He Is Out

Kujawa Switches Vote, Breaks Allocation Tie

HOWELL—A complete reversal in thinking on the part of Leo Kujawa, Brighton industrialist, ended the Livingston County Allocation Board deadlock last Wednesday with a resulting allocation of 4.65 mills to the county and 9.25 mills to county schools, by a 4-2 vote.

Kujawa's intent to change his position started with voicing of his thoughts as he examined immediately that he was wavering from the viewpoint of Dr. Thomas A. Barton and Cecil Lepard with whom he had sided during the entire allocation procedure with the exception of the organizational meeting. (Kujawa was appointed after the first meeting to replace the Chairman.)

All three, appointed by Probate Judge Francis E. Barton, had stuck solidly together to firmly establish the criterion of "necessity" as the basis of dividing the 15 mills allowed as a maximum without a vote of the people to the townships, county, and school districts.

It came as a complete surprise, to those who had witnessed the proceedings to this time, as Kujawa began to swing over to a position of a higher millage for the county which had requested 5.27 mills. The resolution on the floor and the one which was eventually adopted called for 4.65.

This millage levied on the county's equalized valuation of \$144,000,000 will produce about \$90,000 less than the \$760,000 the county indicated it would

need to raise from taxation to meet its budget.

County Clerk Joseph Ellis called the roll on the resolution. Dr. Barton voted no, Mrs. Dorothea Greer, county treasurer, yes, and Walter Hampton, county superintendent of schools, yes.

When he called Kujawa's name, the industrialist replied he was not ready to vote until he had heard from the other two.

Head of the Livingston County Welfare Dept.

Bohm was called over and answered a number of questions concerning his department and the move to transfer \$100,000 to a building fund for a Medicare facility.

Supervisors Establish Project Fund

Howell — Establishment of a building fund for a Medicare facility was agreed upon yesterday (Tuesday) by the Livingston County Board of Supervisors.

By a vote of 12 to 3, with two supervisors not voting, the county's governing body decided that as of now all money returning to the welfare department which is "other than from direct taxation" will be placed in the fund.

It will be used to buy a site, or for construction, or for alterations and repair of existing facilities.

Supervisor Martin Lavan made sure that funds which he claims are now in a so-called "cigar box" will not go into the building fund.

Welfare Director Cecil Bohm informed the supervisors that his department now has a cash balance of \$114,000 and has not yet drawn any of the \$205,000 which were placed in the 1963 county budget.

It is these excess funds which have prompted Lavan to use the term "cigar box." (See "Letters to Editor" for comment by one of the Argus readers, objecting to use of this term).

Open House To Be Held

Open house will honor Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Meabon on their 50th wedding anniversary, Sunday, June 23, from 2 to 6 o'clock at their home, 425 Pinckney-Dexter Rd. for friends and neighbors.

After hearing his answers, Kujawa said, "If you are going to transfer these funds, you have some flexibility in your budget." Turning to his associates, he added, "They don't need these monies in the operation of this department."

Still meditating aloud, he voiced the opinion that "If I were a supervisor I certainly would appeal the 3.9 mills which three of us have suggested."

The supervisors in May had voted to appeal to the state tax commission if their request for 5.27 mills was denied.

When the vote Wednesday was taken, the allocation board chairman and chairman of the supervisors' finance committee, said, "I will do all in my power to ask the supervisors not to appeal."

Both Dr. Barton and Lepard asked several questions of Kujawa during his half-hour monologue in an effort to steer him back into their camp. Lepard told Kujawa he would have to live with his own conscience.

Kujawa tried to rationalize in his mind the justification of allowing the use of the funds for a Medicare facility: "If they (the supervisors) are the representatives of the people they should have a right to decide how the money is to be spent." The supervisors, however, have not voted to use this money for this purpose nor is it included in their budget.

Barton and Lepard were dismayed at Kujawa's switch because the three had been in thorough agreement up to this time that three mills would satisfy the county's budget request for \$760,000. They had argued that three mills, producing \$432,000 plus anticipated revenues in 1964 of \$135,000 and cash balances at the end of 1963 amounting to about \$323,000 would more than meet the budget needs.

School districts, originally allocated 10.9 mills, were cut back to 9.25. For Brighton, this will slice about \$21,000 from its budget.

