The six Livingston County Women representing the Democratic Women's Club who joined the Michigan delegation at the 1964 Campaign Conference for Democratic Women returned late Sunday after an eventful five day trip to Washington, D. C. Attending were Mrs. William Hogan, Mrs. Harold McMacken, Jr. and Mrs. Russell Morton all of Deerfield Township and Mrs. Lloyd Hendee, Putnam, and Mrs. Lester McAfee and Mrs. Francis Shehan of Hamburg Township.

The Michigan delegation was given a military escort to Arlington cemetery where Mrs. Neil Staebler, wife of Congressman-at-large Neil Staebler, placed a wreath on the grave of the late president, John F. Kennedy. From there the group toured Washington visiting the many memorials and the Smithsonian Institute. At the Lincoln Memorial representatives of the various religions were demonstrating in support of the Civil Rights Bill. Nearby was a member of Rockwell's Nazi Party protesting the Civil Rights supporters. This was a most chilling sight. The Nazi member stood at attention in uniform and never once changed his focus.

At the opening session held that evening President Johnson addressed the women on campaign issues. He was accompanied by Mrs. Johnson who is a most striking woman, her pictures do not do her justice.

Later that evening former Michigan Governor and U.S. G. Mennen Williams outlined the state delegates at their suite in the Sheraton-Park Hotel. Also attending were the Neil Staeblers.

Friday's events included a morning on Capitol Hill as guests of the Democratic representatives. After a tour through both sides of the house, the women from Michigan attended a reception in Senator Hart's office. A May celebration and luncheon at the comfort for all the women had to be moved to the Senate garage due to the weather. The Hambley-Binkley Report carried portions of this event on their Friday evening news cast.

That evening the women attended a Gala dinner which was also attended by all Democratic office holders in Washington and their wives. Senator and Mrs. Hart held a reception at their home for the women later in the evening. Other states held various receptions at homes of their senators also.

Saturday was the highlight of the activities. The women had arranged invitations from the White House to attend a reception given by Mrs. Johnson on the south lawn of the White House. A police escort took the 3,500 women by bus from the hotel. Perfect weather, which President Johnson revealed later he and his family had ordered for the day, enhanced the landscaping on the grounds. The American Light Opera Company performed selections from "Guys and Dolls" and "South Pacific." They were accompanied by the Navy Band. The women were again addressed by the President and Mrs. Johnson and their daughter, Lucy. Mrs. McAfee and Mrs. Shehan were two of the lucky ladies who shook hands with the president. Colorful canopies on the lawn held reception tables where the women dined on finger sandwiches, cookies, pastries, coffee and punch.

A side trip to Georgetown attended by our three local ladies from Putnam and Hamburg was enjoyed and they were delighted to find little John Kennedy playing with a dog outside his home awaiting his nurse as they prepared to leave for the country. They also visited historic shops and viewed the Inaugural gowns of the First Ladies and a display of America's past history.

Saturday evening the women dined at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Clare Hendee in Chevy Chase, Maryland. Mr. Hendee is a Pinckney Hometown boy now employed by the government in Washington.

Sunday included a trip through the mountains and visiting antique shoppes. The ladies will have slides available for showing later in the month.

## Post Office Writes Money Orders On Saturdays

The nation wide service adjustment ordered by Postmaster General John A. Gronouski have been modified as they pertain to the smaller Post Offices across the nation. Postmaster Lawrence Baughn announced today.

Mr. Baughn explained that misunderstanding about the scope of the changes prompted the new action. The only part of the original order that effected the Pinckney office was that pertaining to Saturday money order service.

About 20,000 of the small offices across the nation will continue issuing money orders on Saturdays because to do so will have no effect on manpower usage. All rural carriers will continue to accept money order applications. Offices issuing orders on Saturday will dispatch these orders on the day they are received but at the larger city offices the rural money order applications will be handled early Monday.

Postmaster Baughn said, "The Pinckney Post Office will issue money orders as usual on Saturdays."

## Pinckney Post Office Adds New Rural Route

In announcing the addition of a third rural route from the Pinckney Post Office Postmaster Lawrence Baughn said, "The establishment of the additional route will enable this office to provide better service to our rural patrons."

The change will be made Saturday, May 9, 1964. Notices are being prepared informing each patron to which route they will be assigned and asking that mail be addressed to their new rural route as well as to street and number.

The new route number 3 will be served by Henry E. Murphy and route number 2 which Mr. Murphy has served since 1947 will become vacant and be served by a substitute carrier until a regular appointment is made by the Post Office Department Division of Rural Appointments.

Substitute rural carrier Norman B. Miller has been appointed as temporary carrier for route number 2. Mr. Miller has served as sub rural carrier for more than 21 years. His first appointment being on April 5, 1929. He served until May of 1929 when other interests required his attention. He returned to a Sub-Carrier position in May 1932 and has served continuously since that time.

In further comment the Postmaster said, "The move to 3 routes is actually an economy measure. Our 2 routes were so large that they required the payment of overtime or heavy duty as well as auxiliary assistants in the office. The three routes will allow extension of service in our growing community without the payment of overtime to do so."

