## Community Chest Reorganized

### Goal Set at \$6,500; Will Start Oct. 20

#### Demonstration Enjoyed By Craft Club

President Graf would like to announce the names of the three girls who did such a terrific job making posters for the Bake-Rummage sale. They were Sandra Bell, Dana Meabon and Janet Cosgray, all students from Mrs. Alta Meyer's 8th grade.

Mrs. Helen Kaump, Winam Lake was named chairman for the 1964-65 Hamburg - Putnam Community Chest Drive at a re-organizational meeting held Tuesday of this week in the Hamburg Fire Hall. Del Leapley of Hamburg and Mrs. Elizabeth Colone of Putnam were also named to the Board.

The "Drive" will begin October 20, and will continue through November 12, with a goal of \$6,500 set. Persons living in these two townships, but working elsewhere are urged to stipulate at the place of their employment their desire to have their pledges go into the Hamburg-Putnam Community Chest. This must be done each year. According to last year's Chairman, Don Gibson, the local Chest lost \$700 dollars this way, and he stresses the point strongly that each individual should be responsible that this be taken care of where he, or she works.

Outgoing chairman, Gibson said an overwhelming response was received from various organizations, to the plea for new faces to serve on the Community Chest Board. From the twenty-eight various organizations invited to have representation present, eleven showed. This included one Pinckney church and two from Hamburg. The following organizations were represented: Pinckney Fire Department, Pinckney Kiwanis, Pinckney Extension Group, Masonic Lodge, No. 76; Boy Scouts, The People's Church; Livingston County Wildlife and Conservation Club; Hamburg Fire Department, Hamburg Village League, Hamburg Rebekah Lodge, Hamburg Chamber of Commerce, Hamburg St. Stevens Episcopal Church and St. Paul's Lutheran; and the Girl Scouts.

A redistribution of funds also took place. The local Chest will drop the Michigan Heart Fund, and give the 5% instead to the Boy Scouts. This was decided after learning the Michigan Heart Fund is already budgeted by the Michigan United Fund, to which the local chest gives 15%. If 5% continued to go to the Michigan Heart Fund, it would amount to the Hamburg Putnam Community Chest budgeting them twice, once directed and once through the Michigan United Fund. Two representatives were present from the Boy Scouts, offered their services in the Drive, and requested additional funds. Girl Scouts will continue to receive 5% from the local fund, with additional money available, upon request.

At a recent meeting of the outgoing Board members, some of which have served five years, it was decided that one last effort be made to maintain the Chest. Those who served on the Board previously to Tuesday night's meeting were: Chairman, Gibson, Don Swarthout, Manley Bennett, Mrs. Tiny Richter, Mrs. Jola Hall, and Hugh Radloff.

According to Gibson these six people have assured the present Board they will stand by, if needed, help to keep things moving, with hopes that the 1964-65 Drive be a successful one.
