It lies through the sensitive, sharp-focusing powers of binoculars or field glasses. How can you make the "right" choice from the many different glasses available? Don't be guided by price tags alone. More important, pick the kind best suited to you personally, much in the same way you would be fitted for eveglasses. Your choice also will depend largely upon what you want to see most, and under what circumstances. Binoculars of aix to eight power are popular for general use, including bird watching. Field glasses may be adequate for short-distance viewing. They are not recommended for bird watching and similar types of use because of their extremely narrow field of view. A good rule of thumb is to ask a friend who knows something about binoculars to help you make that right choice, .- Mich. Dept. of Conservation.


