Final Transactions Made Concerning Shehan Property

The new high school for the Pinckney Community School district will be built on the corner of East M-36 and McGregor Roads, on the Francis Shehan property purchased for the sum of \$32,500. This is \$5,500 less than the amount (\$38,000) first requested by Shehan last fall.

This information was disclosed to the press by Board of Education secretary, Hugh Radloff, following a special meeting of the Board with Shehan, Thursday, March 26. Last fall a 10-man committee recommended the Shehan property as a suitable site for various reasons, some being for it having a two road access, because the property was relatively level, thus requiring little development, and primarily for the location of the property, centrally located in the school district. The school bond was approved January 13, 1964.

At the February 6 regular Board meeting, Gerald F. Reason, local real estate dealer, propositioned the Board with the Meyer farm property, located less than one quarter mile west of the Shehan property. Reason offered six various sites available to the Board for purchasing, averaging 50 acres each, situated in the 118 acres of land included in the Meyer property.

It was at this time the Board told Reason "at least a two road access to property was preferred." The Meyer property having only M-36 frontage did not meet this qualification.

Reason then approached the Board at the March 5 meeting with a second proposition. Reason told the Board, verbally, as well as in form of a letter—that the Meyer farm was sold and the new owner wished to sub-divide the 118 acres for residential area, and would GIVE the school a parcel of 50 acres of land with M-36 frontage—providing the Board would build a black top road surrounding the 50 acres—a road that would meet with Livingston County specifications.

Board President John Walton pointed out it is not feasible to use school money to build county roads—thus this second proposition was eliminated.

Reason said in his letter issued to each of the 7 Board members at the March 5 meeting: "My interest in this matter, as a taxpayer, is to promote the largest savings possible while maintaining equal or better quality and in the event the Shehan site can be purchased for an amount which is in direct proportion to the overall useability and cost as compared to the Meyer site, I shall have no complaint."

After lengthy discussion of the property issue at this special meeting, March 26, Jack Swanson made the motion to purchase the Shehan property for \$32,500. Lynn Kinsey seconded the motion. Swanson then made a motion to sell the "buildings, trees and shrubbery back to Shehan for the sum of \$1,000." Kinsey seconded this section. The Board passed each motion unanimously.

Board President Walton said that architect, VanderMeiden & Koteles, are presently working with the surveyors at the Shehan property. It is expected the new building will be completed by September of 1965. It will house the 10, 11 and 12th grades.

Hamburger vs Ground Beef

Will you buy hamburger or will you buy ground beef? That is your decision, but you should know the difference and know which you are buying.

An amendment to the Michigan Comminuted Meat Law describes the difference. Under the new amendment, ground beef may contain no more than 20 percent fat, while hamburger may contain no more than 30 percent fat. The balance in each case is lean skeletal meat.

Only the meat which can be removed from the bony skeletal parts is used in hamburger and ground beef. No organ or variety meats are allowed. No cereal, bread or bread crumbs can be added as in some states. No dry milk solids, no artificial color, no chemical preservatives, no thickeners, and no water or ice are allowed.

Ground meats are highly perishable. This means they should be used quickly. Puncture the outside wrap and leave the meat in the cold part of the refrigerator or remove the meat from the store paper and loosely rewrap with wax paper. Try to use hamburger and ground beef within a day after purchase. If this is not your plan, shape the meat for its intended use, wrap in foil or freezer paper, and store at zero degrees or lower.

In addition to these two co-chairmen, the division work force includes vice-chairmen, 28 section leaders, 112 captains and 448 team members. With volunteers from the Master and Special Gifts Divisions, the grand total of volunteer workers exceeds 650.

The Community band, under the direction of Bill Terhune, presented a concert between 7:30 — 8:00 p.m.

Local leaders and campaign directors agreed that last night's turn-out was one of the largest groups of people ever assembled in this area for such a project.

One of the main items of business at last night's meeting was the selection of prospect cards by the workers. Each member of the General

Gifts Division will contact approximately five individuals or family groups, seeking gifts for the recreation center fund. Campaign leaders had said earlier that this is not to be a door-to-door solicitation, but that all prospects have been carefully screened before listed. However, gifts are being invited from all residents of the city and surrounding area whether they are personally contacted or not.

