### Modern Math Adopted By Pinckney Schools

Richard McCloskey, math instructor at P.H.S., recently attended a National Council of Teachers of Mathematics Convention at Miami Beach, Florida. The entire convention was aimed in particular at the implementing of modern mathematics in public school systems.

Mr. McCloskey made a report to the Board of Education last Thursday night and outlined a plan to make the switch to modern math as smooth as possible. This includes a Pre-Service Institute for Elementary teaching of Mathematics in the Pinckney school system, and will start next fall, the 1964-65 school year. This planning of the institute is still underway, and it is intended that it will carry college credit for those who participate. It will be designed to give the elementary teachers a broad view of the changes in mathematics and help strengthen their background in this field.

Beginning the school year of 1965-66, all students will be engaged in the study of modern mathematics. Students at the elementary have had some instruction into the New Math this past year, and this will continue throughout the coming year.

Another In-Service Institute is being planned along with the introduction of the new materials to help the teacher with problems that may arise at a particular grade level.

### Hell Chamber of Commerce Donates Land For Boy Scouts

The Portage Trail Council, Boy Scouts of America, of Ann Arbor executives have accepted the offer of the Hell Chamber of Commerce for use of 100 acres of camping area in Satans Hills. Lucile Reinhard, president of the Chamber will also deed a parcel of land on Kelly Road in this area to the Scouts for a terminus for their two day hiking programs through Washtenaw and Livingston Counties.

In addition, Devils Island in Hi-Land Lake will be turned over exclusively to the Scouts for use in their canoeing trips thru the chain of Nine Lakes, which terminate at the Dam in Hell, Michigan.

This area is an excellent one for summer recreation purposes and many families of the 1,000 scouts will take advantage of the facilities at Bruin, Half Moon and Silver Lakes operated by the State of Michigan nearby. It is planned to open Half Moon Lake State Park early this summer for the first time to the public. It is accessible from the dividing line of Hell at Glen Brook and Patterson Lake Rd. or from North Territorial Road on the South.

Hell, Michigan is the hub of a rapidly expanding Recreation Area. The Girl Scouts of Detroit will develop a camp over a square mile of land, six miles to the North of Hell. Bishop Lake is another New State Park that is developing into an ideal summer sports center. The Hell Chamber estimates over 100,000 visitors will be entertained this summer.

It is believed the parade this year will surpass the super colossal two-hour parade of last year which featured six bands, 100 motorcyclists, Boy Scouts, Mariners, American Legion, Navy Mothers, 4-H Clubs and many, many more clubs and organizations.

The Famous Shawano Indian Dancers who put on such a stirring tribal dance at the conclusion of last year's event are expected to duplicate their performance next Saturday.

Marching bands from Brighton, Howell, Hartland, Milford, South Lyon, and Pinckney have been asked to participate. The Livingston County Sheriff's posse, units from the National Guard, Civil Air Patrol Drill Unit, Hamburg Fire Department, Brighton Barracudas, and DeLuca and Fisher Farms are expected to appear.

A 1913 electric auto will travel the parade route through the courtesy of the Detroit Edison Company. The motorcycle equipped with sidecar that was used by General Rommel in World War II will be an extra added attraction.

Beauty queens will adorn the turned-down tops of convertibles; floats will be entered from all sections of the county, coming from Hartland, Brighton, Howell, Fowlerville, Pinckney, and Hell; civic, religious, and industrial groups





Kimble further reported that the Bank will hold its formal dedication ceremonies at 9:00 A.M. Monday, June 1, marking its 54th anniversary, with a Public Showing including tours and refreshments, scheduled for June 4, at 7:30 P.M. Several preview showings are scheduled prior to the Public Showing. The new building represents two years of planning and construction, and is part of an overall expansion program which began with a new branch office in Hamburg, Michigan, a neighboring community, in August of 1953. Deposits of the bank had more than tripled in the past 10 year period.

The Banks Installment Loan Department, which at the present time is located in a separate building, will now be housed in the Main Bank Building and under supervision of Mr. H. D. Haughton, Assistant Cashier who will replace Mr. W. J. Probst, Vice President. Mr. Probst will be in charge of commercial loans. The new tri-level building will feature among many things, two drive-in windows, a community room, staff lounge and carpeting throughout the entire first floor. Also featured will be an elevated television set mounted in the main lobby, and FM music throughout the building.

