Arnold Abney Trains in Japan

Marine Private First Class Arnold T. Abney, son of Mr. and Mrs. Homer C. Abney of 6025 Pinckney rd., Pinckney, is undergoing ten weeks training at the Camp Fuji maneuver area in Japan.

His unit, part of Third Battalion, Ninth Regiment of Third Marine Division at Camp Hansen, Okinawa, departed for Camp Fuji Aug. 23.

While at Fuji, the Battalion will conduct tactical testing of rifle companies designed to improve combat readiness in amphibious operations, air and ground exercises and counter-guerrilla warfare.

Upon arriving at Camp Fuji Third Battalion made an amphibious landing at Numazu after which they reported to the base camp for the remainder of the training program.

Elements of the Division's Third Tank Battalion, Third Anti-Tank Battalion, and Third Engineer Battalion are supporting the unit in the training exercises.

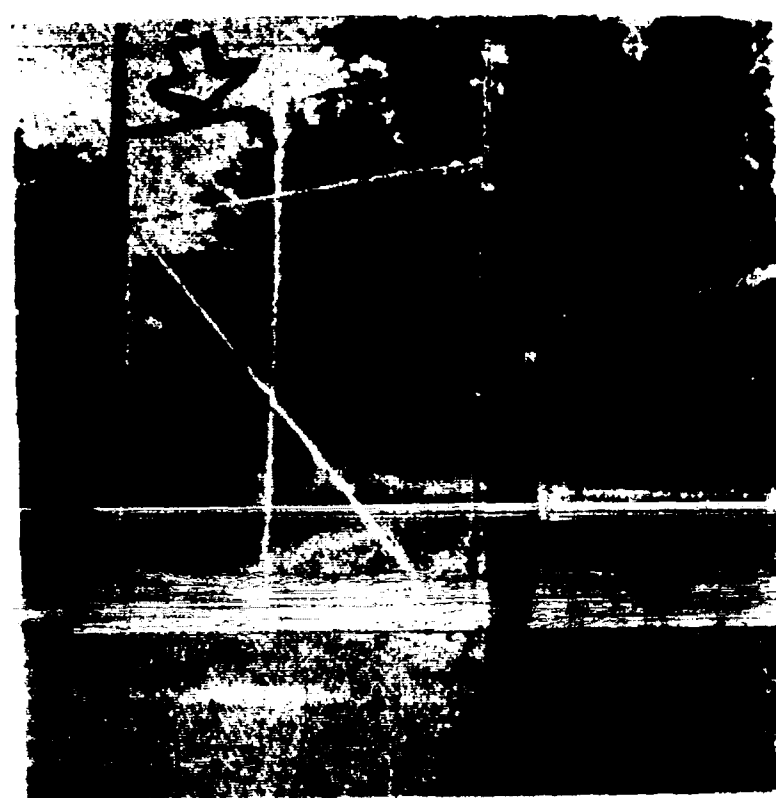
beginning October 1, if those sonic booms make by jet planes scare you and make you jump, like they do me, you surely want to have your tranquilizers handy the months of October, November and December. During this time supersonic training flights will be made by Strategic Air Command B-58 Hustler bombers along a route from Adrian, Michigan to Bayshore, Michigan, with a 40 mile wide corridor. These bombers will fly at supersonic speed up to Mach 2 (1,300 m.p.h.) and at altitudes above 35,000 feet. It is the belief of the Air Force that a costly supersonic bomber is of little value in combat if the crew cannot use its full capabilities because of inadequate prior training and therefore these aircraft must fly at high speeds, creating sonic booms along the designated routes. Headquarters of the Strategic Air Command report that although sometimes startling or distracting in their suddenness, the booms will in no circumstances cause personal injury!

This situation has caused residents in the area, mainly sportsmen, to be angry toward the "management" of the deer herd and last December it came to a climax when several residents claimed the fence to be an illegal height and said that deer were able to jump into the reserve as well as jump out, making these shoots "very illegal." Letters were sent to newspapers, the Michigan Conservation Department and Conservation magazines claiming the U. of M. Department of Life Management, which operates the reserve, as acting illegally under the state laws.

