

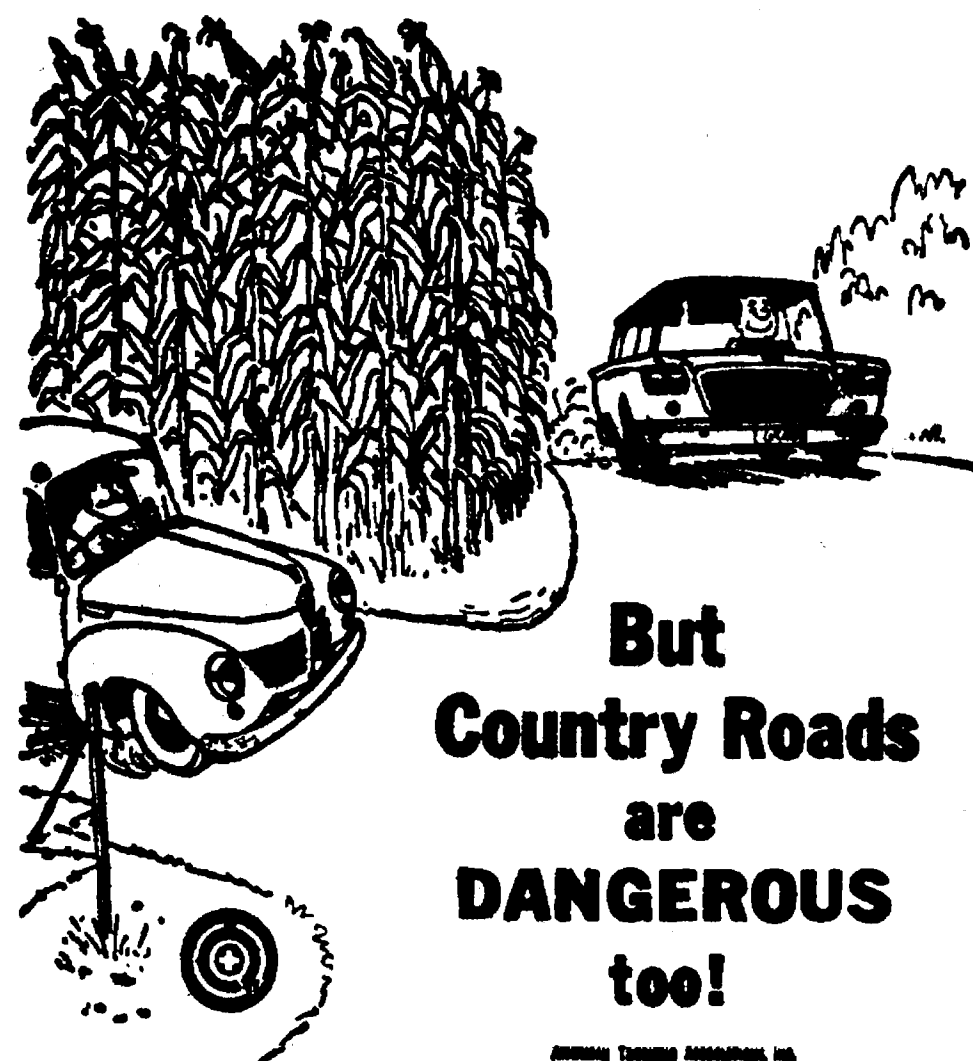

## Trucking Official Urges Safe Driving

A trucking industry official said here today that it is ironic to teach a man how to drive safely on city streets and expressways and then have him die on a country road while driving to the farm or holiday resort on his summer vacation.

Speaking in connection with the Michigan trucking industry's July Courtesy and Safety Campaign, "Country Driving," Robert Osterman, Chairman of the Michigan Trucking Association's Safety Supervisors, went on to say that for most city folk, country driving involves the same danger encountered by the same astronaut, exploring the unknown.

On most country roads you are never quite sure what you'll find around the next turn.

