Funeral Service Held For Harry Utchenik

Harry Utchenik, a one time resident of the Pinckney area, died in Detroit Saturday June 20. He resided at 9603 Yellowstone. He is survived by his wife Frances two sons, Merlin and Joseph; a brother, David Utley and three sisters, Mrs. Ann Bild of Miami, Florida, Mrs. Bessie Ginsburg of Ann Arbor, and Mrs. Bertha Bessman; and four grandchildren.

Funeral arrangements were made through the Hebrew Benevolent Society of Detroit. As one scans back through the years it is discovered in the March issue of the Dispatch, the year 1921, Mr. Utchenik owned the "old Freeman Webb farm" on Hinckley Road. On a Saturday afternoon while Mr. Utchenik was below the surface of the ground, some forty feet, repairing a pipe in a well, it caved in and Mr. Utchenik was entombed 48 hours, from Saturday afternoon until Monday afternoon. Today many Pinckney residents remember this incident, and tell how many, many people from miles away came to aid in bringing Mr. Utchenik to safety. In some miraculous way, two large stones had gone down the well shaft, side by side, and lodged just above the head of Mr. Utchenik, forming an arch, and it was in this small pocket he managed to live for two days and two nights.

The titles accumulated by Tom are quite impressive, as he has been the Champion Bareback Bronc rider three of the past five years.

Board Debates

Special Education Rooms

The Livingston County Board of Education met this week and spent four hours considering a letter from the Howell School board regarding special education rooms.

Mr. Hampton, superintendent of the board reports that no decision has been made regarding Howell's request for two elementary school rooms. Some statements in the letter needed clarification, he felt.

Negotiations regarding special education rooms have taken place since the first of the year. There is some disagreement as to which type of rooms should be built.

The Howell School Board has requested elementary rooms since it feels that tests have shown a great need for special help at this level. The Livingston County School Board claims to be taking a broader dollar and cents view and wants to build two special education rooms at the site of the new Howell High School. The rooms can be built now, the board contends, while the high school is in construction with a fifty percent saving to the county. The high school rooms would be used for all high school special education students in the county. The two elementary rooms because they are additions to the present buildings will cost over forty thousand dollars while the estimate on the high school rooms is close to twenty thousand. The contractor of the high school has set a deadline for a decision on the rooms for the middle of August.

Need Blood Donors

HOWELL — Blood donors are urgently needed for the Mobile Blood Bank, which will be located at the Howell Armory July 8 from noon to 6 p.m. Appointments to donate may be made by calling Mrs. Betty Cook, Howell 693.

Livingston County has used more blood in the past three years than have been donated by county residents. Just in the past year 1,007 pints of blood have been used by those in the county as opposed to the 921 pints donated.

"This will be the only Blood Mobile stop in the county until next September, so it is imperative that a great many people get out and give," Mrs. Helen Bauer, County Blood Drive Chairman, said.

There have been two heart operations for area residents this past month at the University Hospital, Ann Arbor. These operations require a great deal of blood and will push Livingston County's blood deficit even lower.

"Hartland's blood drive last week only scratched the surface with a total of 45 pints donated," Mrs. Bauer said. "Pinckney will not have a blood drive this year, all those in that area are urged to donate blood in Howell July 8."

Persons between the ages of 18 through 59 in good health and weighing over 110 pounds, having had no surgery or received blood or blood plasma within the past six months are qualified blood donors.

An unmarried person under 21 years of age must have the written consent of a parent or guardian.

A physician is present at every blood collection and registered nurses check the donor's temperature, pulse, blood pressure and hemoglobin. Prospective blood donors should have a light lunch shortly before reporting to the blood bank.

Each new donor will receive a card with their blood type and Rh Factor on it. This card will be helpful in case of an accident or sudden illness, if a transfusion should be necessary.

Any resident of Livingston County is entitled to whole blood and its derivatives without charge. A resident hospitalized anywhere in the United States may notify the American Red Cross (Howell 1156) or Blood Bank Chairman Mrs. Helen Bauer (Howell 1123) and any blood needed will be replaced or furnished.

66 Persons Have Drowned This Yr. To Set Record

Sixty-six persons have been drowned and another 17 injured in Michigan water accidents reported through June 17 this year, according to State Police provisional records.

This is 13 more deaths and five more injured compared with the toll in 62 accidents for the same period a year ago.