All is under control now, according to Lawrence Camburn.

"All persons concerned feel this 11' 4" fence to be "deer proof" and makes the reserve private property of the University," he said.

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Sunday Collisions Result In Two Deaths

BRIGHTON — Two persons were killed in separate accidents, early Sunday morning which occurred within five minutes of each other.

John H. Clupper, 21 of Dowagiac died at 1:00 a.m. in a two-car, head-on crash on I-96 between Brighton and Howell near Lake Chemung.

Patricia Ann Day, 24, of Midland, met her death in a crash on U.S.-23 in Tyrone Township at 1:05 a.m.

Troopers from the Brighton State Police Post were summoned to the scenes of both accidents.

Officers said Clupper was driving west on the westbound lane of I-96 when he collided with Thomas H. Holman, 44, who lives at the Wil-Mar Trailer Court in Howell.

Police said witnesses told them Holman was driving the wrong way on the lane. One driver who said Clupper was passing him at a speed 60 mph, saw the other car coming and turned into the ditch to avoid colliding.

Clupper was pronounced dead at the scene by Dr. Patrick May of Howell.

Holman is a partner in Dotter's Restaurant located on West Grand River, Howell. He was taken by ambulance to McPherson Community Health Center with bruises, abrasions, and possible internal injuries. When interviewed at 3:45 a.m., he was unable to explain what had happened.

The other accident occurred in Tyrone Township on U.S.-23, seven-tenths of a mile south of White Lake Road.

James M. Taup, 26, of Midland, told troopers he swerved to avoid a car being pushed along the highway, and went off the brim of the road.

When he tried to pull back on, he apparently lost control of his car which rolled over on the highway. His passenger, Patricia Ann Day, was pronounced dead at Hurley Hospital in Flint.

Both were wearing seat belts in the 1963 model car in which they were riding.

Taup received multiple lacerations and abrasions but his condition was considered "satisfactory" at the hospital following the crash.

The Livingston County Accident Report for the Period Sept. 16 to 23 shows 14 property damage accidents and 5 personal injury accidents.

There were 14 persons injured and two fatal accidents in which two persons were killed.

In all, 28 cars were involved, according to the Michigan State Police who issue this report weekly.

Sgt. Robert Vesey, commander of the Brighton State Police Post, says these two fatalities raise the total so far this year to six as compared to ten last year.