Osterman said that part of the job of saving lives on rural roads can be accomplished through public information. He said that many of the dangers on our country roads are built-in ones such as sharp curves, many of which are un-

banked with abrupt dips and rises, steep hills and one-lane bridges and culverts. He said it would be foolish to attempt, as many drivers do, to negotiate such roads in superhighway fashion.

He also pointed out that even properly designed roadways can generate accident risks if they are not well maintained. Old man weather takes a heavy toll on country roads, causing pot-holes, washed-out shoulders and road edges.

On gravel-surfaced roads, dust can breed as many accidents as fog and, he went on to say, under these conditions speed should be reduced to allow safe travel.

In conclusion, Osterman said that another major hazard of country driving is poor traffic signs and road markings. Many intersections have no stop signs and the ones that do have them are often hidden by weeds, etc., and are not visible until you are but a few yards from the intersection.

The Earl Kimbler family camped at Bishop Lake all last week — they had a new tent to try out.

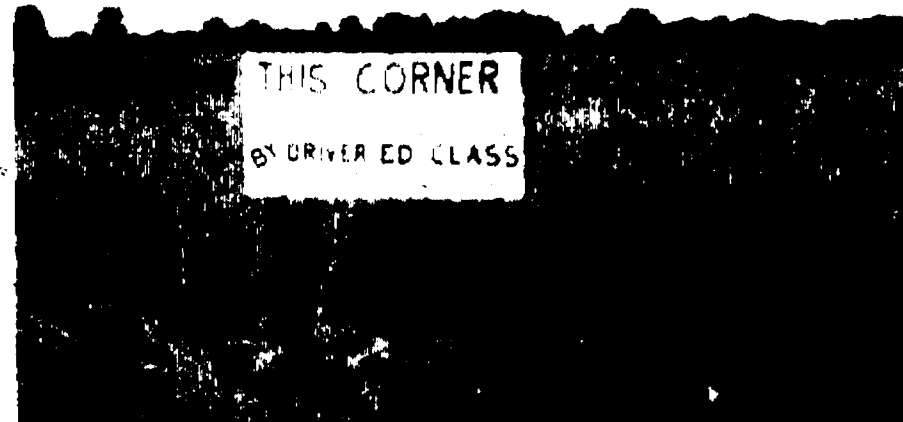

Those were the cries of Bert Wylie, auctioneer at the annual Kiwanis Club Auction held on the Village Square July 4th.

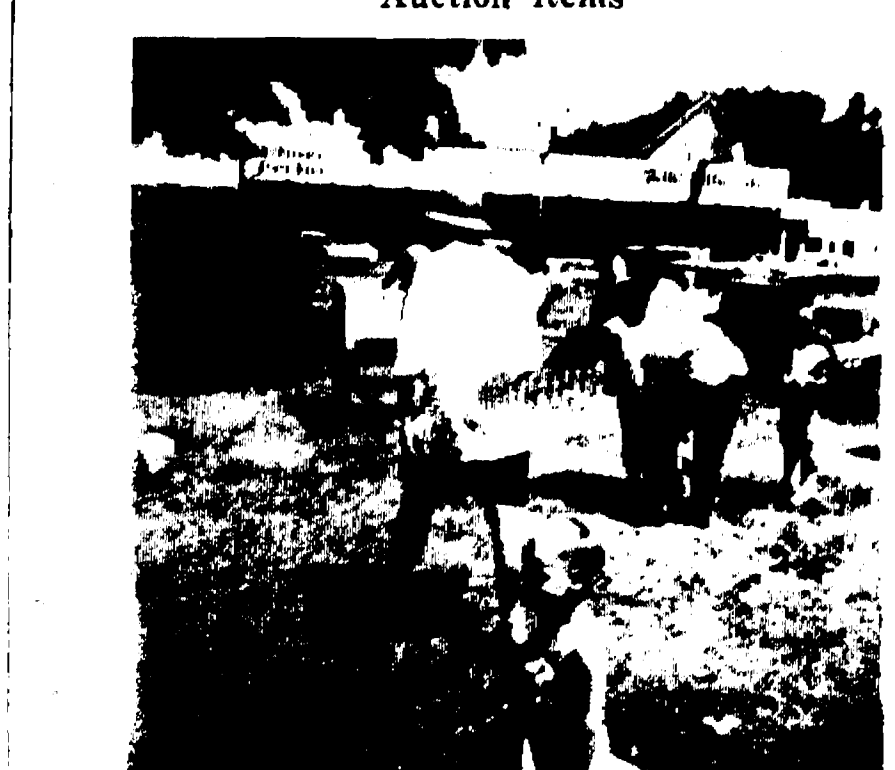
He ran the incoming funds to near the \$200 mark, as he auctioned off clothes, furniture, a boat trailer, pump, a coke

