"Stumbling Blocks, or Stepping Stones" is the title of Dr. Roe's speech. The ceremonies will be held on the Veteran Memorial athletic field at the high school if weather permits. Dr. Roe, professor of education and chairman of the administration area of the College of Education at Michigan State, joined the MSU staff in October 1952. He has received the B.A. degree at Western Michigan, an M.A. degree and Ph. D. degree at the University of Michigan. He has held teaching and administrative positions in the State of Michigan. He was co-author, with the late Lee M. Thurston, of a book, "State School Administration." He has authored other publications. Presently



he is serving as editor of the Michigan Secondary School Principals Journal. Dr. Roe has just completed a text book entitled "School Business Management."

New School To Be Named After Pinckney Resident

Wylie Intermediate School will be the name given the nearly completed Dexter Community School. This announcement was made last week by the Dexter Board of Education. A formal dedication is planned for this coming fall. This name is in memory and appreciation of the late Dr. W. C. Wylie, who practiced medicine in Dexter for 48 years, and honoring his widow, Mrs. Lillian Wylie, who taught in the Dexter system for 19 of her 40 year teaching career. Mrs. Wylie at present resides in Pinckney at 223 South Mill Street. She is well-known for her "subbing" in the Pinckney Community School district, since her full-time retirement two years ago. It was said of Mrs. Wylie at that time "Her love for children, her ability to instill a desire to learn in children, devotion to her position, her untiring patience and her continued efforts to better prepare herself for her profession have made her a master teacher." The former Lillian Evers, she married John Wylie, a farmer, in 1909. They had four sons, Kenneth, Hollis, Fred and J. Reynolds, all of whom are still living. In 1919, John Wylie died "with the flu." His widow had not finished her education, but she knew she wanted to teach. With the help of her mother who cared for her children and her father and brother who helped her with the farming, she was able to attend Pinckney High school and later East-

ern Michigan. In 1922 she began what was to be a 40-year career. It was at the Green District School in Livingston county. She went to Gregory then in Unadilla township to teach in 1923, and was one of the many affected by the bank holiday a few years later. In spite of salaries being withheld, she insisted that her pupils must be taught, and she went on with dedicated work. In 1941 she went to Putnam township to teach, and by 1942 she returned to Green — some of her pupils were children of those she taught in her early career days. In 1942, Mrs. Wylie married her first husband's brother, Dr. W. C. Wylie. He had started in 1900 to practice medicine in Dexter, and in 1950 when he was 82, he was still in the same building and still Dexter's only doctor. The Wylie home and office at the corner of Broad St. was torn down two years ago to make way for the modern IGA Foodliner that stands there now. Dr. Wylie was a director of the bank and president of it for many years, as well as a member of the Board of Education and health officer for the village. He had started out as a school teacher. As was said in an article in The Leader at the time of Dr. Wylie's 80th birthday celebration "A man can do a heap of doctoring in 48 years and there are a lot of people who appreciate what has been done..."

TB Skin Testing June 8-9

TB skin testing early this month in Fowlerville and Pinckney shows that at least one out of every four adults is infected with tuberculosis, it was reported today, as plans were made for similar tests in Brighton and Howell.

The Michigan Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease Association, state Christmas Seal agency, cooperating with Livingston County health authorities and others in arranging skin testing for adults, revealed the results of the Fowlerville-Pinckney survey.

Of 1,099 persons tested and read, there were 225 who showed "positive" reactions, indicating they harbored tubercle bacilli in their bodies, the MTRDA said.

Chest x-rays were given those with a "positive" reaction to determine whether or not the disease is active and therefore might be transmitted to others. Results of the x-rays will be announced later.

In Fowlerville, 912 persons were tested, 843 returned to be examined, and of these 156 showed skin test reactions indicating they were infected.

In Pinckney, of 187 who received the tests, 156 returned for examination and of these, 50 were declared "positive."

The Fowlerville - Pinckney results were announced as plans were made for intensive effort in the Brighton and Howell areas to marshal widespread participation in the tests by all persons 18 years of age and older. Those under 21 and unmarried will be required to have parental permission slips signed.

