Orthopedic Clinic For County Children

The Michigan Cripple Children's Commission will sponsor an orthopedic clinic at McPherson Community Health Center, beginning at 8:00 a.m. on Thursday, October 8th. The Livingston County Medical Society and the Livingston County Health Department will be co-sponsors.

The purpose of the clinic is to follow up patients in Livingston County in the age group of infancy to twenty-one who may have received orthopedic care in the past. It will also be possible to see patients referred by local physicians at this time. It is believed such clinics can do much in the prevention of progression of disabilities by helping plan future treatment. Work can be both with youth suffering disabilities from time of birth as well as those resulting from diseases such as polio.

Dr. Robert W. Bailey, orthopedist of the University Medical Center, Ann Arbor, and a pediatrician will jointly conduct the clinic. Local volunteer workers will do the appointment and clerical work. In many cases, appointments have already been made by letter from the commission. Examinations will be held in the conference room and nursing school class room in the west wing, ground floor, of the hospital.

Persons attending the clinic are requested to use the northwest entrance of the hospital by the self care unit. This can be reached by driving along the driveway to the north of the employees parking lot from Byron Road past that lot to the entrance in the court at the back of the building. Parking is available there.

Washtenaw Dem Chairman Proposes 'Peace' Attempt

Peter Darrow, Washtenaw County Democratic Committee chairman, last week made a futile attempt to patch the split in the Livingston County Democratic Party.

Mr. Darrow asked Edward Rettinger, Livingston county committee chairman to attend a meeting with the following candidates for offices on the Democratic ticket: Gerald Dunn, Brian Lavan, Martin Lavan, John MacMillan, Marjorie Meir, Russell Cole, Walter LaMoria and Jack Shinn.

In a telephone conversation with Martin Lavan, Darrow said that Mr. Rettinger refused his invitation to the meeting which was to have been held at the Miller school.

The purpose of the meeting was to give some direction to the campaign for the coming election. All those asked were agreeable except Rettinger.

"We have tried", said Brian Lavan, "to make peace in the family and bury the hatchet."

Zolton Ferency, State Democratic Committee head, who was also invited to attend, was contacted in his office last Wednesday.

"I'm willing," he said, "to attend any meeting called by party leadership in Livingston County in an effort to work out any problems that may exist in the area. I do not believe, however, that a meeting that does not have present all the people interested in working out these problems would be fruitful."

Because no county delegates were recognized at the state convention, it will be up to the elected Democratic candidates in the county to select a party chairman. Mr. Rettinger's term of office expires in January, 1965.

The celebration October 9 and 10, will consist, primarily, of Consumers Power holding open-house at Pilgrim Hall each of the two days with many various gas appliances on exhibit. The officers and a special committee watches all new legislation to enable them to appear before the proper legislative committees and voice their objection if the riparian rights of lake and river front property owners are in any jeopardized. The Association also assists riparian owners with a solution of their common problems; promotes research and education in the field of water resources for local and regional areas and acts as a clearing house for all problems and information relative to the riparian rights of its members.

Roger Wicklund from Dept. 9 of Conservation appeared before the meeting to explain the new six point program of the Department. Inasmuch as the success of some phases of the new program will depend a great deal upon the Lakes and Streams Associations of Michigan it would appear that it will be of mutual benefit for both organizations to cooperate in every possible way. The Association recently published a 38 page pamphlet "Water Rights for Cottage Owners" and it is available from the secretary-manager of any Association member.

