Polls Open 7-8 Sept. 1 For 1,050 Registered Voters

The September 1 Primary Election is rolling up fast and the politicians in Putnam are restless! Putnam has 1,050 registered voters expected to appear at the polls Tuesday, Sept. 1, between the hours of 7 a.m. and 8 p.m. to choose the candidate of their liking for various offices in the Township, as well as in County and State. Putnam voters vote in the Putnam Township Hall on the Pinckney Village Square.

Stanley Dinkel, (D) is seeking nomination for candidate for Putnam Township Supervisor. Stanley was elected to this office in the Spring of 1963. He is well known in the Pinckney area due to his having held the office of Pinckney Village President for nearly 15 consecutive years. Stanley, his wife Dorothy, and two children, John and Christine live at 251 West Main.

Seeking the candidacy for the office of Putnam Township Clerk are Murray Kennedy and Lloyd Hendee, both on the Democratic ticket. Incumbent, Kennedy, has held this office the past several years. He, and his wife, Dorothy, live at 180 Toma Road. They are parents of five children, two married, one serving in the armed forces, and two at home.

Hendee, who for 8 consecutive years was Putnam Township Supervisor, lives at 8280 Farley Road. He and his wife, June, have three children, all of school age.

Helen Reynolds, (D) with no opposition seeks to be nominated candidate for Putnam Township Treasurer. Mr. and Mrs. Max Reynolds live at 545 Putnam and are parents of five school age children.

Louise Stackable, (D) seeks the nomination for Trustee. He has no opposition. Mr. and Mrs. Stackable live at 3770 West M-36.

Bertrand Wylie, (D) seeks nomination for the office of Justice of the Peace. He has no opposition. Mr. and Mrs. Wylie live at 508 N. Dexter and have three school age children.

Prosecutor Tells About New Laws

On Friday, August 28, 290 new laws will go into effect. Some of the ones of most interest to police agencies and other public officials concern the use of indecent language or threats by telephone, drag racing, the sale of pornography by prescription, and the requirement of different colored drivers licenses for persons under 21 years of age.

Livingston County Prosecuting Attorney Charles B. Gatesman has informed police agencies in the county of these changes and new laws, and a conference of police agencies within the county to discuss these changes, was held Monday afternoon.

Perhaps the most important change which will affect the distinction between daytime and nighttime in burglaries, or breaking and entering cases. Before the change, police often times had difficulty in determining whether a building was broken into in the daytime or nighttime.

Other laws that might be of interest of the general public concern minimum wages, group health insurance for persons 65 years of age or over, safety features on school buses, and particularly to farmers in the area, the fact that they will not be liable for injuries suffered by hunters, trespassers, etc., who are on their property, if they have not paid the farmer for the right to be there.

Will Construct Rest Area On I-96 Near Here

Bids will be opened by the State Highway Department on Sept. 3 on 11 projects, including one in Livingston County. The local project includes grading and paving of ramps and parking area for a Free-way Safety Rest Area on I-96 between Brighton and Howell. The area will be on the north side of the highway and will serve westbound traffic.

It will have parking areas for 24 trucks and 50 automobiles and will include drinking water, rest rooms, picnic tables and stoves and an informational bulletin board.

Court of Appeals

Because the people of Michigan will be voting for the first time for judges of the newly created Court of Appeals, The Argus is printing the following explanation of the new court.

Michigan residents will vote September 1st for the first time for the newly created post of Judge of the Court of Appeals. The court was created by the State Constitution of 1963 which replaced the constitution of 1880.

The Court of Appeals, in the present legal structure, comes between the Circuit Courts and the State Supreme Court. Appeals will now go from the Circuit Courts to this newly formed appellate court. Many cases will be disposed of here, but serious questions of appeal are still present in individual cases these may be appealed to the Supreme Court.

Formerly, Circuit court cases were appealable under certain conditions directly to the Supreme Court. Because of the volume of work and particularly because of the expense involved a limitation of necessity was placed on the number of cases that could be appealed.