New ZIP Code to Start Nationally July 1st

Our five-digit ZIP Code is 48169. Postmaster Lawrence Baughn announced today.

"Everyone in Pinckney, Michigan will use this ZIP Code on all their correspondence to speed mail deliveries and reduce the chance of mis-sent mail," said the Postmaster.

ZIP Code, the Post Office Department's revolutionary new system of improved mail dispatch and delivery, goes into effect nationally on July 1.

Postmaster Baughn stressed the importance of all citizens of Pinckney learning this city's ZIP Code and using it in their return address on all correspondence. In answering mail, he said, ZIP Codes should be taken from the return addresses of mail you receive.

"The ZIP Code is literally the last word in mail addressing," Mr. Baughn said. "It should follow the city and state in all addresses." He cited this example of the proper use of ZIP Code:

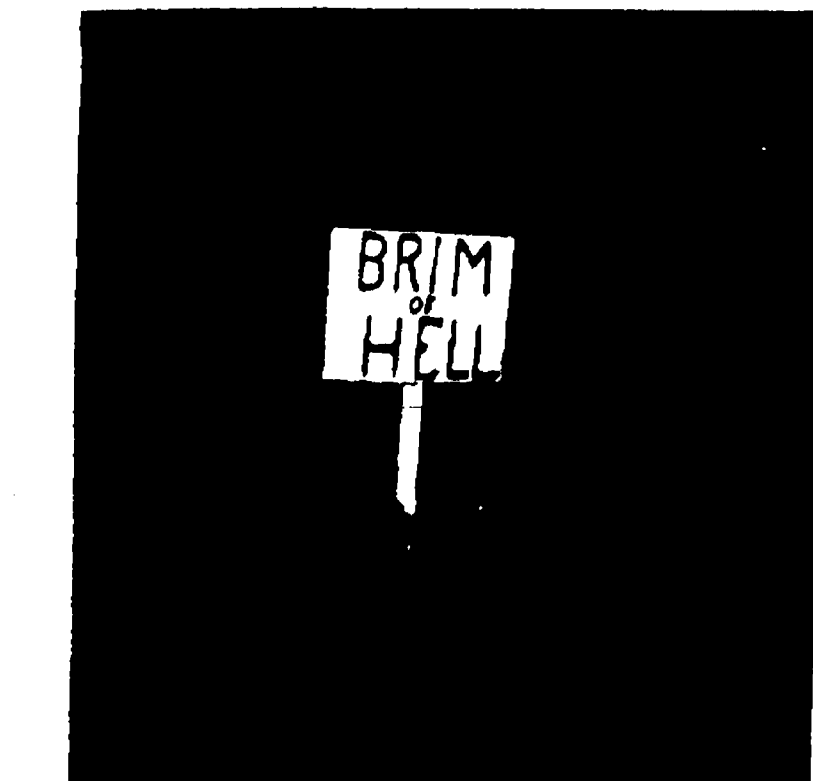

The new ZIP Code plan for the first time will permit the Post Office Department to short-cut repeated address reading. The address on mail must often be read as many as eight or ten times by postal employees, to get it to the proper destination," Mr. Baughn said. "Each handling slows the process of mail dispatch and adds to the opportunity for human error."

"With ZIP Code, a clerk needs only to glance at the code to know immediately to what national area, state and post office the letter is destined, add to speed it on its way, cutting up to 24 hours off the time between deposit and delivery."

Postmaster Baughn said that when ZIP Code is in full swing, the United States will have "the most modern system of mail distribution and delivery in existence."

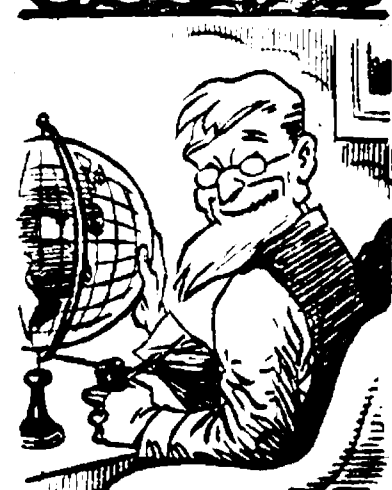
Motion by Tiplady, supported by Lavey, that the Council donate \$15.00 to the Pinckney Fire Department's Fourth of July fireworks display. Carried.