The campaign for the area recreation center was initiated by the Howell Parks Foundation who conducted a two year study before embarking on the drive.

The 6,500 square foot building will be built on the old "Browning property" on West Grand River. Besides the all-purpose building, outside plans include two tennis courts, a basketball court, a volleyball court, shuffleboard courts, an archery range, a picnic and playground area and ample parking facilities.

No additional taxation is involved in the financing of the recreation center. Total cost of the project will be met through voluntary subscriptions, which are payable over a three-year pledge period.



Brighton attempted 773 field goals this past season and made 220 of them for a 28.4% season average, which is ten to twelve per cent less than needed to win.

In free throws the "Pups" attempted 541 and made 274 for a good average of 50.6% which was 4.6% above their opponents' average.

Brighton had 164 offensive fouls and 278 defensive fouls this season for a total of 316 which wasn't too bad considering their opponents had a total of 391 fouls.

The coach of the Brighton J.V. squad is Jim Korwin. A graduate of the U. of M. with a B.A. degree in Physical Education, he is well known around school because he was line coach of the Varsity football team this last fall. Before coming to Brighton, he coached basketball at University High, so the "Pups" are the second basketball team he has coached. He feels that the squad, even though it had a 5 and 11 season, played well considering it was a short team ranging in size from its smallest player, Larry Lemoria, five-foot three inches tall, to its tallest player Dick Ritter, five-foot, eleven-inches tall. They showed the other teams in the league that Brighton has some mighty fine prospects for the future teams.

It was said by many spectators this season that the J.V. games were more exciting than the varsity games, and so they were. Always in the past, Brighton's Junior Varsity has never done well losing almost all their games. This year's team showed it had real hustle by living down the J.V. curse. It was a short team with all its opponents having at least a 2-inch advantage over them at every game. What they lacked in size they made up in spirit being a closely knit group who could take it when the going got

rough. Also, they really wanted to play ball because not many people realize that this squad had to start practice at five o'clock, after the varsity vacated the gym each night so this made it close to seven-thirty before any of these boys would arrive home each night.

They could be called a hot and cold team because of the inconsistency of their victories. This showed up many times when they would lose to a team by only a few points at their encounter, but upon meeting this opponent for the second time would be beaten by a large margin. They had one star, however, who really shone in his offensive work. His name is Rick Musch, a player who led his team scoring in twelve out of fourteen encounters in which he started. In two of these games, he scored over half of his team's total points.

He didn't play the last two games of the season for the "Pups" because he was transferred to the varsity. He averaged better than fourteen points a game with a season total of two-hundred and fifteen points, better than twice his nearest teammate's total score.

The Pups played a man-to-man defense throughout the season. They did well against their taller opponents. In the opinion of the coach the best defensive players for this season's team were little Larry Lemoria who played the steadiest ball, and Pat Gilbert who was big and fast, gaining more self confidence as the season advanced.


The score book doesn't show this season as being too great, and indeed it wasn't from the win-loss standpoint; but when the experience gained by the players and the fact that they almost had a five-hundred year except for losing two games by less than four points is considered it shows that Brighton has some fine prospects for future varsity teams.

Wildlife's Homemaker



Few, if any, animals have a better winter with other wildlife than does the beaver. When this big flat-tailed rodent builds a dam along a stream, he makes more than a home for himself. He creates a whole new community for wildlife, also much to the favor of sportsmen, nature study enthusiasts, and others. Fishermen have learned that trout hole up in beaver ponds on cold-water streams. Audubonists know that dead, flooded timber in beaver ponds is often home to the great blue heron, tree swallow, woodpecker, and other birds. These ponds also rate high as duck factories. Tucked away in the forests, they are most popular among black ducks. Muskrats, mink, otter, and weasels take a liking to beaver ponds, as the pest-seeking trapper knows. Under state permits, some people use these ponds to collect such things as giant water beetles, turtles, and frog eggs which they sell to biological supply houses.