The 66 drownings include 11 swimmers or waders, eight boat passengers, seven who fell through ice, five who fell from bridges, banks, docks or piers, four boat operators, one who fell into a caisson, and another who attempted a rescue. Official reports have not been received on accidents in which 29 deaths occurred.

Expect 25,000 Applicants for State-Supported Scholarships

Screening an estimated 20,000 to 25,000 applicants for Michigan's first state-supported scholarship program poses a big job for one of the smallest government agencies.

The Michigan Higher Education Assistance Authority distributed about 30 scholarships under a private funds-guarantee program in slightly over two years.

Now plans call for the Authority to award 1,000 college aids by fall. A total of \$500,000 was appropriated for the scholarships by the Legislature.

Applicants will first be narrowed down to about 7,500 through consideration of the various available intelligence tests. Then, partly on a state-wide basis and partially on the basis of legislative districts, the financial need of individual students will be considered.

Scholarships are expected to average around \$500, said Superintendent of Public Instruction Lynn M. Bartlett, who serves as chairman of the Authority. The maximum allowance in the 1964 legislative act is \$800 per student per year.

Students who finally receive the scholarships will have their choice of many institutions. All accredited colleges and universities in Michigan, 47 in all including private institutions and some community colleges, are eligible for use of the scholarships.

SALARIES UP

Michigan's governor will be among the highest paid chief executives in 1965, and state lawmakers will hold a similar place in rank among their counterparts.

Only New York, California, New Jersey and Pennsylvania pay their governors more than the \$30,000 Michigan's governor will receive next year. The new rate is a \$2,500 boost over the current salary.

Legislators gave themselves a bigger hike: with a 43 per cent raise in salary and 100 per cent increase in expense allowances. The new rates will be \$10,000 salary and \$750 expenses per legislator.

Many of the current Legislature members will not take advantage of the new rates, however. The 1965 session is expected to include more new faces than have been seen in many years past.

Moon Eclipse Seen Tonight

A totally eclipsed moon will rise tonight (June 24).

The moon will first touch the earth's shadow at 6:09 p.m., and the totality of eclipse will begin at 7:16 with the middle of eclipse coming at 8:06 — all before the moon is visible above the horizon.

Thus, when the moon rises at 8:10, it will be already in total eclipse. The totality will end at 8:57, and the moon's final emergence from the earth's shadow will come at 10:04.

"During the totality period, the moon will shine with a dull reddish copper glow, for it will be illuminated by sunlight which filters through the earth's atmosphere, being bent and refracted into the shadow and on the moon," University of Michigan astronomer Hazel M. Losh says.

"It's closeness to the horizon will also enhance its reddish tinge. As the moon begins to leave the shadow at the end of totality and its bright crescent begins to emerge, the earth's circular shadow may be seen against the moon."

nounced plans to retire rather than face another incumbent in a merged district. Others were eliminated from eligibility by the Constitutional provision prohibiting individuals on other public payrolls, such as city officers and employees, from running.

Still others have been lured into contests in new Congressional districts, and a few will seek election to the State Court of Appeals, a new creation in the judicial branch section of the 1964 Constitution.

HELP FOR STUDY

Initiative toward self-improvement in job knowledge and skills has been lauded in private industry for a good number of years.

In the past three years, Michigan government has also recognized this initiative in its employees by paying part of the costs of continued education.

For the coming year, the State Civil Service Commission set aside \$12,000 as incentive for further study by

employees in job-related fields.

State employees who take college credits related to their work are partially compensated for satisfactory completion of approved courses.

Employe enrollments have increased in each of the three previous years, said State Personnel Director Franklin K. DeWald. There also has been an accompanying like in the number of approved courses taken.

In the past year nearly 350 state employees took almost 500 courses approved by the commission. The state paid about \$9,000 in partial tuition reimbursements, DeWald said.

During the 1964-65 school year, the personnel director estimates an increase of 25 to 50 employees will be involved in the program. Of course, a major incentive in addition to the partial reimbursement is the prospect of promotions and increased salaries resulting from the added knowledge in the individual's field of work.







During 1962, 4,300,000 persons were injured in home accidents, an increase of six per cent over the previous year. Some 110,000 of the injuries resulted in permanent impairment.

According to the Association of Casualty and Surety Companies, these accidents occurred at the staggering rates of one every eight seconds, or 11,500 each day.

To reduce the chances of such accidents occurring, the ACSC recommends that homeowners pay particular attention to keeping backyards free of clutter. Hoses, rakes, ladders and other household paraphernalia should be properly stored away when not in use, rather than left lying carelessly around where people can trip over them.
