## One Killed, Four Injured in Car Crash Here Sunday

### Teen Age Driver To Be Ticketed

One person was killed and one seriously injured when two cars collided at the intersection of West M-36 and Cedar Lake Road at 3:10 Sunday afternoon.

Lloyd Gilchrist, 71, of King Road, Brighton, driver of one car was killed instantly. His wife, Clare Alice Gilchrist, 71, remains on the critical list at St. Joseph Mercy Hospital in Ann Arbor.

Critically injured was Lynn Waterbury, 16-year-old son of Jerry Waterbury of Hamburg.

A passenger in the other car, He suffered multiple injuries, broken bones, concussion and severe facial cuts. He remains on the critical list.

His brother, Carl Waterbury, 17, also a passenger, still hospitalized, is listed as being in satisfactory condition.

Lawrence Patrick Davis, 18, driver of the other car, suffered severe facial injuries and lacerations. He is reported to be in satisfactory condition. Davis is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Davis of Hamburg.

Mr. and Mrs. Gilchrist had attended the Horse Show at the Holt Creek Ranch on Cedar Lake Road and were apparently on their way home. Davis was traveling east on M-36 road, Livingston County, Sheriff's office said. The Gilchrist car pulled out from Cedar Lake Road about 20 feet ahead of his car. He estimated his speed as approximately 60 miles per hour as he traveled along M-36.

Reliable witnesses claimed that he was traveling at a speed of 60 mph before he came to the intersection. Davis was in the Gilchrist car when he was struck by the other car. He was thrown from the car and landed on his head. He was taken to the Pinckney Fire Department where he was treated for a skull fracture. The injured were taken to McPherson Health Center and later transferred to U. of M. Hospital, Ann Arbor.

Both cars were completely demolished.

### Former Resident Dies In Bay City

Mrs. Mary Agnes Dooly, 81, died early Sunday morning, July 26, in Bay City after an illness of six weeks.

Mrs. Dooly, the former Mary Agnes Monks, was born in Pinckney, September 25, 1882 to Alfred and Bridget Shannon Monks of their family farm on Patterson Lake Road. The George Holt home was her home on this land. She attended Pinckney schools, and in 1908 she was married to Charles Dooly in a ceremony held at St. Mary's Church, Pinckney. After this marriage the couple lived in Linden Township until Mr. Dooly's death in 1915. At that time Mrs. Dooly moved to Bay City to live with her brother, Leo.

Survivors include a daughter, Mrs. Charles Dwyer of Saginaw, a son, Harold of Bay City, a sister, Mrs. Helen Berry of Lansing, and a granddaughter, Charlene Dwyer of Saginaw.

Mrs. Fannie Monks, Mrs. Evelyn Kempf, and Mrs. Gary Johnson of Pinckney were all first cousins of Mrs. Dooly. Funeral services were held Wednesday, July 29, at St. James Church, Bay City. Burial was at St. Mary's Cemetery at Pinckney.

### HiLand Plans Water Safety

The Lake Study Committee of the Hi-Land Lake Property Owners Association held their first meeting at the home of chairman, Lloyd Wolf, Sunday afternoon. This committee consisting of Chairman Wolf, John Hampton, Joe Sencey, William Pulver, and President Emerson Pattison as ex-officio member was appointed by Pres. Pattison at the last Board meeting.

The purpose of this committee is to study the various problems that may develop from time to time may develop from use of the lake by fishermen, boaters, skiers and swimmers.

Sheriff Lawrence Gehring, area representatives Ray Michaels and Robert Mannoeh, and all committee members were present at the meeting. Gehring informed the committee how some of these problems were handled on other lakes. He said that these problems are becoming more serious as the number of boats and lake population increases. To July 15 there have been 244 boating accidents in the state, 111 of them fatalities. The ratio of fatalities to accidents indicate an almost 50-50 chance of a boating accident resulting in death.

The committee voted to recommend to the HILAPOA board of trustees that all boats be required to operate counter clockwise around the island (state law); skiers and boaters to stay a safe distance from swimmers and docks; swimmers to stay reasonably close to the shore line; that skiing should be limited to the hours of 10 a.m. to 7 p.m.; and that the Board appoint a Marine Deputy.

