Kinsey and Collier Re-elected To Board

Lyle J. Kinsey and O. Bond Collier were re-elected to office in the June 8 school election for the Pinckney Community School district. Kinsey received 70 votes from each of the two precincts, a total of 140 votes in all, while Collier received 73 votes from Precinct 2, and 73 votes from Precinct 1, a total of 143 votes.

Those who received votes as "write-ins" are Harry Frost, three votes; John Burg, one; Merwin Campbell, one; Howard Thayer, one; James Janowski, one. In Precinct II, Jack Swanson received one vote; A. R. Hoeft, one, and Mr. Vasher, one.

SOUTH LYON
South Lyon School District voters turned down two proposals Monday for bonding for high schools, the fourth defeat within a year's time. One proposal was for a \$1,600,000 high school, the other a \$425,000 addition to the present high school.

WHITMORE LAKE
Voters in Whitmore Lake approved a \$850,000 bond issue to finance a new high school. A companion proposal to build a \$230,000 gymnasium was defeated 336 to 301.

HOWELL
Howell voters approved a school tax of 2 1/2 mills for operating purposes. Three incumbent board members were re-elected.

Require Nominating Petitions For County Party Delegates

County Clerk Joseph H. Ellis has informed The Argus that several changes have been made in regard to conditions involving the primary election to be held this year Sept. 1.

New legislation signed by Governor Romney May 27 brings Livingston county under the same section of the election laws as Wayne and other larger counties with respect to the election of county convention delegates.

Which means that to be elected a county convention delegate from your precinct you must file petitions with the county clerk to have your name placed on the September primary ballot.

Previously in counties the size of Livingston, county convention delegates were elected by write-in in only at the primary.

The deadline for filing of petitions with the county clerk is 4 p.m. July 14.

"It would seem to me if every family gave just one buck, you would have plenty of money year after year, to celebrate and commemorate our Nations greatest day.



Are Your Plants "Anemic"?

Both plants and people are living organisms, dependent on certain nutrients for growth and well being.

Scientists have long known that nitrogen, phosphorus, potassium, calcium, magnesium and sulfur are necessary for plant health. The need for certain micronutrients — such as iron, manganese, copper and zinc — is a more recent discovery. Only trace amounts of these minerals are needed, but without them plants suffer and eventually die.

The most common micronutrient deficiency is a lack of iron, called iron chlorosis or "anemia". Iron chlorosis can be found in plants all over the country, but there are some areas where most untreated plants suffer this condition. For example, in the West plants find it difficult to get all the iron they need from the soil, and in the East iron chlorosis often results from worn out soils.

Pale green or yellow young leaves is one of the major symptoms of iron chlorosis. Another sign to look for is fewer and smaller blossoms.

Iron deficiency can best be corrected with a type of chemical called a "chelate" (pronounced key-late). One of the most widely used chelates is Sequestrene, a development of Geigy Agricultural Chemicals. Available as a powder, it can be dissolved for application with a sprayer or used undiluted directly on the soil. Either way, it will bring iron-starved plants back to a normal glow of health.

Howell Man Regains Sight Through Gift of Eye Cornea

By a miracle of modern surgery, Clyde W. Allis has regained the sight of his left eye.

An operation at the University of Michigan Hospital in Ann Arbor removed Allis from the ranks of the handicapped and enables him to continue his position as operator of the Howell Co-op grain elevator at the peak of efficiency.

Allis' eye, damaged in an accident, functions normally as result of transportation of a cornea from a Brighton donor. The transplantation was implemented through the Michigan Eye Collection Center, a non-profit organization sponsored by the university with co-operation of physicians throughout the state and Lion Clubs.

Within two hours of death eyes are removed from donors and dispatched by law enforcement officials to Ann Arbor in scientific containers for transfer to waiting patients, who are available immediately.

The cornea, outer covering of the eye, serves as a window, but cannot function as such when injured.

Last Sept. 23 a ladder broke as Allis was preparing to treat wheat for smut control, and he dropped to the floor with an open gallon of chemical in his hand. Fluid splashed into his eye, and blindness followed.

