## Kiwanis to Sponsor Rodeo Here

### Will Be Held at Hell Creek on June 27

Less than two weeks remains before the first performance, 2 p.m., June 27, of the nationally sanctioned professional rodeo, sponsored by the Pinckney Kiwanis Club, and scheduled to take place at the Hell Creek Riding Stable, on South Cedar Lake Road.

The 22 Kiwanians are frantically working to bring to the people of Pinckney area, the biggest and best rodeo ever held in this vicinity. It will be a Decker production, featuring all professional participants, and featuring such events as Ladies' Cloverleaf, saddle broncs, bare back, bull dogging, calf roping, Brahma bulls, and many other exciting acts.

## Summer Arrives Sunday, June 21

Summer will officially begin at 3:57 a.m. Sunday, June 21. University of Michigan astronomer Hazel M. Losh reminds.

On that day the sun will reach its direct position over the northern hemisphere which will receive the most heat from the sun in any 24-hour period of the year.

But the changes are very good that the summer solstice, the longest of the year, will not be the hottest of the summer. Professor Losh notes. There will be 15 hours of daylight.

The peak of the season usually comes from four to six weeks later because the earth receives more heat from the sun than is lost each day. Temperatures are likely to keep climbing until around August 1.

"Luckily, we are farthest from the sun during our summer and nearest to it during the winter, so that our seasons tend to be a little milder than those of the other hemisphere," Professor Losh says.

"Also since the earth is moving a little slower in its orbit around the sun during our summer, this season is slightly longer than our winter. This is known as the inequality of the seasons' and is said to have been detected as early as the 6th century B. C."

## New Act Will Create County Library Board

The Livingston county board of supervisors will appoint a five-member county library board at their monthly meeting this week, in accordance with a newly created public act. The new act provides for the distribution of penal fines and their application to the support of public libraries; to provide for the appointment of a county library board to receive penal fines and to define its powers and duties.

There are five public libraries in the county: Brighton, Howell, Fowlerville, Pinckney and Hartland. They are supported by direct local taxes and penal fine money.

The proceeds from all fines for any breach of the penal laws shall be apportioned by the county treasurer in accordance with the directions of the state board of libraries, on a per capita basis.

The penal fine money shall be applied exclusively to the support of public libraries.

County Clerk Joseph Ellis has apprised members of the board of supervisors of the appointments and urged them to give the matter consideration, as the deadline for filing the appointments with the State is June 30.

**What to Wear No Problem For 4-H Girls**

Researchers and psychiatrists today tend to agree with Shakespeare when he wrote "the soul of this man is his clothes."

"Research indicates that beginning with our school experience, and perhaps even before, we become aware of clothing as a symbol which serves to distinguish social position of individuals in a community," says Virginia Davis, extension clothing specialist at the University of Massachusetts.

Clothing, she explains, plays an important part in shaping personal relationships, and that the way a person dresses is closely connected with the impression of herself that she unconsciously wishes to convey.

The importance of wearing the right clothing — at least from the standpoint of appearance, comfort and durability is being taught schoolgirls enrolled in a 4-H clothing program, according to the Co-operative Extension Service.

"When I was nine," writes a national clothing scholarship winner, "a classmate aroused my interest in 4-H. She came to school wearing a very pretty dress or skirt and blouse and told me about making it in 4-H. She told me about the ribbons she won at the fair, about summer camp and other 4-H activities. It sounded like fun. So in 1953 I enrolled in the Greenleaf 4-H Club."

Nearly every 4-H Club girl at some time during membership engages in a clothing project. Girls who continue in the program for four or five years become proficient in sewing and fashion skills.

Probably the most sought after honor is the state award trip to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago. It involves a week of meeting and mingling with some 1,600 club members from every state.

Then there are \$500 scholarships which will be given to the 12 top state girls. They are announced during the Congress, November 29 - December 3.

### June 30 Deadline For New Farm Wheat Allotment

A new farm wheat allotment may be established for 1965-crop wheat for farms that did not have a 1964 allotment and meet eligibility requirements. Mr. Bontekoe of the Livingston A.S.C. Committee announced today. Although there will be no restrictions on the planting or harvesting of wheat in 1965, Mr. Bontekoe said only those farmers with a 1965 allotment will be eligible to participate in the 1965 diversion and certificate program.

A 1965 wheat allotment will automatically be established for farms with wheat histories in the 1962-1964 period, or farms that planted wheat in any of the years 1959, 1960, and 1961.

To be eligible for a new farm allotment, the operator must expect to receive more than 50 percent of his income from the production of agricultural commodities on the farm, and neither the owner nor the operator may have an interest in any other farm which has a 1965 allotment.

Applications for a new farm allotment must be filed in the county office on or before June 30, 1964. Mr. Bontekoe said that any interested producer who can meet these requirements should contact the county office before the final date for filing an application.




