Auto Crash Takes Life of Pinckney Man

Edgar Smith, age 54, of 255 Hamburg Street, Pinckney, was killed instantly Saturday evening when the auto he was driving, crashed into the bridge abutment just off M-36 on the Dexter-Pinckney Road.

Mr. Smith has lived in Pinckney the last three years, and has been an employee at King Seeley Thermos Co. of Ann Arbor as a die-cast operator.

Born November 10, 1910 in Columbia, Ky., the son of Wade and Spicey Scott Smith, he married Ruth Howard on January 1, 1955.

He is survived by his wife;

two sons, Richard and Bobby Joe of Brighton; a stepdaughter, Caroline Fletcher of Pinckney; three brothers, Gilbert and Alfred of Columbia, Ky., and Carlisle of Campbellsville, Ky.; three sisters, Maytra Smith of Edinburg, Ind., Mrs. Emma Morrison of Ann Arbor and Nora; and three grandchildren.

Funeral services were held Tuesday at 10 a.m. from the Swarthout Funeral Home in Pinckney with the Rev. Thomas Murphy officiating. Burial followed at Pinckney Cemetery.

Worthy Grand Matron Anne Joyce and Associate Grand Matron Shirley Jones were present for both afternoon and evening sessions. Several other grand officers were also present.

County officers from Oakland, Genesee and Washtenaw counties were escorted to the East and introduced. Esther Campbell and Edith Carr of Pinckney were among the past presidents of the Livingston County Association to be introduced.

Worthy Matron Lucille Camburn of Pinckney Chapter, W. M. Evelyn Cameron of Fowlerville Chapter, W. M. Jean Lanning of Michigan Chapter of Brighton and W. M. Hazel Mison of Howard Chapter each gave a detailed report of the activities of her chapter during the year.

A business meeting was held and officers for the ensuing year duly elected.

An impressive memorial service was held and a resolution passed on during the year was given by Howell Chapter No. 372 under the direction of Worthy Matron Hazel Mison.

The afternoon session was adjourned; dinner prepared and served by the Pinckney Chapter was serving in the dining room at 6:00; and the evening session convened at 7:30 p.m.

More distinguished guests were introduced, among them past Worthy Grand Matron Betty Clark of Jonesville.

Present Worthy Grand Matron Anne Joyce addressed

the assembled OES members and also thanked them for the generous donation given to the OES scholarship fund by the Livingston Co. Association.

Officers for the coming year were installed with the exception of the incoming president Nettie Vanderhoof of Howell who at present is a patient at the University Hospital in Ann Arbor. She will be installed at one of the four Friendship Nights of the ensuing year.

Dorothy Wilson of Pinckney Chapter was installed as first vice-president, Frances Rathbarn of Fowlerville was installed as second vice-president, Bertha Conroy of Brighton became the third vice-president, Zella Borton of Brighton, secretary-treasurer; Mildred Durk of Brighton, marshal; Julia Ruttman of Fowlerville, chaplain; and Eloyse Campbell of Pinckney was installed as organist.

After a few closing remarks by retiring president May B. Forest, the meeting was closed.

Both County Delegations Rejected at State Democrat Convention

After an all-night session, a credentials committee appointed at the State Democratic convention decided against seating either set of delegates from Livingston County.

The committee handed down its decision to be voted on by all 19 districts represented at the convention.

"It is the action of the credentials committee that neither delegation be seated officially at this convention," Mr. King read.

In his report, he said that fifteen of the nineteen committee members felt that E. Rettinger, party chairman, had failed to comply with the elections statute which says that the first order of business at a convention was calling of a roll call vote to elect a new chairman.

Mr. Rettinger had disenfranchised 85 out of 110 elected delegates on the grounds that the anti-Rettinger candidates' names had been printed larger than Rettinger's candidates. (A letter from Doubleday Co., printers of the ballots said that the error had been a human one and that because the Rettinger candidates' names had arrived later than the others they were set in different type.)

King said that the anti-Rettinger group had not been in order when it re-convened the convention after the county election was interrupted by a riot.

RETTINGER APPOINTMENT

Edward Rettinger was appointed presidential elector from the second congressional district at the Michigan State Democratic Convention last Saturday in Lansing.

"This is the greatest honor ever bestowed on me," he said.

Most delegates favoring the majority report felt that accusations by Rettinger of collusion between what Rettinger called the "Lavan Teamsters Slate" and the county clerk in the matter of disqualifying petitions before the election, if valid, should have been settled in court. Rettinger claims that the FBI and the postal inspector are investigating the election.