The constitution provides that members of this court will be elected from three districts with three judges from each district. Brighton is in district two which includes the counties of Ingham, Jackson, Hillsdale, Lenawee, Monroe, Washtenaw, Livingston, Oakland, Macomb, St. Clair, Sanilac, Huron, Tuscola, LaPeer, Genesee, and Shiawassee.

New Vocational Training For Handicapped

Goodwill Industries of Greater Detroit has added a new training program to the vocational training already supplied to its employees and trainees.

"Tools for Daily Living," as the new program is called, consists of a course in the ABC's of reading and writing. It is welcomed by a number of handicapped men and women at Goodwill, who, through unfortunate circumstances and environment, have never had the opportunity to learn to read and write.

Dr. Lee Durham, Director of Adult Education Division of Detroit Board of Education, has given the program his full support and advice, and recommended Mrs. William F. Street, 18643 Warrington Drive, as teacher. Now retired, Mrs. Street taught in the Detroit Public Schools for many years. She is well known to Goodwill folk, having served as the second president of the Junior Group from 1933 to 1936.

In keeping with its sponsorship of the Rehabilitation Services Division of Goodwill Industries, made possible through its magnificent Antiques Market held every year in November, the Junior Group now assumes the expense of the new school class of Goodwill employees.

A class of five employees

and one trainee was begun on June 30, and it is expected that it will soon be expanded by six clients referred and paid for by the State Division of Vocational Rehabilitation. The pupils meet every Tuesday and Thursday from 9 to 11 a.m. for an eight-week term.

If the program is successful, a second class will be organized in September.

Always in search of ways and means to aid Goodwill's handicapped employees, Don McGregor, Director of Rehabilitation Services, says the non-profit organization has reached a new milestone in its 43-year-old program of service.

800,000 Persons Mentally Ill In Michigan

One of Michigan's most pressing problems, the mental health picture, poses some statistics well worth pondering.

Approximately one-sixth of Michigan's general fund is spent for direct care and treatment of mentally ill and retarded patients. In the current fiscal year this will amount to more than \$100 million.

Additional funds will be spent this year for new and expanded mental health facilities, but experts in the field say much more could and should be done.

Indirect costs of mental illness are also great when computed in terms of work absenteeism, welfare costs due to homes broken by this problem, and legal costs arising from behavioral irregularities.

Perhaps even more staggering are the personal figures involved in records of mental and emotional illness.

The Michigan Society for Mental Health estimates 180,000 school age children are in need of psychological attention, while only about 30,000 are actually receiving such help.

There are about 800,000 persons all told in Michigan with some form of mental illness, but only 37,000 of these are in state institutions, according to Society officials.

Some relief for the imbalance between need and existing care is being provided through the relatively new community mental health facilities, but the Society says there is considerable room for improvement.

Recent figures indicated slightly over 17,000 persons in the state are being served in community psychiatric outpatient clinics. Each is hard pressed to meet the demands for service at this time.

The chief sources of relief for this problem lie, according to Society spokesmen, in future community action and greatly expanded and improved programs for children needing institutional care.

Three persons were killed and 419 injured in 569 rural school bus and related type accidents in Michigan in 1963, according to the annual report of the State Police.

Compared with 1962, these represented one more death, 73 more injured, and 15 more accidents.

Accidents physically involving school buses totaled 341, the highest number ever reported and 16 more than the previous year. These killed three and injured 237, increases of two in deaths and 64 injured compared with 1962. All three rural fatalities were drivers whose vehicles collided with school buses. In addition, there was an urban fatality when a child who had alighted from

Associated type accidents—those involving injury to children before boarding and after

leaving the buses — totaled 11. None was killed in this type accident for the fourth successive year. The 11 injured was one less than in 1962 and the lowest total in the 16 years of which records are available.

Other associated type accidents — those involving vehicles affected by the stopping of the buses — numbered 217, the same as in 1962. There were no deaths but 171 were injured, compared with one fatality and 161 injured the year before.

