Rev. and Mrs. William Standbridge, Jr., missionaries stationed in Italy, were the featured speakers last Thursday evening at the Beulahland Bible Conference on White-wood Road and East M-36. The Standbridges are traveling through the States on a month of intensive speaking engagements.

Rev. Standbridge, Jr. is the son of Rev. and Mrs. William Standbridge, Sr., of East M-36. The Standbridge family came to Pinckney in 1946 at which time they founded and began operating the Happy Day Camp on White-wood Road and East M-36.

After graduating from Wheaton College in Illinois and doing graduate work at Wayne State, Rev. Standbridge, Jr. came to Pinckney in 1949 on his first missionary assignment. Except for periodic speaking tours, he has lived in Italy ever since.

He has been living and working in Rome, Italy since 1953 when he founded the Berean Bible Institute which is affiliated with the Independent Faith Mission which his father established in 1950. This religious work in non-denominational. The People's Church in Pinckney are regular contributors to this mission.

The work at the Institute is largely literature work; preparing, translating, and printing leaflets, monthly newspapers and conducting correspondence courses in Italian. To better prepare himself for this work, Rev. Standbridge studied language and literature at the University of Siena in Italy.

Rev. Standbridge and his Italian wife were married in 1956. Mrs. Standbridge has a Doctor's degree from the University of Genoa and had worked as director of a religious magazine for university students in Italy. Since their marriage they have been working together at the Berean Bible Institute and feel their work has been successful. In 1963 alone they had over 6,000 new enrollees in their courses.

"More Italians are reading the Bible today than in the history of Christianity," states Rev. Standbridge. The Standbridges will return to Italy in November.

Soil Saving

Deep borings are being taken this week on the site of the proposed dam for flood control on the watershed in Fowlerville Village No. 2 County Drain. A drill rig similar to a well-drilling outfit will take borings to a depth of 20 feet for the purpose of foundation investigation.

Some laboratory tests of the soil will be made from samples. The characteristics of the soil will determine such things as the grade or slope of the earth fill or dike, above and below.

The borings are taken on the centerline of the dike. Most of the dike is planned to be located on property owned by Gale D. Dillingham, with one end on land owned by W. E. Zimmerman.

Mr. A. F. Geiger, Geologist with the Soil Conservation Service at Milwaukee, Wisconsin, was to be here to record the foundation investigation and take the samples. Karl F. Otte is the civil engineer with SCS at East Lansing who is designing the dam.

Ribbon Cutting to Open Hamburg Bridge

County Officials Invited To Witness Important Event

HOWELL — The Livingston County Road Commission will formally open the new Hamburg Road Bridge on Thursday at noon.

The Commission has invited the Roads and Bridges Committee of the Livingston County Board of Supervisors as well as all other Livingston County supervisors.

The public also is urged to attend this ribbon-cutting ceremony. The bridge is located in Hamburg Township on Hamburg Road at its crossing with the Huron River north of the village of Hamburg.

Just a year ago the old steel bridge collapsed under a school bus with children. Fortunately no one was injured.

The new bridge is of steel beams and concrete deck with aluminum rails. The entire structure is designed and constructed to preserve the natural beauty of the Huron River. The design was by the Fuller Engineering Company of Lansing.

The Federal Government, the County Board of Supervisors, and the County Road Commission financed the construction of this primary route, and the County will finance the balance of the construction.

Members of the Road Commission are Norman S. Topping, chairman; Fred Berry, and Warren H. Anderson.

Teachers Conference at Lansing

Paul L. Gardner, educational specialist for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, will address some 400 educators attending the annual Region 8 Teachers' Conference in Lansing, Thursday and Friday.

Public schools in Clinton, Shiawassee, Livingston, Ingham and Eaton counties will be closed during the two-day program sponsored by the Michigan Education Association.

Brighton public schools will remain open Thursday and Friday, but will close Oct. 17 and 18 so that teachers may attend the regional conference to be held in Ann Arbor and Detroit. "Space Science and Careers in the Space Age" will be Gardner's topic at the conference's general session, October 3 at 9:00 a.m. in the Civic Center.

Bringing greetings to the educators at the general session will be MEA President Octavian Townsend and Lynn Bartlett, state superintendent of public instruction.

Forrest Averill, Lansing superintendent of schools, will welcome the teachers and Charles E. Chamberlain, representative for Michigan's Sixth District, will be a platform guest.

"Our conference theme this year, 'Teaching — a Profession Dynamic' is both timely and timeless in import," Bartlett said. "Timely in that there has never been greater need for action, for dynamics in teaching, to keep pace with our rapidly changing world."

Letter To The Editor

Putnam Should Have Zoning

Mr. Mel Reinhard, spokesman for the Hell Chamber of Commerce, at the September Putnam Township Board Meeting, put that organization on record as being opposed to zoning in Putnam Township. Opposition to zoning is opposition to planning for the future. Without a plan for the future, Putnam Township may some day be faced with some of the following problems:

1. Fertilizer factories, glue factories, bleach or ammonia plants or hide tanning plants located anywhere or everywhere. Prevailing winds could be very offensive to surrounding homes.

2. Gas storage or explosive manufacturing plants located anywhere, perhaps even amidst residential areas or adjacent to proposed schools.

3. Pig pens, chicken coops etc., located anywhere and not restricted to agricultural areas. Problems with rats and vermin could triple.

Mr. Reinhard and the Hell Chamber of Commerce must favor any business, anywhere in the township. This group must be against a plan for community development. In short, anything that puts more money in their pockets or gets more publicity for the Hell Chamber of Commerce is good for the rest of the entire township.

I seriously doubt if Mr. Reinhard was speaking for the majority of the group. Did he tell them everything he learned at the public meeting, or did he tell them what he wanted them to know? After all, zoning provides a plan for future business and creates an atmosphere conducive to new business.

Before long, Putnam Township will be the only township left in Livingston County which has not adopted a plan for the future. All of Oakland, Washtenaw and Shiawassee counties, plus most of Genesee County are already zoned (about 60 out of 64 townships). All but 4 of 16 townships in Livingston County are now zoned.

Of the four which are not, two are taking the initial steps. Putnam is one of the two who only talk about it. When all of the areas around us are protected by a plan, every undesirable element from 79 surrounding townships will rush into Putnam Township for a free ride — no holds barred.

The Putnam Township Board has taken a giant step toward the protection of our property values by adopting an Anti-Litter Ordinance, which has long been needed.

I congratulate them!

150 New Employees Will Be Needed At Boys Training School Next Year

The Boys Training School at Whitmore Lake which is now filled to capacity with 162 boys in residence expects to accommodate about 300 more when construction, already underway, is completed by November 1964. The total capacity of the institution when finished will be 600 inmates.

There are 88 persons employed at the training school at the present time. Expansion will make job openings for approximately 150 new employees to be hired between May and late fall of next year, school officials said. These positions are under the Civil Service program.

Presently under construction is a cottage unit scheduled for completion about July 1, 1963, and an academic unit to be finished about July 30, 1964. A Central Stores and Food Service Building is to be completed in early August of 1964.

A large treatment plant must be constructed and the powerhouse must be expanded. The laundry unit is to be equipped and activated some time next summer. Another housing unit for 150 boys is scheduled for completion about

November 1964.

Remaining units planned to complete this location include another 150-bed cottage unit, a chapel, maintenance building, gymnasium, pool portion of the school building, the athletic fields

and possible two more residences.

The program at the present time is proceeding on schedule and will undoubtedly be accomplished, according to William Moxey, Jr., Deputy Superintendent.