Motion by Clark, supported by Lavey, to adjourn. Motion carried.

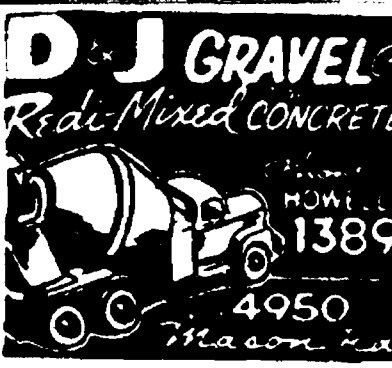

I. Bonding Proposition

Shall the Township of Putnam, County of Livingston, Michigan, borrow the sum of not to exceed Fifty-three Thousand (\$53,000.00) Dollars and issue its bonds therefor for the purpose of paying part of the cost of erecting, furnishing and equipping to be used as a town hall and fire station for said Township?

II. Millage Increase Proposition

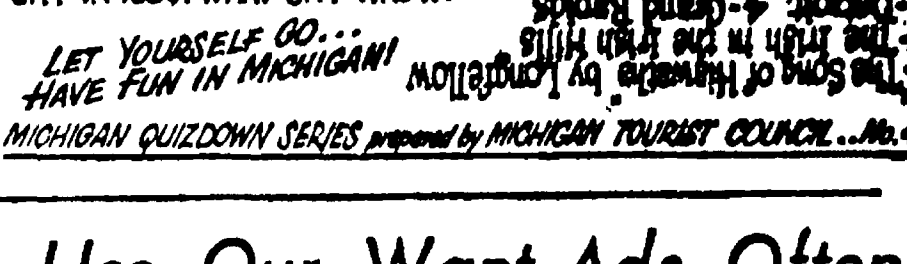

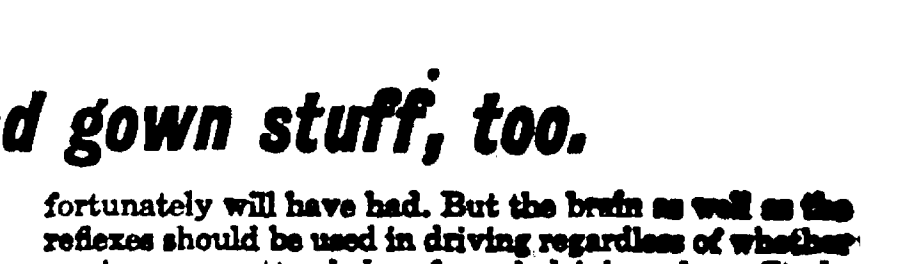

Canoe livers are located in Milford and in Ann Arbor which supply canoe rental service. The Authority does not rent canoes at any of its parks or Authority canoe camp sites.

More Golfers Are Using Kensington

Brighton—The three major parks of the Huron-Clinton Metropolitan Authority reported high attendance for the month of May, according to Kenneth L. Hallenbeck, Director.

Kensington Metropolitan Park, southeast of Brighton, was visited by over 210,000 persons in May of 1963, the second highest attendance on record for that month. Comparative totals for May are: 1962 - 253,000; 1961 - 167,000; 1960 - 203,000; and 1959 - 186,000.

Other facility usage at Kensington Metropolitan Park for the month of May included golfers: 3,841 compared to 3,000; nature center: 9,451 compared to 7,212; plus hundreds of others who walked the nature trails, picnicked, launched or rented boats, and swimmers using beaches mostly on week-ends during May.

Metropolitan Beach along Lake St. Clair near Mount Clemens also reported its second best May on record with over 103,000 persons at the park. Comparative totals for May are: 1962 - 119,000; 1961 - 88,641; 1960 - 74,000; and 1959 - 87,000.

Lower Huron Metropolitan Park near Belleville reported attendance at over 215,000 for the month of May. This was the third highest total on record, with comparative totals as follows: 1962 - 225,000; 1961 - 231,000; 1960 - 170,000; and 1959 - 186,000.

