Results of Study These figures were supplied by the Detroit Edison Co., based on research of Dr. H. Richard Blackwell, of Ohio State University.

A total of 1.386 bulbs at Tiger Stadium were counted in the survey conducted by the American League with retired umpire Charley Berry in charge. Of these, 1,328 on the eight roof-top towers are rated at 1,500 watts each, the other 58, under the overhang of the right field pavilion, are 1,000 watta each.

For the lighting study, readings were taken at 47 spots on i the playing surface -- 16 in the infield at 30-foot intervals and 31 in the outfield at twice that

In the infield, the readings | ranged from 352 foot candlepower at home plate to 192 at second base. That was the only spot, however, where the reading was under 200 and the infield average was computed at

In the outfield, the range was from 842 (just behind third hase) to 92 in deepest centerfield. It was pointed out, however, that the right field overhang affected five of the outfield light meter readings, so those five were eliminated.


