requently praised, at times criticized, the board of education must weather all climates of opinion if it is to carry out the responsibility of maning a school system that will provide a quality education for children under its jurisdiction.

Although all citizens have the right to attend school board meetings and speak to or question issues on the floor, final decision on school issues resides with the board of education.

In its appointed legislative and judicial capacity the board of education is called upon to project educational needs from nursery school through junior college. Along with curriculum problems, the board of education occupies itself with the important task of maintaining the business of education. In financial considerations the board must adopt a budget able to meet the community's ability to pay, decide the safaries of school personnel, and determine the school building program and what operative school equipment should be purchased.

Points vital to remember are that school board members are voted into their positions in open elections and that members of the board of education represent a cross section of individuals whose prime concern is the student and education.

Expanded promotion apparently has done its job for the tourist industry in Michigan.


