Pirates To Play Opener Friday

Riot Ends Democratic Convention Sat.

Delegates Disqualified By County Chairman

Second Convention Is Held Tuesday

A second convention of Livingston County Democrats was held last night, Tuesday, in Howell, called by County Chairman Edward Rettinger.

The meeting was to have been held in the Court House but the board of Supervisors voted Tuesday to not allow any group to use that building until the grounds committee establishes rules and regulations for its use.

Rettinger then moved the meeting to the Southeast School in Howell, where a county executive committee was elected and a slate of delegates to the state convention named.

Livingston county will send two sets of delegates to the state convention in Lansing where the credentials committee will have to rule on which delegates will be recognized.

Rumors have been circulated that Zoltan Ferency, State Democratic chairman, was favoring the Rettinger group, but in phone call to Ferency Wednesday morning he stated that he "was strictly impartial" and that the matter would be settled on the floor of the state convention.

Set Rettinger Trial Friday

Edward A. Rettinger, Hamburg township clerk, is scheduled to go on trial Friday morning at 10 o'clock before Justice of the Peace G. Eric Singer in Brighton. The trial will be held in the City Hall.

He is charged with a warrant issued by Prosecuting Attorney Charles Gatesman with "failure to make available for inspection at a time when his office was open, absentee ballot applications."

The charge is based upon Rettinger's alleged failure to let Brian Lavan, Democrat candidate for state representative, and John McMillan, Democrat candidate for county clerk, inspect the Hamburg township lists of absentee ballot applications.

The prosecuting attorney ordered an investigation of the absentee ballot list, which was conducted by Sheriff Lawrence Gehring, and no irregularities were reported.

Donald A. Moran, Rettinger's attorney, and Prosecuting Attorney Charles Gatesman were scheduled to appear before Justice Singer this morning, Wednesday, and examine the list of prospective voters. Rettinger will be tried before a jury of six.

Meeting Is Re-convened Same Night

What started out to be a Democratic convention Saturday evening in Howell turned into a melee that police had to quell. Ed Rettinger, chairman of the Democratic committee, began the meeting by reading a letter to the Attorney General asking that "quo-warranto" proceedings be started against many of the elected delegates to the county convention, on the grounds that some of the names on the ballots appeared in larger print than others, thus creating a "psychological" influence on the voters.

The 1963 Election Law is very specific about the manner in which county conventions are to be conducted and states "A permanent chairman shall be elected before any other business is transacted and such election shall be conducted as follows: The county chairman shall cause to be read the list of elected delegates for such convention furnished to him by the county clerk."

In spite of the fact that all delegates present at the convention carried notices from the Livingston County Clerk, Joseph H. Ellis, certifying their election, Rettinger's "credentials" committee, led by Gerald Sixby, read a list disqualifying 85 out of 110 delegates.

It was at this point that the heckling turned into violence as several men and women started scuffling and pummeling each other. Four sheriff's deputies and two State Police entered the room and soon had the courtroom cleared and locked.

What began as heated arguments developed into fistfights and the sheriff across the street, hearing the commotion arrived on the scene and efficiently performed his duties. After arrival of the police Mr. Rettinger called a recess.

At 11 p.m., on the advice of Robert Montgomery, state elections director, Mrs. Lillian McMillan, of Hamburg, a member of the State Democratic Central Committee, reconvened the convention with 54 delegates in attendance.

Rettinger ignored a motion on the floor by Otto Wendel, delegate from Conway Township, that a roll call vote be taken to select a new convention chairman. Dr. Thomas A. Barton, favored by most of the delegates for chairman, also suggested that the voting proceed to be nullified in the event that the attorney general decried Rettinger's charges of "psychological warfare" were correct.

To close the evening's program, Tom Mrozek very ably showed pictures of the various activities that took place at Camp Kett, and also the beautiful lake and wooded area. Senior Farm Bureau members were proud of these three young people and are most encouraged with the results of the three day Seminar. FORTY EIGHT YEARS AGO



County Clerks Urged to help Register Voters

Michigan's county clerks have been empowered and urged by Secretary of State James M. Hare to help register voters for the coming general election November 3, a job heretofore handled by township and city clerks. The last day to register is October 5.

In a directive to all county clerks, Hare . . . the state's chief elections' officer . . . asked that county clerks and their duly authorized staff personnel help cities and townships in registering electors.

However, before county clerks may assume the responsibility of registration, they must be appointed as registra-

tion assistants by city or township clerks and file an oath with the appointing authority. "I feel that county clerks can be of invaluable aid in getting our unregistered electorate on the rolls so they can cast ballots in the general election," Hare said. But he noted that it was strictly the prerogative of the city or township clerks of the various municipalities to initiate the program.

The nominating committee named the following as alternates to the state Democratic convention: Jean Desch, Hamburg township; George Boyd, Joann Perry, Green Oak; Martin Lavan, Brighton City; Thomas A. Barton, Howell; Jennie Hopkins, Genoa; Phillip Krupa, Charles Powers, Brighton.

All names recommended were unanimously approved by the delegates.
