## 20,000th Camper Given Citation at Bruin Lake Park

### Livonia Couple Are Honored on Friday

When James and Janis Weston and their miniature dachshund, Schnapps, pulled into Bruin Lake State Park late Friday evening, for a week end of camping they had no inkling of the publicity awaiting them.

Pinckney Recreation Area Manager Ernest Botke, Jr., and his staff had been eagerly awaiting the arrival of the 20,000th camping family to use the recreation facilities since the Pinckney area was developed in 1944.

Camping is an old story to the Westons; they both came from families who liked the outdoors and had camped during childhood. Since their marriage four years ago, they have spent many weekends at their first Michigan's many fine camping areas.

This was the first time at Bruin Lake for Mr. and Mrs. Weston, who live at 11110 Middlebelt, Livonia. It was one they will long remember.

The Honorable Senator Stanley Thayer of Ann Arbor was on hand to present the Westons with a plaque and citation in honor of the occasion of a company Saturday morning before the assembled Bruin Lake Campers.

Park Manager Botke related a brief history of camping in the Pinckney Recreation Area.

The first parcel of land was purchased for the development of the Pinckney State Recreation Area on November 13, 1944. In the next four years small parcels were developed at Silver, Halfmoon, South and Bruin Lakes. Fishing sites were existent at Halfmoon Lake, South Lake and Bruin Lake.

This area was new and not very many people knew of its location, so that camping registrations for the year 1948, I recall, totaled eighty-nine.

At this period in the development of the area campers were allowed to camp anywhere and there was no charge for camping. Campers were considered as a courtesy so that friends and relatives could find them in case of an emergency.

As the popularity of camping increased two things happened out of necessity. One — camping was limited to designated areas only, and a small fee was charged for camping to help defray the cost of personnel and supplies needed to maintain the camping services.

Since that first charge of fifty cents about twelve years ago, there have been three increases in the camping fee to \$1.50 per day and 25 cents per electricity at this time. These increases, of course, paralleled the increased cost of materials and labor.

During this period of course camping has become a much more popular family sport. In the late 50's and early 60's increased the size of the Bruin Lake Camping area from thirty sites to sixty sites to fifty sites and finally in 1962 to its present size of two hundred twenty-two sites. The last expansion and installation of toilet facilities was completed with the motor vehicle permit funds.

This motor vehicle permit act was passed in 1960 and made the 1960's resulting from the diver manipulates his body and his chute, literally steering himself through the air in an attempt to land on a predetermined target. This takes considerable skill and practice. The usual jump is from an elevation of 2,500 feet.

Bangs Richmond, owner of Richmond Field, says, "These young men and women jump here every Saturday and Sunday, depending on weather and wind conditions. Everyone is welcome to come out with us — there is no charge for spectators."

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After this development the number of camping registrations began to increase by leaps and bounds so that this year the biggest week (Fourth of July week) camp rangers registered four hundred sixty camps, total camps this year to date are 4,199 as compared to a total for all of last year of 4,323. It seems quite certain at this time that camper registration for the year will be over 5,000.

Botke said, "Having kept accurate records through the years of camper registration we thought it would be fitting to award a citation to the 20,000th camper on the area. Mr. and Mrs. James G. Weston of Livonia are the lucky ones and we are fortunate in having a member of the state government, with us today, Senator Stanley Thayer, to make the presentation."

### Crash Injuries Claims Life of Lynn Waterbury

A second person has died from injuries sustained in the auto accident of Sunday, August 9 at the intersection of West M-36 and Cedar Lake Road a mile west of Pinckney. When the car driven by Lawrence Davis of Hamburg hit one driven by Lloyd Gilchrist, Gilchrist was killed instantly. Lynn Waterbury, 16-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Waterbury of Hamburg, died Thursday. His brother, Carl, 17, also a passenger in the fatal accident was not seriously injured and was released from St. Joseph Mercy Hospital Wednesday, August 12.

Mrs. Clare Gilchrist, who was a passenger in the car driven by her husband, was seriously injured. She remains on the critical list at St. Joseph Hospital.

Lawrence Davis, 18, who sustained facial cuts and head injuries, was released from the hospital August 16.

Lynn Waterbury was born May 5, 1948 in Howell to Jerry and Eva Shurlov Waterbury. He attended the Hamburg Schools.

His parents survive, as do five brothers, Carl, Marvin, Michael, Luther, and Daniel, all at home; two sisters, Joyce, at home and Mrs. Thomas (Barbara) Line of Flint; maternal grandmother, Mrs. Harry Morse of Utica and paternal grandmother, Mrs. Myrtle Waterbury of Hamburg. A sister, Nancy, preceded him in death September 11, 1963.

Funeral services were held Saturday in the Keehn Funeral Home, Brighton, with Rev. A. C. Pounds and Harold Tjepkema officiating. Burial was in Hamburg Cemetery.

Major Edgar C. Bundy was born in Stamford, Connecticut; graduated from high school with honors at Miami, Florida; received a scholarship to Oglethorpe University and transferred to Wheaton College, graduated with B.A. in 1935; worked his way through Wheaton as sports writer for various Chicago newspapers and after graduation became a member of the staff of The Chicago Herald American; entered the armed services in 1941, rose in rank from private to major; served over six years of active service duty in Air Force intelligence in every major theater of war; received national and Chinese honors; received decoration from Generalissimo Chiang Kai Shek, the Bronze Star medal from Major General Claire Chennault of the 14th Air Force and Five Battle Stars for major engagements.

In August, 1948, he was assigned to States and became city editor at "The States" in Wheaton, Ill. Senator Kenneth McKelley, Chairman of Senate Appropriations Committee invited him to testify before the subcommittee on both sides of the "Far Eastern Situation." He testified under oath that South Korea would be attacked by the Communists of North Korea just one year and two days before the attack. He also warned of the impending fall of China and scored the state department, Dean Acheson and the Truman Administration for what he termed "Appeasement of the Soviet Union and failure to recognize the Communist Threat" in the Far East. Many congressmen and senators praised him highly for his testimony information. Besides testifying frequently before various congressional committees he has ridden in passing three important bills in the Illinois State Legislature.

As a result of his appearances before congressional committees, he has had far more invitations to speak at conferences, conventions, town-halls, patriotic societies, colleges and universities than he can accept. Many of his meetings are one night "Seminars" in America's largest cities and auditoriums.

They are the children of Mr. and Mrs. Bertrand Wylie of Dexter St., Dr. and Mrs. Richard Posler of Mower Rd., and Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Line of Cedar Lake Rd.