Canoe Derby To Have Start At Wixom Bridge

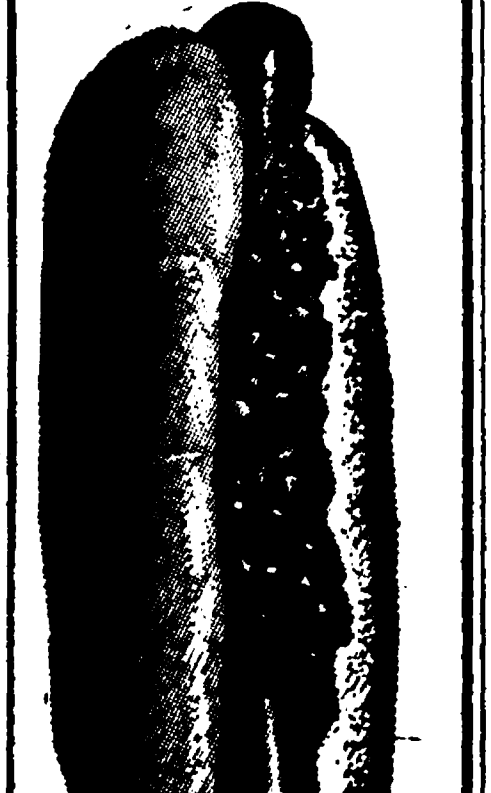

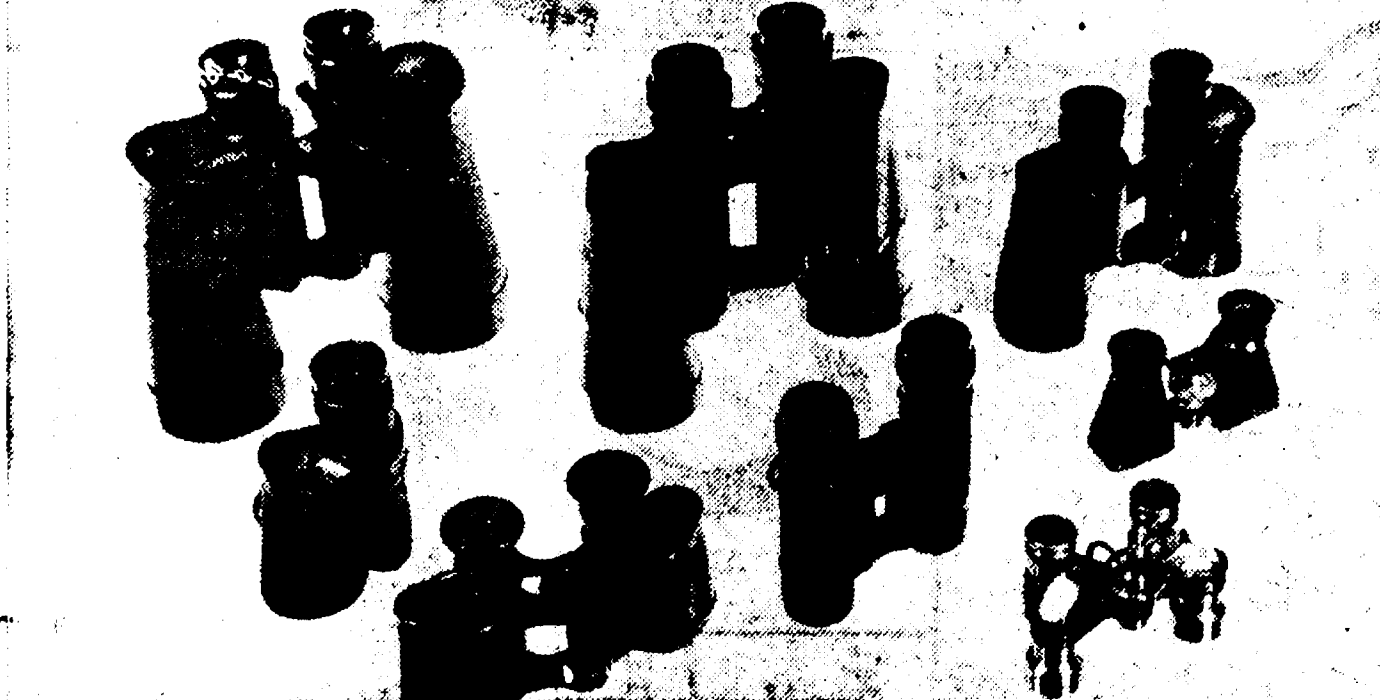

It lies through the sensitive, sharp-focusing powers of binoculars or field glasses. How can you make the "right" choice from the many different glasses available? Don't be guided by price tags alone. More important, pick the kind best suited to you personally, much in the same way you would be fitted for eyeglasses. Your choice also will depend largely upon what you want to see most, and under what circumstances. Binoculars of six to eight power are popular for general use, including bird watching. Field glasses may be adequate for short-distance viewing. They are not recommended for bird watching and similar types of use because of their extremely narrow field of view. A good rule of thumb is to ask a friend who knows something about binoculars to help you make that right choice. —Mich. Dept. of Conservation.