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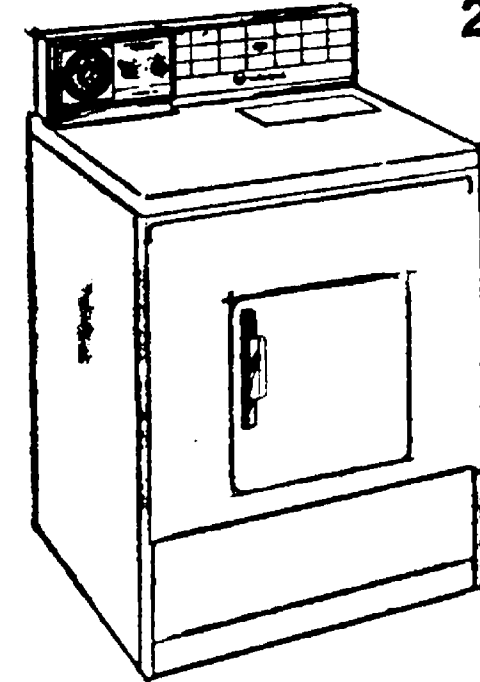
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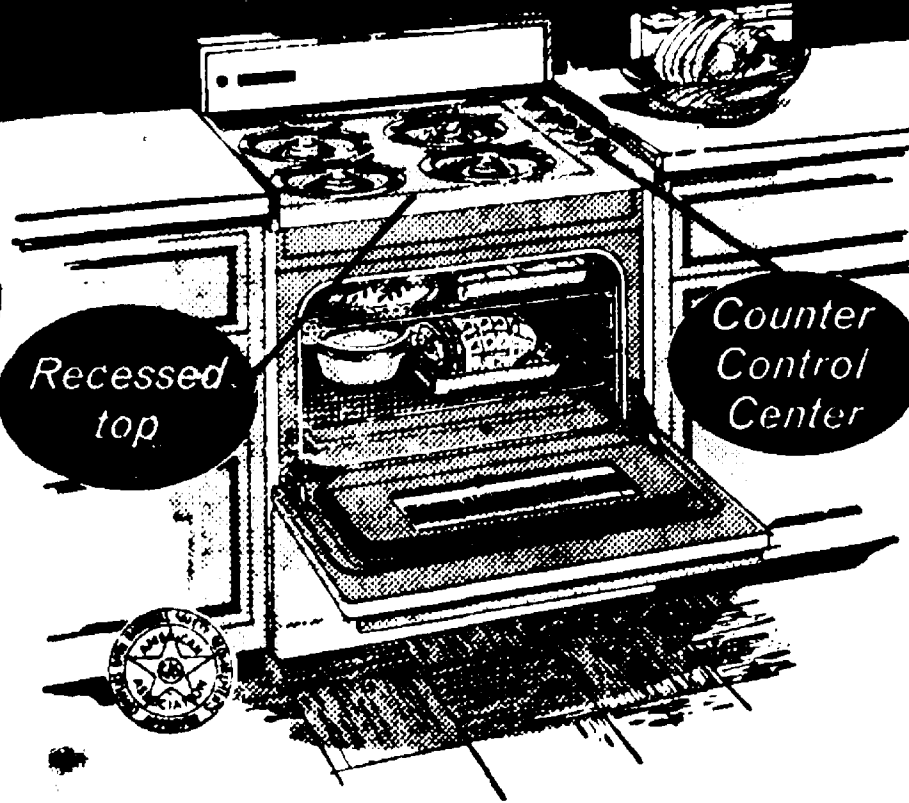
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Pinckney JV's Lose Opener to Leslie

Last Thursday Sept. 24, the Pinckney Junior Varsity Pirates played Leslie's JV, team, the Black Hawks, and lost 8-0. Pinckney won the toss, on the rainy evening, and kicked off from the West end of the field.

Thus the game began and many soaked, loyal Leslie and Pinckney fans watched the battle. For the entire first half the ball went back and forth between the teams without a scoring play and only a few minor threats. Leslie was on of tense most of the time for it seemed as though almost every time the Pirates offense got the ball they either fumbled it or had to forfeit it on their fourth play. One of Pinckney's few drives was started by a 25 yard run by right halfback Randy Brown. the end zone.

After the kick from Pinckney to Leslie, Leslie drove 55 yards and topped it with a touchdown.

The try for the extra point failed and the score stayed at 8-0. This Thursday, October 1, the Pinckney JV's will go to South Lyons to play the Lions.

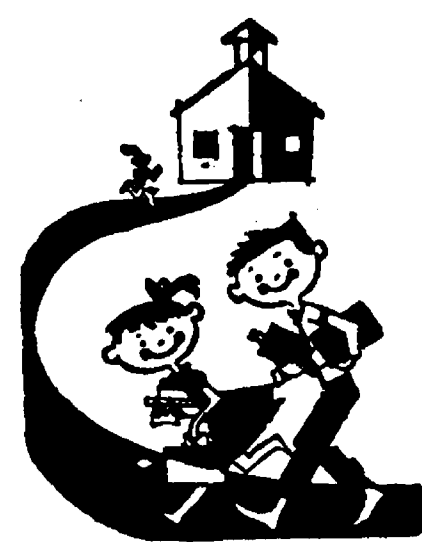

Leslie won the toss and elected to receive. The ball passed hands a few times before either team could do much. Garry Henry the Pirates fine quarterback then elected to run it himself and the Black Hawks didn't catch him till 60 some yards later. They brought him down on their own five. Merle McMichael the Pirates swift half-back flew around the right end on the next play for Pinckney's first touchdown. The conversion attempt failed and the score was 6-0.

Leslie was next to score. It was in the second quarter on a 10 yard pass play from Phil Brown to half-back Dale Boddell. There was no more scoring in the first half. The score The Pirates completely dominated Leslie 7, Pinckney 6. Inated the third quarter as they garnered three touchdowns for 18 points.

The first of three was a 35 yard punt return with McMichael once again and a great burst of speed. Jim Pine threw a key block taking out two Black Hawks at once to spring McMichael loose on his long run.

The Pirates third touchdown was accounted to the defense. Defensive tackle, Alan Steffen and Clair Bell, combined forces when Steffen jurred the ball loose from Leslie's runners in the end zone and Bell pounced on it for the six-pointer. The Pirates scored their final T.D. when Henry plunged over the

Black Hawks from the one. A 21-yard pass to John Haas set it up.