Loomis, "Paris in the Terror" - recreates the reign of terror in Paris from an intensely personal and intensely alive account of the chief performers Marat, Charlotte Corday, Danton, Mme. Roland, Robespierre and Camille Desmoullins. As history and biography the book is superb.

Forsee, "Albert Einstein Theoretical Physicist" - portrays Einstein as a great man and a great scientist who questioned the traditional theory of gravitation and the relation between time and space and who fled to the United States to escape Nazism in Germany.

LeCarre, "The Spy Who Came In From The Cold" is a thriller by a British servant. The leading character has a mission to trap the top spy of Eastern Berlin. The book is significant in its actuality and political outlook.

Wildier, "Wind from the Carolinas" - a story of a loyal Tory family who migrated from Carolina with everything they possessed after the American Revolution, to Barbados to try to raise cotton as on their former plantation. Each generation had to meet the challenge of adversity until another means of livelihood was found.

## Hudson Mills Wild Flowers Now In Bloom

One of the features of Hudson Mills Metropolitan Park along the Huron River northwest of Ann Arbor is the "Acorn" Nature Trail.

Bill Hopkins, chief naturalist for the Huron-Clinton Metropolitan Authority, states that this trail is in a heavily wooded area and quite different from the trails familiar to Washtenaw County and Detroit area residents visiting Kensington Metropolitan Park near Brighton or Lower Huron Metropolitan Park near Belleville.

Acorn Nature Trail is 1 1/4 mile in length and edges the waters of the Huron River and plant life is labelled so that persons may take self-guided hikes. Hopkins said that by May 15 the Flowering Dogwood should be in bloom as well as many wild-flowers such as Trillium, May Apple and Woodland Phlox. Birdlife is especially interesting in this area.

Many persons visiting Hudson Mills enjoy strolling along the Huron River and the park is known for its scenic appeal, wildflowers, wooded areas and wildlife that inhabit the area.

**John Fitzgerald Kennedy Stamp Issued May 29**

The John Fitzgerald Kennedy memorial postage stamp was created by one of the nation's top design firms, Postmaster General John A. Gronouski announced today, as photographs of the stamp design were made public.

The 5-cent stamp will be issued nationwide May 29, the 47th birthday anniversary of the late president. First day ceremonies for the stamp will be in Boston. It is a blue-gray stamp in horizontal format, with an initial print order of 250 million, double the customary production of commemorative stamps.

The stamp combines an informal portrait of Mr. Kennedy and a reproduction of the eternal flame on the Kennedy grave. Circling the stamp is a quotation from the inaugural address of 1961 "... the glow from that flame can truly light the world."

This is the design that Mrs. Jacqueline Kennedy and members of the Kennedy family chose from a portfolio of 16 proposals submitted by the Lowey/Snaith organization.

Within hours after the assassination of President Kennedy on November 22, 1963, artists in the Bureau of Engraving and Printing were rough sketching preliminary designs for a memorial stamp.

President Johnson immediately conferred with Postmaster General Gronouski about the stamp and asked him to work closely with Mrs. Kennedy and members of the Kennedy family.

The quotation that appears on the stamp "... and the glow from that fire can truly light the world" was suggested by Robert J. Jones, a fellow artist in the Bureau of Engraving and Printing.

The full sentence from the Kennedy inaugural address is: "The energy, the faith, the devotion which we bring to this endeavor will light our country and all who serve it—and the glow from that fire can truly light the world."

This statement followed an appeal by President Kennedy to Americans to join him in fighting the "common enemies of man—tyranny, poverty, disease and war itself."

Four days after the assassination, the Post Office Department received from the Bureau of Engraving and Printing eight Kennedy stamp designs.

The artists examined hundreds of photographs of John Fitzgerald Kennedy, searching for one that would best capture the character and personality of the late President. The chosen photograph was discovered by Designer Seno who found it by accident in an advertisement in the Bergen (New Jersey) Evening Record. It is a full face photograph. The designers felt that this picture conveyed personal warmth and vitality.

The artists prepared 16 finishing designs in vertical and horizontal format, all based on the eternal flame, a portrait and quotation.

In mid-February the portfolio was submitted to Mrs. Kennedy by LeMoyné Billings, of New York, a family friend. She expressed a preference for one design. Postmaster General Gronouski approved her

choice and instructed the designers to submit further color studies.

This done, Mr. Barrick, of the Bureau of Engraving and Printing, went to Lowey/Snaith on March 13 to pass on the feasibility of the design from a printing production point of view. Mr. Gronouski approved the design March 17.

Minerals figure heavily in Michigan's over-all economy each year. In 1963, production of these natural resources jumped to \$478 million in value to hit a new high for the state. Last year's output was paced by iron ore operations (top, right) which reached \$98.2 million in mining returns. Next in value were cement \$82 million; copper, \$46.3 million; and petroleum (bottom), \$45.7 million. Some \$42.4 million worth of sand and gravel (top, left) was produced to rate fourth in the march of mineral dollars. Latest rankings list Michigan as the No. 1 state in production of natural salines and peat. Nation-wide, it places second in iron ore, sand and gravel, lime, and gypsum; third in marl; and fourth in cement and salt.—Mich. Dept. of Conservation

## Four Receive De Molay High Honors