The face of the building is done in antique white shadow brick, which sets off the four black marble columns encasing the main entrance and the entire building is capped with gold anodized aluminum. The Main entrance features a circular drive with parking for fourteen cars and a small landscaped island. Additional parking for 32 cars will be found to the side and rear of the building. The paved rear parking area will be landscaped with a water fountain and benches for customer relaxation.

(Cont. from Page 1) the flowers on the streets that day, we will be aiding the war's living victims by the contribution we make for the flower.

The poppies which we will wear on Poppy Days are not, of course, natural flowers from the battlefields. They are flowers which have even greater significance than nature could produce. They have been made in hospitals and work rooms where war's suffering still is going on. They have bloomed under the hands of men disabled in war — the comrades of those in whose honor they will be worn. Their petals are only paper and their stems wire, yet into them has been breathed the spirit of patriotic sacrifice, the spirit of those days when life itself was not too much to give for America.

The disabled veterans who make the poppies derive double benefits from the work. First, it gives them employment — their only chance to help support themselves and families. With strength and health gone they cannot do regular work, but they can make poppies. Even in their hospital bed they can do this work, earning money for each flower they make. Second the work is of real value in aiding their recovery, occupying hands and minds, breaking the tedium of long idleness, and restoring spirits crushed by hopelessness.

that 47 per cent goes to the State Highways for use on state highways, 35 per cent to the State's 83 counties for use on county roads, and 18 per cent to 519 incorporated cities and villages for their roads and streets.

Under this formula, the State Highway Department will receive \$43,211,243 as its share of the first quarter collections, while the counties will receive \$32,178,385 and the incorporated cities and villages will get \$16,548,987.



## County Special Education Program Expanding Rapidly

Director of Special Education, James N. Barker, reports that next year there will be an increase in special education personnel working out of the county office as well as the opening of additional classrooms for the mentally handicapped. Barker, who was employed as Director July 1, 1963, by the County Board of Education, states that "we have made a vigorous effort this past year to establish new programs and expand existing ones." According to Barker, much of the success of the program has been due to the cooperative efforts of school administrators in the K-through-12 school districts in Livingston County.

**Establishment of Special Education Advisory Committee**  
This committee, established in July 1963, consists of the five superintendents of schools within the county and a representative from the county office. Superintendent of the Fowlerville Community Schools, John S. Munn serves as chairman of the Committee with Director of Special Education Barker serving as Secretary. The primary responsibility of this committee is to recommend policy to the County Board of Education. Matters affecting both local district and county office operation are reviewed cooperatively.

"Since a local district and the County Board must work cooperatively toward the development of the most effective educational programming for the handicapped, not only within a given school district but within the county as a whole, the establishment of a Special Education Advisory Committee is of prime importance to the total program," says Barker.

**Speech Therapy Program**  
One of the main areas of progress has been the speech therapy program. Last year Brighton was the only school district in the county providing this service. During the current school year all school districts in the county have been provided with this service with over 400 pupils receiving speech therapy. The program is staffed by three speech therapists, Miss Sybil Piersma, Mrs. Sue Shalor, and Miss Elizabeth Stamos, who work out of the County office and co-operate with the local districts in administering the program. Director of Special Education Barker reports that there are approximately 300 pupils in Livingston County needing speech therapy service, therefore, with Brighton becoming a part of the county-wide program, the county staff will be increased from three to a total of five therapists for next school year.

**Programs for the Mentally Handicapped**  
According to the 1963 incidence figures published by the Michigan Department of Public Instruction Livingston County has approximately 163 "Type A" educable and 24 "Type B" trainable mentally handicapped children.  
1. Type "A" — The following school districts currently have Type A programs in operation: Howell, one classroom with 15 pupils; Hartland, one classroom with 15 pupils; and Fowlerville, one classroom with 20 pupils.

In September, 1964, two new classrooms will be opened at the Hamburg Elementary School in Hamburg. These two classrooms were built with the aid of County special education funds and will service Type A mentally handicapped children from the Pinckney School District and possibly some from the Brighton School District.