## Teacher's Action Produces Results

It seems there is such a thing as asking a favor and having it carried out, and there is such a thing as asking a favor and then having to do it yourself.

This is the conclusion that Don Gibson, instructor of Pinckney's Driver Training Program and John Burg, assistant instructor, have come to after asking the County Road Commission if they would oblige them and their students and other motorists as well, and cut the high weeds and brush at corners of Dexter-Pinckney and Darwin roads,

and Darwin and Patterson Lake roads, making it possible for motorists to see any oncoming cars before pulling out into the intersection.

After two very serious accidents happened at the corners of Darwin and Dexter roads this summer with two deaths, these two men felt the visibility, and the signs at this corner may have had something to do with these accidents.

Gibson met with the Livingston County Road Commission last Wednesday, only to find that it resulted in so much "red tape" and so much stalling on the part of the road commission, he felt it would be much "simpler" to assume the responsibility himself.

That is exactly what he did, and with Burg, and nearly 75 students hacked away with scythes and mowers.

Visibility at these two corners is now 100 per cent.

In the pictures shown here are signs made by student drivers. This policy of marking places along highways where deaths have resulted from accidents is a standard policy in 16 states throughout the nation, and Gibson feels it is a good thing and should be done here.

Other requests made of the Livingston County Road Commission by Gibson were to furnish scythes for the students to use, but the commission came up with but one scythe, and that had no handle.

Request number two was to take down the "Yield" sign at the corner of Darwin Road, replacing it with a "Stop" sign. This was done.

Request number three, that the commercial signs at these corners be removed, but they didn't know what channels to go through to get this done, therefore Gibson called Attorney General Kelley personally, and gained results.

The signs are to be removed by July 15.

Request number four was made to the sheriff's department that these students have protection while clearing the corners.

It was decided by the sheriff at this time that "this protection was not available," therefore, Deputy Sheriff Robert Egeler, took this responsibility by himself, helping Burg and Gibson to see that not one student was injured. There were no traffic mishaps.

"It is too bad that situations such as this occur in our great county. However, I do feel it is risk enough having to ride with driver students, instructing and watching them, without having crossroads such as these two, and many others, similar to these two," says Gibson.

## Poison Ivy Isn't Any Fun; Puts Hundreds In Hospital

Ivy poisoning is no joke. It runs its course. Don't waste

lovely little plant puts hundreds in the hospital every summer and sends thousands more to physicians to get relief from the pain and itching. And countless hundreds of thousands suffer through a light case of ivy poisoning without medical help.

In the United States, poison ivy can be anywhere — in fact, it is almost everywhere. The apartment dweller in the big city who takes an occasional Sunday stroll in the park can get it. Even if you stick to the walks, your dog can bring back the volatile oils on his coat. Smoke from a neighbor's trash fire can wait droplets into your yard.

Poison ivy and its close kin, poison oak, are three-leaved climbing plants. On the ground they are about a foot high. Usually they climb walls, trees, fences. Sometimes they mix in with honeysuckle and other climbing plants, and are very hard to detect.

Poison sumac is a small shrub with small white berries. Whether it's ivy, oak or sumac, the results are about the same — a stinging, itching patch of blisters. If the rash gets into the eyes, or spreads over a considerable portion of the body, it can become serious.