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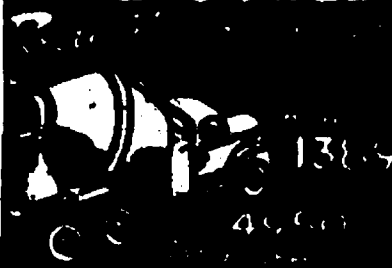
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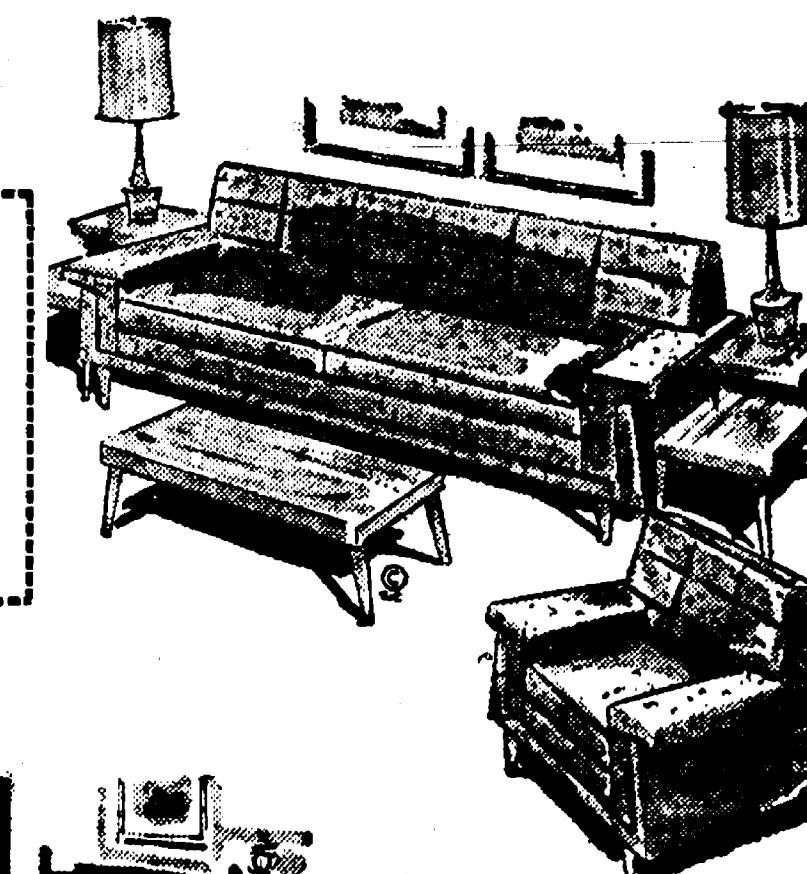
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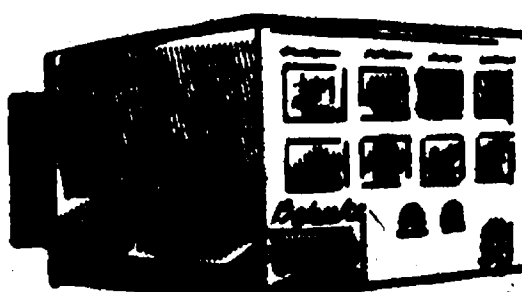


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Hamburg Township News Notes

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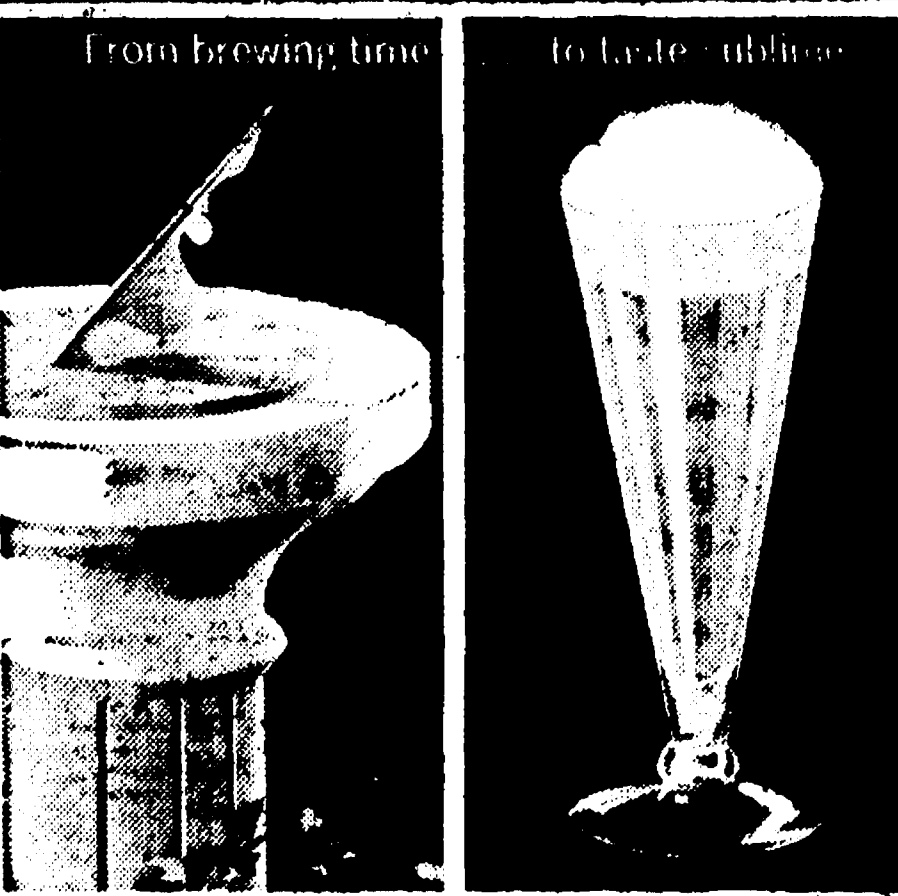