Plans are currently under study by the County Board of Education and the Howell Board of Education regarding the building of Type "A" classrooms in Howell.  
2. Type "B" — At the present time there are no facilities being provided by the County Board of Education for children in this category. The Rickett School and the Howell State Hospital both operate programs for trainable children.

3. Type "C" — The Type C Consultant serves those children who are educable mentally handicapped but who are functionally in the regular classroom with consultant help given to the teacher and parents. Last year Type C Consultant services were made available to approximately 35 children. Because of the shortage of personnel in this area, no services were provided during the present school year.  
4. Diagnostician — The services of a School Diagnostician for the mentally handicapped have been provided to all public school districts in the county during the current school year. Prior to December 15, 1963, 33 children were tested and screened in the Howell Public Schools to determine eligibility for placement in the Type A room. Testing is now being planned for children in the Pinckney and Brighton School districts to determine those qualifying for

placement in the two new Type A classroom at Hamburg. Teacher of the Homebound and Hospitalized  
This is a new service which will be provided next year for the first time. Up to the present time no homebound or hospitalized teaching service have been provided in the County. Director of Special Education Barker reports that Miss Deborah Gussin of Ann Arbor has been employed as a teacher in this area and will start teaching next September. Children who qualify for this service must be certified by a physician as being physically unable to attend the public schools.

**Need for Additional Teachers and Classrooms**  
One of the areas of greatest need is the visiting teacher service, however, due to the shortage of qualified personnel, it has been impossible to start the visiting teacher program. There is a need for three visiting teachers for next school year. The V.T. works with those children who are emotionally disturbed and socially maladjusted.  
Barker reports that when a full staff is acquired in all areas of special education, there will be a total of 15 special teachers working out of the county office, and about the same number of special teachers working out of the county office, and about the same number of special teachers will be required to staff the special classrooms for mentally handicapped in the various school districts throughout the county. He further states that Livingston County probably has the need and potential to maintain one classroom for physically handicapped children, which should be centrally located in the county. The development of such a classroom is currently under study by the Director of Special Education.

**STILL MUCH TO BE DONE**  
Barker reports that "Even though we feel substantial progress has been made over the past year, there is still much to be done. The efforts of those who originally started this program are to be credited."



The boys on the team are, Richard Musch, Mike Lueker, Tim Pearsall, Bob Witting, and Hank Gordon.





# Complete Report of Brighton School Site Committee

The following is the complete report presented April 6 to the board of education of the Brighton Area Schools by the Brighton Area School Site Committee. This group was appointed two months ago after the board had grappled with the high school site problem since last fall and felt the need of additional help. Meetings were held weekly by the committee on seven successive Mondays. During the time they consulted with experts in the field of site selection and educational requirements.

To the Brighton Area School Board:  
We are enclosing a complete file of our minutes, together with other factual information, which outlines our study of possible sites suggested by the Board and various committee members.

The site selected is the Leith property. This decision is supported by all members of this committee.

The properties under consideration were: the Leith property, the Trebesh property, extension of the Miller School site, Meyer property, Weber property, Howell estate (with Robertson property), Hawkins School site, and Flint Road site.

In this summary report, we thought it advisable to go into more detail in regard to the Trebesh and Miller site, in addition to the Leith property, because at various times during our deliberations these sites received strong support from many of our members.

We realize that the purpose of this committee was to recommend a specific high school site, however our investigation and round table discussions did develop some interesting ideas which we believe should be helpful to the School Board and benefit the community. We hope you will not consider that we have exceeded our authority by including this information in

the form of recommendations at the end of this report.

The first investigated was the Miller site. It was noted that the present Miller School building has been long committed to elementary use. If it were to become a part of a new school, a rather undesirable relocation of present elementary pupils would be required. Because of the loss of 12 elementary rooms, it is possible that the district would be faced with the need to expand our primary facilities before the new school is even occupied.

The present Miller School building seems to be most suitable for expansion at some future date, to a more adequate elementary unit, by adding a multi-purpose room, and regular or special class rooms.