There is no simple cure for poison ivy. Lotions and ointments can help to ease the discomfort while the ailment

runs its course. Don't waste time. The best precaution is to know how to recognize the plants and avoid them. Any good natural history book and many encyclopedias have photos. The main thing to watch for is the three-leaved twig.

If you have been exposed, wash thoroughly, several times, with warm water and plenty of soap. You might be able to get some of the oil off before it begins to irritate the skin.

Very few people are immune. Some, because they've never had a rash, think so. They've just been lucky. Of course, some people are more susceptible than others, and these unlucky individuals get a rash almost every summer.

Search your lawn and garden for suspicious three-leaved plants. Dig out the plant, root and all, and dispose of it carefully. Clean the hoe and rake thoroughly. And wash your hands right away.

## Water Accident Deaths Decline

Eighty-three persons have died and at least 45 others have been injured in 118 water accidents so far this year in Michigan. State Police provisional figures disclosed Monday, July 1.

These represent decreases of 10 in deaths, six in injured and 23 in accidents, compared with the same period last year.

He has been farming continuously since 1936 when his father died and at present is milking around 50 cows.

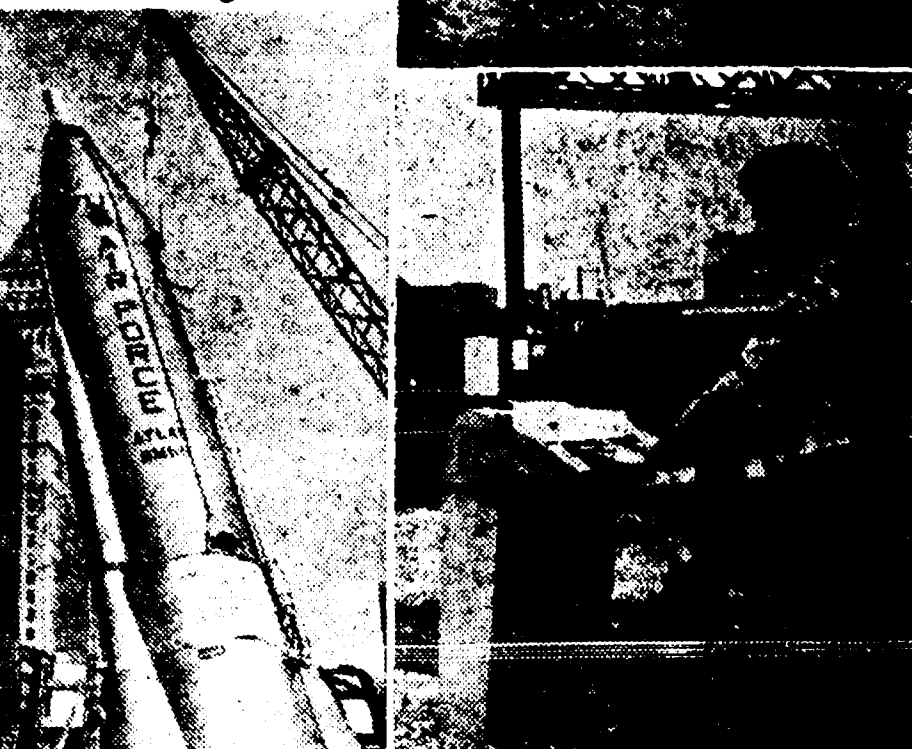

## HAMBURG TOWNSHIP ANTI-LITTER ORDINANCE

### Health, Sanitary, Safety and Protective Measures

#### SECTION I

Ordinance to regulate health, sanitary and safety conditions throughout the Township, to provide penalties for violation of any of the regulations or conditions contained therein.

#### SECTION II

Rubbish disposal: It shall be unlawful for any person to dump rubbish or waste materials on any land in Hamburg Township except in and on Public or Private Dumping Grounds as may be provided for the purpose. It shall be unlawful for any person to dump rubbish or waste materials within the right-of-way of any public street or highway, or park. All public or private Dumping Grounds shall be located not less than one hundred (100) feet from any public street, highway or park; not less than five hundred (500) feet from any inhabited building, and/or recorded residential subdivision. Such dumping grounds shall be reached by a suitable service road of adequate width to permit safe travel. All such dumping grounds shall be burned, leveled and covered with a layer of dirt as often as necessary to eliminate odors, minimize rats and vermin.

