## Letter to the Editor

On the front page of the May 15 Dispatch, it said two incumbents filed for the school board. John Walton and Jack Swanson were the only qualified candidates. Some people wondered why, after they signed my petitions, I feel I owe the good citizens who signed my petitions an explanation.

To begin with, we were told by Mr. Reader and others who should have known, that 25 names were required to run as in the past. I found out too late it was changed to 50 names last year, and the School Board made no public notice of this change. They kept it as secret as possible.

Then the petitions they supplied us with, were doubtfully worded. The warning not to sign more than two petitions, as this would be violating the law, was left off the petitions.

But, by chance I got 50 names and left them with Mr. Reader at the high school to give to the secretary of the Board.

Someone took extra petitions out for Mr. Walton and Mr. Swanson. Making sure he got two local businessmen that had already signed my petitions, to sign the ones he was carrying. This made their names invalid on all petitions they signed. My petitions then had 48 valid names which disqualified them.

I wonder if anyone told these businessmen, they signed illegally. I doubt this. Were they used to disqualify my petition? If I ever find out my friends in business here, did this to me purposely, I will try to prosecute them.

I have seen dirty politics before in other places. If they thought by getting my name off the ballot, I would quit running, they are badly mistaken. I will run on a write in.

## Rev. Hainsworth To Leave Pulpit

In a letter dated May 10, 1963, addressed to the Board of Deacons and to the Board of Trustees, Rev. William Hainsworth asked that his resignation as minister from the Congregational Church, be accepted, effective "the end of August, at the latest."

## Witnesses Plan 3 Conventions

"It will be three conventions instead of two for the United States this year," Warner Miller, presiding minister of the Gregory congregation, announced last night. This came as a surprise to the congregation as Mr. Miller read the announcement from the Watchtower Bible and Tract Society, convention sponsors.

"Milwaukee has been added to New York and Los Angeles," Mr. Miller said. "This became necessary due to limited facilities in New York. The new stadium for New York Mets baseball club is not completed, and thus the Polo Grounds will not be available for our use," he added.

According to Mr. Miller the majority of the congregation will be traveling to New York for the 8-day gathering which will be held July 7-14 in Yankee Stadium. A crowd of 125,000 is expected for the New York meeting.

"This will be our sixth convention in Yankee Stadium since 1950," Mr. Miller pointed out. "Following the New York gathering," he continued "we will begin a series of conventions around the world. There will be 22 in all which will take some 550 delegates from the United States and Canada to Europe, Asia, Australia, Philippines, Hawaii and back to the United States for the Los Angeles convention in just sixty days."

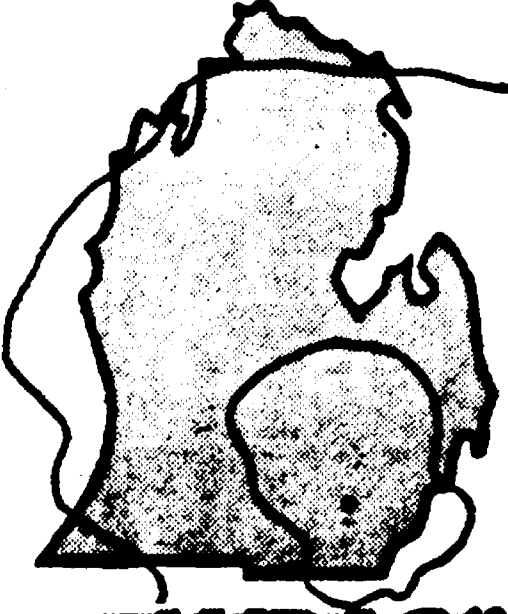

## Food Sense □ Not Nonsense



### Nibbling—No Monkey Business

There can be no more monkey business about nibbling than about a fourth grader clambering over a geodesic playground climber. With growing scientific support for smaller, more frequent meals for Americans, nutritionists caution:

• Calories should total the number you require to keep you to your ideal weight.  
• Nibbles should furnish the nutrients you need and include these foods: Meat or an alternate, milk or cheese, fruits and vegetables, enriched or whole grain bread and other cereal foods.

Results of a recent study by Dr. Margaret Ohlson and her fellow researchers at the State University of Iowa may accelerate the trend away from the established three-meals-a-day routine. As one phase of a research project aimed at learning why young adult men are more subject to coronary heart disease than are young women, researchers compared food habits. Men, they learned, ate more food than women. . . ate more fat which furnished a higher percentage of their calories . . . consumed more protein.

One new angle was apparent: Men stuffed. They tended to eat huge quantities of food at the evening meal, then nibble until bedtime. The scientists questioned male wisdom in concentrating so many calories into this 4- to 6-hour time slot. Recent research, Dr. Ohlson pointed out, shows that men who eat in this fashion may have a higher level of a fatty substance in the blood called cholesterol — a finding suspect in heart disease — than do men who eat smaller, more frequent meals throughout the day.

A simple solution? Accelerate the trend toward nibbling in order to provide a steadier supply of all nutrients.

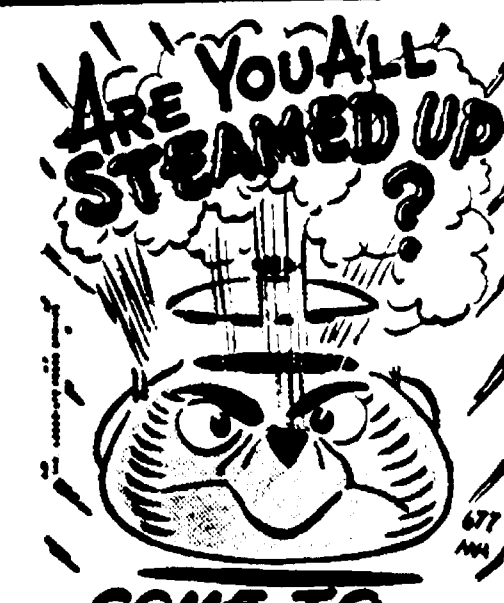