Continuing an increase trend, 590,000 pupils were transported daily in 7,350 buses which traveled 71 million miles during the 1963-64 school year, according to the Michigan Department of Public Instruction. These included gains of 54,000 children, 150 buses, and three million in mileage compared with 1962-63.

To Try Zip Code For Parcel Post

Mr. ZIP has a new assignment—to accelerate delivery of long distance parcel post by 24 hours or more.

Postmaster General John A. Gronouski announced plans Monday to distribute outgoing parcel post by ZIP Code in the nation's 34 largest post offices. These offices account for more than 50 per cent of the total volume.

The program, he said, will not only speed deliveries but will reduce damage to parcels because of fewer handlings in transit.

"I envisage a virtual revolution in the handling of parcels, in speedier delivery schedules and reduction of breakage and error," the Postmaster General commented.

Implementation of parcel

post to ZIP Code has already started in the post offices of six cities — Philadelphia, Washington, D. C., Detroit, Chicago, Minneapolis and Houston. Mr. Gronouski reported.

Next week Deputy Postmaster General Frederick C. Belen will personally get the program underway in Los Angeles, San Francisco and San Diego and announce its implementation in four other West Coast cities — Seattle, Portland, Oakland and Sacramento.

It will be extended to the other 21 post offices by September 1, the Postmaster General said, speeding the general pattern of parcel delivery across the country.

"The success of the program," Mr. Gronouski said, "hinges on public use of ZIP Code numbers in addressing

packages, as well as the co-operation of firms that mail parcel post in large volume.

"I want to emphasize that ZIP Coded parcel post is not designed merely for the benefit of the bulk mailer. Its purpose is to help everybody who sends a package through the mail. We expect it to be a significant postal improvement, especially during the Christmas season."

Explaining how the program operates, Mr. Gronouski pointed out that ZIP Coded parcel post by-passes larger cities where there is a heavy mail volume in post offices and is routed directly to the sectional center nearest its destination.

Delivery thus is accelerated by as much as 24 hours, especially for packages which travel 300 miles or more. And since fewer handlings are involved, the possibility of damage is reduced.

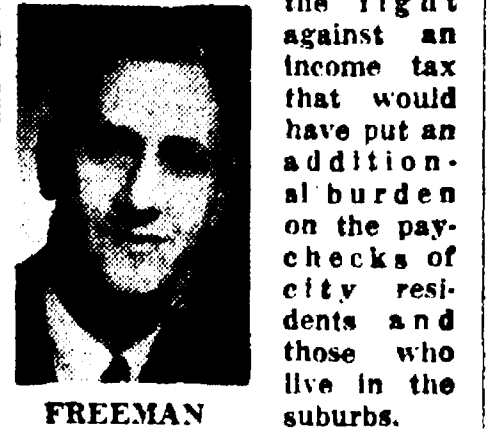

Judge Freeman's entire career has been marked by his fighting for the rights of the average consumer and voter.

He has been a constant foe of consumer frauds and juvenile delinquency, and has been honored for his work in both fields.

Voters who would like to see this kind of a judge on the new Appeals Court bench are urged to cast their ballots for Judge Donald R. Freeman, who seeks election in the primary Sept. 1.

These voters can find his name on the non-partisan ballot and can help promote this man — a judge who is known as a fighter for the people.

To project is known as "Operation Midnight Sun." The Lions International Service Organization is supplying \$600,000 worth of materials for the project.

These classes are held under the direction of Eastern Michigan University at Ypsilanti and sponsored by the State Department of Public Instruction and met at Southwest School in Howell.

School bus drivers were given a complete course on laws and policies governing school bus operation in Michigan with emphasis on safe and economical operation. Drivers had actual experiences in staking out a bus in case of an accident, first aid, fire fighting and emergency evacuation of the bus.

The State of Victoria in Australia has introduced a plan in which drivers will not be entitled to a full driving license until they have been driving a car for three years without a serious traffic violation. Under this probationary system a motorist will lose his license automatically for three months if convicted of any of seven offenses.