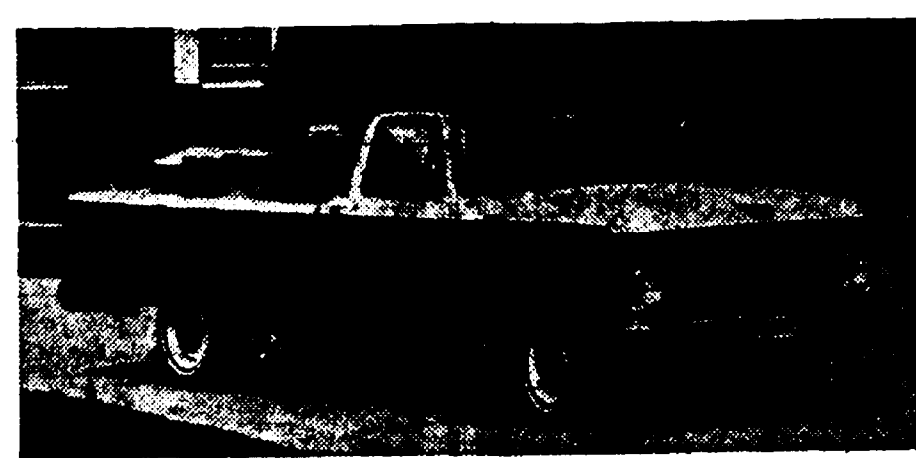

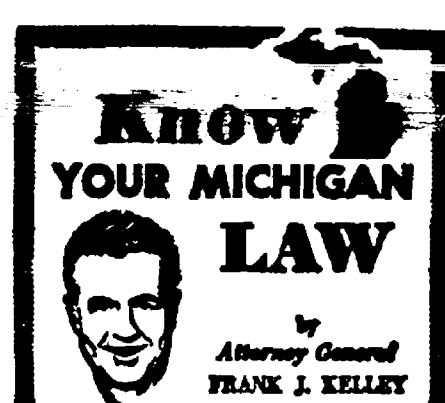

[This is a public service article explaining in general terms a provision of Michigan law. Individuals who wish to determine the effect of any law upon their private legal affairs should consult a private attorney.]

It is said to be that a good liar needed a good memory. Today, thanks to the lie detector, more properly called the polygraph the guilty criminal finds memory isn't enough.

The criminal in attempting to cover up his crime while taking a test suffers the same sensations common to all of us when we make up a story to explain why we forgot to mail a letter or run an errand.

We feel an uncomfortable rush of blood to the face, a dry mouth, at the same time we suffer an increased pulse rate, a rise in blood pressure, and then finally heavy breathing if we think we have gotten away with our story.

The lie detector records breathing, blood pressure and pulsation. It detects the changes and traces them on a graph so that the man operating the machine usually can tell when a suspected criminal is trying to deceive him. On the other hand, the operator as readily sees when an innocent man is telling the truth.

While the lie detector is estimated to be accurate in as high as 95 per cent of the cases, it requires an expert operator who knows not only the type of questions to ask, but how to measure and read the responses.

Because of this area of experience and ability required to read the results of the lie detector, courts still refuse to accept any testimony regarding a test. It cannot even be stated in court that a defendant took or refused to take a lie detector test.

In spite of this, law enforcement officials are greatly aided in investigations by this generally reliable piece of scientific equipment.