#### SECTION III

Promiscuous Litter of Junk in Proximity of Dwellings or on any Lot, Parcel or Tract of Land in Hamburg Township: It is hereby specifically provided that any promiscuous litter of vehicles that are not in running condition, or unsightly accumulation of junk equipment, machinery, and/or parts thereof, and/or used materials located either in the proximity of a dwelling or on any lot, parcel or tract of land in Hamburg Township shall not be considered a "Junk Yard" or "Used Material Yard". Such an existing condition shall be "Illegal" to be abated in the public interest within fifteen (15) days from the date of complaint notice served either by mail, posting of the property, or personally by Township Supervisor of Hamburg Township, Livingston County. Each day said illegal use continues unabated after the expiration of said fifteen (15) days complaint notice shall constitute a separate offense and violation subject to action and penalties as provided by this ordinance.

#### SECTION IV

Any one who operates and maintains a bona fide business shall maintain and store all their essential equipment and material in a neat and orderly fashion.

#### SECTION V

Penalties: Any person, firm, association, or corporation who shall violate any rule, regulation, or condition of this Ordinance or shall operate the same without a license shall upon conviction thereof, forfeit a sum not to exceed one hundred (\$100.00) dollars together with the cost of prosecution or be imprisoned in the county jail for a period of not more than ninety (90) days, or both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court.

#### SECTION VI

Any person, firm, or corporation, or his or its employees, agents, or officers who shall violate the terms and provisions of this ordinance, shall be guilty of maintaining a public nuisance and shall be guilty of misdemeanor and shall be punished as provided in Section V hereof. The continuance of such public nuisance as hereinbefore referred to shall constitute a nuisance per se and the same may be restrained by proceedings in the Circuit Court for the County of Livingston, State of Michigan, upon complaint of the Supervisor and Clerk of Hamburg Township and the institution of such proceedings shall not be a bar to the arrest, prosecution and conviction of any person, firm, or corporation violating the terms and provisions of this Ordinance or any suit to recover such penalty in an action of law.

#### SECTION VII

Sections of this Ordinance shall be termed severable, and should any section or provision of this Ordinance be declared by the Courts to be unconstitutional or invalid, the same will not affect the validity of this ordinance as a whole or any part thereof, other than the part declared to be unconstitutional or invalid.

#### SECTION VIII

This Ordinance shall become effective thirty (30) days after the first publication in accordance with Act 191, of the Public Acts of 1929, as amended.

