Dry chlorine, from the chemical family of chlorinated cyanurics, is increasing in popularity because it is the simplest and safest to handle.

Available in pre-measured packets of graunles or in "pool tablets" the dry chlorine swimming pool compounds dissolve and dissipate in a matter of seconds to protect the water from bacteria, and to drastically reduce scale build-up on pool walls and piping. They are also easier and safer to store than large quantities of liquid chlorine.

Mother has also learned to maintain a pH between 7.2 and 7.6. the ideal acid-alkali balance; never to let pool water temperature remain above 80 degrees F for extended periods of time without adding two to three times the normal dose of dry chlorine every 10 to 14 days, to skim leaves, vegetation on a regular basis, and to store dry chlorine compound in a closed package in a dry area away from heat.