Ruth Munzel, in her testimony before the committee, stated, "They said they would see to it that my husband would be ruined."

Clark Shanahan, Shiawassee County Probate Judge from Owosso, represented the anti-Rettinger delegation and called on the committee to "take away the phony issues" and accept the vote of the people who selected the anti-Rettinger slate at the polls.

"This (Rettinger's action at the county convention) is contrary to the Democratic concept of playing the game on the level," Shanahan said.

He called the "quo warranto" threat "merely a smoke screen"

Brian Lavan, who also testified asked, "What have you to do to win an election in Livingston County?"

In his plea, Mr. Rettinger repeated the question and added, "What haven't they done?" Rettinger said he didn't know why Democrats had to go to a Republican Clerk and a Republican elections director.

He accused the other group of collusion with the county clerk and the printing company and asked, "How far can a sinister hand go?"

Ruth Munzel also testifying on behalf of Rettinger, went into the history of the party in the county when she spoke before the committee. She said that she had organized a write-in campaign two years ago to unseat Martin Lavan as committee chairman and had, since that time, increased party membership 200%. She said attempts to work with Lavan had failed.

Two minority reports were given on the floor of the convention. The first favored seating the Rettinger delegates with no vote; the second, seating Rettinger alone in a fraternal gesture with no vote.

Both minority reports were voted down by the nineteen districts in a roll call vote.

During the credentials committee questioning of representatives of each delegation, Mr. Rettinger was

asked whether or not quo-warranto proceedings had been started in court against the Lavan delegation. It took him a little time to answer no. Mr. Rettinger said that a letter had been sent to the attorney general's office in Lansing, but that no court action had been taken. Leon Cohen, deputy attorney general, said Monday that his office had the matter under study.

Asked if it was customary for such proceedings to be initiated in the attorney general's office, Mr. Cohen said, "This is not a customary situation. I don't think we can go on anything that's happened before."

Martin Lavan, approached about the situation at the convention Saturday said that he views acceptance of the majority report as favorable. It proved, he said, that Rettinger was acting illegally in trying to "steal" the county convention.

Mr. Rettinger said that while he is not pleased that no delegates were seated, that was politics, and he would have to live with it.

Asked if he intended to support the nine candidates who were elected (i.e., Martin Lavan, Brian Lavan, John MacMillan, Walter LaMoria, Marjorie Mier, Lyle Redinger, Jack H. Shinn and Russell Cole, Rettinger answered that he would work for the betterment of the Democratic party. He did not wish to say if he would lend his support to these candidates, all but one of which are anti-Rettinger until he talked to the people who had worked with him the past two years.







Many consumers won't even notice it, but some packages being sold in Brighton have a new look because of the state's 1964 revision of the weights and measures act.

Under the new law the quantity must be declared on all packaged items sold by weight, measure or numerical count. Thus if a non-foot item is sold in a container that looks like a quart it must state the exact quantity inside.

Terms that tend to exaggerate content quantity such as jumbo, king-size, giant or full are illegal under the new law, which took effect August 28.

Some of the computing problems of shoppers also are cut down under the act. Each package must be labeled in terms of the largest unit.

A 20-ounce loaf of bread, for example, must be declared as one pound, four ounces, or 1 1/4 pounds.

Agriculture department spokesmen emphasized that many packages of non-food items which did not comply under the old law already labeled their goods by quantity but there were some who didn't.

The old theory was that the size of the container spoke for itself.

Among manufacturers who did not label for quantity, no law violation occurred for a semi-filled container because the law did not require this declaration.





SEC. 507. Any registered elector who has removed from 1 election precinct of a Township, City or Village to another election precinct of the same Township, City or Village shall have the right to make application to have his registration transferred on any election or primary election day by executing a request over his or her signature for such transfer and presenting the same to the election board in the precinct in which he is registered. Upon receiving such request, the inspector of election in charge of the registration records shall compare the signature thereon with the signature upon the applicant's registration record and if the signatures correspond, then the inspector shall certify such fact upon said request and the applicant for transfer shall then be permitted to vote in such precinct for that election only. The application for transfer shall be filed with the Township, City or Village Clerk who shall transfer such elector's registration in accordance with the application. When the name of any street or resident house number in any Township, City or Village has been changed, it shall be the duty of the Township Clerk to make the change to show the proper name of the street or resident house number in the registration records, and it shall not be necessary for the elector to change his registration with respect thereto in order to be eligible to vote.