Stockings From Gas

EAST LANSING — For the first time since nylon came into use in 1938, a new fiber threatens to take a big bite out of the fashion hosiery market.

The new fiber, polypropylene, was recently introduced in the stocking market of leading cities, according to a Michigan State University extension cloth specialist. The new hosiery will be more widely available in the Fall.

Bernetta Kahabka, of MSU's Cooperative Extension Service, keeps a close watch on clothing and textile developments, reports that the stockings are currently being made in only two shades—a medium beige and a light beige. They cost about \$1.50 a pair.

You may recognize the name "polypropylene." It's a thermoplastic made from propylene gas obtained from petroleum. It is used in molded plastic furniture, luggage, dinnerware, carpeting, electrical appliances, automotive parts and packaging film for baked goods!

More Snag Resistance
Polypropylene stockings are

expected to provide extreme sheerness, a silky feel and four times as much snag resistance as regular nylon fiber. So far, no "runless" claims have been made, but manufacturers are advertising the new stockings as "snag proof."

The real test of any product, however, is extensive consumer usage," Miss Kahabka points out.

The new fabric is also supposed to insure perfect fit, even after repeated washings.

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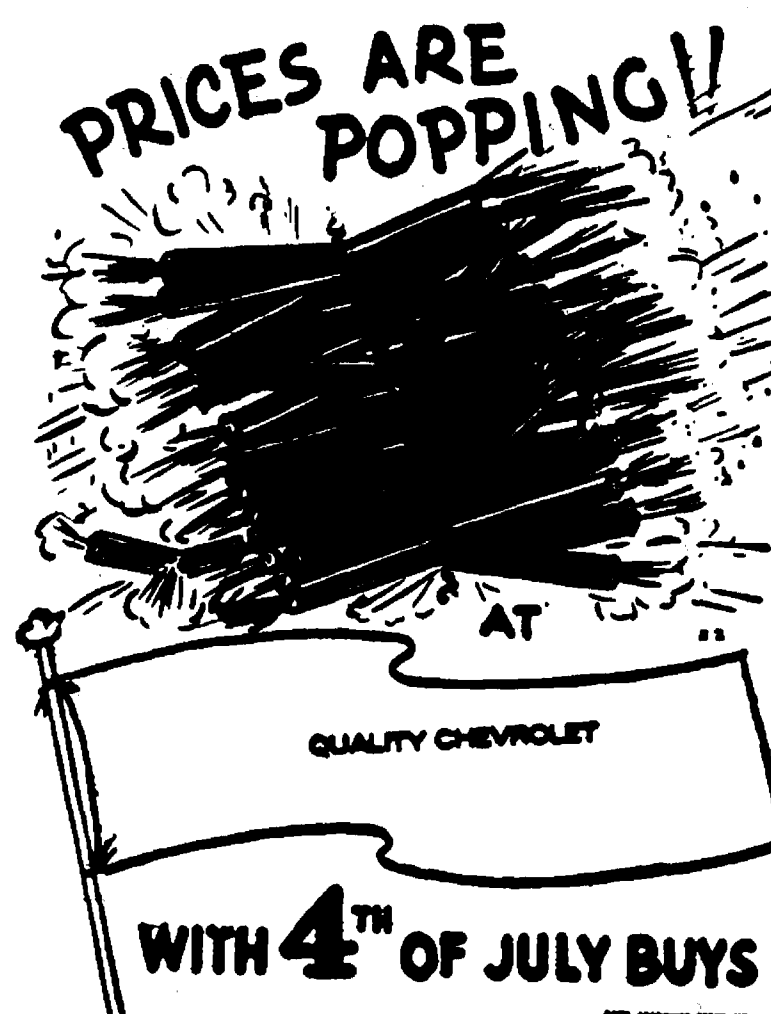