Fair Visitors To See Future Post Office

Visitors to the New York World's Fair from Brighton have an unusual opportunity to see a post office of the future, Postmaster Al Bosworth said today.

A carefully-chosen group of 80 employees from New York area post offices man the facility which handles all the Fair's mail and some from the Flushing New York area. The outside mail is used to keep the highly mechanized devices operating at "full tilt."

The post office handles approximately 250,000 pieces of mail each day.

Postcards to friends and relatives back home are a big item. About 30,000 are mailed from the Fair each day. One third of these are addressed to persons overseas.

Foreign visitors have no trouble understanding U. S. postal operations. The facility has staff members who speak twenty languages.

Postmaster Bosworth notes that residents of Brighton Area who attend the Fair and wish to try out their foreign language ability can either talk with the multi-lingual window clerks or listen to a tape recorded presentation in the post office lobby which features individual earphones for those

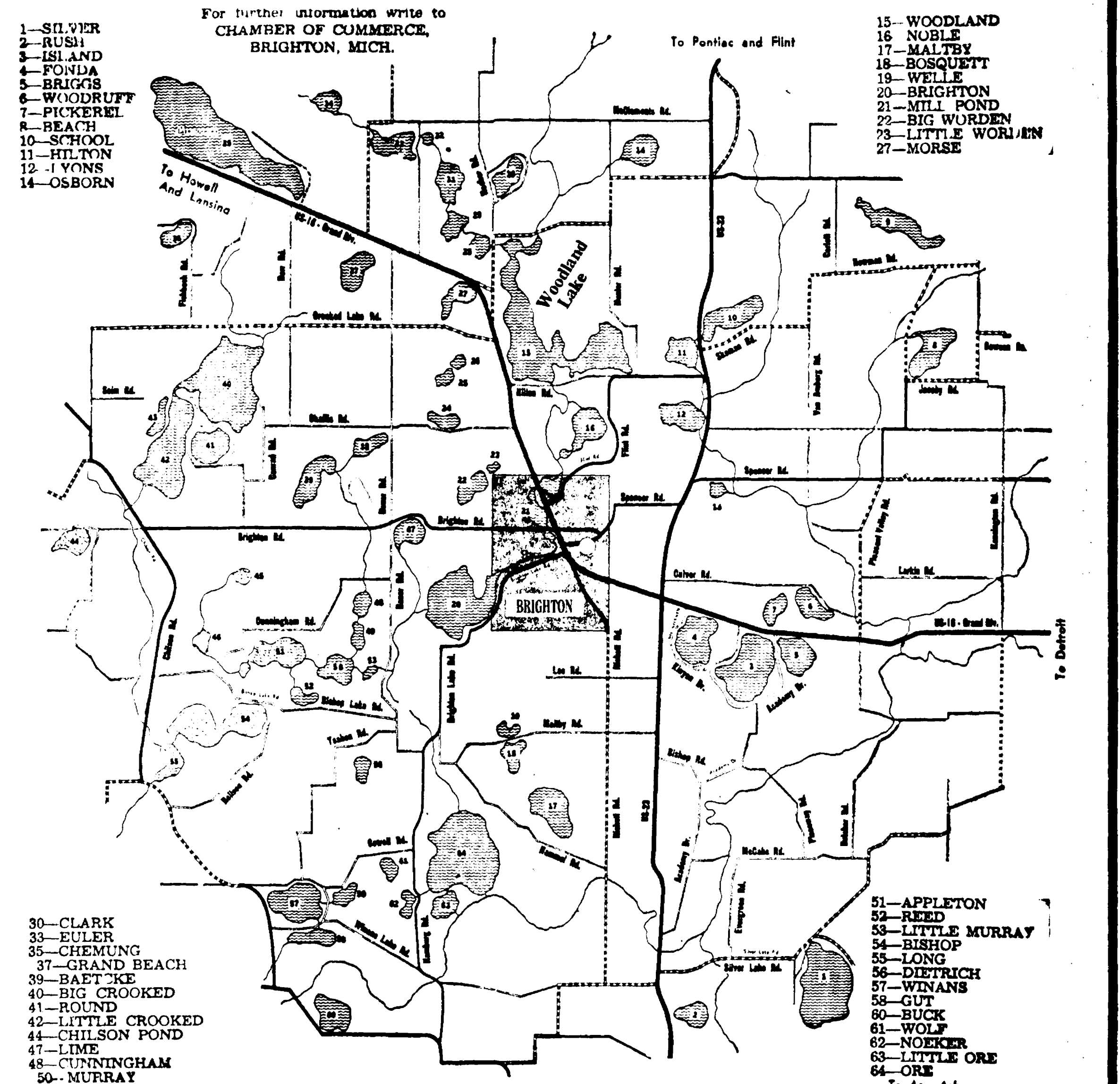

SKYDIVERS



There are some that would say skydiving is a fool's pastime, but a dedicated group who each Saturday and Sunday at Richmond Field, eight miles west of Pinckney would readily disagree. As a sport, it is increasing in popularity throughout the United States and the world.

Tom Kaminsky of Howell, pictured here among the clouds is one of the groups of young men and women who practice this sport for "kicks." It isn't an inexpensive sport either, the average parachute costs from \$175 to \$250, and can run as high as \$500. The initial cost of \$30 for instruction, jump boots to help absorb the shock of landing, and sturdy clothing are also a must.

Plain parachuting, the action of departing from an aircraft, falling, opening a chute and making a descent, differs from skydiving. The skydiver manipulates his body and his chute, literally steering himself through the air in an attempt to land on a predetermined target. This takes considerable skill and practice. The usual jump is from an elevation of 3,500 feet.

Bangs Richmond, owner of Richmond Field, says, "These young men and women jump here every Saturday and Sunday, depending on weather and wind conditions. Everyone is welcome to come out watch, there is no charge for spectators."

