become Daily Phrase

This is the first of a series of articles explaining the Progressive Patient Care program as it will be developed at McPherson Community Health Center.

Progressive Patient Care is a phrase which will become familiar to the ear in Livingston County in the coming months. Progressive Patient Care (or PPC) is tied up very closely with the new building program going on now at McPherson Community Health Center.

The first purpose of the new building, of course, is to provide needed hospital beds for the area; another purpose

is to provide facilities to put Progressive Patient Care into effect.

What is Progressive Patient Care? PPC is a plan for organizing the services of a hospital so that the patient can be assigned to the part of the hospital where he will receive the best care according to his nursing and medical needs.

It is believed, if patients can be grouped according to their nursing and medical needs, nurses will be able to do their best work, and physicians will be able to order specific care for their patients much easier.

This plan has been widely recommended by the United States Public Health Service. Many hospitals have put part of the plan into effect, and a few have adopted most of it; but the McPherson Community Health Center will be one of the first, if not the first, to put the full program of PPC into operation.

Progressive Patient Care at McPherson Community Health Center will make it possible for the physician to assign his patient to any of six different areas of care. These areas are exclusive of the maternity and pediatric (children's) divisions which will continue to operate much as in the past.

The six units under PPC will be Intensive Care, Intermediate Care, Continuing Care, Self Care, Home Care, and Out-

patient Care.

Intensive Care is quite familiar to many former Health Center patients and their families and friends, because an Intensive Care Unit has been operating there since March, 1960. In this ICU, a trained staff has taken over the functions one would expect from private duty nurses and added the benefits of a well-organized life-saving team ready for most health emergencies.

The Intermediate Care Unit is thought of as being for patients who are not critically ill, and who should respond well to regular hospital nursing.

The Continuing Care Unit will take care of the patient who needs to be hospitalized for a longer-than-average time. Most of these people, it is hoped, will show improvement through good medical attention, skilled nursing, and physical or occupational therapy.

The Self Care Unit will probably be the most-talked-about innovation in the Progressive Patient Care program. This unit will be housed in a separate-but-connected one-story building to be built this spring just west of the present structure. This will be designed and furnished much like a first-class motel or hotel.

Convalescent patients nearly ready to be discharged and persons in the hospital for more than a day of diagnostic tests will be most likely to be found here. They will be up and about, able to go to the cafeteria, able to take care of their bodily needs.

No less noteworthy is the Home Care Unit which last October began to supply a service new to this county. Mrs. Diane Webb, trained as a Public Health Nurse, is co-ordinator of a program which furnishes visiting nurses, and physical and occupational therapy to patients at home—as ordered by their physicians.

The hospital already is operating an Outpatient Unit to care for patients the physicians send there for laboratory tests, x-rays, and therapy treatments. These patients come at appointed times for service or treatment and then return home, much as they would on a visit to their doctor's office.

It is hoped the new additions to the hospital will be finished and all six units of PPC will be functioning by the summer of 1963. At that time, the present 75-bed structure (now regularly outfitted with 88 beds) will be enlarged to 141 beds, with units of care divided in respect to the total number of beds as follows:

Obstetrical, 15 beds; Pediatrics, 11; Self Care, 20; Intensive Care, 10; Continuing Care, 28; Intermediate Care, 59; total—141 beds.

The number of beds in the completed building will be well within the total recommended by the Bureau of Hospital Administration of The University of Michigan in a survey made of hospital bed needs of Livingston County in 1960. The Bureau recommended 152 beds for the kinds of cases the Health Center cares for, plus 38 nursing home beds.

Russell Hill, Executive Secretary of the State Soil Conservation Committee, was present at the meeting, and stated that an amendment to the Michigan Soil Conservation Districts Law would soon be submitted to the Legislature which would provide a method and authorization for consolidation of two or more districts.

Cecil Benjamin was elected as a new director in the Northwest District. Frank Herbert was re-elected a director. Maurice Kingsley declined nomination for re-election because of his pressing duties as president of the Livingston County Farm Bureau.

Other nominations submitted by a nominating committee were James McGuire, Howard Dorrance, Glendon Hoisington and Willis Duncan. There were no nominations from the floor. Robert McPherson of Howell showed colored slides taken last summer on a trip in California and along the Trans-Canada Highway.

