Can Pie Be Cut?

HOWELL — Disagreement over Livingston County's budget has created a deadlock in the county allocation board which members will try to resolve when they meet today.

Unsuccessful in two previous attempts to resolve their allocation problem, there is still no indication that either side of the six-man board will yield sufficiently to break the three-vote deadlock which has persisted on all allocation resolutions which have been offered so far.

One of the main issues is whether the county's budget of \$865,000 is a "true budget". Three of the members claim it is not, pointing out that the budget for 1964 shows no anticipated beginning or ending balances, that all revenues are not fully shown and that all expenses are not shown.

On one side of the fence are three appointed members: Dr. Thomas A. Barton, Cecil Leopold, and Leo Kujawa, who have all served for three years. Opposed are Chairman Carl Raddatz, chairman of the board of supervisors' finance committee Mrs. Dorothea Greer, county treasurer, and Walter Hampton, county school superintendent, all statutory members. Raddatz has been a member of the allocation board for 15 years.

The three appointees say the county's financial needs can be easily satisfied with an allocation of three mills to be levied on the county's equalized valuation of \$144,000,000.

This would give the county \$432,000 to operate on in 1964 from taxes plus an amount of \$475,765 which the appointees say will be available in 1964.

The total of the two amounts is \$889,765 — an amount \$24,765 higher than the county's budget.

They offer as proof of their contention the facts that at the end of 1962 the county had a cash balance of \$131,565 in the general fund, \$3,200 in the building inspection fund, and \$186,000 in a "cigar box" in the social welfare department fund.

They contended these balances will not change substantially during this year. These three amounts plus anticipated revenue during

1964 would add up to \$457,765. Raddatz said, "If this three mill allocation were made, the funds of the county would be exhausted on or before December 31, 1964."

Some members of the board of supervisors have had hopes of using excess funds in the social welfare department to construct a medicare facility. A resolution to put \$100,000 into a building fund was introduced May 21 at the board of supervisors' meeting but was laid on the table.

The supervisors also agreed to appeal to the state tax commission if the allocation board denied their request for 5.27 mills.

This year's budget calls for an allocation of \$225,000 for welfare which the opposition claims could be met by transferring only \$39,000, which would be added to the \$186,000 expected to still be on hand.

"If there is one victory we

can claim, though," said Dr. Barton. "It's getting the budget off the back of an envelope. It took us three years to get a copy of the budget for each member of the allocation board."

ALLOCATION MADE

The allocation board has been able to reach agreement on granting up to one mill to the township and one-tenth of one mill for the county school district. This leaves them 13.9 mills from the maximum 15 mills allowed by law that they have to split up.

In their preliminary allocation, up to 10.9 mills were granted to schools and 3 mills to the county.

Questioning the leadership being given by the chairman in resolving the conflict, Leopold advised the chairman that he had been selected "to lead us".

Raddatz replied, "They should have elected someone else I guess."

With over 1400 registered voters in the Pinckney Community School district, only 672 turned out to cast their ballots in the school election, for school board members on Monday.

Terms of two Board members, Board President John Walton and Board Treasurer Jack Swanson, expired at the time.

Results of the election are as follows:

Incumbent John Walton received from Precinct I, 137 votes, and from precinct II, 259, giving him a total of 396 votes. Incumbent Jack Swanson received from precinct I, 134

votes, precinct II, 311, giving him a total of 345 votes. Arthur Wm. Rentz received

precinct II, 21, giving a total of 230 votes. Morton J. Scott, Jr. received from precinct I, 183 votes, precinct II, 45, giving a total of 228 votes.

Rentz and Scott ran as write-in-candidates after their petitions had been disqualified by Board Secretary Leo Goucher, for not having sufficient signatures on them.

Health Center Receives Gift in Doctor's Memory

HOWELL — A "Perpetual Gift" has been presented to McPherson Community Health Center in memory of the late Hollis L. Sigler, M.D. A plaque marking the gift will be placed on the wall outside the Intensive Care Unit in the new hospital addition, soon to be completed. (The new ten-bed Intensive Care Unit will be furnished through another gift — one of \$5,000, pledged by the Women's Auxiliary of the Health Center.

The gift is particularly fitting for those who want to give or leave money in memory of a person, or bequeath money with the thought that the gift will be one in perpetuity, one which will not be used within a short time, according to hospital officials.