Mr. Richmond, a grandfather twenty times over, is a flight enthusiast. "Anytime they've got room for one more passenger, I hop right in," he says. He is an old Pinckney boy, having lived on the site where the Three Brothers Farm is located. He attended Pinckney schools until the 6th grade. The land at Richmond Field was bought by his grandfather back in 1897 and Bangs Richmond has lived there since he was 10.

"Tools for Daily Living," as the new program is called, consists of a course in the ABC's of reading and writing. It is welcomed by a number of handicapped men and women at Goodwill, who, through unfortunate circumstances and environment, have never had the opportunity to learn to read and write.

Dr. Lee Durham, Director of Adult Education Division of Detroit Board of Education, has given the program his full support and advice, and recommended Mrs. William P. Streit, 18643 Warrington Drive, as teacher. Now retired, Mrs. Streit taught in the Detroit Public Schools for many years. She is well known to Goodwill folk, having served as the second president of the Junior Group from 1933 to 1936.

In keeping with its sponsorship of the Rehabilitation Services Division of Goodwill Industries, made possible through its magnificent Antiques Market held every year in November, the Junior Group now assumes the expense of the new school class of Goodwill employees.

A class of five employees and one trainee was begun on June 30, and it is expected that it will soon be expanded by six clients referred and paid for by the State Division of Vocational Rehabilitation. The pupils meet every Tuesday and Thursday from 9 to 11 a.m. for an eight-week term.

If the program is successful, a second class will be organized in September.

Always in search of ways and means to aid Goodwill's handicapped employees, Don McGregor, Director of Rehabilitation Services, says the non-profit organization has reached a new milestone in its 43-year-old program of service.

Michigan State Flag History

Secretary of State James M. Hare has an interesting anecdote to relate concerning the official Michigan emblem.

Here's the story: Several years ago, Hare, who almost daily has a parade of youngsters into his office for a little visit, decided to experiment on the youngsters' knowledge . . . or more accurately their lack of it . . . of the Michigan Flag. In a general question, Hare asked the children, who were junior high youngsters, what our Michigan Flag looks like.

"It was surprising to learn that none of the children even knew we had an official State Flag, much less what its appearance was," Hare stated.