No one scored again until the final play of the game. Brown once again lofted one of his floating passes and this time Ron Ekins pulled it in.

BOARD OF EDUCATION



Frequently praised, at times criticized, the board of education must weather all climates of opinion if it is to carry out the responsibility of running a school system that will provide a quality education for children under its jurisdiction.

Although all citizens have the right to attend school board meetings and speak in or question issues on the floor, final decision on school issues resides with the board of education.

In its appointed legislative and judicial capacity the board of education is called upon to project educational needs from nursery school through junior college. Along with curriculum problems, the board of education occupies itself with the important task of maintaining the business of education. In financial considerations the board must adopt a budget able to meet the community's ability to pay, decide the salaries of school personnel, and determine the school building program and what operative school equipment should be purchased.

Points vital to remember are that school board members are voted into their positions in open elections and that members of the board of education represent a cross section of individuals whose prime concern is the student and education.

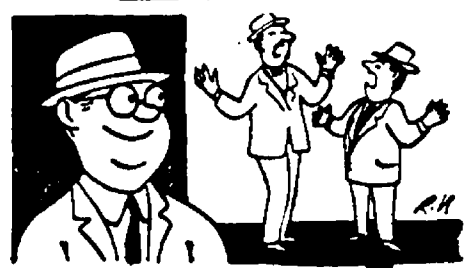

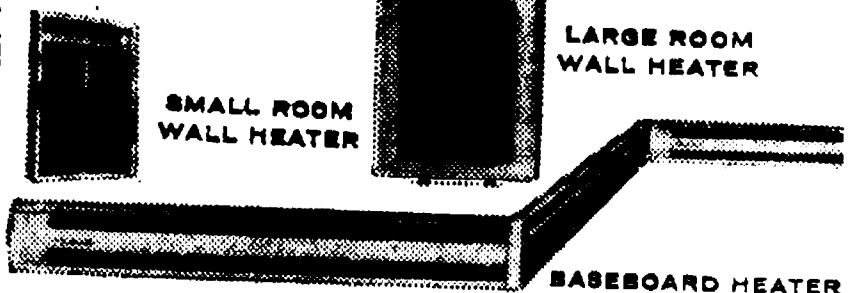

Tourists to Leave \$800 Million Here This Year

Expanded promotion ap-
parently has done its job for
the tourist industry in Mich-
igan.

State Tourist Council Direc-
tor William T. McGraw pre-
dicts that this year's travelers
to Michigan will leave \$800
million in the state. Last year
the estimated 11 million tour-
ists spent \$727 million here.

McGraw credited favorable
weather most of the summer,
the busiest season, with a good
part of the increase in tourist
tensive local and regional pro-
motion also accounted for some

Of the amount spent by tour-
ists this year, McGraw said
the best estimate available
was that the state itself would
collect more than \$56 million
in taxes.

This includes sales taxes,

cense fees.

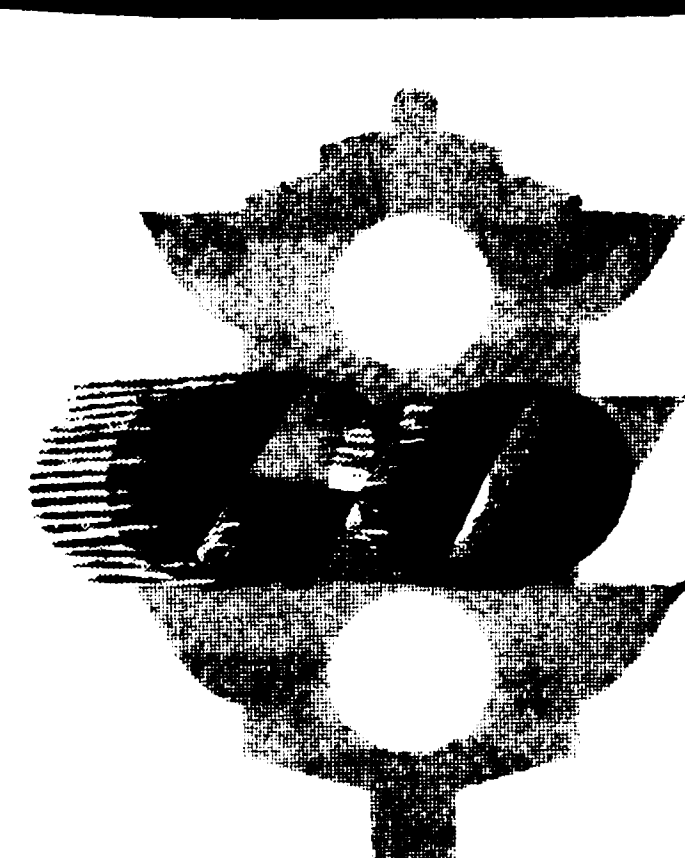
The contribution of tourists