The Sigler gift will be placed in the Fund for Perpetual Gifts. The principal of the gift will not be spent; the interest or

dividends earned from the invested money will be used to help pay for the hospital's charitable projects in the county or to buy needed new equipment and life-saving devices.

Hollis LeMayne Sigler was born in Pinckney, November 15, 1898, the son of Claude and Mildred Sigler. He was graduated in 1916 from High School and, in 1922, from the University of Michigan School of Medicine, where he was an Alpha Omega Alpha honorary student.

A temporary internship at Harper Hospital followed his graduation from medical school.

In September, 1924, Dr. Hollis Sigler established a private practice in Howell, where he served until his death January 20, 1962.

He was a member of the Medical Staff of McPherson Community Health Center from the day the hospital opened until his untimely death.

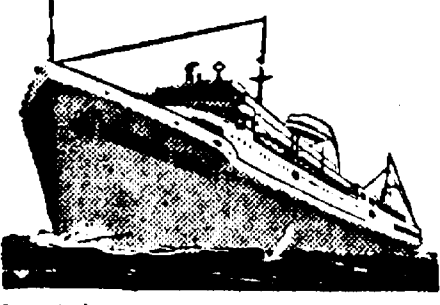

Trackless Wonders

Pinckney Finishes Best Season

But Relay Team Loses

Pinckney High Schools' Trackless Track team closed out the most successful season of the schools history in Class C State Finals at Mt. Pleasant the last Saturday of May. In a field of 89 schools, Pinckney finished in fourth place only three points out of first place.

The 880 yd. relay team, Jim Wicker, John Holben, Chas. DeWolf, and Jerry VanSlambrook, met its first defeat in 10 meets running in a record time 1:34.8. Jim Wicker was Pinckneys first medal winner in a State Meet taking second place in the 220 yd. dash, and then placing 3rd in the 100 yd. dash. These four boys scored 115 points in their events to give Pinckney its first points in a State Track Meet. Boys Training School won the meet with 18 points.

The team placed well in several other meets around the State also this season. At Howell Invitational Pinckney placed fifth in a field of 10 'B' schools, at Tecumseh Relays placed 2nd in a field of 10 schools, at the State Regionals placed fourth out of 27 schools and at Washington Conference meet, tied

with Chelsea, a 'B' school, for 2nd place, this in addition to the standing of the State Finals.

The 880 yd. Relay team Wicker, Holben, DeWolf, and VanSlambrook, set track records at the Saline Track, Tecumseh Relays, and the League Meet at Eastern Michigan University. The Medley relay team G. Colone, D. Knapp, D. Fritz, and D. Shirley set a school record in the two mile relay The Tecumseh Medley relay, a special relay, composed of J. Holben, J. Colone, J. Wicker, and J. VanSlambrook holds the field record at Tecumseh.

Individual records were broken in various events: Jim Wicker holds the school record of 10.3 in 100 yd. dash, Chas DeWolf holds the school record in the high hurdles at 15.8 and record of 20.6 in the low hurdles. Jerry VanSlambrook broke the school record in pole vault going 10' 9".

It is interesting to note that the 880 yd. relay members, Wicker, DeWolf, VanSlambrook, and Holben collected a total of 29 medals and 66 ribbons and two trophies for their efforts this spring.