The Fenton District Board of Directors met on January 22 and made plans for the annual meeting to be held in March. They approved a district agreement with James M. Pattison covering an additional piece of land purchased recently. The plans of Arthur Malone and Dallas Malone were reviewed by the directors.

It is reported that Milton Dyer, a cooperator in the Northwest District, is making use of elm in his woods which is threatened by the Dutch elm disease. Lumber sawed out of elm logs is made into pallets for industrial use.

Steve Shetron, Soil Scientist at the Howell SCS Office, completed last fall a preliminary soil map of the City of Howell.

Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman recently said "At present, some 62 million acres of privately-owned land are being used for recreation. Estimates are that by 1980 we will need 85 million acres for this purpose."

## State Had Only 19 Cases of Paralytic Polio in 1962

Michigan physicians today were urged by the State Health Commissioner to continue full use of Salk polio vaccine and to reserve oral vaccine for possible use in epidemic situations.

"The facts are," said Dr. Heustis, "that we only had 19 cases of paralytic polio in Michigan last year. This compares with 56 cases in 1960 and almost 2000 cases ten years ago."

This reduction was accomplished by means of a vaccine whose effectiveness and safety cannot be questioned. Thus we continue to urge the use of this proven vaccine both in community immunization programs and for individual immunizations in doctors' offices."

Today's statement came as

a result of the report of a special advisory committee to the Surgeon General which on December 19 recommended once again using all three types of oral vaccine for community planning immunization programs, with special emphasis on children and young adults under thirty.

After carefully reviewing the report and the recommendations of the committee, Dr. Heustis said, "the facts have not changed at all, since the Surgeon General first banned use of Type III oral vaccine."

"Furthermore, Michigan's experience has been that the risk of oral vaccine is at least ten times that reported nationwide. Since there is no emergency we cannot logically change our position and recommend the routine use of oral vaccine in Michigan."

The Commissioner continued his recommendation that oral vaccine be used only in the event of an epidemic or threatened epidemic of a specific type of polio.

## Highway Dept. Sets Policy For Employees

A policy for State Highway Department employees who stop to assist a motorist who appears to be having trouble should:

—Push distressed vehicle far enough off the road to eliminate a traffic hazard.

—If qualified, offer first aid if it is needed. About 3,000 Highway Department employees have completed a 10-hour first aid course.

—Call State Police from the scene for assistance if driving a radio-equipped vehicle. About 550 Highway Department vehicles will have two-way radios by the end of the year.

If a motorist or his passengers are in danger of suffering from the elements, they should be driven to the nearest community.

Under no circumstances should victims of a traffic accident be moved, the policy states.

The policy forbids employees to make mechanical repairs or tow or push a vehicle any distance. They are prohibited from calling a wrecker service — they should contact police only — and may not accept cash or gifts from persons they assist.

## What Makes Capitol Tick

The 1963 session of the Michigan Legislature convened Wednesday, Jan. 9th, 1963. The organization of the Senate was normal and uneventful, however the House ran into an unusual situation when one of its members elected namely Leonard Walton from Wayne County having been accused of violating certain election laws, and is bound over for trial in Wayne County Recorders Court sometime next month, was asked by a majority of its members to step aside from being sworn in only until an investigating committee could conduct a hearing in Detroit to determine the validity of the charges and make recommendation to the House whether or not to declare the seat vacant.

The legislature has the sole right to determine the qualifications of its members. Thursday, January 10th, 1963 Governor George Romney delivered to the joint session his State of the State message, and was wholeheartedly accepted by all of the legislators that I talked to as one of the most realistic messages they ever heard. I am expecting one of the most fruitful sessions of this state has seen in many years.

After the Governor's message the legislature adjourned until Monday, Jan. 21st. The reason for the week's adjournment was to grant time for our new speaker of the House, Allison Green from Tuscola County to make the necessary committee appointments, also the special committee to investigate the Walton case began their hearings, Tuesday, Jan. 15th. There were two recounts to be conducted in the Upper Peninsula one for a Senate seat in the Houghton district and the other

for a House seat in the Menominee district.