The details for door-to-door canvassing to encourage Brighton-Howell area residents to take advantage of the free service offered by the Livingston County Health Department and the Michigan Department of Health in cooperation with other agencies were discussed at a meeting in Southeastern Ele-

mentary School on May 19. George Wickstrom, M. D. Livingston County Health Director, told some 30 volunteers who will spearhead the drive that the county's share for the cost of tuberculosis hospitalization of residents last year was approximately \$19,000.

He emphasized the value of the test as an indicator regarding infection and the importance to the individual of knowing whether or not he was infected.

The group also saw the movie "Town Against TB," a documentary showing how a New Jersey community mobilized in an all-out effort to combat the disease.

Other organizations sponsoring the detection campaign are the Home Demonstration Clubs, the Farm Bureau Women's Committee, the Howell Junior Chamber of Commerce Auxiliary, the Ingham County Health Department and the Livingston County Medical Society.

Mayor Clifton W. Heller, of Howell, has been named honorary chairman of the campaign in his community.

The skin tests will be offered in Brighton on June 8-9 and in Howell on June 15-16. Schedule details will be published next week.

The officers for the ninth grade will be elected at the beginning of next year.



Postal Workers Count Livestock

Postmaster Lawrence Baughn announced today that rural mail carriers distributed June 1, 1964, Livestock Survey cards to farmer patrons on their routes last week.

The Post Office assists the U. S. Department of Agriculture each year in making this and two other surveys.

Livestock cards returned by farmers to their carriers will be mailed direct to the Michigan Agricultural Statistics Reporting Service in Lansing. Information from each card, will then be tabulated and combined with other reports to give indications of changes in livestock on Michigan farms. These indications will be used to establish estimates of the current milk and egg productions, the 1964 calf crop, lamb crop, wool production and spring pig crop as well as plans for fall farrowing.

"If you have found in your mailbox a card titled Livestock Survey June 1, 1964, don't put it aside. It was placed there by your carrier who asks your cooperation," Postmaster Baughn said.

He urges the card be filled out carefully and returned to the carrier as soon as possible. "It is important that you return the card for your farm since only a given number of farmers received these cards, and your community will be represented according to the number of cards returned," said the Postmaster.

Carriers helping with this survey are: Gorman Kelly Route one, Norman Miller Route two, Henry Murphy Route three.

The beautiful symbol was first instituted on February 22, 1837, by Michigan's first governor, Stevens T. Mason, the "Boy Governor of Michigan." He presented the first Michigan flag to a state militia body known as the "Brady Guards" in Detroit, then capital of Michigan.




The defeat pushed Brighton's record to a 5-10 record. The loss doomed the Bulldogs' last chance of getting a .500 season.



Safer Highways Will Prevent Fatal Accidents

When more than 43,000 people are killed by automobiles in one year (1963), tragedy has visited a lot of people who were friends and family of the dead. Another tragedy is that many of those deaths could have been prevented by safer highways, but weren't.

No one pretends that all fatalities can be prevented. But, even efforts to reduce their number — to convince people to drive MORE safely — has resulted in people driving LESS safely. The accident rate per 100,000 people has increased in each of the past two years.

If we're going to prevent accidents we would be wise to await more persuasive mass communications before trying to convince people to drive safely, and, meanwhile, concentrate upon improving highway environment.

Collisions between vehicles would become rare if opposing directions of traffic flow were separated by space, and by barriers; if intersections were eliminated by overpasses; if direct access to highways from adjoining property was avoided. Interstate highways incorporate all these safety features.

The number of injuries and deaths resulting from increasing off-the-road accidents could be reduced by wider lanes; wide shoulders; protection of all physical obstructions such as light posts by guard rails; wide bridges, and straighter curves.

Traffic engineers generally agree that light, too, prevents accidents and protects pedestrians. The well-lighted streets of some cities give the lie to the complaint by cities with dark streets that light costs too much. A far greater cost is property damage and the potential productivity of traffic accident victims.

There's no doubt that highways can be made safer. Now it's a matter of balancing money against human life and determining which weighs the most.