Two operations at Ann Arbor in the winter failed to remedy the damage, and cornea transplantation became the last resort. The operation was performed under local anesthetic while Allis laughed and joked with surgeons.

"Ability to see is one of man's most cherished gifts, and no one realizes its value until deprived of it," Allis said. "Persons who contribute their eyes to Michigan's 29 banks, or collection centers, are granting a gift that will return the handicapped to normal, productive lives. There can be no nobler act."

The Livingston County program is being activated by McParson Community Health Center, Drs. L. E. May and Roscoe V. Stuber, Phil H. McBride of Brighton, donor chairman, Don MacDonald and Al Bosworth, respective heads of the Howell and Brighton Lions Clubs, Clergymen and family physicians.

Donors may be individuals or their next of kin, and forms are available at the health center.

They will be in supply soon at physicians' offices and several banks.

Procedure has been mapped at meetings of the Livingston County Medical Association with Dr. John Henderson, Professor of Ophthalmology at the university hospital.

Emergency messages will be sent by amateur or so-called "ham" radio operators.

State Police Emphasizes Water Safety

The State Police are giving special emphasis to water safety slogans — "A Captain for Every Ship" and "A Lifeguard for Every Family" — as part of their contribution to Michigan's Water Safety Education Month, said Sgt. Robert Vesey, commander of the Brighton post.

Though water safety is a year-around concern for the State Police, the special efforts are in conjunction with Governor George Romney's proclamation for the month which marks the start of increased outdoor water activities.

Explaining the slogans, Sergeant Vesey said that State Police analysis of Michigan's 540 water accidents last year which killed 244 persons and injured 216 others indicated that more responsible supervision by boat operators, parents and other adults could have cut the toll appreciably in boating and nonboating accidents.

The study showed that some of the 88 lives lost in boating accidents could have been saved in at least 48 cases had there been life preservers for passengers.

In nonboating tragedies, investigating officers believed that adequate supervision could have saved lives in 52 fatal accidents while in 15 other mishaps provision of a life guard on duty would have prevented some deaths.

Sergeant Vesey pointed out that motorboat operators, responsible "captains of the ships," should see to it that each passenger wears or has available a life preserver jacket. Passengers should be cautioned against standing in changing places when underway. Operators should be alert and follow the safety rules and should not overboard or overpower their boats.

Rights of other water users — swimmers, waders, fishermen, water skiers, divers — must be respected too, and this consideration applies as well to moored craft and waterfront properties which can be damaged by boat wakes. Motorboats should be properly equipped, including lights, anchor, fire extinguisher and some rescue devices such as a ring buoy and line for emergencies.

The Brighton Post commander emphasized that waders and teenage swimmers should always have capable supervision with provision for effecting rescue if trouble develops. Persons in that age group accounted for 63 per cent of the 136 drownings in Michigan nonboating accidents in 1963.

Because accidents may happen despite the best of safety intentions, Sergeant Vesey urged that boat operators and at least one family member know how to apply some method of resuscitation. Sixteen lives were reported saved in state water accidents last year because someone was able to revive the victims.

History of Early Michigan Money

A courtesy display of Colonial Bank Notes, and author, History of Early Michigan money, are being shown at Brighton State Bank's opening, and with arrangements for our social science student classes to have the benefit by a number of my published articles, which contain an excellent background for an understanding of the type of money exhibited in collection.

Wildcat currency of early days showing how, unlimited printing of money resulted in disaster, to practically all pioneer banks, gives examples of American earliest speculators, and shady sides of some of our earlier officials and bankers.

The document has been printed semi-monthly in weekly county news medium and the historical part clipped every two weeks, until last issue arrives and student has final complete write-up for social science classes. My material has been displayed by National Bank of Detroit, shown at National Building and Loan Association's convention in Detroit, used by Lincoln High, Ferndale, Pleasant Ridge, Theodore Roosevelt School by Social science classes.

Two notes are signed by John Quincy Adams, son of John Quincy Adams, second President of the United States, who caused Washington to be made commander in chief of the Continental Army. John Quincy Adams was the sixth President of the United States and was the only President who served in Congress after the close of his administration. His son, Charles Francis Adams first served in Congress and was United States minister to England. By profession he was a lawyer, Charles Francis Adams, the third was secretary of the Navy during the Hoover Regime. The Adams family is known as America's most distinguished. For five generations there has no break in the line of their statesmanly standards.