Yours Truly was selected to serve on the House Committee which was chaired by Rep. Russell Strange from Clair, Mich. We left Lansing, Monday, Jan. 14th for Iron Mountain, we were welcomed with 28' below zero. We started our work Tuesday and finished Friday noon.

We counted over 18,000 ballots and the original count was changed by only three votes with Clifford Parris carrying a 92 vote margin over James K. Constantine.

This was my first assignment and I considered it a privilege to have this opportunity. There was no change in the Senate recount.

We expect to have a report from the special committee that held the Walton hearings early in the week of January 21st.

I was also privileged to join a joint legislative committee on Economic Growth chairedman by Rep. Gilbert E. Bursley from Ann Arbor on December 17th - 18th - 19th. The importance of Research as a contributing factor to new product development and income growth was repeatedly emphasized. We started December 17th touring laboratories and facilities at the University of Michigan, Tuesday and Wednesday we visited the Detroit area industries with some time allotted to Wayne State University.

This was a very informative tour. It was amazing to see the vast amount of research that is being conducted by private enterprise and is being made available to our Universities at no cost to the taxpayer.

I will attempt to continue this report with the desire to keep you informed as to some of the activity of your State Representative.

The history of the Gregory Baptist Church dates back to the year 1837, when thirteen people met to organize this church, then located two miles Southwest of Gregory.

For a time the meetings were held in homes or at an old log schoolhouse. In the year 1852 the church office was built.

The Sunday school was organized in 1879 when the rail-

road was built, and the town of Gregory was built, it soon became necessary to move the church or build a new one, into the village. One year later 1887 a new church was dedicated.

The year of 1908 saw tragic damage to the church caused by fire, through great effort on the part of many people the church was saved from complete destruction.

When the year of 1916 rolled around members of the church voted to join the Jackson Association and has continued this fellowship through the years.

Five years later, in 1921 repairs were made to the church and a large room was built onto the North end, and this is now the new chancel area.

The bell that tolls out each Sunday morning was hung in the year 1948 in memory of the son lost in World War II by Mr. and Mrs. Leslie Gillmore of Gregory.

Thirteen years ago 1950 remodeling began in the church basement, in 1955 work was completed on the annex, consisting of class rooms, wash rooms and pastors study.

Early in 1962 the \$28,000 remodeling of the church began building the new church inside the original frame.

In tones of yellow, warm brown, white and wood the newly remodeled church was dedicated to his glory Sunday, Jan. 20 when over 250 members, from near and far attended the days event.

Guest speakers were the Reverend Dressell of Finley, Ohio, formerly a pastor here and Reverend Truman Cochran, Hillsdale, also a former pastor.

### Social Security

A new concept in social security was described today as "partial retirement payments" by W. Scott Hamlin, Social Security Administration district manager at Lansing. Mr. Hamlin stated that many people in the district are getting some retirement benefits even though they are working and earning more than \$1200 per year. He also estimated that many more persons in the district could be receiving from one to eleven months' benefits per year by filing an application.

Mr. Hamlin went on to explain that earnings of \$1200 per year is no longer an absolute level beyond which all social security benefits are cut off.

He urged that all workers past retirement age check with the social security office for an individual analysis of their status.



## Portage Trails Scout Executive Takes New Post

Joe A. Juncker, Scout Executive of the Portage Trails Council, B.S.A., has accepted the position of Scout Executive at Elizabeth, New Jersey, according to Jack R. Doidge, Council President.

The Portage Trails Council (formerly the Washtenaw-Livingston Council) has had Juncker as its Scout Executive since June of 1947.

During these 15½ years the Council attained impressive achievements.

In 1947 the staff consisted of the Scout Executive, one office secretary and a Camp Ranger. As of the end of 1962, there was established a five man professional staff, four office personnel and two Camp Rangers.

The Council has grown from 645 Scouters to over 1800 and from 1865 boy members to 5000.

The annual budget has increased from \$13,000 to an approved budget of \$79,000 in 1963. In 1947 the Council owned only a 24-acre camp on the Huron River (Camp Newkirk). It now counts two additional camps, one an overnight site of 40 acres eight miles east of Milan (Jones Weber Camp), and the other a 100-acre camp with 600 feet of Lake frontage. Bruin Lake Scout Reservation has seven troop camping sites and improvements amounting to approximately \$100,000.