While the polygraph is a valuable tool for law enforcement agencies, it should be recognized that it may not be used in court as evidence of the guilt or innocence of the accused.

In any event, individuals who may be subjected to polygraph examinations will be counseled by their private attorney as to their rights.

The minutes of the August session were read and approved.

The Clerk read the various communications from the Auditor General's office, the East Michigan Tourist Association and the Livingston County Road Commission.

Clair W. Miller, County Drain Commissioner, gave a report on the Cedar Lake Level project, stating that the various problems involved had been cleared up and in approximately six weeks the engineering in respect to the lake level would be completed.

Supvr. Heeg arrived at this time.

Lawrence Gehring County Sheriff, addressed the Board in regards to the central base radio station to be established in the Sheriff Department for fire protection.

Mr. Leon Boyko of Motorola Communication Co., addressed the Board in respect to the Federal Communication Commission's ruling of keeping the police and fire frequencies separate.

Supvr. Lavan inquired if this entailed only the addition of a crystal to the present system. Mr. Boyko answered no, stating that going from 37.10 to 154 megacycles it required a more comprehensive change.

Supvr. Cooper asked if the Brighton Fire Department would have to have a base station. Sheriff Gehring said no, the fire trucks could be dispatched from the base station at the county Sheriff's Department.

Supvr. Engelhardt spoke in respect to the Telephone Company in regard to setting off the local fire station alarms and sirens.

Supvr. Conine, Chairman of the Civil Defense Committee addressed the Board in regards to including in the system an inter city change over system for the County Sheriff's Department, recommending this be included for the nominal cost & necessities. By doing this, the inter city change over would eliminate some costs in long distance telephone service in the County Sheriff Department.

Supvr. Heller presented the following resolution and moved its adoption, which was supported by Supvr. Cooper:

Supvr. Raddatz moved the adoption of the resolution as read on the Retention of the Issuance of Drivers' Licenses by the County Sheriff's Department, supported by Supvr. Gordon. Resolution as follows:

RESOLUTION
As recommended by the County Sheriff's Assoc.

WHEREAS it has come to the attention of this Board that an attempt will be made in the coming session of the legislature to eliminate the Sheriff's office and the City Police from the licensing procedure for operators of motor vehicles and to substitute therefore civil service personnel under control of the Secretary of State: Therefore be it

RESOLVED, that this Board opposes any such move for the following reasons:

1. It is definitely helpful, not only in the matter of enforcing traffic laws but also in all law enforcement, for each motor vehicle operator to know that, at least once in three years, he must come to the Sheriff or the City Police to have his driver's license renewed.
2. Moving this local function up to the state level would be another example of centralization and the weakening of local government.
3. There is no magic in the words "civil service", and frequently with their assured tenure regardless of performance their zeal in doing a good job would be much less than of a Deputy Sheriff or City Policeman, who must give service or lose his position.
4. The County obtains some revenue from the licensing process and the counties are not in a position to lose even this amount of revenue.
5. Mistakes in licensing, if they occur, are not a major cause of traffic accidents inasmuch as it is definitely known that the high accident rate exists among the young drivers who can pass the licensing examinations without any trouble at all, but who fail to use good judgement in the operation of motor vehicles.

And be it **RESOLVED** further, that a copy of this resolution be sent to the Governor, the Clerk of the House of Representatives, and the Secretary of the Senate.

Motion carried.

Dems and GOP Name Nominees For Canvassers

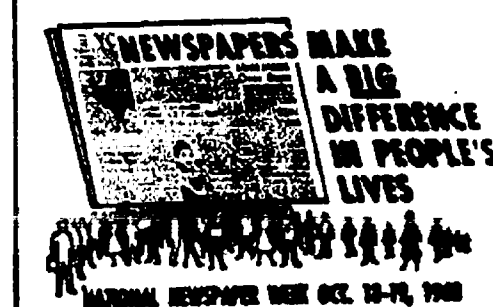