The Bank of Monroe, Michigan our most worthy and revered 6th President of the United States was President of, and P. C. H. Brotherson, cashier was granted a Special Legislative Charter and commenced business in 1827 with \$100,000 capital (rechartered by the Legislative Council 1835.) P. L. Brotherson, Cashier was State Representative from Manchester, Washtenaw County 1846. It was at all times advantageously managed until suspension became the rule, when it, too lost its credit and its business. Soon after it liquidated, paying nearly all of its indebtedness.

One note signed by Penn A. Backus, whom late George B. Catlin, historian, stated, was supposed to be one of Michigan's first bank examiners, appears on a note of the River Raisin and Lake Erie Railroad Company of Monroe.

Big One That Didn't Get Away



Looking bigger than life, a whopping-sized walleyed pike reached the end of the line in his battle with this fisherman. No doubt this catch will be the talk of the town, sending a flock of other fishermen to try their luck at the same stream. If they're here in walleye fishing, these anglers will seek out submerged bars and deep rock areas close to shore. Some will try this fisherman's approach to success by spinning for action. Others will slowly drift or troll over likely spots, with their lines strung out 30-50 yards behind boats and the bait at the bottom in 6-30 feet of water. Minnows 2-5 inches long hooked through both lips, or nightcrawlers on a harness are natural baits preferred for taking walleyes. A Junebug or similar spinner should be attached just in front of the natural bait. The Flatfish, Pike, Minnow, River Run, or Lutz Ike, (based with porridge), are good artificial baits. Mich. 

The Brighton State Bank Has Interesting Coin Display

Residents of the Brighton area are invited to visit the Brighton State Bank and inspect the interesting display of old coins in the lower level of the new building.

Also on display are various old paper money dating from the War of Independence.

DISPLAY NO. 1 One Hundred Years of United States Coins

This display of United States coins shows every coin denomination and design used since the Civil War with the exception of U.S. gold coins. Under each coin is a description of the piece and the story behind it. Such current coins as the Lincoln cent, Jefferson nickel (designed by a sculptor now living in Owosso, Michigan), Roosevelt dime, Washington quarter, and Franklin half dollar are shown and described in the labels.

DISPLAY NO. 2 The Story of the Penny

The British penny and, less directly, the U.S. one-cent piece are descendants of the denarius, a dime-size silver coin issued by the Romans as early as the second century before Christ. By 200 A.D. that coin was being imitated by the people of central Europe who made their silver denier approximately equal in weight and size.

The silver penny of England appeared in the eighth century. It was really an English adaptation of the denier. Originally broader and thinner than the dime. It was gradually reduced in size until, under Queen Elizabeth I and King James, the diameter was under three-eighths of an inch.

The copper penny was introduced by King George III in 1797. It has been issued from that date to the current popular penny of Queen Elizabeth II.

British money ledgers record transactions in Pounds, shillings, and pence or L. s. and d. The "L" is the abbreviation for "Libra," a Latin word meaning pounds, and "d" indicates "denarius," the ancient predecessor of the penny.

The U.S. cent is a first-cousin of the British penny. We often refer to the one-cent piece as a "penny" in conversation — a reflection of the English background of the United States.

The "Story of the Penny" display includes specimens of all important types of pennies issued in the last twenty-one centuries. A descriptive label appears beneath each piece.

DISPLAY NO. 3 Paper Money of the War of American Independence

During the War of American Independence the Continental Congress issued paper money, called Continental Currency, to ease the economic problems which beset the new nation. The financial difficulties encountered by the weak central government caused the currency to depreciate. By the year 1782 it was virtually worthless. The expression "Not

worth a Continental" originated at that time.

Counterfeiting is often a weapon of war. Such was the case when the British printed counterfeits of Continental Currency in large quantities. The British and loyalists had some difficulty when passing them because they were more perfect than the genuine notes!

Specimens of colonial currency, Continental currency and a British counterfeit Continental currency note appear in this display.

People have quit struggling for an existence; the struggle now is to keep up with the automobile and gadget payments.