The possibility of expanding the present Miller site to the rear and east and constructing a 31 station high school independent of the present building was fully explored. The wooded area and land contour could be considered a natural barrier between the two buildings. We found that it would be difficult to acquire sufficient land at a reasonable price to accommodate a good out-of-doors educational and recreational program and still have room for possible future expansion.

A good site as now recommended by the state and professional school people, should have a minimum of 40 acres. The reason for this recommendation is fully explained in the minutes covering our discussion meetings.

We found in our investigation that the Brighton City Sanitary Sewer Distribution System is now operating to capacity and we were told that due to the present inadequate 8" mains covering most of the city, a proposed high school would not be permitted to connect into any of these 8" mains.

This means that the school district would be required to stand the cost of installing a new line, bypassing most of the present mains. To comply with this requirement would increase the ultimate cost of the Miller site to a prohibitive figure.

Excessive development costs, principally sewer and water make the Weber and Meyer property impractical.

The Hawkins site was considered too far from the city, multiplying sewer and water costs and creating annexation problems.

The Howell estate property, even with the acquisition of the Robertson acreage is an extremely long and narrow strip, difficult to develop and use efficiently.

The Flint Road site was investigated and this committee supports the Board's decision to abandon this site.

The Trebesh site was favored by many of our committee members as the possible cost

of providing sewer and water to the site appeared reasonable.

However, other costs are not too easy to determine. The asking price of land appeared excessive and would require an appraisal and/or condemnation proceedings. Absentee ownership, cost of securing right-of-way to Brighton Lake Road and road building cost from both Brighton Lake Road and Rickett Road to building site is difficult to estimate.

The Leith property has sufficient acreage with good site characteristics, level land areas for building and athletic field, interesting natural beauty, including a small lake which will be of value in an out-of-doors educational program. Water from the lake can be used for non-drinking purposes, which will greatly reduce the school water bill.

The cost to provide sewer and water will be lower than any other site. Present ranch house dwelling and large quonset type barn on the property can be used by the school district as administrative offices, and for bus maintenance and storage facilities.

The cost of the property is well established (written offer of sale by owner, Donald Leith, Sr.) and less guess work in estimating sewer costs.

We recommend a market value appraisal be made to the school board of the land and existing buildings. We understand that the purchase price of the land includes the removal of unwanted fruit trees. This cost should, also be determined so that actual per acre cost will be known to compare with similar land in the area.

In our study, we explored the possibility of securing Federal Aid for the planning, purchase, and development of school sites but like most Federal assistance programs considerable "redtape" and delays could be anticipated. It was estimated on good authority that it would take as much as three years before actual funds would be available, other than for planning, so this approach was not seriously considered at this time.

This committee believes that this source of assistance should not be overlooked and recommends that the board investigate the use of Federal Funds, to plan and develop the Leith site. It is possible that some of the cost for sewers, water, roads, and landscaping could be recovered. A list of pertinent Federal Acts with the names and addresses of the administering personnel are included with the minutes.

Basically, we understand that in order to come under these acts, there must be community participation, involving other governmental units in addition to the School Boards.

A new high school will be the largest project our area will undertake for some time to come, to get the maximum use and enjoyment out of this facility, the site could be developed in cooperation with the city and townships to include a park area to provide recreational, cultural and educational opportunities after school hours and during the summer months.

Our high school students, themselves, would certainly benefit through an enriched out-of-doors education program.

The school site committee

recognizes that cost of providing or improving access roads, sewer lines and water lines should be the responsibility of the entire School District rather than asking the City of Brighton residents to stand the entire cost of these needed improvements. In this way the cost would be prorated equitably throughout the community.

Our study brought out the fact that there is a grave lack of communication between the School Board, City Council, Water and Sewer Commission and the Townships which will continue to cause unnecessary programs in selecting a school site.

We recommend that a permanent planning council be formed, composed of representatives of the city, township governments, and the School Board, to work together in producing a master plan, including the development of the present school sites, location of future sites, extension of sewers and water, road and other civic improvements. Dr. Howard McCluskey of the Bureau of School Services, University of Michigan can be of considerable help in the formation of such a community council.

We believe the School Board should take the initiative in forming a council as the school district is a common interest to all citizens involved. In this way, our area can develop in an orderly and efficient way, with each government unit occupying its proper place in a master plan for the benefit of the whole community.