"Not one of the youngsters knew the history behind the Flag or what it stands for. I decided then and there to do all to help promote Michigan's Flag to Michigan's people."

Hare said that since Michigan Week began, many more people had become "Michigan Flag conscious" but that there was still a long way to go before the Flag became universally recognized or widely used.

Hare related the history of the Michigan Flag:

"Our Flag dates back to Michigan's early days of statehood . . . nearly 130 years ago to 1817. It was on a well-

known date, February 22, which is the birthdate of our first president, George Washington, that the Michigan Flag came into being.

"On that date, Stevens T. Mason, Michigan's first state governor, presented the Flag to a group of Michigan militiamen known as the 'Brady Guards' of Detroit, the first company of uniformed militia in the state's history. The 'Boy Governor,' as Mason was known, made this presentation in Detroit, then the Capitol City of Michigan.

Hare continued:

"The banner presented by Mason depicted himself on one side. On the other side of the banner was the state's coat-of-arms and a soldier with a lady. This was the first Flag which bore the Michigan coat-of-arms.

"It wasn't until 1865, however, after the close of hostilities during the terrible Civil War when the Michigan boys in blue returned from the battlefields, that Michigan officially adopted a new design for the Flag. On one side of the new banner was the Michigan coat-of-arms, while the reverse side bore the coat-of-arms of the United States. The newly-designed state emblem was first displayed on the 4th of July in 1865 during the dedication of the cornerstone of the Soldiers' National Cemetery, the site of the Battle of Gettysburg.

"In 1911, the Flag underwent still another change . . . a change which has endured to this day, although several times persons have sought to change it. Actually, it amounted to using the state coat-of-arms and omitting the U. S. coat-of-arms on the other side.

"We keep discussing the Michigan coat-of-arms. Actually, this was designed even before Michigan became a state, when it was known as the Michigan Territory. The first territorial governor, General Lewis Cass, designed the central coat-of-arms. General Cass had been a soldier in the War of 1812. He was conscious of Michigan's strategic geography on the international boundary of where the land fighting of the war had taken place. He placed on the shield of the state coat-of-arms the word: 'Tuebor . . . I will defend.'"

Hare also outlined how the Michigan Flag should be displayed:

"Whenever possible, the Michigan Flag should be displayed with the Stars and Stripes. If carried in a parade or procession, the State Flag should be carried a little back of the U. S. emblem. No State Flag should ever be placed above or to the right of the Stars and Stripes.

"Whenever the two flags are displayed from a staff, the Michigan Flag should be below the Stars and Stripes. If it is displayed in a room against the wall, the State Flag should be on the left, the Flag's own left. From a pulpit, the State Flag should be flown from a staff placed on the speaker's left as he faces the audience, and the Stars and Stripes should be on the speaker's right."

Livonia Couple Are Honored on Friday

When James and Janis Weston and their miniature dachshund, Schnapps, pulled into Bruin Lake State Park late Friday evening, for a week end of camping they had no inkling of the publicity awaiting them.

Pinckney Recreation Area Manager Ernest Bottke, Jr., and his staff had been eagerly awaiting the arrival of the 20,000th camping family to use the recreation facilities since the Pinckney area was developed in 1944.

Fifty cents about twelve years ago there have been three raises in the camping fee to \$1.50 per day and 25 cents for electricity at this time. These increases, of course, paralleled the increased costs of materials and labor.

During this time of course camping has become a much more popular family sport, and through the late 50's and early 60's increased the size of our Bruin Lake Campground from thirty sites to sixty sites to ninety sites and finally in 1962 to its present size of two hundred twenty-four sites. The last expansion and installation of toilet facilities was accomplished with motor vehicle permit funds.

This motor vehicle permit act was passed in 1960 and made the funds resulting from the sale of bonds available for capital improvements in the area.

The first parcel of land was purchased for the development of the Pinckney State Recreation Area on November 15, 1944. In the next four years small picnic sites were developed at Silver, Halfmoon, South and Bruin Lakes. Fishing sites were existent at Halfmoon Lake, South Lake and Bruin Lake.

