Dr. Harry Davis Becomes President

BRIGHTON — Charles A. Powers, president of the Brighton Area Schools board, resigned Monday because of poor health.

His resignation came as a surprise to his fellow members who heard his letter of resignation read Monday night at the school board meeting.

Dr. Harry Davis was elected to replace Powers and Thomas H. Leith was chosen vice-president. Dr. Davis will serve until July 1 when the new board members take office.

Powers letter reads: "With reluctance I am forced to resign my elected post as a member of the Brighton Area School Board, effective immediately.

"Many of you know I have considered this some time ago. However, due to recent developments in my health, it is on the advice of my physician that I withdraw from all outside activities.

"Inasmuch as life is worth living, I am following his advice.

"It has been a pleasure for me to work with each of you. I am sorry I cannot continue, especially at this difficult period in our school's future.

"I am sure the board, with the sage guidance of Mr. Hawkins, can appoint a suitable replacement."

After hearing from a delegation of three men, James Sullivan, administrator of McPherson Community Health Center, Dr. Niles Clark, and Thomas Anderson, DVM, the board agreed to sponsor a program for practical nurse training.

The superintendent was instructed to make the final application for administration of the program to the federal government.

Board Discusses Hall Renovation

The Putnam Township Board will use oil on all gravel roads this year in preference to chloride as has been used the past two years.

Notice will appear within the next two weeks in the Dispatch just how this oil may be obtained.

Oiling will begin the first of June on a 50-50 basis, at the request of the resident.

Plans were discussed in regards to renovating the present Townhall - Library building. Treasurer Helen Reynolds questioned the Board members if action should not be taken immediately toward making repairs, adding more storage within the present building, and add badly needed toilet facilities.

Supervisor Stanley Dinkel, however, feels that citizens of the township will petition the Board to hold a special election for the re-voting of the Community building proposal, and any "renovating" should be withheld, pending action on the matter by the citizens.

Clarence Pietilla, of Patterson Lake area, has asked the Board's approval for permission to open a house trailer court within a mile of the Village limits.

The Board asked that he come to the next regular meeting, May 15, at which time they will give Pietilla an answer.

They wished to have more time to investigate the matter as to what effect a trailer court might have in the Village, as well as in the township.

This Board meeting, April 17, was the first since the April 1 election, at which time Supervisor Dinkel was elected to office.

GEORGE P. SCHUDLICH a New Baltimore realtor, always used to say, "Publicity is a two-edged sword," which he would interpret to mean: one cannot foretell those it will help and those it will harm.

All one can do is to present the facts and the truth. From there, each person makes his own decisions and judgments.

In the United States we operate on the theory, that reason will prevail if information is made available. Don't underestimate the power of a woman and don't underestimate the power and intellect of the public.

It should therefore not be a matter of request of citizens of this, or any other community; don't ask news reporters to omit certain items from their stories. To do so, usually indicates that the news was more important than it appeared at first.

Many times, news suppressed at home appears full blown in a neighboring publication, and then local residents ask their hometown paper: "Where were you?"

ONE NIGHT LAST WEEK about 6:15 Justice Kenneth Weber was sitting in his office near the Brighton State Police Post while Bill Teasley, local car dealer, was gazing out the front window on to Grand River Ave.

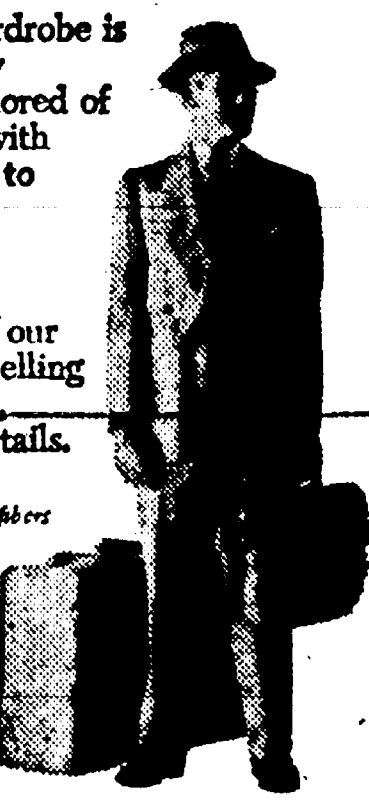

Kent Lake Launching Ramps Open

Boaters Warned of Low Water

Two boat launching ramps at Kensington Metropolitan Park southeast of Brighton are now open for the 1963 season. There is no charge for boat launching, permitted daily from sunrise to sunset at the 1,300-acre Kent Lake where both ramps are located at different ends of the popular boating and fishing sites.