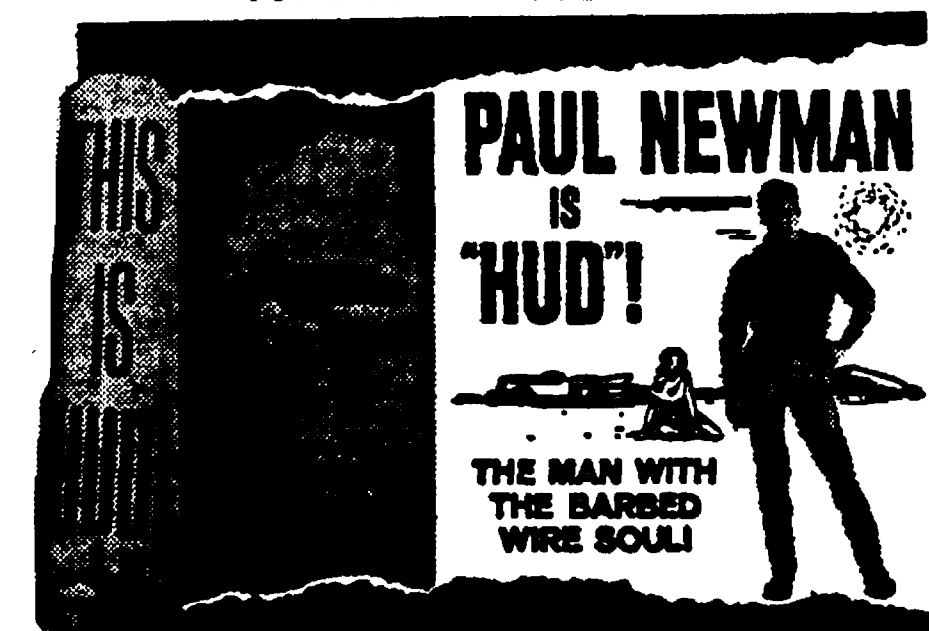

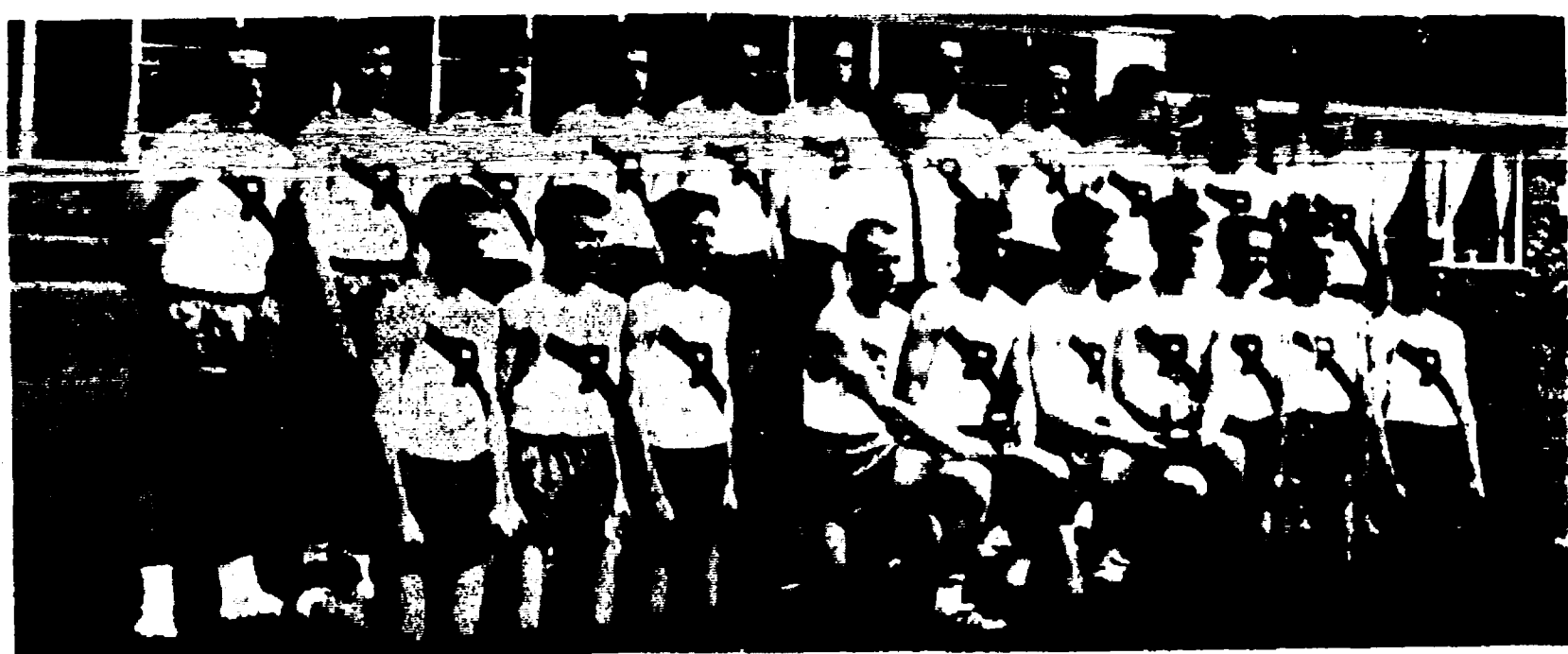