Awards will be made in all divisions, floats, horses, bicycles, animals, cars, and etc. Berthold Woodhams will be in charge of the parade judges.

The festival will be held on Saturday, September 5th, and will feature the Melon Parade, and the selection of Miss Livingston County in the afternoon.

The work was principally on two themes, children's books and their selection, under the direction of Mrs. Mariel Long of the Ingham County Library at Mason, and Philosophy and Public Relations under the direction of Mrs. Charlema Rollins, former children's Librarian of the American Library Association.

Mrs. Rollins is a charming colored lady and there was much discussion of the part the library can play in promoting better relations in a community and in promoting better racial understandings.

Two of Mrs. Rollins' books have been ordered for the Pinckney Library: Christmas Gift, a collection of Christmas stories about negroes; and "They Showed the Way," about the leaders who have made great contributions to our country.

Other interesting activities at the Workshop included story telling; a visit to the Michigan State Library, and to the Materials Collection in the Education Building. Becky Henry and Doris Meachon had charge of the library during Miss Preuss' absence. "They did a fine job. Everything was in order when I returned," Miss Preuss said.

### Burn Victim Has Operation

LeRoy Walker, who was severely burned in a home accident on East M-36 last July 20th, underwent a skin grafting operation on his legs Friday, August 7, at St. Joseph Mercy Hospital in Ann Arbor.

After many days on the critical list, Walker is now slowly recovering but is still kept in isolation and can take only two or three steps each day.

Walker suffered his near tragic burn when fumes from a nearby can of gasoline ignited as he did some repair work on his car. He rolled in the grass to extinguish the flames, but his legs were badly burned.

Sharon Cornette, his fiancée, spends her days at the hospital with Walker. Sharon, who attended the Pinckney schools, is the daughter of Mrs. Margaret Cornette of Portage Lake.



Brighton Residents Are Invited To Visit Nuclear Plants in State

The explosion that rocked a remote western desert air base on July 16, 1945, has been tamed at two locations along the popular recreational beaches of Michigan's Great Lakes.

The test blast of the first atomic bomb demonstrated the potential energy which is now being harnessed and carefully guided into areas contributing to the progress of modern civilization.

Aiding in the task of harnessing atoms for useful purposes are the waters of Lakes Michigan and Erie which pour into the condensers at Big Rock Point near Charlevoix and the Enrico Fermi plant near Monroe.

These are the nuclear research and development laboratories of Consumers Power Company at Charlevoix and the Detroit Edison Company at Monroe. Here, scientists and others in the atomic energy field maintain a proving grounds for equipment which one day may light the homes of millions of Americans.

The Detroit Edison plant is conducting similar experiments and has maintained a development program from its inception in 1936. The Charlevoix plant started operations in 1962.

Although both nuclear plants share the same ultimate goal of producing electricity, each uses a different method. The Fermi plant operates

a fast breeder reactor — one that actually produces more and a different type of nuclear material than it consumes in the process, thus building new supplies of energy fuel rather than depleting it. Heat from the creation of the new material can then be used in the generation of power.

A by-product of both nuclear plants is their attraction to tourists and other vacationers.

The Enrico Fermi plant offers an Atomic Information Center where visitors are also initiated into the ways of the industrial atom.

In addition to vacationers, both plants cater to teachers and students as an aid to curriculum studies and to create more interest and awareness in the nuclear sciences.

Tours through the Enrico Fermi Atomic Information Center are conducted Tuesday through Saturday from 10 a.m. until 4 p.m. Advance arrangements for visits by large groups may be made by contacting the Detroit Edison Company, 2000 Second Avenue, Detroit.

The information Center of the Big Rock Point Nuclear plant is open to visitors daily throughout the summer months from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Large groups will be accommodated by contacting the information


Fine horsemanship was shown in many of the speed and action events, and a touch of humor was added to the hilarious apple bobbing and dizzy stick races.