This area was new and not very many people knew of its location, so that camping registrations for the year 1948, I recall, totaled eighty-nine.

At this period in the development of the area campers were allowed to camp anywhere and there was no charge for camping. Campers were registered as a courtesy so that friends and relatives could find them in case of an emergency.

As the popularity of camping increased two things happened out of necessity. One, camping was limited to designated areas only, and a small fee was charged for camping to help defray the cost of personnel and supplies needed to maintain the camping services.

Farming 3rd Most Hazardous

Farming continues to rank as the third hazardous occupation. Only mining and construction have higher accidental death rates. Yet many farm accidents too often could have been prevented. Frequently the farm employer who is injured is temporary help — itinerant worker or a student working during the summer. Lack of proper training and the knowledge to work safely make these workers potential risks.

The farm employer should make an extra effort to be sure his workers understand their duties. They should learn the proper, safe way to operate equipment and handle the materials they use. Although a high school student with a driver's license makes an excellent worker in the summer months, caution should be taken in letting this boy operate a tractor without proper instructions first.

The National Safety Council says 55 per cent of tractor accident victims are under 20 or over 60 years of age. Tractor overruns, both on farm and on highway, account for nearly two-thirds of the deaths. Other leading factors are falls from tractors being run over by tractors and power-take-off accidents.

Although the Michigan Rural Safety Council says the state's farm record has improved significantly, there are still more accidental deaths in farming than in any other Michigan industry. It's up to everyone to insure "Safer American Families Everywhere."

Girl Scouts To Get 2 New Buildings

Late this summer the first two identical permanent buildings will be erected on the Huron Valley Girl Scout property on Crane Road, between Bemis and Willis Roads just outside of Ypsilanti. The buildings, designed by Tanner and Kowalewski of Ann Arbor, are a combination shelter and unit-kitchen which will serve 40 girls in each kitchen and shelter up to 100 girls during inclement weather.

At the completion of these buildings, this campsite will be formally dedicated and named in memory of Miss Mildred Crawford, one of the early leaders of Girl Scouts in this area.

In 1928 Miss Crawford started her first Girl Scout troop at Roosevelt High School, Ypsilanti. Troop No. 5 camped, hiked, and came to be devoted followers of nature under her guidance.

Over the years, and until her death December 18, 1956, Miss Crawford was a troop organizer, camp director, and was President of the Ypsilanti Girl Scout Council in 1949 and 1950.

The Ypsilanti Council merged in 1958 with other neighboring councils to form the Huron Valley Girl Scout Council, and a special committee was formed to continue this project. In January of 1962, 50 acres of land was purchased from Mr. Daniel T. Quirk of Ypsilanti. This is the land where the buildings will be erected.

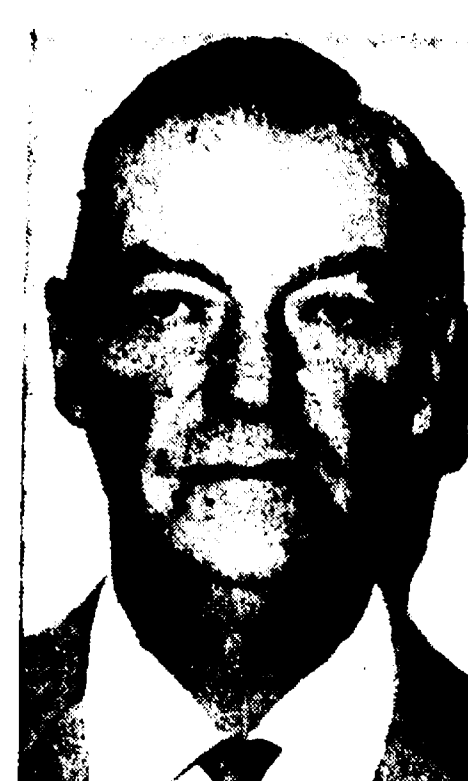