Entrance is from the park's two entrances along the I-96 (Grand River) Freeway with the East Launching site having space for 60 cars and trailers plus additional parking space for cars and providing six simultaneous launchings. The West Launching site has space for 125 cars and trailers and permits from 6 to 8 launchings at one time with a 120-foot ramp. Speed limit is 10 miles per hour on Kent Lake.

Charles Damm, assistant superintendent pointed out that at the present time the water surface is 1 1/2 feet below the usual late spring level and advises all boaters to proceed with caution in the more shallow areas of Kent Lake.

Boaters are required to obtain a boat launching permit, issued without charge and good for the 1963 season, prior to launching their craft. These may be obtained at the launching sites on week-ends and at the park office on week days. Trailers, cars and boats are

not permitted to remain in Kensington Park overnight except for boats in slip rental spaces.

On Saturday, starting at 8 a.m., persons may sign up for the 96 slip rental spaces available for small craft and sail boats, with charges from \$10 to \$15 per season depending upon size of slip. No reservations will be taken, persons must appear in person at the Boat Rental Building and will be served on a first-come, first-served basis.

17 Home Games

DETROIT — The longest home stand of the season confronts the ambitious Tigers when they return to Tiger Stadium today (Wednesday) to present 11 players who are new to many of their fans.

Before hitting the road again, the Tigers will play 17 games on the home diamond—meeting seven of their American League rivals in a string which could go a long way toward determining the Tigers' pennant chances.

The Los Angeles Angels, exciting upstarts of the 1962 season, will open the Tigers' home stand with afternoon games Wednesday and Thursday.

The first night game of the season will follow on Friday

with the Minnesota Twins helping inaugurate the floodlight schedule and remaining on the scene for afternoon games Saturday and Sunday, April 27-28. The highlight of the 17-game period, however, will be three successive night games May 6-7-8 with the New York Yankees, anxious to square accounts with the Tigers after dropping two decisions to them in New York last week. Other night games of the home stand will be May 3 with the Baltimore Orioles, perhaps the most-improved team in the league; and May 10 with the Cleveland Indians, whose lineup is studded with new faces this spring.

The Financial Responsibility Laws are intended to hold people responsible for automobile accidents, but are widely misunderstood.

If there is an accident involving personal injury or death to any person or damage to property of \$100 or more, a report of the accident must be made to the Department of State. This report must be made by the drivers and owners of vehicles involved and is separate from the report made by the police officers at the scene of the accident.

If any of the people involved were not covered by insurance at the time of the accident, the

Department of State requires them to either settle the claims resulting from the accident or post security with the Department for their settlement. If the person fails to settle the claims or post the security before a fixed date, his driver's license is automatically suspended.

Any person whose license is suspended under this section of the Financial Responsibility Laws may petition the Circuit Court for the restoration of his license.

If a judgement is rendered against a person as the result of an automobile accident, and the person fails to pay the judgment or make a court approved partial payment agreement within thirty days, the judgment can be certified to the Department of State. If this is done, the Department is required to suspend his driver's license. Before the license can be restored, the judgment must be paid and the person required to take out Financial Responsibility Insurance.

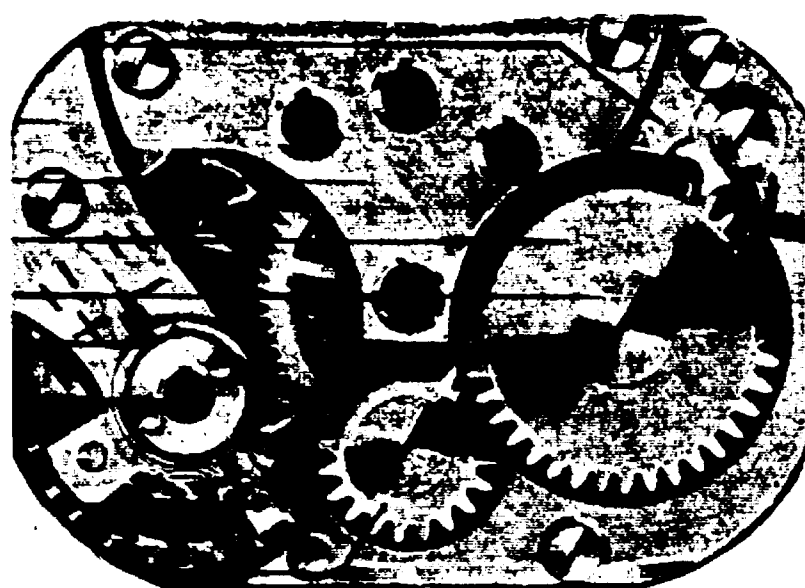