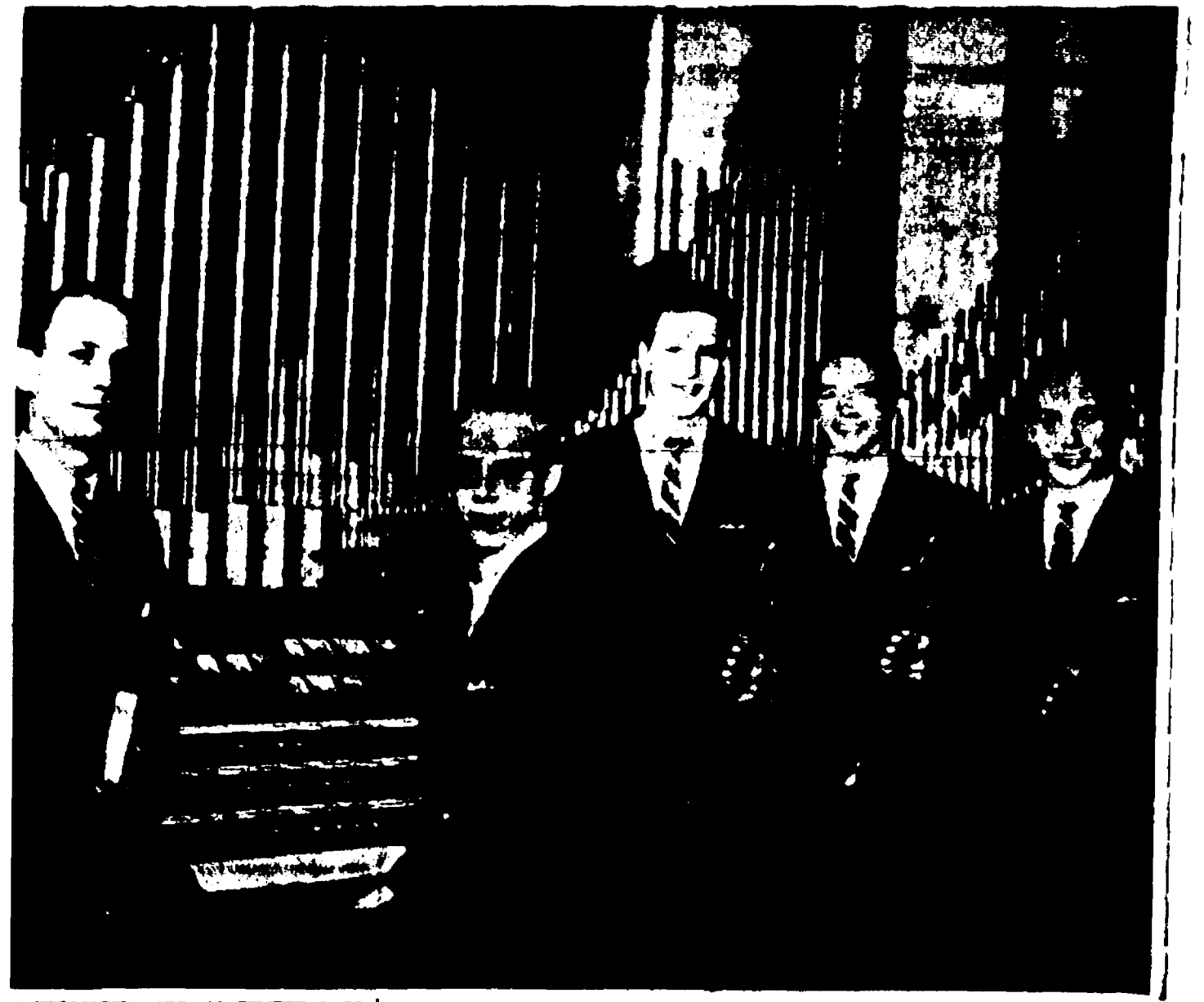

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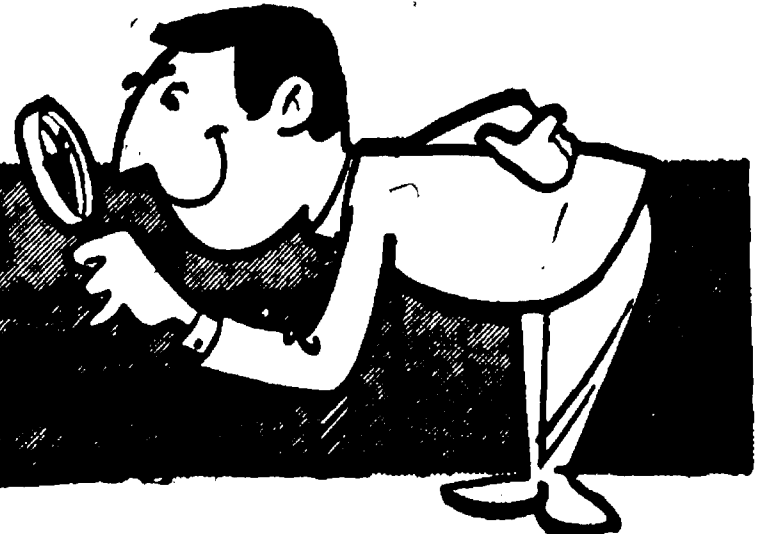
